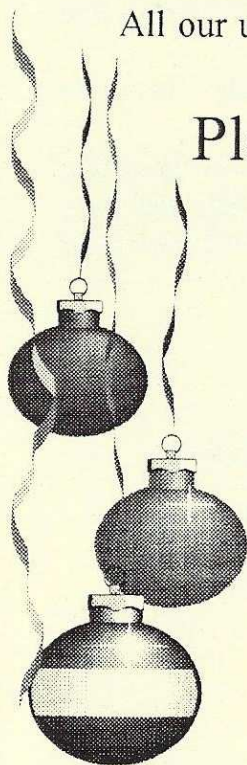

Nature Notes

Oct 26th. A familiar chack-chack-chack alerted me to the fact that the first fieldfares of the season were flying over. I could only see 8 well spaced out across the sky flying south-west on exactly parallel courses but more could have passed over silently before I was aware of them. The way they were flying made me think that they were still on their migration flight and had probably flown through the night. It is a great pity that there are so few haw-covered hedges that they can drop onto to fill their crops after their long flight from Scandinavia. Some farmers are leaving them but there are quite a few more hedges that could be allowed to grow old enough to produce haws without detriment to crops or stack, but annual trimming has now become a habit with some farmers.

Nov 2nd. There was a flurry of excitement when a peregrine falcon was seen in Sibford Ferris this morning but it seems likely that it had escaped from a collection as it was tamer than a wild bird should be. However it had killed a pigeon so should be able to look after itself.

Nov 3rd. Another buzzard was seen near the village recently. So many are being seen that we could almost class them as resident in this area now although I have not heard of any nesting locally yet.

Nov 10th. Over 100 fieldfares flew over this morning. This is the biggest flock I have seen this autumn.

Nov 17th. We are still hearing the tawny owls almost every night, sometimes several times a night. I don't know whether they are more plentiful or whether the ones near us are particularly vocal but I have never heard owls so regularly over such a long period before.

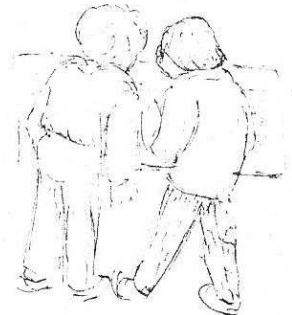

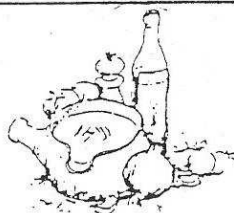

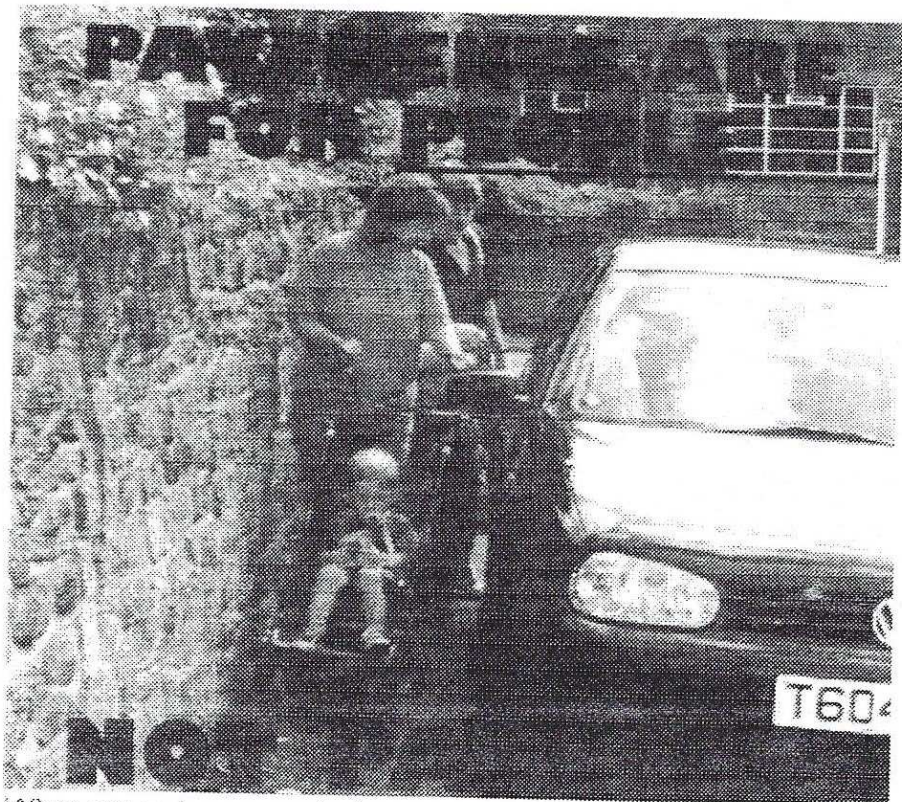

DEAR SIRs,

ALTHOUGH I AM NOT THE TYPE OF PERSON THAT USUALLY COMPLAINS I FEEL THAT I MUST SAY SOMETHING ABOUT THE TOTAL LACK OF COMMON SENSE WHEN IT COMES TO PARKING ON THE ROADS IN THE FERRIS. DRIVING THROUGH THE VILLAGE RECENTLY TOWARDS THE GOWER, I TURNED THE CORNER BY THE SCHOOL AT THE TOP OF MANNING'S HILL TO BE FACED BY AN OPEN HORSE BOX PARKED VERY DANGEROUSLY HALF ON THE FOOTPATH (WHAT LITTLE THERE IS) AND HALF ON THE ROAD. A LADY PUSHING A PUSHCHAIR WITH A SMALL CHILD IN HAD TO TAKE TO THE MIDDLE OF THE ROAD TO WALK ROUND THE ILLEGALLY PARKED BOX AND VEHICLE. 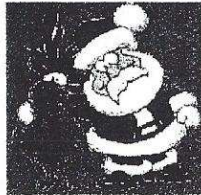

They printed the first railway guide and timetable, a copy of which John brought to show us. During the First World War they worked for the Admiralty and in the Second World War Armstrong Sidley took over the buildings for secret war work. Altogether a fascinating evening, enlivened by John's sense of humour.

Our thanks to everyone who came to the workshop when Mike Finch showed slides of the Sibfords and the help given in identifying many people in the photos.
