# Nature Notes.

Sept 25th. A Badger was seen trotting calmly up the Hook Norton road at 8 o'clock this morning. It trotted past the entrance to Cotswold Close before turning into the crop of maze inn the House Ground.

Oct 4th. While walking this morning we found a good range of late wild flowers including basil-thyme and blue fleabane which I have not found growing locally before.

Oct. 5th. It was lovely to hear the trilling of dabchicks when we visited a pond near Cottisford. There were at least 8 of them as well as a heron, some pochard, moorhen and coot and quite alot of the late red dragonfly (common sympetrum) flying on this lovely sunny day.

Oct 6th. To the New Forest for a couple of days. Walked mainly through oak and beech wood with a lot of holly, some of it well berried, as underwood. There is a greater variety of mushrooms than I have ever seen on the ground, on fallen trees. We saw no sheep or pigs. There were a few cattle and of course plenty of ponies with some cute foals. The ponies keep it too well trimmed to get a big show of wild flowers but there have been some good stands of foxgloves.

Oct. 7th. While having breakfast at our lodging we watched a nuthatch, not on a tree but working it's way over an old brick patio just outside the window. seemed to be finding plenty to eat there. surprised to see such large areas of heather moorland within the bounds of the forest. One huge area we walked across this morning was pockmarked with holes a few yards across and a few feet deep which were left after it's use as a practice bombing range during the last war. Beside the path we found a huge wood ant nest some three feet high and four and a half feet wide, made of leaves, bark, larch needles and bits of twig with plenty of ants in residence. We have seen very few signs of rabbits here. I am wondering whether the pebbles in the ground make it difficult for them to dig burrows. As we were making our way back to our car we saw a hornet buzzing round isolated holly. It seemed to be enjoying the warm sunshine.

Oct 19th. The first flight of feldfares that I have seen this autumn settled in our trees this morning.

#### A NEW SCENE MACHINE for the MILLENIUM

In November 1990 the Trustees of the Town Estate Charity provided the funds to purchase a reconditioned photocopier for the *Scene*.

This machine has given good service to the *Scene* and to other Sibford users, but for the last few months it has shown signs of old age - creaking joints, rattling (cog) teeth, occasionally stopping for a rest and generally showing a tendency to develop bad habits. Our gallant team of *Scene* printers were beginning to find it difficult to print the 5000 sides per issue with their fingers permanently crossed.

But what to do? A replacement machine, even with an excellent discount, would now cost £1285, plus the dreaded 17½% VAT (which we had forgotten about) - a total of over £1500. As previously mentioned in the Scene, we have managed to build up a modest 'reserve' fund, thanks to the annual contributions of villagers and to the donations from some of our village organisations, but this was nowhere near the required amount.

We considered several possible solutions (hire purchase, selling zero-interest shares in the *Scene*, charging villagers to view the Rector's garden, etc). In the end, our Treasurer wrote a letter, in his best joined-up handwriting, to the Town Estate Charity Trustees, explaining our dilemma.

We can now report, with unbounded elation & gratitude, that the Trustees have once again come up trumps - they have sent us a cheque for a magnificent £1000, which has enabled us to go ahead and purchase our new photocopier, which should see us well into the next millenium.

Unfortunately, this leaves us with one small potential snag. Because of the unexpected £225 VAT on the machine, the Treasurer had to use up some of our 'operational' fund as well as all our 'reserve' fund, with the result that we may run out of money before our next income from adverts, contributions & donations starts to arrive in March 1995.

Consequently, this would seem to be an ideal time for any villagers or village organisations who have not sent donations this year to help us out; also some of our regular supporters may like to make an extra one-off donation - every little helps, as somebody once said.




Our recent 50/50% sale resulted in a profit of £93. Many thanks to all who helped and to those who contributed raffle prizes - Whichford Pottery in particular.



Dear Sir

I am puzzled by the white plastic sticks that have appeared in the road at the bottom of Main St in the Ferris. What are they for?

Are they to protect those pedestrians who, in accordance with the Highway Code, walk down the road on The Manor side? Such pedestrians (especially those with push-chairs, etc) are now forced to walk several feet away from the wall and in the path of oncoming vehicles.

Or are they to protect drivers from hitting the wall? They don't seem to be tall enough for drivers to judge accurately their distance from them. A consequent drift to the right to keep well clear of the sticks may lead to a collision or force an oncoming car to swerve into a pedestrian on the other side of the road. #### A FARMERS VIEW

In the September issue of the Sibford Scene we have Sibford School requesting members of the village community to prevent their dogs from fouling the sports field.

In the same issue we have a report of the Sibford Gower Parish Council meeting where a discussion took place regarding dogs fouling footpaths within the village, apparently the council recommended the use of local fields for owners to exercise their dogs, presumably this means send the dogs to foul those fields.

Several questions spring to mind, 1)Shoudn't the occupiers of the fields be consulted about what happens at their place of work? 2) Does the Council know that dogs can carry a host of diseases that are transmissible to farm animals? 3) Is the Council aware that dogs can and frequently do frighten farm animals and wildlife? 4) Does the Council know that more often than not dogs foul the way to and from those fields, be it path, road, verge, areas adjacent to farm buildings, in fact anywhere they can smell other dogs?

Fouling by dogs is extremely unpleasant! Isn't it time owners dealt with this problem at their own premises or in such a way as to avoid being a nuisance to the rest of the community?
