



### Nature Notes.

Sept. 23rd. Now that our hardy cyclamen are in full bloom we can see that they are quite a bit thinner than they were last year. We know that the badgers had dug up a few corms during the drought but they must

have taken more than we thought.

Sept. 24th. Although the birds are not very hungry yet I have put out some peanuts and sunflower seed as a cousin from Canada is here and he likes to see what birds we are getting. He keeps a feeding station going to which the commonest visitor is the chickadee which is very like our blue tit. We are seeing blue, great and coal tits in roughly equal numbers and 2 willow tits are coming regularly.

Sept. 30th. As I watched about 35 geese, many of them in vee formation or staggered lines, sail majestically over the village I thought how rarely we saw geese years ago. On a few occasions we did see a skein flying high on a course from the severn estuary to the wash area or vice-versa. Of course most of the ones we see now are the semi tame canada geese which were apparently first brought to this country in the 17th century. I once read in a very old book, that "canada geese were introduced to grace ornamental lakes but have never been known to breed here" which makes me wonder how they kept their lakes stocked for all that time. Be that as it may they have certainly increased over the last fifty years. By 1953 there were thought to be about 3,000 in the country, by the mid sixties there were over 10,000 and now they breed on every suitable piece of water, of which there are more in this area than there were fifty years ago.

Oct. 14th. As I drove towards Enstone today I noticed several old beech trees looking poorly and still holding their leaves which were withered by the drought. Some of the older beeches at Edge Hill are in a similar condition. The old trees seem to have suffered more than the younger ones and their future must be in doubt.

Oct. 17th. I was saddened to see the roadside trimmer at work near the Elm taking off the dead heads of keck, docks, sweet cicely etc. that as well as providing winter food for birds would have been beautiful when coated with hoar frost. It is a pity that we have become so obsessed with tidiness. Although a few more farm hedges are being allowed to grow to produce haws etc. for winter bird food more could be allowed to grow without detriment to crops.

### **ERNEST JONES**

Before moving to Sibford Gower in 1979 Ernest and his wife Vera lived in Whichford where he was church warden, and it was there that he died suddenly on 5 October whilst chairing a PCC meeting.

His father, a methodist minister, filled churches with his oratory. Like father, like son, because Ernest too was a gifted communicator. Following conscription and a commission in the army he worked in a bank for a short while and then decided to qualify as a chartered accountant.

Ernest discovered where his real abilities lay when invited to lecture, on an occasional basis, to accounting students. This led to his becoming head of department at what was then called the City of London Polytechnic, and he had the distinction of introducing the first degree course in accounting. He was to become disenchanted with all the administrative duties - what he enjoyed most was lecturing, particularly simplifying, de-mystifying and de-jargonising finance and he devised a method of teaching the subject which was unique and which he was to use to great effect over the next 25 years in his popular "Finance for Non-Financial Managers" courses held nationwide, even in Sibford Gower, and overseas.

Ernest delighted in living in the Gower - so much so that the financial training business he and Vera had set up in London back in 1978, was extended so that they could have a local office near Temple Close (more recently adding to it a small conference centre) and thereby enjoying village life more fully.

Ernest was president of the Hook Norton and District Silver Band and, because he was an ardent Frank Sinatra fan, the band most movingly completed their short repertoire during the funeral service with "My Way".

A larger than life personality he had time for everyone, but his special people were children. He enjoyed supporting organisations such as the boy scouts and doing things for the primary school. He revelled in making things happen and a good example of this occurred two years ago when he masterminded Bandcare - a concert with fireworks at Broughton Castle in aid of various childrens' charities.

Because he impacted on so many people Ernest's premature death at 67 leaves a big vacuum in the lives of many of us. The consolation is that he would have wanted it that way!

### ERNEST JONES - A PERSONAL TRIBUTE

There could not be one of us who had the good fortune to know Ernest Jones who was not stunned by the news of his untimely death on 5th October. Our heartfelt sympathy goes to Vera and the Jones family.

Just a couple of weeks earlier Ernest & Vera had dined with us; a lovely lighthearted occasion on which we exchanged gossip, dissected governments and laid out our plans for the future. As always, Ernest was brimming with ideas & dreams of perfection. Sadly, he has been denied the opportunity of finishing the job he so much wanted to complete - and we the pleasure of his delightful company & presence amongst us.

