

NATURE NOTES Springtime(?) in Scotland



March 26th. Wood pigeons, as they did last year, are taking blossom buds from our plum trees and the tits are taking the flowers from our weeping prunus. The tits seem to be eating the base of the flower and dropping the petals which makes me think that they are seeking the nectar:

April 2nd.An observant person tells me that he has recently seen a white pheasant near Traitors Ford. I suppose it may have been a hand reared one. I have never seen a truly wild pheasant that was white but I did see a white one amongst about two hundred that were feeding alongside a wood last year.

April 4th. Having arrived here at Killin, Scotland in rain yesterday I thought that we had woken to a brighter day but we found on looking out that it was only brighter because an inch of snow lay over all. By Loch Tay we saw a party of long tailed tits, a few redpolls and a sizeable flock of siskins.

April 5th. Two inches of snow this morning with snowploughs at work on the roads. The snow had largely gone when we had an enjoyable walk along the gated road on the north side of the river Dochart. Some showers only served to enhance the colour of twigs. The red/brown of the birch, grey areas of ash and the larch which were surprisingly bright with an orange tint to them while the evergreens made a good background. I was fooled by an old tree growing by the roadside whose trunk looked like a larch. When told to look higher up I saw that the trunk devided, one head being larch and the other scots pine. It seemed that the two seedlings must have grown so close together that they merged to form one trunk. In the river a dipper walked from its perch on a rock to feed in the water but the current was strong and it was soon swimming like a duck. There were quite a lot of larks and meadow pipits among the lambing ewes in a field that the road ran through. The farmer told us that his main flock on the hill would not start lambing until May. In some marshy fields peewits and curlew were calling and mallard dabbled in the flooded areas while on the skyline we spotted a stag. Walked from Glen Lockay up a little road that used to go to a group of shielings but is now surfaced as far as an enclosure on the line of an eight foot diameter pipe which takes water to a hydro-elctric power station. I think that the enclosure may have surrounded a filter point to screen any debris from the water before it plunged steeply to the





Something to make

Have you ever seen a hovercraft travelling over the sea? They are fascinating to watch because they actually float over the water by forcing air beneath the hull. This month you can follow these instructions and make your own model hovercraft. You will need:

a balloon

a circle of stiff card about 10 cm. across


a drawing pin

a piece of tube which is wide enough, for the neck of the balloon to fit tightly over --- you can make this from an old cereal packet

glue

- 1. Make a small hole in the middle of the circle of card with a drawing pin
- 2. Glue a piece of the tube (about 4 cm. long) over the hole in the card.
- 3. Blow up the balloon and, keeping it inflated, fit the neck over the tube.
- Place the card on a smooth tabletop, and it should float like a hovercraft.
 N.B. It is important to keep the card completely flat.


Why does it work? The air comes out of the balloon spreading beneath the card and lifting it just above the surface. Because the card and the tabletop hardly touch, there is very little friction between them and the card moves easily.




WAS IT EVER FOUND??

The book belongs to the Friends' Library and they would be delighted to have it back. Perhaps this is the year that someone's Spring cleaning or Bring and buy will bring it to light.


