Nature Notes.

May 20th. A friend told me that he saw a toad and thought he might move it into his garden to help control the slugs but when he went to pick it up he noticed that it had one leg down a hole. When he looked down the hole he thought that there was a yellow band around the toads' leg. He eventually managed to withdraw the leg bringing with it a fair sized grass snake. The yellow band that he could see was the yellow mouth of the snake. To free the toad he had to handle the snake with the inevitable result that it produced the stinking substance, which is its defence mechanism and though he washed his hands several times he could not get rid of the smell.

June 3rd. This week a song thrush has been singing from dawn to dusk with hardly a break. I expect that its mate is sitting on a second clutch of eggs and with this damp weather to bring out the slugs and snails, food is easy to come by so he fills up his time with song.

June 7th. A pair of flycatchers are now building in earnest in the flowerpot that is fixed to our house wall among the branches of pyracantha which we hope will hide it from magpies etc.

June 11th. There is an oak tree between the Ferris and the Elm which

has far more than its fair share of galls but I had to refer to a book to name the white fluffy balls that had formed on the male flowers, as the hairy catkin-gall. Most of the young shoots on the lower branches and probably over the whole tree have swellings on the leaf vein which are no doubt caused by the grub of another insect. It is fortunate that there is plenty of moisture in the ground to help the tree with its second growth of leaves.

June 15th. Cycled along the road by Stourswell hoping to hear a quail but we were out of luck; however there was a pair of yellow wagtails sitting on, and several larks singing above, a field of peas. The thick tangled growth of the peas must give excellent protection to their nests from foxes and badgers as well as prying eyes from above.

June 16th. Although I saw a few house martins flying over the village about a month ago I have not seen any since nor have I seen a nest.

Although the fall in numbers is widespread it is not general. A letter in a newspaper talks of a housing estate with nests on almost every house and my sister in law at Killin in Scotland says that they have plenty up there. She has also plenty of sand martins which sadly we seem to have lost largely I think because the sandpits where they used to nest have been filled in or planted with trees.

Sibford Ferris Gardens

We did not have nearly as many visitors as in previous years, but there were a lot of other gardens open within a ten mile radius, and the weather was somewhat variable. However, we hope our visitors enjoyed the gardens and we were able send £347.58 to the National Gardens Scheme of their charities.

We would like to thank all who helped and all who lent chairs, tables, crocks, tea urns and the field for parking.



It seems and indeed is a long time since an open meeting in the Village Hall on 11th April 1996 agreed to go ahead with a pageant based on David Ryall's proposal which he had made on the invitation of the Sibfords Society. A lot of work has gone on since then and presentations were made of the ideas and outlines at two Village Hall gatherings held on 27th April 1997 and 8th March 1998.

An application was made for funding from "Arts for Everyone" in mid 1997 but this was unsuccessful. The Committee has however kept in touch with the Cherwell District Council throughout and we should hear the result of our application for a grant from them next month. It is also anticipated that they will support our application to "The Millennium Festival" which must be made by the end of this month, but for which we will not hear the result until December.

The Millennium Festival is a £100 million programme set up jointly by the Millennium Commission and the National Lottery with the aim "to support local and regional millennium celebrations throughout the UK".

It appears that we have a reasonable chance of receiving in all funding of about £30,000 from these two bodies, a sum which would cover our costs so that ticket sales would produce a surplus. Of this, we must produce 10% or £3,000 from our own resources. Thus the Committee has embarked on a series of functions to raise this sum of £3,000 and it is hoped that the village will support us with these.

The Millennium Festival Programme has The Arts Council as a major patron so that our proposal must be associated with plans of an artistic nature. Any surplus made will need to be invested in a properly constituted Trust Fund for the "Lasting Benefit" of the local community. It is a rule that such benefit may not be used for capital projects.

If the funding does not materialise, the Pageant will need to be substantially scaled down and we are working on contingency plans for such an eventuality.

We are sure that when the Millennium comes, there will be a celebration worthy of the heritage of the villages and which all, young and old, will enjoy.





MUSIC - A TOUCH OF GENIUS

Bernard d'Ascoli is a professional pianist who travels the world playing over fifty concerts a year. Yet he has been totally blind since the age of



three. "Braille music is rather like reading a novel in Morse Code" he says. So, far from treating his blindness as a disability, Bernard d'Ascoli actually uses it positively, developing an acuteness over piano sound that few can match. The painstaking process of learning via Braille music-text also gives him an added intensity, a depth of knowledge in detail that is more profound for having to be memorised right from the start.

"Reading Braille requires more concentration in the early stages" he says. "What I certainly cannot do is open a score today, say a Beethoven sonata, and play it tomorrow. It would take me four or five days. But like many pianists, I would work on it for about three months and let it mature on my unconsciousness for a further six months."




