Nature Notes.

Jan. 26th. The cold weather has brought many birds into the garden for food including a female blackcap which is feeding on apples. Even the sycamore seeds that have been lying on the lawn since the autumn and look most unappetising are now being taken by bullfinches.

Jan. 28th. Among the fieldfare that are feeding on the apples is an aggressive one that spends most of the time chasing other birds. It looks and acts exactly like one that we have seen here over the last two winters which makes me wonder whether they always come to the same area each year. A friend tells me that he had a lone fieldfare winter in his garden for three consecutive years which he thinks must have been the same bird which supports this theory.

Jan. 31st. I estimate that the redwings, fieldfares, thrushes, blackbirds and starlings which have been coming in fairly constant numbers over the last few days have been eating almost half a pound of apples

per bird each day.

Feb. 6th. Over seventy birds of the thrush family are feeding on apples etc. after the overnight snow. The main of the increase in numbers is made up of redwings, one of these which has lost all its tail feathers, is pretty aggressive. There was also a yellowhammer which we seldom see in our garden. The muntjac with the lame leg came at about 11 o'clock this morning to eat some of the apples which had been hollowed out by the birds. It finds these easier to chew than whole ones.

Feb. 7th. I find that the muntjac has been lying up in our woodshed during this snowy weather. It was in

there again this morning.

Feb. 8th. Still cold but the sunshine cleared the snow from a few south facing fields which was enough to bring about a big reduction in our fieldfares and red wings as they found other food. Waxwings are coming into the country in unusually large numbers this winter so we must keep an eye out for them. I hear that some were seen in a garden at Hook Norton today. A Scottish farmer wrote a few years ago to say that he had 28 feeding on a cotoneaster bush in his garden which must have been quite a sight. I have yet to see one.

Feb. 12th. The photographs that I took last winter of ice towers growing on birdbaths have just been printed and have come out quite well. I would like to hear of any others that have been seen by anyone.

Feb. 20th. Frost and drifting snow again. Quite an

old fashioned winter.

Although destined to be a farmer, his greatest and lifelong interest was classical music. His first instrument was the piano, followed by organ lessons with Mr Palmer at St Mary's Church in Banbury.

He became organist at Whichford at the age of 14 and then continued his organ playing career at Swalcliffe Church for over 50 years! A keen Churchman, his talent and dedication were much admired by all who knew him.

As close neighbours we shall miss his friendly presence at the farm ... the sight and sound of handsome cockerels crowing on the wall, ducks going contentedly about their own business in the yard... his old Fordson tractor carting manure up to the field .. and, of course, Daisy, his dear old cow.

No more shall we see him, accompanied by excited dogs, pushing a wheelbarrow laden with vegetables back from his "allotment". He was justly proud of his produce, and we were often recipients of his generosity - a swede, a cabbage, or a bunch of carrots left in our conservatory as he passed by.

This corner of Sibford will never be the same again. Arthur was unique, and will be sadly missed.

** Important News for Pensioners **

The District Council are introducing a new District-wide scheme of BUS PASSES which will replace the present tokens. Any District resident of pensionable age will be entitled to purchase a bus pass for a one-off payment of £2, which will entitle them to half-price travel on buses in the area. This sounds an excellent scheme and it will be good to have more uniformity between parishes.

The District Council is sending details of the scheme to every household, together with an application form. Parishioners who have had tokens previously, and anyone else who wishes to use the scheme, should complete these forms and return them to the District Council direct. I have some spare forms if you need them. Those who have outstanding travel tokens can use them up, but we will not be issuing further ones. People who currently receive them can rest assured that they will be able to use the new scheme.

For the first time in ages there were no public present at the PC meeting on 23 January. This was not surprising as it was a dreadful night - your Councillors had to slither & slide to reach the School Library and to slither & slide even more to leave it after the meeting!

The main task of the evening was to set the Parish precept for 96/97 and the sum of £1198 was agreed. This should cover our expenditure for the coming year and give us a little to go into the reserves.

The next PC Meeting will be at 8pm on Wednesday 6 March in the library of Sibford School. As always, all parishioners are warmly invited to attend. The Annual Parish Meeting will be at 8pm on Wednesday 24 April at the same venue.

Young Scene

Hello, and welcome to Young Scene. I expect that you have been outdoors playing in the snow. I must say that I have seen some very unusual sledges zooming down our slopes!! Did you find time to try out any tricks and illusions from last month's Young Scene? I hope so.

