Nature Notes

June 5th. A friend from Shipston tells me that a blackbird is already sitting on its third clutch of eggs in a wall shrub by her front door.

June 7th. We have not seen any holly blue butterflies yet this year which is unusual, as we have plenty of holly and ivy around for their caterpillars to feed on, so I rang a butterfly expert to find out whether this was general. He tells me that they have almost died out but not to worry as this happens once in a while due, it is thought, to heavy predation of the caterpillars by a parasitic wasp and that after a year or two, when I presume the wasp population has fallen, the holly blues will spread up from the south again. Blackcaps are much in evidence in our garden with the male in good voice and this morning the female spent a few minutes preening herself on the little tree that we see while having breakfast.

June 9th. A smell like rotting flesh alerted us to the presence of a stinkhorn fungus growing again on the same spot on our rockery as the one we had last year. The smell attracts flies to the sticky coating on the top of the fungus which contains the spores for the flies to carry away on their feet. I am not keen to see them multiply so I buried it deeply in the garden. June 15th. The young blue tits flew today from the third storey of a block of flats that I made for the tits from an old pump. There has never been more than one of the four flats occupied at any one time so perhaps they don't even tolerate other kinds of tits nesting close by. I think the youngster that I saw sitting on the lawn will be lucky to survive all the hazards of its young life.

June 17th we had to stop the car and wait for a big grass snake to make its way across the very hot road to Grounds Farm today. This hot dry weather must come as quite a shock to grass snakes after two months when the soil and herbage were always moist. The lucky ones live near water and can go for a swim on days like this.

When I went into the garden at 10.30 tonight I surprised a badger that trundled off through the garden which they must use every night this is only the second time I have seen one here.

June 18th I have heard fewer cuckoos here this year than in any year that I can recall but I am told that good numbers of them are still coming to some areas, particularly river valleys.



On the evening of the 18 May, two members of the Shipston-on-Stour Historical Society took us on a guided walk around their town and then into the recently opened museum, which proved to be a fascinating collection of memorabilia.

In readiness for the Society's exhibition of archive material to run in

conjunction with the Sibford Pageant, some of our members have been busy sorting out suitable photos and articles showing village life earlier in the 20th century.

On Thursday, 13 July, Robin Spicer is leading a walk of about 4 miles, commencing from the Bishop Blaize at 6.45 pm. This promises to be a delightful summer's evening walk and is open to everyone, so do come and join us.


As for hobbies, Simon loves motor racing and Rachel is interested in art and literature and also plays the piano.


Church Fete

Village Hall Extension

A brief progress report on the plans to extend the village hall and a little bit more!

The lottery application is on track and will be submitted around the end of the month. If successful in our bid we will have the additional space to offer much more to villagers and visitors. A key element of any bid is the support of local groups. Overall the user groups have supported our intentions. The two Parish Councils have indicated their support for our bid, however because of a lack of finances not in monetary terms. It should be noted that each donates £250 a year, an important contribution towards the running costs of the hall. Moving on, it appears that I need to scotch a couple of rumours. Firstly at the public meeting I believed I had made it quite clear that the extension was not being built for the sole use of the playgroup. My apologies for not doing so. By way of reiteration: - the playgroup will use the new hall on the same contractual basis as everyone else. If others want to book the new hall and it is free, you will be able to do so. Ways in which we see it being used are as a creche whilst other activities take place in the main hall, a small meeting room, children's parties etc.

Secondly at the same meeting I gave a personnel undertaking that whilst I was chairman the fees for hiring the hall, which I reduced on being appointed three years ago (villagers are charged half of the normal fees) would not increase. This excepted normal inflationary rises. (These have not been applied for three years and I see no reason to change them this year either.) So for those of you that have heard and more importantly believed that fees on completion of the extension would double please ask yourself where is the sense in that? We would lose the support of the groups who use the hall, fail to attract new users and eventually be forced to shut the hall if we maintained such a position.

BOOK REVIEW - 'THE SIBFORD MILLENNIUM PANELS'

This book, published by Andrew and Martin Gordon in memory of their mother Peggy, a former village resident, is both an intriguing snapshot of the Sibfords for turn-of-the-millennium villagers and a potentially valuable historical record for future generations.

Mollie Picken's heroic achievement in galvanising 66 villagers of hugely varying experience into action with dye and thread is most appropriately celebrated through the medium of Andrew's excellent photographs. The 36 pages are divided into two sections, separated by a map showing the locations of the buildings featured.

The book's first half shows the panels as they appear on display, allowing one to follow the historical work at the bottom in chronological order. Two pages are devoted to each panel, with a guide giving numbers for each piece of work. These relate - not quite infallibly - to the central map. There's also a page number for houses which appear in the second half. The tall format of the book, matching the format of the panels, enables the detail of each picture to be easily distinguished.

The second part shows individual pieces of work enlarged to varying degrees, with much interesting information about the buildings' background, researched and written by Andrew. I was fascinated by the history and trust that current residents will not mind their names appearing: they will, after all, themselves be history. The 'Directory of Artists' at the end must be used in connection with the numbered panel guides at the front, from which you can go to the individual houses in the second half. The system takes a little getting used to.

The book, which is designed by Nigel Fletcher, is a pleasure to look at and to handle. I thought it a wonderful way to remember Sibford's contributions to the year 2000, including the panels' connection with the Pageant, which Andrew mentions in his helpful introduction. Sibford has not been so celebrated in print since Leslie Bailey's *From Romans to Rock'n Roll* in 1960, and, as Andrew says, it would be nice to think that someone 'at home with their demesnes and their heriots' might be inspired by the work to produce a really detailed history.


