Nature Notes.

June 23rd. To Killin in Scotland to stay with my sister-in-law. This afternoon she took us to a forest ride where we were greeted at the entrance by a tree pipit singing as it parachuted down into a young plantation, but what we had really come to see was the chickweed wintergreen blooming along the edges of the ride. Sadly, as we went further, and the ownership changed, the ride and the ditches on either side had been sprayed and the chickweed wintergreen, foxgloves, yellow pimpernel, etc. were all dying off.

June 24th. As the morning was damp with cloud down on the hills we went to see a crucked longhouse that is being preserved by the Scottish National Trust which was far more interesting to me than the grand houses that our National Trust tend to preserve. The long single storey house has accommodation for the family at one end and animals at the other. There was one tiny room behind the fireplace where children must have slept. The rest of the family slept in the bunks that were built into the walls of the living room and kitchen. The chimney from the large open hearth fireplace where the cooking was done. tapered quickly to a normal size at roof level. It was made of thin wooden boards with the cracks well papered over to stop the smoke coming through. We were told that with peat as fuel there was little chance of the chimney catching fire. In the tiny bedroom a piece of rotten wood had fallen away showing the edges of about a dozen layers of wallpaper. Some of them were actually newspaper with one having the headline Royal Wedding and by the number of layers covering it, it could well have been Queen Victoria's wedding to Albert. Having the livestock in the same building must have been very convenient when the snow was drifting. Further along the roadside we found some big patches of melancholy thistle and fields liberally dotted with common spotted orchids, lousewort, heath bedstraw with cotton grass, yellow iris and lesser spearwort in the damp areas. The bracken, ferns and some other plants have had their tops browned by a sharp frost that came on June 15th. This evening, while walking by the river Lochay to Loch Tay, we watched a snipe using the full length of its beak to probe the turf for food, and a flock of 13 curlews came down to feed on the rushy meadows.

June 25th. When the cloud had lifted a little we went up to the power station reservoir on Ben Lawers. Where the road had been cut across sloping ground to expose the peat supported by shaly stone, a wildflower garden had grown with butterwort, yellow mountain saxifrage, lousewort, mountain sorrel, heath bedstraw, tormentil, milkwort, mossy campion and the white spikes of alpine bistort. There was a wheatear flying from rock to rock trying to keep track of its young family and a sandpiper skimming low along a mountain stream. Coming back we found a lovely area with wood cranesbill, valerian, meadowsweet and more melancholy thistle, which seems to be a roadside plant. Perhaps having no prickles the cattle graze it in the fields.

June 26th. I saw 3 chimney sweeper moths as I walked by the Dochart to its convergence with the Lochay where I sat for a time while a shower passed, Curlews called, oyster-catchers came and went, a sandpiper settled under the bank close by, a sizable colony of sand martins fed their young in nesting holes in the far bank of the Lochay and 2 hatches

of ducklings were picking flies off the water as they followed their mums downstream. Walking back I got a good view of a male reed bunting and met a friend who had seen 2 redpoils there on the previous day. Later in the day we found sundew and butterwort growing together in a ditch.

June 27th. Visited a lochen and were pleased to see that the least water lily is still thriving there. There were also some very fine northern marsh orchids and some small pearl bordered fritillary butterflies along the line of the railway that used to skirt the lochen. June 28th. Walked to the pike pools where white water lilies, bog bean, marsh cinquefoil, flote grass and dense patches of ragged robin grow. There was also a pair of flycatchers, the first we have seen up here. At the falls of Dochart there were globe flowers and northern bedstraw.

June 29th. To the far end of Loch Tay to see a circular house built out over the water on stilts to a design which was used on the loch 2,500 years ago. It is a beautiful piece of work. July 1st. We were sorry to find that the flycatchers nest on the wall of our bungalow had been destroyed by magpies (a bird which we didn't see at all while in Scotland) or crows while we were away.

July 2nd. Our daughter thought there were a lot of flies around when she was picking gooseberries and it wasn't until one stung her that she realised that there was a wasp's nest hanging in the bush that she was picking.

July 18th. I thought that house martins had deserted the village but they seem to have all moved into Barley Close. There was quite a crowd of them over there this evening. July 19th. A flycatcher now has a nest in the next door garden. I expect it is the same pair that tried to nest here.


Our Midsummer walk, led by Arnold and Ina Lamb, took place on a beautiful sunny afternoon.

VOLUNTEERS WANTED FOR RED CROSS TROLLEY SERVICE at CHESHIRE HOME, ADDERBURY

For around 15 years, a varying group of about 12 volunteers has provided a weekly trolley service at the Cheshire Home, under the auspices of the Red Cross, selling sweets, toiletries, stationery, etc., to the residents, most of whom are either bed-ridden or at least restricted to a wheel-chair.


