## Nature Notes

Feb 27th. While helping with a bird count on a 1 km square near Kineton we met a farmer who was erecting an electric fence round a young mixed plantation to discourage the deer which, he said, had greatly increased in number over the last few years. Some of the young trees had been nibbled until they looked like fuzzy topped bonsai trees. He had also dug out some ponds and had planted some areas of what I thought must be canary grass. I think he had done all this work to improve the shooting but it is also of great benefit to other wildlife, particularly birds.

Mar 1st. The fox that trotted across our lawn at 1 pm looked healthy enough but I understand that there are some very mangy ones round Sibford Gower that have little hair left and a rope for a tail.

Mar 12th. People keep telling me that they have seen buzzards and today I saw one for myself flying westwards at some height. It was the first one I had seen for several months.

Mar 15th. For the last week or so there have only been two long tailed tits coming to our birdtable so I presumed that they had paired off for the nesting season. This was confirmed this morning when my sister noticed that they had started to build in the gorse bush in our garden so we are looking forward to the completion of what must be the most beautiful of all birds' nests. A domed ball made of lichen and cobwebs with a hole near the top and lined with feathers, hence their old name of featherbeds. I am not usually keen to see birds nesting here unless they are in a safe nestbox as there are so many cats squirrels etc that they have very little chance of successfully rearing a brood but as this nest is 5 feet up a gorse bush there must be a fair chance of success.

Mar 21st. Squirrels have a very varied diet. This morning I watched one eating a sow thistle plant by pulling off one leaf at a time and eating it from the stalk end discarding the last bit of each leaf. The recent fine weather has brought out ladybirds, a good selection of over wintered butterflies, bumble bees and a few bee flies with long snouts which they use to probe the flowers of pulmonaria etc.

Mar 22nd. Last week a muntjac spent some time wandering amongst the trees in our garden and today a bold one was seen crossing the road on Mannings Hill at mid-day. This mornings dawn chorus was dominated by

blackbirds and it was not until they fell silent that I could hear that there was a mistle thrush singing in the distance and a green woodpecker laughing in the valley. After being so vocal a month ago song thrushes are quiet again. We shall soon get more variety when the blackcap and other summer visitors arrive.

Mar 23rd. When my daughter goes to look at the lambing ewes she quite often sees a badger but last night she saw 5 on the turnip field. They may have been eating the remains of the turnips or perhaps the worms and slugs under and around them.

#### Sibford Gower Parish Council

National Spring Clean - lst - 30th April 2000

National Spring Clean is the Tidy Britain Group's annual campaign to raise awareness about the problems of litter and encourage people to clean-up their local area. Last year millions of people across the country took part. This years Village Litter blitz will be on Saturday April 29th at 2pm starting at the Village Hall. Sacks, Gloves and Tabards will be provided.

#### Village Skip Service

The skips are provided for Sibford Gower and Burdrop residents only to dispose of bulky household waste with the exception of hazardous waste. Commercial waste or builders rubble must not be put in the skips. Hazardous waste includes waste such as garden chemicals, paints, solvents and oil. Residents can arrange for such materials to be removed and disposed of by the "Toxic Taxi" on 01865-815796. There is also a furniture recycling scheme in the Cherwell District. Old furniture in reasonable condition can be collected by Banbury and District CVS and passed on to people claiming benefits. The CVS can be contacted on 01295-279515.

#### Changes to your local Post Office.

As you may already know, significant changes are being planned for post offices and the services they can provide.

The Government intends to use ACT (Automatic Credit Transfer) for benefits distribution, in other words benefits will be paid straight into bank or building society accounts rather than through post offices. The effect on post offices will be huge, particularly smaller rural offices. Despite an assurance from Alan Johnson MP that "those benefit recipients who wish to collect their benefits in cash at a post office will continue to be able to do so", we fear that the Government and the Benefit Agency will actively encourage

the switch to payment by ACT with the resulting loss of business to post offices. Thousands of post offices in the UK are likely to be lost in the short term.

Those who are receiving benefits are perhaps those most likely not to have a bank account and also they may not have ready access to a car or to a bus service to get to the town to a bank. This can only increase social exclusion and rural disadvantage. We believe that rural post offices have a vital role in their communities.

We would encourage you to write to your MP and to Alan Johnson MP, Minister responsible for the Post Office (Department for Trade and Industry, 1 Victoria Street, London SWIH OET) in support of your local post office and the essential service it provides.



## Sydney 2000

Well it is now 2000 and 20 Fridays to the Olympic Games in Sydney Australia.

Mike and I have just returned, for me the last visit before D-day, while Mike will have one more look for two days in June. We will cortainly miss our trips down under; to go to the sunshine at this time of the year is a real treat. The Australians are fun people to work with and their food is brilliant! Sometimes when it is so hot that the only relief is to jump in to the air-conditioned car, I think of the cold and rain at home, and enjoy being cooked.

We are fortunate enough to stay in a flat in North Sydney, which sits right on the harbour over looking both the Opera House and the famous Bridge. The view is amazing especially at night with the changing lights. One night we had just dropped off to sleep when we thought war had broken out, but we were witness to the most fabulous firework display I have ever seen. The reason for such a scene was the docking of the QE2, which was spectacular on its own.

The Equestrian site for the Olympics is forty minutes from the city and we leave early to avoid the traffic and to get the bulk of the course walking done in the morning. It was great to see the change from last autumn, they have had some wet summers since the project was started in 1997 and so the trees and grass have grown significantly. People visiting will not believe how much the site has improved. The entire going where it could not be upgraded with topsoil and stolanizing (which is planting grass with the runners) has been turfed. The stables, indoor school and buildings look good having been finished last September when we had the test event.

Alan Willis from England and his two sons head the building team with five Australians. They have been out there for six weeks this spring and Mike goes in every day to set up where he wants the jumps

built and what height. Course Designing is not only making sure that the right jumps are in the right places, but all aspects of the speed and endurance day, a main concern being, is the going good enough? Horses are very precious and good going makes it easier for them to enjoy a good performance. One of the reasons for Mike being asked to take on the job was his experience in running events and a number of meetings are with the organising group. The building lads are a great bunch and we have a fun time discussing dressing for the fences to give them an Australian feel. One complex is an old Australian homestead, and the lads borrowed! Items to add to its authenticity.

One thing, which is difficult to get used to, is the snake population. I am more wary now than I was originally. When we first arrived the grass was so long that you could not see anything and I gaily walked through putting in post where told! During September they held the test event having made (in places they cut and filled tons of soil) the track and maintained the short grass, there were snakes everywhere. An SOS from the Police during the test event, could the building team please come and remove a brown snake from the cutting as the competitors could not get passed to walk the course. Alan turned off his radio! Brown snakes are very aggressive and poisonous.

Well the next visit in the company of family and friends will be the real thing, keep your fingers crossed for a good British performance, we will certainly being cheering them on.

There will be a short course next term for parents of pre-school children.


The course is called "Looking at Learning Together". It starts at 7.30pm on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> May, and runs for six weeks, excluding half term.






