Nature Notes.

May. 22nd. Because the field to the west of Mannings Hill has not been grazed this spring it has produced the best show of meadow saxifrage that I have seen for many years. They used to grow like that when, more than 50 years ago, Salmon Pettipher used to graze it very lightly, often only with his cob.

June. 6th. Our thermometer went up to 83°F today but it feels much hotter after the very cold weather

throughout May.

June. 7th. We saw a very pale coloured house sparrow today, much like the one that was around 2 years ago.

They were both young ones, perhaps related.

June. 8th. As we sat on our garden seat afternoon we noticed a stream of butterflies passing over us at high speed, probably close to 30 mph and that into a light breeze. They were flying from SE to NW with great determination. One came down for a few moments on to a dames violet which confirmed that they were painted ladies. They went on flying over, singly or in groups, for the whole afternoon and when at about 6 o'clock I drove along the road to Grounds Farm hundreds of them were flying up from the road in front of the car. As the crop on either side of the road is oil seed rape I wondered whether, by this time they were coming down on to it to feed and rest for the night. This is the first time that I have witnessed such a migration but having seen the speed and directness of their flight under these circumstances I now believe that they do migrate and are not just blown here by the wind. It is still almost beyond belief that they can produce the power and energy from their tiny bodies which is needed to fly all the way from North Africa. I rang a friend in Ledwell and he had also been out watching them, so the invasion must be widespread. I wonder what they will do when they come to a sea which is too wide for them to cross. There are records of huge flocks of butterflies being seen at sea.

June. 14th. There was an item on the radio today about the influx of painted ladies which they said were coming from North Africa and the middle east where conditions have suited them causing a population explosion. They also said that clouded yellow butterflies, silver Y moths and humming bird hawk moths are coming over in unusually large numbers. The silver Y's that fly by day are already here in quite large numbers; the others we shall have to watch out for.

June. 15th. The open arable areas to the east of Sibford support an interestingly different selection of birds than do the fields nearer the village. This evening we saw yellow wagtails on oil seed rape and on linseed. Corn buntings that were perched on the tops of the young trees flew down with their lark like rapid wingbeats to settle on the wheat. There were fewer skylarks than there ought to be but we did see 8 or 10 tree sparrows that seemed to be nesting in holes in the walls of an old barn. The other birds will doubtless be nesting in or near the crops.

Invitation to The Sibfords Lascelles Millennium Pageant

Following an open village meeting as to how the Millennium could be celebrated, at which over 20 families were represented, it was agreed that a spectacular **PAGEANT** be mounted on three evenings in June 2000.

The inspiration for this is the life and works of Frank Lascelles (1875 -1934). The son of a vicar of Sibford Gower, he attended the village school, won his way to Oxford and was a leading light in the OUDS. He lived most of his life in Sibford, became Lord of the Manor and built the present "Manor House" from several former cottages.

Frank Lascelles was best known as a Pageant Master, ultimately becoming known as "The man who staged the Empire". He devised the highly successful Oxford Historical Event. His subsequent successes include the celebrations in the Tercentenary of Canada at Quebec, attended by the King and Queen; the Bath historical Pageant of 1909; the opening of the Union Parliament of South Africa at Cape Town, the Pageant of London at the Crystal Palace, the first public event attended by King George V and Queen Mary; and being Master of the Pageant at the Coronation Durbar at Calcutta in 1912. He created pageants all over the country, and in 1924 organised the Pageant of Empire at the Wembley Exhibition.

Work has already begun in Sibford, with an active committee in place. It is anticipated that a large cast of village people will take part, with school children in prominent roles. The story to be unfolded will record the celebrated history of the Sibfords during the past 1000 years, as well as looking forward to the next Millennium. The Committee would particularly welcome information and stories from residents in the villages, which could be incorporated into the pageant.

The Pageant will form the centrepoint of the village's celebrations to mark the Millennium with many additional events being planned to cater for the extensive range of interests of the local population. There is a very necessary requirement for volunteers to help in the planning of the activities. For further information please contact:



* 'ELLO! 'ELLO! *

My name is ROSEMARY DILSAVER and I am the new Area Beat Officer for Hook Norton and the surrounding villages of Great Tew, Little Tew, Milcombe, Sibford Ferris, Sibford Gower, South Newington, Swalcliffe, Swerford, Tadmartán and Wigginton.

I have been happily married since December 1974, and I met my husband while he was a serving member of the United States Air Force. In May 1977 we moved to Frankfurt, West Germany where I worked for a Major in the USAF. After 18 months, we moved to West Berlin, a very beautiful city, before the days of reunification. Whilst there, I worked for a Colonel in the U.S. Army and then became Head Cashier for the U.S. Mission which is the equivalent to an embassy in a non-capital city. We remained there until May 1981 when we returned to England and eventually found our way to Banbury, where we have lived ever since.

