


'CHERWELL VILLAGER' - Your Wednesday 'Dial-a-Ride' Service (see timetable on page 22)

This little bus is a community initiative which runs round the villages that are not served too well with public transport to take people in to Banbury once a week. It should come to Sibford on a Wednesday calling at the Gower at 9.55 and at the Ferris at 9.57. It goes to Banbury by a circuitous albeit pleasant route arriving there at 10.50. It leaves again at 1.00pm and this time comes straight home, dropping people at the Gower at 1.15 and at the Ferris at 1.20. If you want to make an afternoon trip into Banbury you can of course catch that bus which will get you back in there at 2.15. Sadly, it has not been used by parishioners with the result that it has ceased to come to the Sibfords. I discovered this on Wednesday when my daughter waited in vain at the bus stop to catch it to work. When I telephoned the Community Transport Association I was amazed by their response for they sent a car out to fetch her and transport her to Banbury at no charge. I cannot think of any other bus company big or small that provides such a service!. ordinator told me that they are only too willing to pick people up from the Sibfords but, understandably, they do not want to make wasted journeys here if no one is travelling. In future therefore, you will need to telephone the day before if you want to use the bus. There are two numbers to try - either 263777 or 255863. [The fare is 75p one way, £1.50 return - Ed]

It would be a pity to lose this service at a time when we have so few other buses and when there is no other way of getting to Banbury in an afternoon, so please do try and use it. It is remarkably cheap compared with the service bus. I personally have used it with my dog to get to an adjoining or further away village and walked home. Other people might like to try it. We could perhaps have a competition for the most enjoyable walk using the villager bus!

Nature Notes.



Feb 24th. My brother rang me this morning from his home in Banbury to say that he had just been watching, from his kitchen window, while a sparrow hawk, having caught a starling, was standing on it and trying to pluck it. They usually pick the feathers from their prey before eating it but this starling was still very much alive and was fighting back. He did not see the end of the struggle as the sparrow hawk flew away over the fence carrying the starling with it.

Feb 27th. I am told that there is one fieldfare in a flock that feeds locally with a white head and neck. I have seen white feathers on several different birds

but not before on a fieldfare.

Mar 1st. A male sparrow hawk rested for a while on a small tree a few yards from our window where it was

sheltered from the buffeting of todays gale.

Mar 7th. This mornings sharp frost produced an even more interesting ice sculpture than the one I saw last month. It was again on a birdbath and its shape was like a three sided vase made up of three triangular sheets of thin ice frozen together up the corners with the top wider than the bottom where it joined the flat sheet of ice that covered the birdbath. By the time I saw it the ice sheet had melted away from the edges of the copper birdbath and was free floating. I found that gentle pressure on the ice sheet made the water well up into the ice vase through a hole in its base. The welling up of the water through the base must have had a bearing on its formation but why it should take on this shape is a mystery to me. I have taken some photographs of it which I hope will come out better than the ones I took of the last formation.

Mar 15th. The song of the blackbird is now swelling the dawn chorus which with us is starting as soon as

the tawny owls have finished their hooting.

Mar 24th. I watched a pair of goldcrests working their way along our yew hedge this morning. They seem to be spending a good deal of their time in our area so perhaps they will nest hereabout.

Young Scene

This year Easter Sunday falls on April, 16th. This is the day that Jesus was raised from the dead after his crucifixion. Christians remember this miracle each year- in fact, Easter Sunday is the greatest of all Christian feast days. In many Christian countries, eggs are given on Easter Sunday as a symbol of the re-birth of Christ. The giving of eggs is a very ancient custom. It probably began when Christians gave up eating meat, fats, and eggs for the forty days before Easter. This period of fasting is called Lent. When Lent is over, and Easter arrives, it is a time for rejoicing, and eating nice things like eggs again.

Have you ever tried decorating a hard-boiled egg?


Use felt-tip pens to draw eyes, a nose and a mouth on the hard-boiled egg. Glue on paper or wool hair, and then make a paper hat. Cut a 3 x 6 cm. strip of coloured paper and then stick the ends together so you have a small circular "display stand" in which to place your egg.



Make a volcano erupt.

Build a model volcano- and then make it erupt!

Inside the earth there is hot liquid rock called magma. It is far below the earth's surface. On the surface the rock is cold and solid. In some places the magma pushes its way up to the surface through a hole in the earth's crust called a vent. This forms a volcano. Each time the volcano erupts another layer of lava or ash builds up around it which gives the volcano its cone shape. Magma from a volcano is called lava. At first it is so hot that it flows but eventually it cools and slowly turns to rock.



You can make "red-hot lava" flow down the sides of your volcano. Although the lava is not real, your model will work just like a real one.

You will need:

a large dish or tray

white vinegar

a small plastic bottle

bicarbonate of soda

sand and gravel


red food colouring

- 1 Add red food colouring to the vinegar. This makes your "lava" red, like the real redhot lava in a volcano.
- 2 Make a funnel out of paper, and half fill the bottle with bicarbonate of soda. Then stand the bottle upright in the middle of the dish.
- 3 Pile gravel, then sand around the bottle to make the volcano. Quickly pour some red vinegar into the bottle and watch the volcano erupt!

(The vinegar reacts with the bicarbonate of soda to release bubbles of carbon dioxide gas which forces out the red vinegar).

Colouring Shapes.

Use 5 different colours for this pattern. Try to keep all the colours separate.