Lots of people are now looking forward to warmer Spring days when plants burst into growth. With this in mind, I thought you might like to make a plant maze. Plants must have light in order to grow because they use the light to make food for themselves. If your maze works the plant should find its way through the maze because it always grows towards the light.

How to make a plant maze:


You will need a large shoe-box (with a lid), some card, a flower-pot full of compost, a runner bean seed, scissors and some water.

Soak the bean seed for a day before you plant it.


1) Stand the box on end and cut a window out at the top.

2) Use the bottom end of your shoe-box as a template in order to make two pieces of card which will eventually slide into the inside of your box to make compartments.

Cut a window in each card.



- 3) Plant the bean seed in the pot and water it.
- 4) Put the plant pot into the box and then fit one of the cards into the box above the pot.
- Put the lid on and stand the box in a warm, light place.
- 6) When the bean starts to grow through the window in the first piece of card, insert the second card. Make sure that its window is not directly above that of the first piece of card. Replace the lid and return the box to its warm, light position.



7) You will find that the plant bends in order to get through all the windows and reach the light. Of course you could make more windows to create a more difficult maze for your plan.


Not only are we looking forward to the arrival of Spring, but many of us are thinking about Easter. No doubt you have already seen chocolate Easter eggs in the shops. Here is an experiment using eggshells. So you will need to collect the empty eggshells when your family has scrambled eggs or omelettes.


Egg Power.

Eggshells are fragile, aren't they? Or are they?

You will need 4 eggshell halves, scissors, masking tape and some tins of food.

Wrap a piece of masking tape around the middle of each empty eggshell half. Then, with your scissors, trim off the excess shell so that each one has a staight edge. Place the 4 eggshells, dome up, so that they form a square. Holding it upright, stand a tin on the eggshells. Keep on stacking tins on top of that one, until the shells crack.





How many tins did you manage to stack? The "fragile" eggshells can support a surprising amount of weight. The secret of their strength is their shape. No single point in the dome supports the entire weight of the object on top of it. The weight is carried down along the curved walls to the wide base.

Well, I'm running out of space again, so it must be time to close. Let me know how many tins you are able to stack on top of your eggshells and have fun making a plant maze. You could try inventing your own maze on paper too.

Keep busy and I will see you next month.



an invitation to an open forum on local government in your community

It is a truism that people get the government they deserve, but there are two sides to every story. One of the most frequently heard criticisms of local councils is that they don't understand what people really need; at the same time, local councils often accuse residents of being apathetic, and not taking an interest in matters which affect us all.

At Cherwell District Council we are challenging this vicious circle, by looking more closely at how the services we provide meet residents' expectations and needs. In short, we're saying: "Let's talk". You may already have noticed that we're asking a lot more questions than we used to, and we now want to begin formalising the process of involving local people, businesses, and organisations in setting policies, priorities and standards. Our commitment is made clear in our recently published document "Towards a Community Plan", which sets out what Cherwell DC is doing at present, and asks for your help in deciding where to focus in the future.

We want as wide a range of views on the contents of "Towards a Community Plan" as possible. To facilitate the process, Cherwell DC is arranging six community meetings around the District, providing an open forum for your views. There is a questionnaire, and you may be contacted in a telephone survey. You can see a copy of the document at Council offices. Let's talk - we promise we will listen.

We will listen because we want to get it right. To get it right we need to hear what you think of the services and the way they are provided. We need to hear your concerns about your community, and where you think solutions may lie. We need to know how you think the responsibility for supporting and developing strong communities should be shared. We need to know what you think is important for the wellbeing of your community, and for a good quality of life for everyone in it.

We can't promise to right all the wrongs or solve all the problems, but we can promise to shift the emphasis, adjust the priorities, and formulate policies which more closely reflect the real needs and wishes of people in Cherwell District. But we must know what those needs and wishes are.

Good governance requires good citizenship, which does not mean turning out to vote once a year and doing nothing in between times. Its about taking an interest in your community, and being prepared to speak out. Wroxton Village Hall is the venue for the northern part of the District, on March 7 at 7.30pm, but if you are unable to get to the meeting in your area please do come along to one of the others. Also, if you have difficulty with transport to a meeting, please get in touch and we will help. We need you to talk to us.
