Nature Notes

June 20th. While on a short cycle ride this evening we saw a remarkable number of road casualties which included rabbits, a pigeon, a mole and a hedgehog. There also seem to be a lot of fox cubs suffering the same fate showing that they have had a good breeding season which will make the food chain even more top heavy.

June 26th. A badger sampled our carrots and strawberries last night but no great damage done. They seem to be particularly fond of carrots and turn to them whenever we get a dry spell of weather.

June 29th. While on our Tuesday cycle ride we spotted five spikes of knapweed broomrape which is a strange plant without chlorophyll which draws its nourishment from the roots of the knapweed. One of them was a particularly fine specimen which was nearly two feet tall.

July 1st. A very healthy looking muntjac with a nice shiny coat walked across our lawn at midday today.

July 5th. On two occasions recently I have seen a young great spotted woodpecker working its way round the stems of our red hot poker putting its beak into each flower as it went. On looking at the flowers I found no insects to account for their interest in them but found that they do hold a lot of nectar so I suppose that, being young, that woodpecker has a sweet tooth. We have often seen tits on them and presumed they were taking aphids but they too may like nectar. Our search by scent for a dead body this afternoon revealed a stinkhorn fungus pushing its way up through a plant on the rockery. I have now dug it out and given it a deep burial elsewhere in the garden.

July 6th. A thrush is building a nest about 10 feet up in our yew hedge within a few feet of a wood pigeons nest where it will probably be safe from cats but on a route regularly used by squirrels so they will need a bit of neighbourhood watch for success. As the thrush worked on the nest this morning some greenfinches and great tits were taking quite an interest in the proceedings.

July 10th. How lucky we are to live in a place where birds come to us. While having breakfast on this sunny morning we saw various young tits, a nuthatch and a family of treecreepers and when I went out

into the garden there were two buzzards slowly circling in the clear blue sky as they drifted slowly to the southeast. All the while I was watching I did not see them flap a wing.

July 13th. Badgers have dug out at least three bumble bee nests in our garden. To get at one of them they dug quite a deep hole into a stony bank representing a lot of work for a small reward.

July 16th. I found a dead water shrew by our back gate. I don't really know how common they are in this district but I have only seen them on two or three occasions.

July 17th. I was told today of a possible sighting of a red kite over Sibford Ferris flying quite low down towards the Gower. It was seen on Sunday 11th July between 4 and 5 pm. Did anyone else see it?

July 18th. A few weeks ago my Grandson found the shed skin of a grass snake in our garden pond. Since then I have heard of some being scooped up with a load of muck on a muck loader, another coming into a house in Burdrop, two road casualties and two more crossing roads where the drivers managed to avoid them.



Margaret Dring Remembered

Margaret Dring (nee Wild) was born in Leicestershire on the eleventh of August 1917. At a young age her family moved to Charlecote where her father was the estate foreman for the Fairfax Lucy family. A subsequent move to Harewood in north Yorkshire saw the family established in that community, with grandfather again estate foreman - this time for Lord Harewood.

The youngest of five children she excelled at school and distinguished herself in matriculation. A career in the Post Office beckoned - where she became counter services and a teleprinter instructor.

Shortly before the Second World War she met and became engaged to Arthur-then a young gardener on the Harewood Estate. The war intervened, and for six long years they were parted as father saw service in Egypt, Palestine, Turkey and Greece.

In 1944 they married, and following demobilisation set up a market garden in Harrogate. This successful venture was followed by periods in Harewood, Lincolnshire and Sussex - before moving to the School and village of Sibford Ferris in 1954.

Arthur plied his trade as head gardener whilst Margaret for a while worked for Alcan and following a spell working in the kitchens became the school domestic matron making sure that the boarders had a supply of clean, smart clothes to wear. Following their retirement to Applegrove in 1983 they continued to play a part in village life. For Old Scholars - Margaret presented the Lesley Bailey lecture. A number of family celebrations, Silver, Ruby and Golden wedding anniversaries were all duly celebrated.

