



Nature Notes.



The Badger

May 10th. This dry spell is making life hard for the birds and mammals that rely on worms and slugs as their main source of food. I have heard of two places where badgers were thought to be taking ducks because the force used to break into the pen was beyond a fox's capability. In one case the ducks made nests away from their usual pen and were sitting on eggs, so rather than disturb them a barricade was put round the nest to keep foxes away, but they were still taken. Last night at about ten o'clock they heard a noise and went out to see a badger trying to get at another sitting duck. It was very determined and was not going to give up easily. It took a bang on the nose with the torch to persuade it to move away. With the big increase in the badger population I expect we shall see more poultry taken by them during dry spells of weather in the future.

May 12th. I was told today about a muntjac that found itself trapped when it jumped down into a back garden and found the walls too high for the return journey. It had to be let out through the house.

May 14th. I saw my first swift of the year today. Their decline in numbers in recent years is probably due to the lack of good nesting sites. They are among the least adaptable birds in that respect. I cannot recall a nest anywhere other than under the eaves of a building and modern farm buildings leave few places for them to get in. I wonder whether a nest box with the entrance through the bottom, fixed under the eaves of a two or three storey house might attract them. Years ago there was plenty of poor thatch around which provided well insulated nesting sites.

May 17th. A good rain at last! Nearly an inch has fallen over the last two days which is more than we have had over the last six weeks.

We had received no further suggestions for the spending of the £500.00 Centenary Grant, so this will be spent on a cover for the Notice Board and a seat at the bus stop. We have received another grant of £500.00, this time to celebrate V.E. and V.J. days. Some of it has been spent on the V.E. day party but there will be a balance, and suggestions for spending that would be welcome.

The Clerk has a leaflet concerning art bursaries for Cherwell District residents and an application form. These bursaries are intended for individuals pursuing professional arts careers or enthusiastic amateurs wishing to attend professional short courses and workshops. They are also available to purchase equipment which will improve or enhance the quality of future work. The word art is meant in its broadest sense and covers every aspect, e.g. painting, sculpture, photography, theatre, dance, music, literature, craft etc. Applicants must be over 14 years of age but there is no upper age limit. If you are interested, please contact the Clerk.



Did you know?

Did you know that crocodiles hatch out of eggs?

Crocodiles are very special creatures. Their ancestors were around a long, long time before ours. There were crocodiles already roaming the earth over 200 million years ago and their appearance has changed very little since then. They lived at the same time as the dinosaurs and managed to survive when the dinosaurs died out.

Here are some interesting facts about crocodiles.

A crocodile can close its ears and nostrils and hold its breath underwater for over an hour.

The longest crocodiles (the estuarine or saltwater crocodile from South-East Asia and Australia) can grow as long as 9 metres.

The mother crocodile digs a pit or builds a nest of plants in which to lay her eggs. She may lay up to 95 eggs at a time.

To tell the difference between a crocodile and an alligator, look for the large 4th tooth on the bottom jaw. If you can see it when the mouth is closed it is a crocodile, if you can't then it's an alligator.


The oldest crocodiles can live up to 100 years.

Of course you all know that a crocodile is a reptile. Reptiles hatch from eggs and most have scaly skin which they shed from time to time. They are all cold-blooded. This means that they cannot control their own body temperature, which varies according to how hot or cold the reptiles' surroundings are. So during the day they will alternately bask in the sun and slide into cool water to stay the same temperature.





SIBFORD GOWER ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Annual Parish Meeting of Sibford Gower was held in the Primary School on 12th May under the Chairmanship of Mr Eric Payne and was attended by 20 local electors. The Chairman welcomed District Councillor David Green.

The Chairman reported that the Council had met 6 times during the year dealing with various issues affecting the village including 16 planning applications, potholes, public footpaths and their stiles and signs and grasscutting.

The monthly skip was still proving a success and it would now be in the village twice a month during June, July and August. Also the village now has a bottlebank sited along Acre Ditch one weekend every 2 months. The dates of the skip and the bottlebank are publicised in the Sibford Scene.

The Chairman made special mention of the Council's memorable centenary celebrations last December.

He also thanked Mr and Mrs Ryall on behalf of the village for organising the VE Day celebrations.

He expressed thanks to the Town Estate Charity for their continued support in providing the free busservice to Banbury and Chipping Norton.

The Clerk reported on the Council's finances. Expenditure for the year ending March '95 stood at £1,580 which included £377 for last years Parish Council election. £223 was spent on the centenary celebrations for which the Council received a grant of £500. The remainder of the grant had been spent on 2 litterbins to be placed in the village. The remaining expenses were in line with previous years. Expenditure for the coming year, excluding VE Day celebration costs, is anticipated to be in the order of £900 and the precept was set at £500.

Mr Baadsgaard reported on behalf of the Town Estate Charity. The accounts had been submitted to and accepted by the Parish Council. Detailed accounts are available for inspection. The new instrument to update the charity was still in the draft stage but the final draft should be finalised within a matter of months and details of this would be announced in the Sibford Scene.

Mr Mulley reported on the Weighbourhood Vatch Scheme (see page 18).

The Chairman then asked the meeting to raise further matters and these included the area outside Pond Cottage, the gateway in the wall at New Cottage, Burdrop, the opening in the hedge in Hawks Lane at the building site, the condition of New Barn Farm Road and blocked drains in the Colony.

With regard to highway matters these were continually being addressed by the Council, reported the Chairman, and were regularly raised with the Highways Dept. However, repairs were largely dependent upon funding. The Chairman agreed that New Barn Farm Road was in a dangerous condition and the Council was doing all it could to having it improved. The Chairman agreed that the Council would again contact Mr Colin Carritt of the Highways Dept but he also stressed that villagers, who were concerned about this stretch of road, should write individual letters. In connection with the opening in the wall at New Cottage there was nothing the Council could do as it had gone past the enforcement date. However the Planning Department had agreed to put it on record so that it would show up in the search when any enquiries were made regarding the sale of the house.

Another visit by the dogwarden was requested as grassverges and pavements were again fouled by dogs.
