#### Nature Notes


Dec 6th. In an old notebook that we received by post this morning there is a list made by my grandfather, while visiting his brother in Ireland in 1913, of "birds in the large case at Richards which Charles P Simms shot and stuffed". It does not say whether Charles P Simms shot them near his home town of Chipping Norton but I expect he did. The dreadful but nevertheless interesting list is - Swift, Reed Sparrow, Willow Wren, Tree Sparrow, Stonechat, Large Bat, House Sparrow, Cirl Bunting, Hedge Sparrow, Yellow Hammer, Cole Titmouse, Smaller Bat, Pair Bearded Titmice, Nuthatch, Whitethroat, Sedge Warbler, Whinchat, Kingfisher, Marsh Titmouse, Long Tailed Titmouse, Smaller Butcher Bird, Martin, Pair of Crossbills, Swallow, Robin, Common Wren, Large Titmouse, Small Blue Titmouse, Greenfinch, Red Linnet, Tree Creeper, Blackcap, Pair of Hawfinches, Pair of Mountain Finches, Nightingale, Redstart, Chaffinch, Bullfinch, Wryneck, Golden Crested Wren, Skylark, Crested Lark, Wheatear, Two Sandpipers, Grey Wagtail, Pied Wagtail, Yellow Wagtail, Smaller Dotterel.

These are as he wrote them. The reed sparrow is the reed bunting, the willow wren is the willow warbler, smaller butcher bird is a red backed shrike and the mountain finches might be snow buntings.

Dec 22nd. We had not seen a muntjac for some time but at midday today a female was wandering around near the house eating cow parsley and ivy leaves.

Jan 1st. 1999 was almost as wet a year as 1998. I measured 31.68 inches of rain against a decade average of 24.83". The wettest month was August with 4.75 inches and the driest July with 0.12 inches. February with 0.75" was the only other month when I measured less than an inch. Looking back I find that the driest 12 month period that I have ever recorded was August '75 to July '76 when I measured 12.45 inches.

Jan 6th. During the night a screaming noise came from amongst the trees in our garden which sounded like animals fighting. I went outside to find out where the noise was coming from and this morning searched in that direction for clues but did not find any. I am inclined to think it was made by badgers disputing their territorial boundary. Our garden is



about midway between the two nearest setts.

Jan 11th. Long tailed tits are again coming regularly to feed at our tube of peanuts. There were five of them on it at one time today with tails sticking out in all directions. We have not had any goldfinches this winter although they have visited food put out by a neighbour.

**Jan 15th.** More birds are singing that is usual for January particularly song thrushes and robins but I have also heard a mistle thrush and hedge sparrows.





On the 26 February Robin Spicer is leading a walk in conjunction with Cherwell District Council. We are meeting at Bill and Barbara Crabtree's home. The Brambles on Woodway Road at 10.00 am. and our walk should take about two hours. When we arrive back at the Brambles, we will be able to enjoy

a welcome bowl of soup and a roll, which will warm us up after a winter walk.

The walk is open to everyone, so please come and join what promises to be a very pleasant morning but do come with suitable footwear, as there is bound to be some mud!

#### Little London Sibford Ferris

Dear Editor,

I am writing in response to Mr Bryan's letter in December's Sibford Scene.

I am the owner of the pick up truck to which Mr Bryan refers to as being parked "so thoughtlessly" and as such feel that I should explain my reasons for parking my vehicle where I do.

I have been living in Sibford since the end of March 1998 and I love it, apart from the **speeding** traffic in and out of the village. Being at the end of the village you can hear the speed of the traffic. It is amazing how often you hear locked brakes on school day mornings, which suggests to me that the problem is mainly caused by people taking their children to school, rather than the villagers.

I have also noticed that some people entering the village seem to think that the 3O mph (maximum speed) limit starts outside the Old Forge, rather than upon entering the village.

After a couple of neighbour's cats had been killed on this short stretch of road, I decided to contact the Police and the Council to try and do something about this problem, but to no avail.

Then upon returning from work, I was horrified to find my cat had been hit by a vehicle. Her face was badly injured and she had a shattered jaw. She was lucky to be alive!

This was the "last straw" for me and as a result decided something must be done to try and slow the traffic down, hence parking my pick up right outside my house.

I have however carefully studied the road to ensure that there is enough room for the larger vehicles, such as buses, tractors etc to pass safely and have not just parked it "without any consideration" for other road users. I would rather not have to park my pick up where I do, but it does seem to have slowed down the traffic quite considerably, which surely must reduce the chance of someone getting injured? The speeding traffic is the biggest danger!

