Nature Notes

Jan. 17th. Hook Norton seems to be a favourite village for waxwings to visit. A few years ago a group of these spectacular birds were seen there eating cotoneaster berries and recently there has been another sighting there. Waxwings nest in Lapland moving down into southern Scandinavia for the winter months and sometimes crossing the sea to Scotland. Some years ago I had a letter from a farm near Lairg to say that 27 of them were busily feeding on a cotoneaster bush growing against the wall of his barn. What a sight that must have been. It is only very rarely that they make their way as far south as this.

Feb. 2nd. Today I was shown a male mink which had been shot near Lambs Pool. It was the first one that I have had in hand and it was bigger and heavier than I expected. I tried to look up their weight in a book but only found reference to the european mink. The ones that have escaped or been released from farms into the wild here and are doing so much damage to our wildlife are of the American strain.

Feb. 3rd. A muntjac appeared in the garden this morning. I think it may have been a young one as it seemed less nervous than they usually are and with its tail cocked up, looked very much like the kid of a toggenberg goat. I thought that it might be tame enough to let me walk round it allowing it to go into our clump of trees where I have seen signs that they are lying up but it would not trust me to that extent and trotted back towards Mannings Close.

Feb. 4th. Most of our grandchildren who were here to lunch were able to watch the same or another muntjac as it wandered around in full view from our kitchen window. It was only eating a few ivy leaves while I was watching but I have noticed that a few of our garden flowers have been neatly trimmed.

Feb. 16th. A mistle thrush that has been singing frequently for most of this month has largely given up singing the typical short sharp phrases all on a similar note in favour of a rapidly repeated Tyew-Tyew-Tyew-Tyew-Tyew-Tyew-Tyew-Tyew which is not as nice. However it's distinctive song has taught me that the same bird sings from different trees spread over much of Sibford Ferris. Previously I would have thought that there were several separate males singing in the area, which means they are rarer than I thought.

Feb. 18th. While we were out today a sparrowhawk had picked a collared dove right by the wall of our bungalow. It had taken the carcase away with it just leaving a deep ring of feathers.





A NEW YEAR'S HONOUR FOR SIBFORD

Congratulations to John Millband, for whom the New Year Honours brought a well-deserved OBE 'for services to the community in Nepal'. John and Jean Millband have had their home in Sycamore Close, Sibford Gower, since 1986 but for the last 10 years have spent much of their time in Nepal.

John is a roads engineer and he has been helping the Nepalese government to decide how the money offered by rich countries for road building should be used for the greatest benefit to the community. Nepal is a mountainous country with few roads - they are all tremendous walkers. But new roads are easily washed away, so there is a temptation to build to a much higher standard than is warranted by the potential traffic. And roads built with the best intentions can sometimes have unfortunate results, for example if the village population decides to leave for the fleshpots and overcrowded tenements of the capital, Kathmandu.

The right course can be difficult to see and even more difficult to follow, as the roads department faces pressure from all quarters - local and international, political and commercial. John, having acquired a thorough knowledge of the terrain and people's needs, was able to provide the sort of calm and unprejudiced assessment of advantages and risks which greatly strengthened the hands of local civil servants and politicians.

John went to Nepal for Banbury-based consulting engineers TP O'Sullivan (of which he was a partner until the company was absorbed into the WSP Group in 1997) and thanks to him the contract was repeatedly renewed. Jean worked for a time in a local school. 'The people are so kind and so honest', she says, 'but all the same, it was 10 years in quite a hard posting.' Although John is now officially retired and they will spend most of their time in Sibford (and around - they are keen long distance cyclists), the Nepalese have asked him back for a series of short monitoring visits over the next couple of years.

John Millband follows a trail from Sibford to the Indian sub-continent pioneered by Frank Lascelles, with his pot of Sibford earth under the imperial throne at the Calcutta Durbar. John's mission has lasted somewhat longer and his impact will be more durable, if less spectacular. It is a pleasure to see such solid and useful work in remote places properly appreciated by governments both there and here.

The Deadline for contributions to the April Sibford Scene will be **Tuesday 20th March**.



11.30! The evening had gone by in a flash.



HARVEST TIME IN THE CAPE

It is odd to talk about the harvest at the end of February when you probably have the snowdrops just coming through but the grape picking is well under way here. It does depend on where the wine farms are and the state of the grapes as to when they start but I'm seeing lots of open trailers loaded with wonderful looking grapes. On Wednesday next week a group of us are going to Morgenster wine farm to do some grape picking of our own, then we will be watching the pressing and learn more about wine is made at their new cellar. I'm sure we will be doing a bit of sampling too! At the same farm they also grow olives and they have won in international award for their olive oil. You can actually go and sample their oils which is quite a unique experience.

So while the grapes are being picked the tourists continue to flock in. It is the main season for European visitors, all coming to escape the cold northern winter. The Cape is proving to be very popular with the Germans who are buying property as holiday homes much to the delight of the local estate agents. We notice that a lot of the houses where we live on Erinvale golf estate are used as holiday homes which means that often six months of the year or more they are unoccupied - such a pity as some of them are magnificent homes.

While on the subject of Erinvale, perhaps I can describe in a bit more detail about the estate where we live. Golf estates are becoming very popular in South Africa, not just for the enthusiastic golfers bur because of the security that they give. The whole of this estate is fenced and you have to pass through a security check point to get in and out. On Erinvale we have the Helderberg Nature Reserve on two sides, a fruit farm on another side with only the bottom end being flanked by a road. Not only does this afford it extra security but it is also very beautiful. The mountains circle the whole estate and it doesn't matter what time of day it is, they always look wonderful.

We can see the Nature Reserve very well from our house and often see bontebok, steenbok and duiker, all types of buck (deer), grazing just the other side of the fence. We see lots of birds, the most common being the guinea fowl who walk round in large family groups clucking contentedly. The down side is that they tend to scratch up your lawn, leave their calling cards everywhere and when alarmed give rather a raucous cry which at five o'clock in the morning outside the bedroom window is not welcome! There are also lots of plovers, Egyptian geese, and the hadeda ibis which has a very distinctive cry of ha..de da..de da., hence its name. Of course there are lots of other birds and the Nature Reserve itself is the place to go for some real bird spotting. There is a gate from Erinvale through to the Reserve and all residents can get a key and walk there at their leisure. 
