Nature Notes.

Oct. 25th. I had never seen a hornet locally until today when I saw two in Whichford Wood. They were spending much of their time patrolling a ride, as dragonflies often do, eventually returning to settle again on the same bush. We also saw 4 roe deer near Traitors Ford.

Nov. 1st. As I went into the Meeting House graveyard early this morning I was greeted by jays, redwings and fieldfares that were feeding on the holly and yew berries.

Nov. 10th. From this mornings radio programme "The Living World" I learn that polecats, which have recently recolonised Oxfordshire, are in danger from rat poisons collected from the rats that form a substantial part of their diet. It said significant traces of the poison had been found in the livers of polecats killed on the roads.

Nov. 13th. Todays announcement that the ozone layer over the country is thinning more quickly than scientists expected is worrying, but they still expect that it will get back to normal by the middle of the next century now that the world wide ban on CFC's has been imposed. One bright spot in the report is that it is now known that aeroplanes produce or destroy ozone depending on the height at which they fly so there is scope to improve matters by adjusting their cruising heights. The outlook for the control of greenhouse gasses look very much worse. John Gummer says that Britain may be the only country that signed the 'Rio Declaration' agreeing to reduce the output greenhouse gasses to 1990 levels by the year 2000, that is still on course to achieve that aim. The rapid increase in road and air transport makes me wonder how we can possibly meet this target.

Nov. 16th. Wood pigeons are feeding on haws rather more than is usual at this time of year. This may be due to the poor crops of acorns and beech nuts which they normally prefer. The lack of beechnuts may also account for the number of tits which are already coming to our birdtable. The great, blue and coal tits are visiting in roughly equal numbers along with two

marsh tits.

Nov. 19th. Todays early snow was very clinging and has broken a few branches. It seems strange to see snow lying on deciduous trees that have not yet lost their leaves.

A career change into a different but equally rewarding field of communication - that of counselling, followed about 15 years ago. 



The Remembrance Day Service took place on Sunday 9th November at 10.55 am. A large congregation, which included representatives of the uniformed organisations, Scouts, Brownies, Cubs and Beavers took part in the traditional Act of Remembrance around the War Memorial when the two minute silence was observed after the Rector, accompanied by Methodist Lay Preacher Mr Laurie Baker read the names of those villagers killed in the two world wars and the Canadian airmen killed in the crash nearby. Cdr Peter Baseby RN ret'd laid a wreath on behalf of the British Legion and Phillip Hall on behalf of the uniformed organisations. At the service in church which followed, an address was given by Mr Baker and Mr Mark Paine played the organ.

The Christmas Bazaar was held on Saturday 16th November and there was a large attendance from the villages and from the other parishes of the new Wykeham Benefice. The gross takings amounted to £966.25 and the Church Council is most grateful to those who ran the various stalls and games, those who gave gifts and donations and all those who supported the afternoon with their presence. A special thank you for Erica Wimbush who organised the event.

The church has an efficient new boiler and villagers can now expect an even warmer welcome than has been possible for some time. Perhaps this will help us to find a regular organist which we have not had since Mabel Payne retired some years ago. We are greatly supported by various volunteers who help out and of course we are greatly indebted to our Rector for managing to play at so many services which he conducts as well. We must be the only church in the country where the rector has 6 churches to staff every week, who frequently preaches at least at four of them and plays the organ at two of them and who is also Rural Dean with an overall responsibility for another 23 churches. Could this persuade a local musician to come forward to act as regular organist? The Royal School of Church Music runs, amongst many things, a "Reluctant Organists Course" which can help transform a pianist into a very respectable organist. A fee will be paid. Volunteers should speak to Timothy Wimbush.