I apologise to any villagers for any inconvenience I have caused, but I hope you will understand my reasons for doing this. If anyone has any alternative suggestions, I would be pleased to hear from them.

### Cherwell Adopts Fixed Penalty for Dog Fouling Offences

Dog owners who fail to clean up after their pets will be facing an instant £25 fine under new Council policy. The Dog Fouling. (Fixed Penalties) Order 1996 enables the Council to apply the immediate fine and was adopted by the Environmental Committee at its meeting 15 September last year.

The Dog Wardens, who already dedicate 2 days per week to dog fouling enforcement, will continue to be on the lookout for offenders, but if they witness an offence instead of the lengthy process of taking these people to court, the fixed penalty will be applied and the offender given 14 days to pay up. Failure to pay will result in legal action. However, people who let their dogs foul on children's play areas can still expect to be prosecuted, because of the potential health risk to children from dog faeces. Dog Warden, Cathy Wainwright says, "We feel that the use of the fixed penalty system will speed up and streamline our enforcement work and still punish irresponsible dog owners accordingly. This system also avoids the creation of a criminal record, as long as the offender pays within the 14 days. We are really pleased with the number of dog owners we now see cleaning up and using our bins, but the irresponsible few still spoil it for everyone else and give dogs and their owners a bad name".

## Sibford Ferris Parish Council

The head of Sibford School gave a report on the long term proposals for developing the school.

The bungalows in Back Lane have been sold and the proceeds will be used to create a new main entrance from Hook Norton Road which is being considered for planning permission at the moment.

The next phase will be to sell the Manor as the building needs huge amounts of money spent on it to replace the roof and to bring it up to 2000's standards for fire protection etc. Disposal was planned as long ago as the 1930's. The school would dispose of the entire site including the garden and the land behind. It is not yet on the market but approaches have been made by various developers. It is thought that he site may be developed as flats, possible refurbishing the swimming pool and demolishing Gillett House to build "executive" houses.

The site would be exchanged for a major development of the Hill site and clearly phasing would be important. The heart of the new development would be a new meeting hall, of circular design, which would be capable of conversion to a 630 seater concert hall. This would be a huge asset, not only to the school but also to the area as nothing like it exists. The old hall would be rebuilt as a theatre complete with purpose built changing rooms, etc. This could be an asset to the village and would attract public productions as well as being useful in attracting holiday lets. A new music building would be situated by the South Corridor with state of the art facilities suitable for GCSE and A level courses. A new Art block complete with a sculpture garden and exhibition facilities is also proposed. This would include CAD and film production facilities. A new swimming pool will be built adjacent to the Sports Hall.

The whole campus will be pedestrianised with a circulation route for traffic to and from it. The existing main entrance will be blocked off. All the buildings will be of a high build quality rather than the rather cheep tradition of the past.

The school has now decided to retain the Ark.

Being a Quaker organisation, the school cannot apply for National Lottery funding and so raising money will not be easy.

Councillors were very interested by the plans but clearly the impact on the Village will not only come from the new school drive but also from what the developers want to do on the manor site. Access will be an issue as will parking and maybe pressure to build on adjacent land in the valley.

### Wheathills Farm Cats - Sibford Gower


There are two cats who live at Wheathills Farm, between the church and the Primary School. The smaller tabby, Porridge, is quite shy but very happy to be fussed if she chooses to approach you, although she tends to keep herself to herself.

Cat No.2, however, is a different case all together. He is already well-known by most of the children at the Primary School, anyone who uses the footpath across Wheathills and many of the visitors to the Church Yard. He has also been known to help tidy up the Village Hall and is quite often spotted curb-crawling on Mannings Hill. He is tabby and white and goes by the name of Diesel. He loves everyone and is inclined to follow anyone who shows him attention, grabbing as many strokes and cuddles as he can in the process!

I adopted him from the Cats Protection League in Learnington Spa where he just appeared one day as a stray - I would imagine by climbing into someone's car (another of his little specialties!). Although he has been at the farm for nearly a year I am concerned that he may do something similar again or that someone may mistake him for a homeless individual and take him in.

This is just to reassure anyone who is followed by a tabby cat with a very pink nose that he does have a home, he is fed twice a day and if you just ignore him he will make his way back to the farm. Also, a word of warning for the children at the Primary School - if Diesel is around, don't leave your packed lunches unattended!
