Nature Notes

Sept 25th. I thought I caught a glimpse of a weasel in the garden yesterday and it was still around today, sprinting across the drive and lawn, so must be finding some food. Years ago weasels were welcome visitors to our rickyard at this time of year as they helped to control the mice in the corn ricks. They were slim enough to follow the tunnels that the mice chewed through and between the sheaves, chewing many of the sheaf strings as they went. The loose corn made the job of the men on the rick more difficult when it came to threshing time as it made it harder to see where each sheaf was and wasted energy when they stuck the fork into two and had to drop them and try again as the string cutter wanted the one at a time.

Sept 30th. The rains have brought on the first flush of the fungus, which is aptly named lawyers wig, that adorn our lawn each autumn.

Oct 3rd. A pair of grey wagtails paid a rare visit to our garden pond today. The male looking very smart with its slate grey back and lemon yellow underparts and the female not quite so bright looking more like a pied wagtail.

Oct 10th. I had always thought of sticky groundsel as a rare plant in this district, only having seen it in one farm, but this afternoon I found several plants flowering where a heap of chippings had been cleared. Perhaps the seed was introduced with the chippings.

Oct 12th. The wasps in the nest that my daughter found hanging in a gooseberry bush died out naturally early in September but the one in our roof space above the bathroom window is still very strong. I am surprised at how active they are in the early morning. I get up at a quarter to seven and if I put the bathroom light on without first closing the hopper window the wasps come in at a great rate. This morning six came in in a few minutes. They must be attracted by the light as they don't come in during daylight hours.

Oct 17th. I have just heard that a raven, a bird very rarely seen in this part of the country, was seen at Sibford Gower on Sept. 12th.

Oct 20th. Yet another song thrush died when it flew against our window pane. They seem to be more prone than other birds to die in this way. As many as we do, this one cause of death

The Millennium Panels.

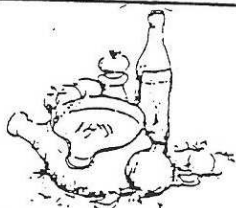

Do you want double yellow lines throughout the village and the police to vigorously enforce them?

Sibford Gower Parish Council is appealing for help from all car, truck and van owners to park their vehicles off the road if at all possible. The Council has appealed for your co-operation in this matter on numerous occasions in the past and your response has been disappointing.

Parking in both villages has become a problem, increasingly cars etc. are being parked on the road, especially near to junctions and blind bends which is both dangerous and inconsiderate to both other road users and pedestrians.

The Council is concerned that a serious accident will occur and therefore are currently in discussions with the local police with a view to solving the problem in the worst affected area, i.e. Sibford Gower Cross-roads, the area around the pond and of course the corners in Burdorp, and thus are appealing to villagers with off street parking facilities to use them.

The Council will monitor the situation over the next weeks and unless there is an improvement they will be discussing ways of solving the problem which will include yellow lines, 'no parking' signs, issue of parking tickets and obstruction notices.

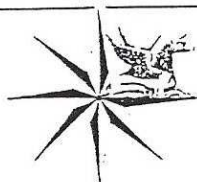

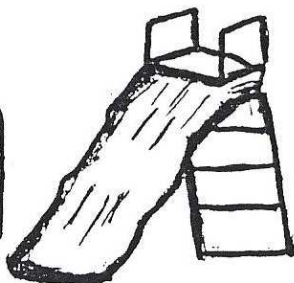
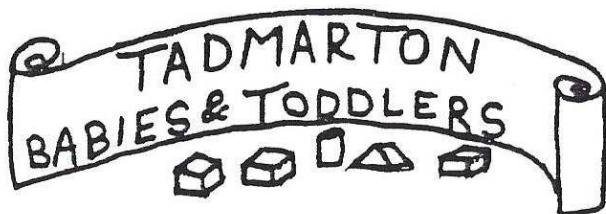

Sibford Society Meeting 15 Oct.

David Eddershaw gave an excellent talk with slides on Oxfordshire Market Towns to the Sibford Society.

Chipping Norton is a particularly good example because the layout of the streets and the land behind the houses facing onto the market place (now mostly car park) has not been re-developed to any great extent. It still shows, particularly in an aerial photo, the strips of land behind each of the houses (now shops) going up to Albion Street, which used to be called Back Lane. The houses, too, still have very similar width frontages, as the first buildings there must have had.

The church is well on the edge of the town, where the original village of Norton, mentioned in the Domesday book was situated, as was the castle consisting of motte and bailie, (again visible in the aerial photo). When the King granted a market to Norton, it was developed in its present position and the town was built round it and became known as Chipping Norton.

David Eddershaw showed slides of other market towns in Oxfordshire and some of the covered, pillared and arched buildings (butter crosses) where the wives sold their butter, eggs, cheese etc; these areas were slightly raised and paved to keep them out of the mud of the market square.

David Eddershaw was a first class speaker, who, I for one, hope will be invited again, as he has many subjects on which he is an expert.

On Wednesday 11th November, we again have Mr Hirons who is going to talk on British Wildlife. We do hope many visitors will come along and listen to his talk.

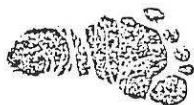

Review of the Season

The season finished on a positive note, with the club winning the last three fixtures including an eight wicket win at Brailes. After what was on reflection a good, but nevertheless disappointing season, the club finished joint fourth in the league and had an overall record of:

Had we not made a poor start we may well have won promotion nevertheless we must be pleased to have finished this high with what is still a relatively inexperienced and young team. The average age of the team was further reduced by the absence of Roger and Philip Gilbert through injuries; we hope they will be able to return on a more regular basis next season. In the absence of Roger the bowling was bolstered by the arrival of Matt Walsh from neighbours Radway, and by the return to action of Tom Holliday and Chris Sabin. As far as batting is concerned Ian Wollerton carried on this season in the same vein as last year to again top the averages. He was supported in his efforts by the return to form of Dave Simms and Dave Pratt, the latter being rejuvenated having given up the captaincy of the club. At the clubs annual end of season dinner the batting and bowling awards for leading run scorer and wicket taker respectively were presented to Dave Simms and Jason Barton. Dave Simms' 591 runs were enough to beat off competition from Ian Wollerton whose 559 and Dave Pratt whose 444 runs left them second and third highest run scores respectively. Similarly Jason Barton's tally of 35 wickets were enough to take the best bowlers title from Simon Chard who came second, taking 33 wickets and Matt Walsh with 29 wickets in third place. The Inaugural Sibford Cricket Club Players Player of the Year Award was presented to Dave Simms, with Richard Morbey and Lee Gilbert in joint second place. Once again we wish to thank Sam and Shelia for all their efforts on the night and their continued sponsorship through the season.



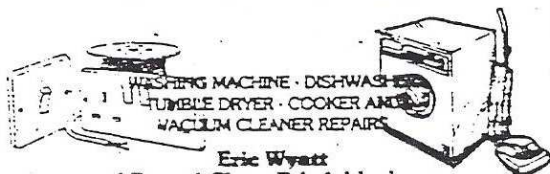

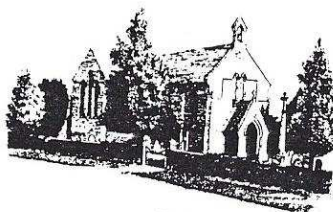
