Nature Notes

June. 19th. Earlier in the summer a chaffinch had a nest in a clematis growing on the wall of our bungalow but it was ransacked by magpies. Recently a greenfinch has been feeding her young ones there but today a cat has managed to climb up and drag out the nest along with some of the clematis.

June. 26th. The collard dove population seems to be lower than for some years. Being a bird that only spread to this country from the south east about 30 years ago they may not all be hardy enough to survive a cold spell such as the one we had last winter but I expect that survival of the fittest will be soon breed a hardier British strain.

June. 27th. Our thermometer only struggled to 49°F today and with a fresh wind from the north (though it would be quite good for January) it feels very cold for midsummer but the cold spell is due to end soon. June. 30th. We heard our first quail of the summer today. Not quite within parish bounds but only a few yards outside.

July 5th. This morning we stopped at a good roadside wild flower site and were lucky enough to find 2 bee orchids in bloom as well as a good selection of other wild flowers. There is still a colony of marbled white butterflies there are also some common blues, small skippers and the usual huge number of burnet moths mostly hatched leaving their empty cocoons hanging from the grass stalks.

July 7th. Early yesterday morning I rushed out to drive away the magpies that were near a flycatchers nest. I saw that the eggs were still there and later in the morning I was pleased to see that she was back on the nest but today it is empty. Birds nesting in our garden have had a hard time over the last few years. They have just too many enemies.

July 8th. We walked along Grange Lane expecting to see a good show of scabious and knapweed, that grow there as abundantly as anywhere in the parish, but we were disappointed as the roadside had been trimmed right back to the hedge where one or two plants had escaped the massacre.

There will probably be a second crop of flowers in the autumn unless they also get the chop.

July 12th. There is an interesting piece in todayspaper about a blackbirds nest on the chassis of a four wheel drive vehicle. As soon as the vehicle was parked after a journey a blackbird started going back and forth,

feeding youngsters which were almost ready to fly yet they had stayed in the nest each time the vehicle was driven and I suppose the parent must have sat on the eggs to incubate them during the journeys. We once had a nest on top of the engine of a little used tractor and on the few occasions when we had to use it the blackbird would stay on her nest while it was driven right out of the shed. At least with the nest in that position there was no chance of the eggs getting cold.

July 13th. There is a fine group of giant puff-balls near the Woodway Road. The best one is 15 inches in diameter.

July 14th. It is nice to see that the greater spotted woodpeckers have reared a brood and from their calls I think that the green woodpeckers may also have some young ones in the valley.

July 15th. Wasps will nest almost anywhere. Today I was shown a nest built in a pile of blankets. We are not seeing many dragonflies although we are finding a lot of empty nymph cases. We have also found a good many wings including one this morning that was not quite fully expanded which makes me think that they are being taken by birds during those dangerous hours while they are hatching and expanding their wings prior to flying.

THE OXFORDSHIRE HISTORIC CHURCHES BICYCLE RIDE







NEWSPAPER COLLECTION

The waste paper re-cycling people who have been taking our newspaper collection for more than 10 years recently announced without warning, that they are no longer prepared to provide a skip in the village because there is "now no money in recycled waste paper". For some months we have only received payment from Cherwell District Council. After consultation with CDC, it was agreed that the skip would be provided for the July collection.

A CDC committee meeting will be held at the end of July in an effort to resolve the problem. However it has been suggested that any CDC funds available will go to the re-cyclers to provide the skip, rather than to ourselves for the actual collection. If this is the case, and since we provide the service mainly as a fund raising exercise, we will have to switch our efforts into other forms of fund raising and shall stop the monthly newspaper collection.



The Parish Council met on Monday 23 June and discussed a number of issues including some sensitive planning applications. We also discussed the district conservation strategy, so important for protecting our rural environment.

I have a number of copies of a discussion paper from the District Council entitled "Helping To Shape The Future - Rural Issues. This includes a questionnaire for people to comment on housing, how much and what type should be built; jobs; protecting the countryside and so on. These issues are a major influence on the quality of life for people who live here and it is important that we let our views be known. We have also been approached by the County Youth Orchestra about financial support for people who wish to send their children but are concerned about the cost. Let me know if your child is of the required standard.

