Nature Notes.


Nov. 29th. I saw a pair of grey partridge which is unusual these days but what I cannot understand is why so few of the pairs that we do see manage to rear a covey when years ago they nearly all did.

Dec 29th. It has been a very cold week with our thermometer down to 17F (-8C) this morning but it is much colder in Scotland.

Dec 31st. Slightly less cold here but we have had severe glazing as drizzle has fallen on to frozen ground. These are conditions which normally only last for an hour or two but on this occasion have lasted for two days. Yesterday morning the temperature fell to -27C at Altnaharra in northern Scotland. The lowest recorded in Britain is -27.2C at Braemar according to the Guiness Book of Records.

Jan 1st. I saw a male blackcap in a Burdrop garden today. They used to be summer visitors. Now through bravery or laziness quite a few stay in this country which seems to suit them as there are more about than there used to be.

Jan 2nd. In spite of the desperately dry summer last year crops on the farm did reasonably well due to the ground being well moistened by nearly seven inches of rain that fell in the first three months and the inch that fell on the 17th and 18th of May. The three hot months, that withered our gardens and produced only just over one inch between them, affected the grassland much more than the corn crops causing the present shortage of winter feed. My total for the year was 22.19 inches.



My brother who lives 15 miles west of us measured 25% more as he does most years. When we get dry years my mind goes back to 1975 and '76 which were the worst drought years while we were farming. 1975 was the drier with 17.75 inches but it was in '76 that crops really suffered and springs were affected and most if not all of the winter barley was combined by the end of June while this year it was only a little earlier than normal. I have a photograph that shows that the flow of water at Traitors Ford was much lower in '76 than this year.

Jan 16th. A muntjac has just (1 pm) trotted past our back door going on three legs only. The other leg, a back one, was very short as if it had been damaged when the deer was young and not grown since.

Young Scene

This month I am going to show you some tricks and illusions.

Dead Finger

Press the palm of your hand against a friend's palm. With the finger and thumb of your other hand rub gently, up and down, against the two pressed-together forefingers.

One of these pressed-together fingers should feel dead. Is it yours, or your friend's?



Right Hand Foot.

Ask your friend if they can stand on their left leg, swing their right foot in a circle clockwise and, at the same time, write a 6 with their right hand.


If your friend is left-handed, simply ask them to use the opposite legs, feet and hands.

P.S. A tip on how to manage this, but don't tell your friend -----The secret is to write the 6 clockwise.

Invisible Photo.

You will need a little bit of help from an assistant for this trick which needs to be performed in front of an audience of two or more people. The only other item needed is a blank sheet of paper.

1) Say to your audience, "I'm going to leave the room now and my assistant will make an invisible photo of one of you on this sheet of paper. When I come back into the room I will tell you who the photo is of."



- 2) You leave the room and your assistant holds the sheet of paper near someone's face for a few seconds.
- 3) You are then called back into the room and your assistant sits down with the audience.
- 4) Study the invisible photo carefully.
- 5) Now look at your assistant who will be sitting in exactly the same position as the person who has been "photographed". Then look at the audience.
- 6) When you know who the person is, say so!

The Missing Piece of Hand.

You need a cardboard tube from inside a toilet roll for this illusion.



- 1) Hold one end of the tube close to your eyes.
- 2) Put the palm of your other hand close to the far end of the tube.
- 3) With both eyes open, look through the tube and at your palm.

It will look as if a piece is missing from your hand.



Stomach Egg.

Ask your friend how many eggs a person can eat on an empty stomach.

I bet they do not answer correctly. The answer is one because after one egg the stomach is no longer empty!

Finally, here is some "paper magic". You can cause paper to have only one side! This was discovered by a 19th century German mathematician, August Ferdinand Moebius and is known as the MOEBIUS STRIP.

- 1) Cut a strip of paper 25 x 250mm.
- 2) Give one end a half twist and tape or glue the ends together to form a loop.
- 3) Draw a lengthwise line down the centre of the strip until you reach your starting point.
- 4) Cut along the line you have drawn.

What happens? There is no side without a line, and you have only one loop which is twice as long as your original loop.

No one has been able to explain this strange "trick". But it has actually been put to pratical use. The fan belts on cars and factory conveyor belts wear out faster on the inside than the outside. But belts made with a half twist like this wear out more evenly and more slowly.



Well, I am running out of space so it must be time to close. Do try out these tricks and let me know how you get on. I won't ask you to share you own favourite tricks with me because in order to become a top-class "trickster" you must never tell anyone how your tricks are performed (except for your assistant or grown-up helper).HAPPY BAFFLING!

PAUL EDDINGTON 1927 - 1995

Most village people, if not all ,will have heard of the death of Paul Eddington (alias Jim Hacker of 'Yes Prime Minister,' fame) on November 4th, after a long and debilitating illness, bravely borne with tremendous courage.

What you may not know is that he was a Quaker and was a pupil at Sibford School during the '39 - '45 war. I recently met a New Zealander visiting the Meeting house, who was a fellow pupil and had lively memories of their schooldays together. Despite his busy acting life, Paul Eddington took a continuing interest in the school, its progress and activities.

Although radical in his convictions, he was a gentle, peace-loving man who found spiritual peace in the quiet Quaker form of worship and fully suppported the Society's stand against all war. Apparently one of his few criticisms of the TV scripts was when one poked fun at the Nuclear free zones that various local councils established throughout Britain in the sixties and seventies; he also refused to smoke when scripted to do so in the part. This was long before the present outcry against smoking and other harmful drugs.

Some of you may have seen him recently as Justice Shallow in the BBC's production of Shakespeare's 'Henry the fourth', where he played his part convincingly and with great fortitude. I'm sure that he also played his role in real life with similar courage. Had he been Bitain's real Prime Minister, I feel sure he'd have cut a very different figure from his TV image, and would have striven for true social justice and an end to the greed-ridden policies which afflict our divided country.



All will be welcome at the service and meeting but only those on the Electoral Roll will be qualified to vote for the new Council members, the officers and in connection with any other resolution. Formal notice will be circulated nearer the meeting.

The first United Eucharist service of the new Benefice comprising Broughton with North Newington, Epwell, Shutford, Sibford, Swalcliffe and Tadmarton will take place at Broughton Church on Sunday 4th February at 11.00 am. It is hoped that as many as possible will be able to attend from Sibford.