I don't think I ever knew a man who loved people as much as Ernest, nor for a person of such strength to be so self-effacingly kind to those who came within his orbit. No wishy-washy theorist, he was a clear-thinking man with strong beliefs & convictions and an ability to impart them to others. If we (foolishly!) discussed politics I often found his reasoning much more persuasive than my own!

Many will be our cherished memories of Ernest in & around Sibford. The lurid bow tie and benevolent countenance at Temple Close during those wonderful summer garden parties, the soothing music of the Hook Norton Silver Band which Ernest so loyally supported. His strong voice leading the carols to celebrate the beginning of Christmas in the village. And if you stayed late, the soothing strains of Frank Sinatra accompanied his devotee's mellow mood to perfection.

His ceaseless efforts to support the community in which he became a key figure, whether in the Church at Whichford or his home village of Sibford Gower, will never be forgotten. Nor will the mischievous grin, the rapid-fire mutterings, the rapier wit of a man enjoying the debate of issues parochial or international over a pint of Hookey at the Gate. The pain in his face when speaking of Arsenal's latest defeat, or the pleasure when months of charitable work were rewarded by a crowd of thousands at a midsummer's night of music & fireworks at Broughton Castle. His cheery wave to everyone he met on the road as he gently swept by in his beloved Rolls Royce.

Finally, at the beautiful & moving service at Whichford Church last week we bid farewell to our dear friend. He was a truly Good Man.


Yes, it is possible - follow the arrows on this

picture to see how to draw the chair.

### Can you solve this? Stripey Puzzle.

Fred's Granny is knitting him a stripey scarf. Fred says the scarf must have red,blue and green stripes followed by red, blue and green stripes and so on. It must start with a red stripe and Granny says she will end with a red stripe. It must be 140cm. long when it is finished and each stripe will measure 5cm.

Can you work out how many blue stripes there will be in the finished scarf? Please feel free to colour in the picture while you ponder over the problem.



### Fairground Science.

After watching fast rides at Banbury Fair, I asked myself "How do they do that?" Have you ever ridden on a playground roundabout and felt a force pressing you outwards? The faster you whirl round, the stronger the force becomes and the tighter you have to hold on. This outward force works on anything that is whirling around - and it can be very useful.

It is this force which is used in a washing-machine or in a spin-drier to spin clothes dry. At the end of the wash, most of the water is pumped out of the machine. Then the motor starts the drum spinning very fast. The soggy clothes are pressed hard against the inside of the drum - just like the people on the fairground "Roundup" in the picture below. The clothes can go no further, but the water can. It gets spun out through the hundreds of holes in the surface of the drum.

Man-made satellites stay in orbit because the outward force caused by their whirling movement just balances the pull of Earth's gravity. As soon as they slow down, they fall back to Earth. Here is an experiment to show how this works.

Thread a length of thin string through the case of an old ball-point pen. Then tie a paper clip very firmly to each end. Press a ball of plasticene or play-dough weighing about 10g round one paper clip, and a larger ball weighing about 50g round the other paper clip. Bury the paper clips crossways so that they will not easily be pulled out.


Hold the pen-case upright and whirl the small "satellite" round. Its outward force will raise the big ball even though it is heavier. Let the satellite slow down.

As it slows, its pull gets less and the weight of the larger ball will pull it back into a small orbit.

Fairground rides use the outward force of whirling objects to do things that look

impossible.

Here on the "Roundup" the outward force presses the people against the wall of the ride. They do not even have to hold on.



The same force holds the "Death Spiral" car on its loop-the-loop track, even when it is upside-down.

Just in case you are wondering whether I go on the big rides, the answer is "No".I don't fancy being "spun-dry", but I do like to work out how the rides operate.

Well, that's all for this month. Have lots of fun on Bonfire Night, but remember to TAKE CARE.


The National Trust manager for Upton House will be the speaker at Swalcliffe Sociey's next

Volunteers (?) were enrolled for the village Quiz, and helpers were forthcoming for the Moreton Market Day coffee morning.



Contact with her parents was maintained via a relative in Zurich, and letters which she had found too poignant to reread for nearly 50 years she has now collated and published in a book entitled "Voices in the Night". Never to see her parents again, they met their fate at notorious Auschwitz.

We were privileged to hear her story.
