
SIBFORD PLAYGROUP





Nature Notes.



The Sparrowhawk

April 19th. Today I heard of what must have been a chance in a million. The tailgate of a car had been left open while goods were being unloaded. When the owner returned and shut it there was a great commotion inside and he found that he had shut a sparrowhawk into the car. I can only think that it must have been chasing a small bird to have gone into such a place.

April 28th. I have not seen or heard the nuthatch for several days now so I suppose that it must have moved away to find a mate to replace the one that died when it flew against our window last summer. This is sad as I have enjoyed hearing it's frequent call while working in the garden. The pattern in the past has been for them to spend a year or two here with lengthy spells between these visits.

May 14th.Saw my first swifts of the season at Tysoe this morning. There have been eight or ten house martins around the Ferris since the 27th of April but there seem to be very few swallows as yet.

May 15th. When I washed through some blanket weed that I removed from our garden pond I extracted about twenty dragonfly nymphs which were all of the short bodied type. They looked to be full grown and likely to hatch this summer. There are more newts in the pond this year and this evening I could see sixteen, some of them engaged in their courtship display.





SIBFORD GOWER PARISH COUNCIL

* Minutes of Annual Parish Meeting *

The Annual Parish Meeting of Sibford Gower was held in the Primary School on 20th April under the Chairmanship of Mr R E Payne and was well attended. The Chairman welcomed County Councillor David Turner and District Councillor David Green.

The Chairman reported that the Council had met 6 times during the year dealing with various issues affecting the village including 19 planning applications, potholes, public footpaths and their stiles and signs and grasscutting.

Notable achievements included the long awaited pruning of the Cherry tree on Burdrop Green which had been completed, a vastly improved grasscutting service and a grant of £1000 for restoration work to the pond. In connection with the latter new outletpipe work had been laid and a thorough cleaning and tidying of the pond and the surrounding area would commence as soon as possible. Also the monthly skip which is placed in various locations in the village is still proving a great success.

The Chairman made special mention and expressed thanks to the Town Estate Charity for their continued support in providing the free busservice to Banbury and Chipping Norton and to various residents of the village who had carried out the pond work, renovating the Council notice board and moving the gritbin in the Colony.

The Clerk reported on the Council's finances which excepting the pond expenditure was running at a similar level to last year. Expenditure for the coming year was anticipated to substantially increase, due to, mainly the forthcoming election and the precept had thus been set at £1.300

Mr Baadsgaard reported on behalf of the Town Estate Charity. The accounts had been submitted to and accepted by the Parish Council and despite slight reduced receipts and increased expenditure the trust was still able to discharge its duties in all three areas of responsibility. The trustees had negotiated a new draft Instrument with the Charity Commissioners and details of this would be announced in the Sibford Scene.

The Chairman then asked the meeting to raise any further matters and these included the gravel hardstanding outside Pond Cottage, the gateway in the wall in front of New Cottage, Burdrop, the opening in the hedge in Hawkes Lane at the new building site, the condition of New Barn Farm Road and blocked drains in the Colony.

With regard to highway matters these were continually being addressed by the Council, reported the Chairman, and were regularly raised with the Highways Department, however, repairs were largely dependent upon funding. Mr Turner agreed to raise personally with the Highways Dept the flooding and state of New Barn Farm Road. The opening in Hawks Lane was being monitored but New Cottage was a lost cause as there was no method available to enforce its closure.

The padlocked gate at Wheathills footpath was raised and it was requested that a gate be constructed instead of the present inadequate stile. The meeting was informed that the County Fieldpath Officer would inspect the stile in the coming week.

In reply to questions the National Rivers Authority would be contacted regarding returning some of the fish when the pond restoration work had been completed.

The controversial planning application at Wheathills was raised and Mr Tompkins set out his position. Further discussion was held after the Parish meeting was closed in order that villagers from both Sibford Gower and Sibford Ferris could put forward their views. Since the meeting the Council understands that the application has been withdrawn.

The 24th of June is Midsummer's Day. Old legends tell us that it is a day of magic when fairies (if you believe in them) feast and dance from midnight to dawn.


The great circle of stones at Stonehenge was built for the festival of the sun. Some of you may have visited Stonehenge. If you haven't you could look for pictures of it.

The sun has got his hat on and he's coming out today".






The 21st of June is the longest day in the year. The sun rises earlier and sets later than on any other day in the year. So here are some ideas to keep you busy on these summer days.

SIBFORD VILLAGE HALL

REPORT BY THE CHAIRMAN, COLIN FRITH, TO THE AGM FOR THE YEAR 1993/94

There tends to be a certain sameness about Chairmen's reports on the annual affairs of the Village Hall. I fear that this year will prove to be little different.

However I will make one refreshing change by reporting first on the causes for pleasure rather than, as in the past two years, matters for regret.

We have had a wide-ranging series of events, some better supported than others, some more financially successful than others, but all without exception most enjoyable - yes even jumble sales and sales of 'seconds' can be enjoyable!

The Officers of the Committee and the small but dedicated band of helpers at Hall events have, as ever, worked tirelessly for the Hall. And too, the Officers of the Committee have as usual been conscientious and thorough in dealing with the Hall's affairs. Work for the Hall is, of course, work for the community, though the community does not always seem too wildly appreciative! Everyone, especially the Chairman, owes them a considerable debt of gratitude.

I am happy that the Committee has been strengthened by the co-option of Keith Manning and Bernard Phillips. It needed strengthening because of those members who fail to play a full part. For the second year running I have to say that representatives of village organisations really must realise that they are full (and should be active) members of the Committee; they are not there (even when they are there!) solely in the interests of their organisations. It would be embarrassing to look up and list the number of occasions on which some have failed to attend meetings. They know who they are. And, of course, we still lack representatives from the two Parish Councils, though mention of the Councils reminds me that we owe them our thanks for their financial support. And while I am in thanking mode, I must record our appreciation to the County Council, Cherwell District Council and the Town Estates Charity for enabling us to construct toilet facilities for the disabled at no cost to Hall funds.

We lost and gained a Hall Manager during the year. David Baker had to resign because he came into full-time employment. We were later able to re-appoint him because through no fault of his own or anybody else, he had to give up that employment. As ever we are grateful to him for his work, as

we are to his wife who is now officially what she had been unofficially for some time previously, Bookings Secretary.

As I think most people know, this is my last Annual Meeting. Advancing years and an increasingly senile memory suggested to me that it would be in everybody's interest, not least mine that I should stand down from this as well as some other activities. I am only here now as a sort of unnatural progression because the late Eric Benton, wishing to give up as Secretary, 'persuaded' me to take over from him some (can it be?) 23 years ago. So my final thanks to those officers who have served with me as Chairman and to those Committee members who have given their support. You'll all continue to be badly needed!