About fifteen months ago Margaret discovered that she had cancer of the breast - and a series of operations and treatments followed. All borne with a stoic spirit which made her countless friends in the medical world - mother's bravery left father, Carole and myself gasping in admiration. Margaret's total Christian conviction gave those around her a confidence that whatever the future held - she was in God's capable hands. Shortly after Christmas the illness took a turn for the worse. Further trips to hospital, some wonderful care from Sibford Surgery and the tender ministry of Timothy Wimbush.

Sadly Margaret passed away peacefully at home on the 26th May. She touched so many lives and is remembered with love by countless family and friends.

We would like to thank those whose prayers, cards, notes and practical help have done so much to support us during our time of loss.

We had two brave "over 10's" dressed as Posh and Baby Spice - Amy Healey and her friend Gina Brooks. The Dog Show, like the Fancy Dress was a great crowd pleaser. Milo had a good day, winning Best Puppy, 2nd in the Best Pedigree and 3rd in the Handsomest Dog classes.

The Best Pedigree class was won by Jack, the rough Collie owned by Celia Phillips from the Gower. 



QUIET GARDEN DAYS AT HANDYWATER FARM, SIBFORD

The second season of occasional quiet days at Handywater has been under way since April, and as curious questions are still being asked, ("What is it like? What do you do?"), perhaps the idea ought to be demystified a bit.

The light-hearted answer to the first question is "it's like a party where people don't speak to each other for much of the time". The benefits of stillness and silence in a world that is so fast and noisy, are numerous. Although the days are Christian-based, with an invited leader bringing ideas for meditation and focusing our thoughts at the beginning and end of the moming and afternoon, nobody is obliged to take part in these short sessions. For two hours, morning and afternoon, people find their own space in the garden or the house, to read, meditate, stroll around the garden, listen to the sound of the stream, stare into the fire, reflect - or even snooze,. You could even pull out a few weeds, but that's not encouraged....

How often is it said, "I can't relax completely in my own home because I always think of something that needs doing'? How often do you think to yourself, as Anthony Newley said, "Stop the world, I want to get off? Remove yourself from your own stressful or lonely environment to a place where you are actively encouraged to do nothing but cogitate, and you may find the experience more restful than a holiday, more beneficial to your health than medication.

Three quiet days have been held so far this year, The Reverend Ian Adams from Thame and the Reverend Linden Fletcher from Botley came to lead the meditations on Tuesday 20th April and Tuesday 15th June respectively. Both were recommended by Bishop Anthony Russell when he was asked for advice, and each brought a particular personal dimension to their day. Ian Adams introduced us to the poetry of R. S. Thomas, and Linden Fletcher was able to incorporate a musical element, having been a music teacher, and having a piano to hand here.

On Sunday 11th July, Canon John Fenton joined us for a picnic lunch after preaching at the deanery service at Bloxham, and led us into an afternoons meditation that was quite blissful on a gorgeous summer's day.

I can't think of a lovelier use for the garden. Apprehensive new participants at our quiet days are surprised at how they are unexpectedly able to be still for two hours, and indeed how quickly those two hours seem to pass. They smilingly report feeling more refreshed in mind, body and soul than they have felt for some time.

So if you feel like trying out a day with us, there are two more dates arranged for the autumn The invited speakers are Canon Barbara Doubtfire, from Woodstock, a well-known figure respected for her quiet spirituality, and the Reverend John Edmonds-Seal from Beckley near Oxford, who was ordained after retiring from a career as an anaesthetist. Do put the dates in your diary, and ring Sue on 788770 if you intend to come, or if you would like more detailed information. You do not have to attend the whole day, as long as you arrive and leave quietly. Bring a packed lunch and a rug/cushions, and we will provide drinks, cookies, good books, your own space in the house if it's wet, and an inspiring leader.
