Mr & Mrs Bishop, who have moved from Banbury into Cotswold Close with their four children Debbie, Lee, Mathew & Kelly.


Mr Bob Evans, who has moved all the way from Devon into Cotswold Close.

NATURE NOTES



DATURA STRAMONIUM, known as Thornapple or Jimsonweed, after Jamestown, Virginia, the first permanent English settlement in America. founded in 1607.

Sept. 6th. Today I noticed a well grown Thornapple plant in our neighbours' garden. This is the first one that I have ever seen, but one was found in a field in Sibford Gower some years ago. Why they appear where they have not been previously is a bit of a mystery. I wonder whether the see'd might be imported in some way from the U.S.A., where it is more common. Perhaps with Soya Bean which is used in animal feed.

Sept. 16th. Although some people have told me otherwise, I am convinced that the numbers of Swallows, House Martins and perhaps Swifts are still falling. They may be some of the birds that are having difficulty crossing the ever widening Sahara desert.

Sept. 18th. It has been a late but quite good harvest with less rain than last year, which has meant that the ground has been firmer than it was after the exceptionally wet July of last year.

The dry spell at the end of August had many farmers, who had finished their Barley, champing at the bit as the Wheat was still not ripe enough for the combine. In the days when we used to cut with a binder this spell of weather would have suited us well, as we liked to cut Wheat a bit earlier and let it ripen in the shook. If it was allowed to get fully ripe before the binder went into it, a lot of the grain could be lost through shedding during the many times that each sheaf was handled before it was finally threshed and the corn was in the bag.

The Wheat harvest is now virtually complete, although we did see some still standing near Tysoe this morning, but most of the Linseed and Beans are yet to be harvested. Beans are the crop that has been revived in this area by the E.E.C. subsidy given to encourage the production of high protein crops. It must have been usual to grow some years ago, as I remember being told it was often appropriate at harvest festival to sing "All is safely gathered in, all except our Winter Beans". I suppose that, in the intervening years, they were replaced by Soya Beans imported from America.

SIBFORD FERRIS PARISH COUNCIL

Traffic Calming Measures - Affordable Rented Accommodation

There were two important items that were raised at the recent meeting of the Parish Council and which will be discussed again at the next meeting arranged for Tuesday 2nd November to which people may well feel they want to attend.

First of all the continued problem of drivers speeding through the village despite the 30 mile an hour signs was raised. This involves local people as well as those just passing through and the Council are very concerned that there is going to be a serious injury unless something is done about it. They are therefore considering the possibility of 'traffic calming' measures and the options available plus likely costs. Please come to the next meeting if you have views on this proposal that you wish to be heard.

The lack of affordable rented accommodation for young people and low wage earners in the Parish was also brought to the last meeting. As a result the Regional Director of The Rural Housing Trust has been invited along to the 2nd November meeting of the Council to outline the possibilities of action to alleviate this problem here in Sibford Ferris. This will undoubtedly be an issue on which many people feel strongly if so please take the opportunity to come along and join in the discussion.

Sibford met Tysoe in the final of the George Clark Cup on 4 September and despite the cold and penetrating wind blowing down from Edge Hill, the small Radway cricket ground saw a close match to decide the competition.

Tysoe, batting first, made a good start putting on 54 runs before losing the first wicket to a run out and reaching 84 before Wollerton struck, bowling Evans for 52. From this point on the Sibford bowling took control and Tysoe were all out for 120. The wickets were well shared with all five bowlers having success.

Nigel Fletcher was left the job of guiding the team home, but saw Gilbert bowled by Boswell without addition to the 94 on the board. David Bennett then joined Fletcher and the two of them took the score steadily towards the 121 target. With Nigel on 12 and David on 10, Nigel hit a glorious four, giving victory and the George Clark Cup to the jubilant Sibford Cricket Club.



Driving out of New Orleans across the 20-mile wide Lake Pontchartrain on a hot muggy night in November 1984, with the echoes of a myriad jazz tunes still dancing round my brain, I never dreamed that the next time I would hear such glorious music in the open air, I would be in 'my own' Cotswold village on a cool September evening, standing outside a gleaming marquee that was throbbing to a succession of such eternal jazz strains as 'Muskrat Ramble' & 'Royal Garden Blues'. For me, the Tierra Buena New Orleans Jazz Band made Sibford Shindig 93 a thoroughly exhibarating and memorable evening.

My enjoyment was only slightly marred by the absence of those traditional epicurean adjuncts to N'Orlins jazz - jambalaya, gumbo & catfish stew; there wasn't even a bottle of McIlheny's Tabasco to add genuine Louisiana spice to the succulent hamburgers. But there were some superb foot-long tangy barbecued sausages, that went down a treat with the beer from the well-stocked bar provided by the Lampert Arms (pity there was no Hooky). There was also a vast selection of delectable salads prepared by the ladies, so, since we were, after all, in Sibford and not in The Deep South, a respectable 9 out of 10 for the food & refreshments.

The organizers had ensured that the marquee was well arranged (perhaps 'ship-shape' would be more apposite), with a wooden dais for the band, enough tables & chairs for the over 100 participants, adults & children, to sit & eat at in comfort, and a convenient alcove for the bar. The raffle had excellent prizes (eg. meals for two at local hostelries) and the draw was conducted by Bob Thompson with his expected and professional aplomb.

When I reluctantly dragged myself away (I had promised 'er-indoors not to be''too late'), the shindiggers were at last responding to the music (and possibly the refreshments) and, as they say, or at least used to, 'the joint was jumping'.

I understand that the organizers were disappointed by the attendance (another 15-20 and they would have broken even) and are wondering what detered people this year and what to do next year to attract more participants.

Was it too late for a 'marquee' event? Was the music too 'specialist' to attract the general public? Would a simultan-eous youngsters disco in the Hall, with a soft-drinks bar, have helped? Had the news got around beforehand about the absence of Hooky?

I am sure the organizers on the Village Hall Committee would be pleased to receive any useful comments or suggestions.

For me, it was a great evening of foot-tapping music, convivial conversation and, oh, those foot-long sausages.



Dubane Trust - Zimbabwe

This trust was set up by Stephen Hussey - a farmer's son, an ex-scholar of the Friends School who, when he left, went to Tasmania, New Zealand and finally to Rhodesia to study farming methods. He stayed in Rhodesia, which became Zimbabwe, and formed the Trust which helps small farmers in subsistance grain production, and providing and storing drought-resistant seed.

They are also helping in irrigation by well-drilling and by hand pumps made by local smiths, trained in their workshop, who are ready to set up in local villages; but they lack anvils, leg vices, and swage blocks - these are blocks of iron (weighing from 2cwt to ½ton) with perforations for bending bars, rods, and plates.

These cannot be obtained in Zimbabwe and only bought from abroad using 'hard' currency. There must be many of these in the district in the back of sheds and old forges and never used; they are too bulky and heavy to take to the tip in the car boot.

The need is urgent, and transport can be arranged. If you have any of these, and would be willing to donate them, or know where there are any that are not being used, please let me know.
