#### Nature Notes

Aug. 18th While on the Sibford Society walk this evening we saw about 17 swifts over Burdrop. As this is the most I have seen together this year I expect they are collecting for their journey south.

Aug. 22nd When I went out this morning I found our clock golf course in a bit of a mess. A badger had dug a few holes in it and a sparrow hawk had plucked a song thrush on it and sadly another song thrush died when it flew into a window this evening.

Aug. 23rd A few days ago I was shown what we took to be an owl pellet but it contained what looked like small cherry stones which seemed a strange diet for an owl. I posted it to an expert and he thinks it is a rook pellet and the stones were from wild cherries which have been plentiful this year. I didn't even know that rooks regurgitated waste pellets but we live and learn.

Aug. 24th A neighbour called me in to see a beautiful insect that had come into her conservatory. It looked like a bright green grasshopper with antennae as long as its whole body and was an oak bush cricket. An hour later there was one walking up our television set and since this date we have had one in our bath and seen another on a wall outside. It must be a good year for them.

Aug. 30th I followed a new badger track to the base of our old blenheim apple tree where I found that they had dug out a wasps nest. There was still some comb with a good crowd of wasps on it in the hole. While cycling this evening I was pleased to find quite a lot of danewort and a stunted plant of wild liquorice, which had been damaged by the verge trimmer, at the only local site I know where either of these plants grow. I thought that the liquorice had died out when I failed to find it last year but this plant was 20 yards further up the road.

Sept. 2nd Last night badgers completely destroyed our 5 sweet corn plants which were all that germinated this year. Last year they waited until we had picked the best cobs but not so this time. I expect this dry spell of weather and the very high population of badgers is making them short of food.

Sept 11th About midday I caught sight of a puff of cloud crossing the clear blue sky but realising that it was moving too fast for this light breeze I took a second look and saw that it was a flake of cobweb and was not much higher than the trees. This prompted me to re-read the letter that Gilbert White wrote on Sept 21st 1741 about cobwebs. On that

similarly glorious day flakes of web started falling from the sky at about 9 o'clock and continued all day by which time they had draped the hedges and bushes and even when viewed from a hill 300 feet above the surrounding countryside the sky was just full of them.

Sept 13th While we were watching brown bumble bees, probably carder bees, working on our red salvia bush we noticed that they always settled on the side of the flower. Looking more closely we saw that they were puncturing the tube behind the open flower presumably as a short cut to the nectar which otherwise was beyond their reach. We noticed also that they always punctured the left side of the flower. I am told that they do the same with runner bean flowers which is one reason why they fail to set as it bypasses the pollination procedure.

Sept 14th Except for a few fields of beans farmers have pretty well completed harvest and are preparing the ground for next years crops. I still marvel at the changes since I started farming when we cut the corn with a binder which tied it into sheaves each of which we handled a minimum of six times with our hands or a fork before it reached its place in the rick to await its turn to be threshed in the winter or spring.

Sept 15th It was nice to see more than 60 swallows on the electricity wire at Wheathills this morning.



Tuesday 15th October. Outing to Bourton-on-the-Water. Times to be arranged. Enquiries to Mrs. Boughton on 263460



#### SPRING ARRIVES IN THE CAPE

Yesterday was a glorious Spring day, pure blue sky, no wind and the spring flowers at their best. I sat on the lawn in the octagonal garden at the Vergelegen wine estate listening to Margaret Roberts, a well known herbalist telling us the merits of eating organic fruit, vegetables and herbs. As well as being a very interesting speaker, she entertained us with tales of her life and the people she meets on her travels around the country. According to her, we all have to chuck out our microwaves and mobile phones and watch less television before we all fry our brains!

I digress, back to the Cape Spring. The octagonal garden at Vergelegen is planted in the European style so there were banks of azaleas blazing with colour, wisterias looking their best and lots of daffodils and tulips lining the paths. The trees are now that lovely light green and bursting with new growth. It's so wonderful to feel the warmth in the sun again after the winter storms and believe me we've had some fearsome ones this year. A roof was blown away on Erinvale in August.

This is the time to see the wild flowers that bloom only after the winter rains. A couple of weeks ago we went up the west coast to see the incredible sight of carpets of flowers in yellows, pinks, blues and white. We stayed at a tiny fishing village called Paternoster. It apparently got its name from the Portuguese sailors who used to land there on their way around the Cape. Before they set sail again they offered up a prayer starting with 'Patre noster', our father. We stayed in a wonderful B & B right on the beach. B&Bs are great value for money in South Africa being of a high standard and in our experience, offering great hospitality.

It's a very quiet part of the Cape, offering a rugged coastline and stark beauty. We also visited a fossil park where they have discovered the remains of animals that roamed the area five million years ago. Once a phosphates mine, the fossils were discovered while stripping the surface layers from the ground.

Last week I was off again, this time to my friend's cottage by the Kruger Park. Once again, it was a treat to experience wild animals so close at hand and in their natural habitat. We sat outside to eat every night and

watched as grey duiker (a small deer), male kudu (large antelope with big twisted horns). a genet cat and warthog would stop by for a drink. We also went into the Kruger Park for the day where our early start of being at the gate at 6.00 am was rewarded by seeing a pride of lions eating the remains of their kill and a spotted hyena slinking in afterwards to crunch up the last bones. We also saw lots of elephants and quite a few rhino on this trip. On the last night there was a herd of elephant on the other side of the Crocodile river in a very agitated state. There was also a pride of lions lying on the river bank and as the elephant herd had some tiny babies, they were not happy about the proximity of the lions. They trumpeted and growled throughout the night which is a more unusual reason for being kept awake!

Finally, we thoroughly enjoyed our trip to the UK in August and especially our weekend in Sibford. It was great to meet everyone again and catch up with all the news. Thanks to Gaynor and Mike Harper-Tarr for providing us with a bed and to Gill and David Soden for inviting us to a splendid lunch in their garden.

Bridget and Christopher Hill came to live in Sibford on their retirement in 1978, and have been here ever since. They lived a quiet life, gardening and writing books, and making many friends in the village. They were interesting people: Christopher was once talking to his neighbour, the actor John Woodvine, who said that he had played the Master of Balliol: 'I was the Master of Balliol', Christopher replied. He was indeed a great Master in the revolutionary days of the late sixties (1965-78), and Bridget was part of the scene; I remember the pair of them holding hands at the end of a student party, so unusual in those stuffy days.

Christopher was in fact the greatest left-wing historian of his generation, who turned the English Civil War into the English Revolution, and wrote famous books on Bunyan, Milton and Cromwell. He settled in Sibford because he felt at home with its Quaker and Non-conformist traditions. Bridget was a match for him: she had a career as Treasurer of St Hilda's College, Oxford, and as one of the first tutors for the Open University. She too wrote good radical history about women, starting after she arrived here; her most recent book, Women Alone, Spinsters in England 1660-1850, was published last October. It was written in odd days of research in Oxford while providing 24-hour care for Christopher in his illness. This summer she arranged for him to go into a home while she had a fortnight's holiday: she became ill almost at once, and died of cancer in Katharine House Hospice a few days later on July 31<sup>st</sup>. Christopher is now happily settled at Southerndown Nursing Home.

Bridget's life will be celebrated in Balliol College, Oxford on Monday November 4<sup>th</sup> from 2.30 to 4.30 pm; friends from the village are especially welcome, but please let the Bursar know that you are coming (01865-277742).
