### Nature Notes

Nov. 21st Two mistle thrushes are noisily defending the berries on our holly tree against all comers.

Nov. 22nd At 7 o'clock this morning a very noisy flock of rooks came into our trees to compete with the hooting owls while a robin sang through it all.

Dec.1st I had a fine view of a goldcrest feeding in a bramble bush by the road on Burdrop hill. It was too busy to notice me watching it and came so close that I could have touched it. At 4 o'clock this afternoon there were about 25 pied wagtails assembled on the roofs of the houses in Home Farm Court. When we stopped to look they flew off as a flock but were soon back as though they have a regular roost in the shrubs nearby.

Dec. 3rd I thought I saw a firecrest in a nut bush in our garden. Its firery crown covered most of its head as it hopped in an agitated manner round, what I took to be its mate while she crouched on a branch in a submissive manner. I have since been shown a book that shows the firecrest and goldcrest with their crests raised and spread which apparently can be used as a display or as a sign of aggression. I am now left wondering whether it was in fact a firecrest showing aggression towards a goldcrest or a goldcrest displaying to its mate even in early December. I picked a few late raspberries for tea today. There would have been more had the October gale not stripped the canes of their leaves and most of their fruit.

**Dec. 7th** This morning at Taynton near Barford I saw a huge flock of fieldfares well spread over the fields on both sides of the road and a buzzard that seemed to be feeding with them.

Dec. 11th I-counted 16 long tailed tits around our bird table today. Two families may have arrived at the same time or have joined forces.

Dec. 27th A mistle thrush has been singing for most of the daylight hours near us but it seems to be the only one in the area that is.

Dec. 29th Our holly which is normally stripped bare by this time still has most of its berries which is partly due to the mistle thrushes keeping the blackbirds away but also that the October gale blew the top out of our cedar which was the roosting place for a number of pigeons that used to eat them for breakfast and supper.

Jan. 3rd The mistle thrush suddenly stopped singing on Jan 1st. I thought it might have come to grief in some way but there are still two defending the holly berries.

Jan. 8th During this spell of old fashioned winter weather we have seen increasing numbers of birds coming to feed. The blackbirds have built up to a maximum of 35 and have cleared up the 14 lbs of apples that I put out today. We have only seen 1 redwing, 2 fieldfares and 8 or 10 starlings. We also had a tree sparrow for a while this afternoon. I wonder whether there has been an influx of blackbirds from the continent where they are having even colder weather.

Jan. 12th A muntjac joined the blackbirds this morning and managed to eat a few of the apples that had been hollowed out by the birds. The whole ones were too big and solid for its little mouth to span.

Jan. 15th A Canadian cousin sent a newspaper cutting about the West Nile Virus which has spread from the USA. It has affected horses, humans and may also be responsible for deaths among birds, particularly crows. Their Christmas bird count in one area has shown an average of 1313 American crows over the last decade. This years total was 70. Chickadee numbers have also fallen by 25% of last year in the same area. Testing has detected the virus in more than 500 birds, 488 of them crows.




Spicer. The next meeting will not be until **20 March**, when we will have our AGM, followed by a quiz to test your knowledge of Village Locations in the Sibfords.



### HOT FROM THE CAPE

Happy New Year to all of you. We understand that so far it has been rather cold and has now changed to being wet again. Since the beginning of December we have had hot, dry weather, typical of the Cape summer. In fact we had a heat wave just before Christmas when all we wanted to do was either sit in the pool or inside with the air conditioning on. Christmas and New Year we had wonderful weather which was great for all the holiday makers. The tills rang merrily as Cape Town enjoyed a bumper season with all the tourists, local and international, enjoying the festivities. The only thing that marred the holiday season was the usual carnage on the roads. Over 1200 people were killed in the two months of December and January in SA.

We escaped for Christmas by flying up to Port Elizabeth, then driving up the east coast to Kariega Game Lodge for a few days. Set on a ridge above the Kariega river, the lodge is surrounded by typical riverine bush, ideal for the different species of buck, zebra, giraffe and newly introduced rhino. We went on a game drive every day and enjoyed seeing the animals at quite close range. The bird life was interesting too. We saw a pair of Knysna louries which have beautiful colouring when they fly. They are rather shy and fairly rare birds so we were fortunate to see them. A night drive with spotlights revealed a marsh owl and springer hares, the latter looking like mini kangaroos. They also had a boat on the river so on Christmas day, a group of us were sedately conveyed down towards the sea while we drank our beer, ate kudu biltong (wind dried

meat) and watched the monkeys swinging through the trees.

