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

Nature Notes.

May 25th. Magpies were chackling in the trees near our bungalow at a quarter to eleven last night. There was an owl around so I expect they were seeing that off.

May 26th. Last evening my grand daughter pointed out a dragonfly which was resting on a leaf of a day lily. When I looked this morning it had gone but there was an empty nymph case nearby from which it had no doubt emerged. The day lily is a good yard from the pond so the nymph must have crawled across the garden to get to it. They usually climb up the stalk of a plant which is growing in the water.

May 28th. I removed the body of a badger from the road this morning. I expect it had been killed by a car but it was a very unhealthy one with a good quarter of its body devoid of hair and its paw pads peeling off.

June 19th. Went on a very interesting walk, organised by the Sibford Horticultural Society, in Wychwood Forest. The walk was led by Peter Sheasby who showed us a good range of wild flowers like the beautiful common valerian (not the rad valerian) and the pyramidal, southern marsh, spotted and greater butterfly orchids, also twayblades. I am unsure as to whether the twayblade counts as an orchid. We also saw plants with interesting names like the goosefoot which is known as "Good King Henry", herb paris, eybright and the sinister deadly nightshade. We also smelled the difference between cornmint and watermint. While we ate our sandwiches near some man-made lakes a pair of swans and their cygnets posed for photographs. Peter and one or two others saw a woodcock and I thought I caught a glimpse of a buzzard, but the highlight was a fallow deer fawn which lay absolutely still in its grass nest while we milled around within a few feet of it. We could easily have moved on without seeing it. Despite the dry weather one member found a roman snail which looked like a huge garden snail. It is thought that they were introduced by the Romans for culinary use.

Our thanks are due to Peter Sheasby who gave so generously of his free time to take us on this enjoyable walk.

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

The next LEO meeting, on 20 September, will be an evening visit to Banbury Police Station. Full details in the next edition of Sibford Scene.





An order for new swing seats and some safety matting beneath the swings, to prevent the muddy area increasing, has just been placed and this results in the need for more fund raising.



To make your map look old, tear the edges slightly and then gently wipe both sides of your map with a used damp tea bag. Empty washing-up bottles make good water pistols. Pile up some empty yogurt pots and see how many you can hit from five paces away.

Rainy Day Football.

Cut the bottom off a large cardboard box with scissors to make your pitch. Cut gaps at each end of this bottom piece of box to make the goals. Paint this base with green and white paint to look like a football pitch.

Place a ping pong ball in the middle of the pitch. Use straws to blow the ball towards the opposite goal, while your opponent tries to do the same thing. The first to score ten goals wins.

A Game to Play While Travelling.

If you have a long car journey ahead of you, try playing Sign Cricket--One of my favourite travel games.

Have two teams if possible, each taking one side of the road. Whenever a team passes a pub or restaurant on their side of the road they score a point for the number of legs shown on the sign.



'THE GOOD LIFE'

Fifty years ago, on 26 July 1944, Arthur Dring and Margaret Wild were married in the romantic setting of All Saints Church in Harewood, an 18th century model village outside the walls of Harewood House, the home of the then Princess Royal (who marked the occasion by allowing them to use her own private entrance to the church).

The couple had met in 1937 when Arthur came to work as a gardener at Harewood House, where Margaret's father was running the estate. When the War started Arthur volunteered for the RAF; he & Margaret became engaged in February 1940, a few days before he set off for the Middle East - little did they think that it would be more than four years before their next meeting.

As the War ebbed & flowed, Arthur's duties took him to Egypt, Palestine, Syria, Greece, Cyprus, Turkey (in mufti), and the Desert, including Tobruk & El Alamein. Margaret helped the war effort as a telegraphist and then as an instructor on PO counter work and took part in drives to boost National Savings - but still found time to pen a total of 1376 letters to Arthur!

When peace came, they at last settled down to married life. After a while they decided to go into market gardening - a wise choice at a time of food shortages and rationing! (Many will no doubt recall that this was the time of clandestine pig rearing and bartering as a way of life.)

In 1954, and with 8 year old Anthony's schooling in mind, they ventured south and Arthur became estate manager/head gardener/maintenance man/book keeper/etc at Sibford School; Margaret became matron/housekeeper the following year. During the next 28 years they saw many changes at the School, including the introduction of mains water and the increase in pupils from 200 to 340, with an even greater percentage increase in staff.

Since their retirement from the School in 1982 they have continued to enjoy life in their bungalow in the Ferris; Arthur uses his horticultural skills to keep his flower & vegetable garden immaculate (with a little help from his good neighbour and fellow golden-wedding celebrant, David Elldred), whilst Margaret keeps her matronal skills in tune by looking after Arthur.

May they share many more years of 'The Good Life'.

SIBFORD GOWER PARISH COUNCIL

At the Annual Parish Council Meeting held on 17th May Mr Eric Payne was re-elected as Chairman and Mrs Maureen Hicks as Vice-Chairman. The stiles as Wheathills were again discussed and since the meeting the Clerk has received a letter from the Field Path Officer informing the Council that the original Parish Claim of 23rd May 1951 clearly states that at every boundary on this path there was a kissing gate. The Field Path Officer will be taking this matter up with the owner of the land.

The Clerk has written to the County Engineers Department with regard a 40mph speedlimit in the village as the Council is concerned with the speed with which carusers travel through the village but were informed that limited resources for such measures are having to be concentrated at sites where there is a history of casualties. The Council urge road users to take care when driving through the village especially near the Primary School.

The pond has been cleared off the blanketweed several times and once the frogs have gone a workparty will empty the pond and clean it thoroughly before returning some fish.

The Council has also received a letter from the Rural Housing Trust with regard Affordable Housing for Sibford Gower.

HOLY TRINITY CHURCH PARISH SUPPER

As promised in the last issue of the *Scene*, here is a report on the results achieved after the supper and financial presentation.

We have received many appreciative letters, not only about the supper itself but about the manner and content of the presentation. Grateful thanks to those who wrote.

One correspondent commented that he had not previously realised the narrow support base which the figures disclosed [that we had only 26 regular and committed pledges out of a Family Roll of 80 people and villages with a population of over 700].

The good news is that the base has been widened; there are twelve new donors under Deed of Covenant and 6 new regular uncovenanted pledges. In addition there have been six donations, some of which may be repeated and three other pledges whose monetary value is as yet unknown. I suppose that it could nevertheless be seen as a little disappointing that with the sizes of the Family Roll [more formally, the Church Electoral Roll] and of the village population, the base is still relatively small.

But let us be positive. The exercise has clearly engendered a lot of good will and in financial terms there is, in new or increased covenants grossed up for recovery of tax, a fraction under £3,450 per annum of *new* covenanted money and there are new pledges of uncovenanted giving amounting to something over £600 per annum. And we have received single unpledged gifts of £285 including a splendid £80 raised at an event run by the Friendship Club in aid of our funds. Another substantial gift is promised, but I knew about it well before the supper, so we cannot claim it as a result of our efforts. So if there are no unforeseen disasters our finances look reasonably secure for a year or three. But any prudent Treasurer still ought to say to those who want there to be a Church in Sibford, 'if you aren't giving regularly please consider doing so. If you are, please remember to review your giving as your own circumstances improve'!

To all those who have responded to our appeal I offer on behalf of the Parochial Church Council (and indeed myself) our very grateful thanks.


