Nature Notes.

Dec 7th. Birds are getting hungry now. I counted 40 visits by tits and greenfinches to our sunflower seed feeder in one minute at lunch-time today.

Dec 11th. Floods have caused loss of life in Strathclyde. They have had nearly six inches of rain

in the last three days.

Dec 14th. On holiday to 'West Mill' the most westerly house in Devon. It is on the north coast only 20 yards from Cornwall. All that remains of the mill is the water wheel outside and the primary drive wheel, less its wooden cogs, in what is now the dinning room but originally housed the milling equipment. Some of the stones are still in evidence around the garden.

Dec 15th. The sea cliffs here show some spectacular folds in the rock strata. In one area the folded rocks have been eroded to sea level so that, when viewed from the cliff top at low tide, they look like a field ploughed in the old fashioned way with ridges and furrows. A colony of fulmars were gliding round the cliffs and we saw stonechats in the gorse and scrub on the cliff top. Winter heliotrope which is flowering on the hedge banks, is quite common in this area. By a farm gate we saw a renovated single furrow roll over horse plough, I wondered how the horses took to alternately occupying the furrow position.

Dec 16th. To Tamar lakes where there were over 200 canada geese and a flock of at least 1,000 peewits, a few grebe and cormorants but a pair of mallard were the only ducks that we saw. About 15 or 20 snipe rose from a small area of water close by and after darting

round the sky, settled again.

Dec 18th. Visited Braunton Burrows a large area of sand dunes now designated a national nature reserve. It must be a wonderful place to see wild flowers in the summer. I spotted haresfoot clover, yellow-wort, carline thistle, evening primrose and a stonecrop, probably english stonecrop, was doing well where the vegetation was sparse. Over much of the reserve the ground was littered with empty snail shells. They were mostly unbroken which made me think that they were not killed by birds.

Dec 19th. Today we went to see the R.H.S. garden at Rosemoor which looked very nice even in December. I

shall look forward to seeing it a few years hence when it is completed. One advantage of going in December was that with very few people about we saw some interesting birds including a treecreeper, a nuthatch, some goldcrests, 4 ravens and 5 buzzards that seemed to be at home in the hanger that runs right along the top of Rosemoor.

Dec 20th. Walked by the Camel estuary where we saw a great variety of ducks and waders. There were widgeon, redshank, a bar tailed godwit, 2 little egrets and many that we could not identify. We also

enjoyed the thrilling call of the curlew.

Dec 21st. As we were driving home we were surprised to see an area of daffodils in full bloom on the roadside near Ilfracombe. The autumn has been mild and they may be an early variety but I think the streetlights must have had the most influence on them.

Dec 28th. Treherbert in the Rhondda valley has had

nine inches of rain in three days.

Dec 31st. It has been a near average year for rainfall here. I have measured 25.24 inches. June with 0.66" and July with 0.67" were the dries months and September with 3.29" was the wettest.



He will be remembered for a long time by many in the village, especially those who experienced his quiet sense of humour.







Something for you to make for Valentine's Day.


Fold a piece of A4 paper into quarters and draw the following shape. Make sure that your folded edge is in the correct place.

Cut out the shape, but be careful NOT to cut along the fold. This should give you two


identical pieces.



Use a ruler to draw 2 lines from the fold towards the curved top. These lines should be 3cm. away from the sides and 9cm. long. Cut along these lines.



The two pieces must now be woven together. Hold the pieces as illustrated and weave the first strip of the left piece between the first strip, over the second strip and between the third strip of the right piece. Then weave the second strip of the left piece over the first strip, between the second strip and over the third strip of the right piece. Weave the third strip between, over and between to complete a heart shape.





You should now be able to open the completed shape which is now a heart-shaped container. Add a handle and fill with sweets, with tissue flowers or with a special message for Valentine's day. These hearts look good when made with two different colours.

SIBFORD FERRIS PARISH COUNCIL

Your Council has been particularly busy since we last reported in the Scene. Those outrageous white posts in the Main Street resulted in a number of Parishioners turning out for the Parish Council meeting at the end of November. The Clerk was asked to write to the Planning Department and the Highways requesting their removal and several parishioners agreed to write too. I am delighted to say that this lobbying paid off and the posts are to be removed. It's great to know that local democracy does work! Thank you to those people who wrote.

We have been offered a £500 grant to celebrate the Centenary of Parish Councils and have to apply by March to get this money. Suggestions so far have been to provide a seat at the bus stop and a glass cover for the notice board. We would be very grateful for any other suggestions - they must be in by our next meeting on 7 March; We would like to purchase something of real benefit to the Parish, so please give us your ideas.

We have been asked to find a transport representative in the Parish. This is someone who appreciates the importance of public transport in rural areas and who would act as a liaison person between the transport services and local people. The Clerk has a leaflet about this and would be pleased to hear from anyone who would be interested in taking this on. It is a vital task and hopefully someone will come forward. Obviously if we could find someone who uses public transport regularly it would be best, but it is important to have someone to represent our views so any suggestions would be welcomed.

Oxfordshire County Council are also seeking members of the public to join the inspection teams for elderly persons homes in the area. You do not need any special training or experience for this task and again anyone who is interest is asked to contact the Clerk who will put them in touch with the relevant person. This could well be an interesting job and I do know that we have many people in the Parish who are concerned with care offered to elderly persons.

I am about to put in the order for bus tokens for elderly and disabled people once again. 