So as you can see, we had a very different sort of Christmas, in fact it was one of the most un-Christmas like Christmases I think we have ever had. The other people in the Lodge were mainly Brits on holiday, escaping to the sunshine for whatever reasons.

On our last day we explored the area a little before we headed back to PE. The coastal resorts of Kenton-on-sea and Port Alfred are very pleasant with lovely beaches. We even had lunch at a pineapple farm where they claim to have the largest replica pineapple in the world!

Then it was back to the Cape for New Year with friends. The big event since then has been the SA Open Golf Champi-







### TOUR de TRIGS

I'm sure that many people in our communities have heard of the Tour de Trigs. It's a tough 24 hour walk held on the first weekend of December every year for the last 37 years with just two breaks because of foot and mouth. Teams of three must complete 50 miles in 24 hours and are only given the route half an hour before they set off.

This year seemed to be something special because more than 20 people from the Sibfords were involved in some way. Three teams of three people actually took part and completed the 50 miles. Another dozen or more people went without sleep for most of the Saturday and Sunday helping with the organisation of the event. Catering, transport, house management, publicity and communications were just some of the tasks that Sibfordians take on each year.

In fact the Sibfords provide the largest number of people from any single community who take part or help run the 'Trigs.

There must be something in the Sibford water!



'Oh! - (I'm Rick). - Anyway, he took no offence at my inability to understand his English and gave me a 'Smokey the Bear' badge.

Down near the Pacific we watched the pelicans and surfers and visited a beach which cost several million pounds to protect from the sea. The seals moved in and the millionaires were moved out. (Californians are good like that) - One seal liked to lie on the same stone and would occasionally show off to the photographers.

### Do You Want Broadband Internet?

High-speed broadband Internet access at the Swaiciitie exchange could be nearer than we expect - if we say we want it. The latest information we have from BT is that their target for upgrading the exchange to support high-speed broadband Internet access (ADSL) is a total 94 subscribers registering interest. 50 have already done this, so we're more than halfway there. Since there are also 2 schools and the surgery on the exchange, BT may be even keener to get the upgrade done. If we want to avoid remaining the poor relations of town homes and businesses, let's see if we can register enough demand with BT for this to happen sooner rather than later for once.

BT is encouraging potential subscribers to register, but via an Internet Service Provider (ISP) rather than directly with them. To do this, one nevertheless starts with BT: go to <a href="www.bt.com/broadband">www.bt.com/broadband</a>. choose the green Getting Broadband tab at the top of the page and then choose the Broadband Suppliers link in the second line of the page. There's a Registering interest section in the lower left, through which you can register via an ISP of your choice. (The BT page also has an Availability & Registration tab, but it's a longer process if you follow this. First, you will be asked to enter your telephone number, then you'll get a discouraging message saying "It Is unlikely that there will be enough demand to cover the cost of upgrading your exchange". However, if you then follow the subsequent links "See how many people have registered an interest in ADSL at your exchange", "What to do next" and "Find out which Suppliers you can register with", you'll end up at the same Broadband Suppliers page.)

Most ISPs seem to be pricing broadband access at about £25 / month for unlimited, "always-on" access over normal telephone lines. The line can be used for both voice calls and internet access at the same time. This is much cheaper, and more satisfactory, than the satellite broadband service that BT has recently been marketing through leaflets.

Stop Junk Mail - Leave the Paper on the Trees

Residents in Oxfordshire can rid themselves of unsolicited junk mail thanks to a scheme pioneered by Oxfordshire County Council.

500,000 tonnes of junk mail is thrust through peoples' doors in the UK every year. Most of it ends up in the bin and therefore goes to landfill. It is one of the commonest gripes by Oxfordshire's residents that they don't want all this junk. However, you can now help to reduce the rubbish going to landfill by contacting the Junk Mail Hotline on 01865 816070 and requesting a copy of their junk mail package. It provides a range of solutions, including taking your name off junk mail databases, stopping the delivery of random junk mail and ensuring that companies stop sending you unsolicited mail.


