#### Nature Notes

Jan 21st. It is at this time of year that the thinning of the ozone layer in the northern hemisphere is most marked. A scientist has today given a warning that is has thinned at an alarming and unexpected rate over the last twelve months. It seems that the depletion of the ozone layer, which protects us from the ultraviolet rays emitted by the sun, is of more immediate concern then global warming.

Jan 24th. While we were having breakfast a male muntjac walked out onto our lawn to investigate an empty seed tray that I had left there yesterday. From the number of sightings that I hear about I think there must be quite a few around the village.

Jan 25th. We are never quite sure how many marsh or willow tits (they are almost identical in appearance) are coming to our bird table as they tend to come singly but today two came together which is about the same as for the last few years. They could well be the same birds. It would be nice if they could increase in number as the long tailed tits seem to be doing. We have seen them more frequently this winter not only at our bird table but in various places around the parish.

Jan 27th. I don't think I have ever heard so much bird song in January. This morning a song thrush was in full flow for some time before the owl stopped hooting.

**Feb 17th**. While working among the trees in our garden I spotted a small depression in the wild garlic where a muntjac had rested. Judging from the quantity and spread of droppings it had been there for a long time or on more than one occasion. I see that a newspaper feature on our deer estimates the muntjac population at 40,000 mostly in the midlands where they have spread out from a release from Woburn about 100 years ago.



#### Who are these Quakers?

This is a question we often get asked and also, jokingly, whether it's true that they invented and/or live on porridge!

It is not altogether surprising yet we've been in and around Sibford for more than 300 years and I don't suppose the consumption of oats in our village is above the national average! 'Quaker' was in fact a nick-name given two or three centuries ago by a magistrate after a Friend had used the verb 'to Quake' meaning 'having great respect for', rather than 'physical fear'.

About 350 years ago a man called George Fox, distressed at the way so-called Christians behaved, went back to square one and not only read what Jesus had said and done about loving your enemies and speaking the truth at all times, (thus making oath-swearing unnecessary), but actually put it into practice and, mainly by example, persuaded his followers to do likewise.

He also saw that a religion based on love - including even your enemies - must of necessity preclude any killing of ones fellow beings whether 'legally', during

war, or judicially.

In Britain, well into the 19th century, some 200 crimes were still punishable by hanging. When I was at school in the twenties and thirties there were still hangings for murderers, traitors and some other crimes; now thankfully, there are none. As to their beliefs, from their beginnings Quakers rejected what has been rather crudely been described as, 'Pie in the sky when you die' type of religion, opting rather for, 'bread, and justice, for all while alive!'. As to the spiritual dimension, Quakers believe that everyone can have a mystical experience arising from the sheer wonder of 'being' and having the privilege of living on a tiny planet in such an amazing universe!

This great sense of joyful wonder, Friends recognise as spiritual or divine which we believe, emanates from a source beyond our normal comprehension which we call God. We believe that each of us has the ability to relate to 'that element of God' within each one of us: life then involves a continuous search for, and realization of, this amazing experience.

In our Sunday Meetings we gather in silent stillness contemplating the wonder and 'worthship' (now written as worship) of the remarkable experience of God, as

here most inadequately defined.

This practical form of worship has inspired Quakers to oppose, and wherever possible, to do something about, all manifestations of evil, whether social, international or political. In the early days this lead to much suffering, persecution and even death, but their lives and example continue to inspire us to carry on the struggle to enable people worldwide, to live in peace, love and joyful harmony which we believe, are the fruits of all true religion.



#### Calling All Spinners and Weavers

A fascinating insight into textiles is gained at the monthly meetings of the North Oxfordshire Guild of Weavers, Spinners & Dyers, which are held in the Baptist Chapel Schoolroom in Hook Norton throughout the Spring, Summer and Autumn. From transformation of fleece or fibre to yarns; colouring through natural or synthetic dyes; to their fabrication into cloth, braids, rugs or tapestries through weaving, felting, knotting or knitting/crochet - so much is possible even with the most simple home-made equipment. One can work with not only wool, and that varies in its nature and lustre according to breed (of which their are scores), but also silk, flax (linen), cotton, mohair or cashmere (both from goats), angora (from rabbits), alpaca, came], hemp: the options are endless. These ancient crafts truly span the globe with different techniques traditional to many cultures; one does not need language to appreciate their beauty or complexity. Our first meeting for this season, at 7.30 on March 21st, will be a talk with slides on 'Navaho Indians, their weaving and way of life'.

N.O.G.W.S.D. is one of many guilds based around the UK and we are fortunate to have a branch right here on our doorstep as we would otherwise have to travel to Stratford, Oxford or Gloucester for similar facilities. Local guild members range from complete beginners (or those who just want an interesting evening out) to professionals who earn their living from their craft, including those who rear their own animals. An innovation at our meetings this year will be a sales table where members and visitors can buy and sell crafts (not necessarily textile-based) or other home-made or home-grown produce, even dye plants.

New members are always welcome (£12.00 annual fee) and in addition to the monthly meetings can borrow books from our extensive library, hire equipment or participate in fortnightly 'self-help' groups where beginners can learn the basics - and oh the joy when that lump of inanimate fleece no longer tangles and twists with a mind of its own but becomes a length of smooth yarn, slip-sliding soft and sensuous between the fingers, longer and ever longer.

So if textiles hold a fascination for you, join us at our first meeting this year, or ring Ann Bond on 01608 684385. We would love to see you, and refreshments are included.

#### The Brown Envelopes Are Back!





#### Care around livestock - a reminder

With spring on its way and a number of the local farms starting lambing in the next few weeks, a timely reminder about care with dogs around livestock is, I think, in order. Whenever you take dogs near any livestock, but particularly sheep, it is important that disturbance to the livestock is kept to a minimum. With ewes and lambs around it is very easy to get lambs separated from their mothers and then the whole flock get upset by a few ewes and lambs trying to sort themselves out again. This can usually be avoided simply by keeping your dog on a short lead and giving groups of livestock plenty of time to move if you have to walk through them, or better still walk round them and leave them undisturbed.

As the weather improves we will start to see more cattle turned out and as many people find out, frisky young beasts turned out after winter can be very unpredictable and lively. Please treat all cattle with care for the next couple of months.




