## Nature Notes.

Feb. 21st. The muntjac has been around the garden for most of the day. It lay in the sun chewing its cud for an hour or so. Its leg must be more comfortable as it uses it a bit but is still raw where an abscess has burst on the hock. Hopefully it will now heal up. It eats quite a lot of ivy leaves, which we used to carefully avoid when tethering our goats years ago, thinking that they were toxic if eaten in quantity.

Mar. 1st. I hear that blackcaps are now wintering quite happily as far north as Killin in Scotland. We are told that the ones wintering here are mostly ones that have moved south from Scandinavia, ours having themselves moved south. If this is so I suppose that the increase in the number wintering here means that they are extending their breeding area northward or at least breeding in larger numbers in the north which may in turn indicate climatic change. I don't suppose that the ones wintering with us will start singing until they get back to their breeding ground so we can still look forward to that first burst of song when our breeding ones arrive. We have a female coming regularly to the bird table and saw two a few days ago.

Mar. 5th. I saw about 20 pigeons feeding on oil seed rape today which is the most I have seen this winter. I hear that there are some big flocks in Scotland but hear they have been conspicuous by their absence.

Mar. 14th. The muntjacs leg is now healing nicely. Today I saw it standing on the bad leg while it was

scratching its chin with the other hind leg.

Mar. 19th. These less cold days have set the birds singing. The hedge sparrow or dunnock has a sweet little song that can easily be missed. With all members of the crow family building, the collared dove already sitting and woodpeckers drumming it is all go.

In 1956, by which time Jane, the first of their three children, had arrived, they were the first family to move

Two more children were born, Carlton & Adele, and, although busy with her own family, Kathleen was always there to help when someone was in need. While the children were young, she worked for some years at Sibford School, where her caring and expertise made a very valuable contribution to the welfare of children for whom we were in loco parentis. Later she worked in Sibford Post Office for several years. In her very busy life, Kathleen still found time to be an active member of the Youth Club committee and was also on the Yillage Hall committee for many years; in both capacities she worked tirelessly to raise funds.

Kathleen found great joy with her children, grandchildren and great grandchildren — in fact, I think she loved, and was loved by, all children. One day I was invited to see the album she had prepared for her grandchildren — a record of her earlier life as a ballet dancer & teacher. That day she was child-minding and I was amazed how she motivated the children in her care and how eager they were to please her. They had a time for drawing, hearing a story, exercise — including learning a few ballet steps, lunch, a rest period and time in the fresh air — child-minding at its best.

More recently she worked for people who really needed her. For families who were without a mother, she was there with a welcome and the smell of an appetising meal being cooked when the children came home from school; or she would be helping a husband care for his sick wife. The patience and kindness shown by Kathleen towards one such elderly charge made a deep impression on many who saw them together whenever they visited the Fielding Day Centre.

Kindness is a paramount virtue and those of us who have been privileged to know Kathleen during all or part of the last forty years will always have happy memories of the time she lived among us. MD



Have you ever wondered why pictures of hares and rabbits feature on many Easter cards? In lots of countries, children get up early on Easter Day and go around their houses and gardens looking for Easter eggs. Maybe you do. Some people say that the eggs were hidden by the Easter hare or rabbit. How did this story start?

Long ago, people believed that the Easter hare belonged to the goddess of Spring, Eostre. Parents told their children that the magic hare would leave presents for them. These were usually painted hens' eggs. That is why pictures of hares and rabbits are often seen on Easter cards. The eggs that we get today are usually made of chocolate.

Here is an Easter hare for you to make. You can use it as a card or as a table decoration.

- 1) Trace the shapes and transfer them onto card.
- 2) Cut out the hare and fold it in half along the dotted line.
- 3) Colour it.
- 4) Cut out the mouth being very careful not to cut too near the side of its face.
- 5) Cut out the teeth and bow-tie and colour before glueing into position.
- 6) Cut out the message board. Write your message and slide it into the slits which you must cut on the hare's paws.

#### HOLY TRINITY CHURCH - PLANNED GIVING SCHEME

It has been suggested to me by a number of people that nearly two years after we held the launch supper for the appeal it would be good to know how the Planned Giving Scheme is doing.

While there are still one or two new donors appearing, it is fair to say that the results of the appeal are pretty clear.

I ought at the outset to say that the Parochial Church Council is most grateful to all who support the scheme, even though they cannot know who they are or how much individually they give, since every donor is promised complete confidentiality.

In the financial year 1995/96 we will have received through Planned Giving some £10,975 under Deeds of Covenant (including Income Tax reclaimed) and about £1,100 of uncovenanted but regular gifts. Under existing pledges/covenants this will remain more or less the same in 1996/97 - there are one or two new donors, but income tax will be reduced by 1p in the pound so that we will be able to reclaim a smaller sum. One can only say that on these figures the campaign can be thought to have been a success.

At the time of the launch a parishioner remarked that he had not been aware on how narrow a base the Planned Giving donations were founded. I fear that much the same could be said today. Of the covenanted income 59% comes from donors aged over 65 (some well over!) and over half comes from only 5 out of 34 donors. The same is true only more so of the other donors. So if the 'wrong' people were to die or move away the fund would be in considerable difficulty. At the moment it can just meet the 1996/97 Parish Share; other expenses have to be paid from collections and fund-raising events. It is perhaps worth reminding our readers that the Planned Giving Fund is devoted exclusively to church expenses; for many years the Parochial Church Council has thought it proper to give a proportion of the collections taken at services to charity and I hope that it will continue to do so. So while this is intended to be a report rather than an appeal, perhaps I could end by saying that if anyone who wants to ensure the survival of Holy Trinity Church can either increase their giving or join the scheme I will be happy to provide covenant forms and/or envelopes.