DON'T SUFFER IN SILENCE

Domestic violence is any physical, emotional or sexual abuse between people who are, or have been in a close relationship. It can happen to anyone, whatever their age. It can take the form of threats and intimidation, mental or verbal criticism, and it can result in feelings of guilt, low self-esteem, depression and stress. Outsiders may not realise what is happening, but help is available, just a phone call away.

AN APPEAL for a LITTLE of your TIME

This is an APPEAL - not for the usual money or gifts but for your TIME - something everyone has but very little is 'spare'.

An Appeal, not because I'm Secretary of the Village Hall Committee but from an ordinary villager who is still a comparative 'newcomer' and believes if you are lucky enough to live in such surroundings, you should give something back to your village.

We have a great Village Hall, surrounded by a large field, play area, lovely front lawn and large car park - which many villages I visit would really appreciate, some having no parking facility at all (a real problem) - but we do not use it anything like as much as we should. Folk Dancing, Amateur Dramatics, Youth Club, Badminton all having 'disappeared' over the last few years. I understand Brownies keep going mainly thanks to leaders who travel from Twyford and Banbury.

At the current events it is the same people assisting, time and time again. We have a very good Hall Manager, who is also now taking over the Chairmanship of the Village Hall Committee, David Baker, who is always ready to help. AND there are a regular band of volunteers who do a lot on a regular basis for the village - they are continually asked to help even more. I know most of those feel it would be nice to have some new help, possibly with a lot more ideas.

At the Village Hall AGM's which I have been associated with, only a couple of the public have visited, and this year no-one attended other than the Committee members and representatives of the various Organisations using the Hall, and everyone is welcome. We have struggled to fill the various positions on the Committee and one member resigned with a comment I overheard that there were too many older people on the Committee! Yes, we do need some younger members who would be gladly welcomed, with hopefully some new ideas for fund raising but the same people stay because there is no-one to come forward.

Surely we want to keep our Village Hall, and keep it in a good condition - this takes a little time, effort and fund raising. This year the Committee were trying to cut costs by doing all the ground maintenance ourselves - but again it is left mainly to one person - I am determined to try and do more - PLEASE can you come and help?

We have a lot of newcomers in the area - presumably you came because you liked the look and feel of the village - just a "little" of your time and ideas would assist. To be on the Committee means only five meetings a year (one includes the AGM), usually about 1% hours per meeting.

Could I please ask everyone to give us an idea of what "you" would like to have and see at "your" Village Hall. Either telephone me, Muriel Chandler, on 01295 780025, or a letter via the "Sibford Scene", but I hope shortly to arrange for everyone to receive a Questionnaire and I hope everyone will take a few minutes to complete this. LET'S USE THIS GREAT FACILITY WE HAVE TO IT'S BEST ADVANTAGE.

The Parochial Church Council meeting on 8th July had a very full agenda to consider. Among the matters for attention were recommendations from Bishop Anthony on The Church and the Wider Community, reports on recent meetings of the various conmittees of the Wykehan Benefice Council and of the Deddington Deanery Synod. Charitable giving by the Council was reviewed and a detailed report on a meeting with the architect following his Quinquennial Report was discussed also the position of the necessary extension to the burial ground.

Barry Davies has retired as the Sibford Gower and Burdrop "Welcome to Sibford" organiser and his place has been taken by Mrs Maureen Warden. Mrs Hary Mills continues as the Sibford Ferris organiser.

The monthly Benefice service on the first Sunday in July was held in Sibford and was conducted by young people from the various parishes in a "Young at Heart" form. A very large congregation attended and the church was more full than it has been for some years. It was particularly good to see so many young people present and their parents.

The Annual Church Garden Party was held at The Red House, Burdrop on Saturday 12th July. The theme this year was "Paper" and a large paper tree, magnificently made by Ian Warden advertised the need to conserve and the use of recycling paper. There were the usual number of highly successful stalls and some more unusual games and competitions. The children were kept busy searching for names of newspapers planted round the wood and reaping rewards of many jelly babies. The gross takings for the afternoon amounted to f856 and the Council is very grateful not only to its dedicated band of helpers but to the entire community for its generous support on a beautiful afternoon and for so many gifts. Thanks also to Mary & Norman Nash for the use of their garden.