Young Scene

As new water mains are presently being laid in Sibford, this month's activities are all about-----(yes, you have guessed it!) ------WATER.

Water plays a very important part in our lives. Not only does it support life but it also controls the weather, helps to shape the land, enables us to clean things, allows us to travel by boat, gives us fun and exercise in swimming and so on.

Here are some fun activities to show how water behaves. Please note younger readers will need a grown-up to help.

LIQUID LAYERS.



Take a see-through container and pour some syrup into it. Next pour some cooking oil on to the syrup and then add some water. The three liquids will form separate layers floating on one another.

Why Does This Happen?

smaller density than water and syrup has a greater density.

Try putting a small grape, a small piece of candle and a piece of cork in the container. The grape floats on the syrup, the candle on the water and the cork on the oil. This is because these objects have different densities. The lowest density goes to the top and the greatest to the bottom.

The liquids do not mix because they have different densities. Oil has a

MIX OIL AND WATER.

Take a jar with a screw top and pour in some water and some cooking oil. Screw the top on hard and shake the jar to mix the oil and water. Can you mix them, or do the oil and the water separate into layers no matter how hard you shake?

Add a few drops of washing-up liquid and shake again. As the foam clears, you should see a milky liquid instead of the two layers.

Why Does This Happen?

The oil and water mix because the washing-up liquid breaks the oil up into tiny droplets. These mix with the water to form an emulsion.


WATER PRESSURE - an outside experiment.

Fill an empty washing-up liquid bottle with water and push the top back on. Now go outside and squeeze the bottle hard. See how far you can make a jet of water spurt from the bottle.

Take the top off the bottle and try again. You will discover that the water does not go as far.

Why Does This Happen?

As you squeeze the bottle, you place the water inside under pressure. It can only escape through the hole, making a jet. As you squeeze harder, the water pressure becomes greater, producing a bigger jet. But if the hole is wider, the pressure is less and the jet is smaller.



Take another empty washing-up liquid bottle and make three or four small holes along one side, one above the other. Make sure you are outside! Cover the holes with your fingers. Fill the bottle with water, place the bottle on level ground and uncover the holes.

See how the lowest hole produces the longest jet and the highest hole the smallest jet.

Why Does This Happen?

The jets are produced because the water inside the bottle is under pressure. This pressure is greater where the water is deeper, which is why the bottom jet is the longest. The pressure is caused by the water above; it presses down on the water beneath and creates pressure.

PAPER SPEEDBOAT.



Make a speedboat by cutting a boat-like shape out of flat card or stiff paper. Float it on the water. Now place a drop of washing-up liquid on one finger. Gently lower it into the water just behind the speedboat, and the boat will shoot forward as if by magic. This trick will only work once. To make it work again, you'll need fresh clean water.

Why Does this Happen?

As the boat floats on the water, surface tension makes the skin of the water pull in all directions. It therefore does not move. When the washing-up liquid enters the water, it decreases the surface tension behind the boat. The surface tension in front of the boat is now stronger and it immediately pulls the boat forward.



Well, it's time to close now. Enjoy finding out about water and have a super summer.

DOG FOULING

Dogs have been regarded as a source of pleasure and companionship for many years.

However, public opinion is changing and many people now regard dogs as a nuisance due to some of the problems being caused, the main one being fouling.

Everybody, dog owners included, agree that dogs mess is unsightly and unhygienic.

Diseases and infections can be passed to man from dogs through the dogs faeces, and of particular concern is the roundworm Toxocara Canis the eggs of which, if ingested can lead to blindness.

Regular worming can help to reduce the risk. Cleaning up immediately after your dog will further reduce the problem. It also keeps public areas clean and prevents "anti-dog" feelings.

You should also be aware that allowing your dogs to foul public areas often leads to clothing being unpleasantly soiled, and this is frequently carried into the home.

In rural communities, people are often very reluctant to complaint about specific incidents of fouling as they prefer to "keep the peace" within their community. It is also accepted that dogs do have a very real and positive role to play in our lives.

If you are a dog owner, all we would urge you to do is to think how easy it is to improve the quality of life for others by simply clearing up after your dog. Many people do act in this way, but we will always welcome a more responsible attitude.

The Dog Wardens regularly patrol the District dealing with fouling, and other dog related problems, however with such a large district to cover we do rely on the general public to be our "eyes and ears". If a member of the public witnesses a fouling offence, and is willing, we can take formal action on their behalf.


