Nature Notes

Apr. 21st My daughter saw a white deer at the bottom of the field below her house. On closer inspection she could see quite a number of darker coloured deer resting there. They must have been fallow deer as they are the ones that vary in colour.

Apr. 26th I hear from the radio that a manx shearwater was caught on Bardsey Island which was ringed in 1957 which by my reckoning makes it 46 years old.

Apr. 27th At breakfast time I saw a swift flying high against the low cloud. I think this is the earliest date that I have ever seen one.

May. 5th We are on holiday in Devon where we visited Berry Pomeroy castle. While there my son saw a buzzard dive into a clearing on the opposite bank as though it was trying to get a rabbit but all it did when it landed was to spread out its wings and tail and spend about half an hour sunning itself. When it had gone I could see through my binoculars that the spot was bare of vegetation so it may do it whenever the sun shines into the clearing. A very bright double flowered gorse grows by the castle wall but I don't know whether it is truly wild as I cannot find it in my wildflower book.

May. 6th To Slapton Sands Nature Reserve where an Australian black swan was flying round with a much larger white mute swan as though they were a pair. It is thought that their genetic diversity is such that they will not cross breed. I hope this proves to be so as it would be sad to finish up with speckled or piebald swans. Now that we can see film of wild-life taken in their natural environment on television it is no longer necessary to take the risk of importing wildlife in the flesh. Also at the reserve I could hear a cetti's warbler which was identified for me by a local bird watcher. The cetti's warbler has only moved into the south and east of England over the last 20 years or so. We returned from our trip to hear that a jay had come near the garden and my wife had seen a flycatcher that died by flying into a window in the village. They are rare enough without suffering accidents like this.

May.7th We have now seen swallows, house martins and a swift down here but all as yet very scarce. The goldfinches, greenfinches and the old and young robins and blackbirds that visit the garden are safer here than at home as there seem to be less cats around, probably because so many of the houses are only holiday homes. There were two ravens along the

coast when we visited the beautiful National Trust gardens at Coleton Fishacre which go right down a steep valley to the coast path. The cutting of the roadside hedge banks must have been well timed with the tops trimmed so close that sheets of bluebells show above the other vegetation along with greater stitchwort, red campion, primroses, wild garlic, shining cranesbill and a few bits of gorse. I think we must be seeing them at their best.

May.8th Across Dartmoor to Lydford Gorge where we saw golden saxifrage, water avens, pink purslane and its white form, which I had not seen before, and grey wagtails by the stream. Among the gorse growing on the moor were some brighter bushes. I am wishing now that I had stopped to see whether they were the double form that we saw at Berry Pomeroy castle or whether they looked brighter because the others were going over. There was also a good deal of western gorse which won't bloom until July.

May. 13th There was a good crowed of house martins catching flies above the road at Whites Barn, Hook Norton today.

May. 15th A mink was seen on the roadside at the entrance to Grounds Farm.

Sibford Gower Annual Parish Meeting - Thursday 1st May

The above meeting was held in Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School. In attendance were the Council Members, County & District Councillor George Reynolds, Mr Colin Carritt (Area Engineer, Oxfordshire County Council) and 19 local electors. The Chairman (Mr Eric Payne) presented his report on the work carried out during the previous year by the Parish Council. Included in this were dealings with highways and footpath matters and the consideration of planning applications. He reported the bequest by the late Miriam Tebbs of a plot of land which she hoped would be for the enjoyment of local residents. The Meeting heard from Cllr Reynolds who gave a County and District Council point of view. He referred to the extensive works carried out in respect of roads and pathways. He gave some background as to the District Council's decision to terminate the village Skip service (this was highlighted in a previous issue of the Sibford Scene). Reference was made to the Housing Stock transfer and this has been well publicised elsewhere. Colin Carritt then addressed the Meeting in his position of Area Engineer. He ran through the works which have been carried out in the village - around some £300,000 has been expended during the year and the main results may be seen in the footpath in Acre Ditch, the road works in Colony Road and Barley Close. A report on behalf of the Town Estate Charity was made by Mr Fred Inns and he gave details of the 2002 financial year. The total assets of the Charity as at 31st December 2002 amounted to £437,299. The annual surplus of income over expenditure is for the benefit of the community. Mr John Mulley gave the Neighbourhood Watch report and was pleased that nothing untoward had been advised to him during the year. Again, he urged vigilance and caution with a request that anything out of the ordinary should be reported to him. The Clerk gave his financial report for the year ended 31st March 2003 and went on to refer to the adoption of the Parish Council Model Scheme in respect of the Freedom of information Act 2000. All matters in which the Parish Councillors are involved are open to public scrutiny upon request. Under the heading of Any Other Business, various aspects were raised. They related to some criticism of the road works in Colony Road, damage to the grass verges adjacent to the Triangle, Backside Lane, inconvenience caused by parked cars and the annual cleaning of the village pond. All matters raised will have the attention of the Parish

Council. The Meeting closed at 8.40pm after the Chairman again expressed his thanks to all who had been present.

Lynda then took over to explain about the three resolutions on which we would be required to vote. Many took part in the discussion that followed and the resolutions were subsequently agreed upon.



A meeting of the Council was held on 16th May 2003 in the Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School. Eric Payne and Robin Spicer were elected to be Chairman and Vice Chairman respectively for the coming year. Since the previous meeting, the Councillors had considered seven planning applications. The Clerk was able to provide details received from Oxfordshire County Council's Department of Environment & Economy as to remedial work promised following matters raised at the Annual Parish Meeting on 1st May. At the meeting under report, Councillors raised subjects which had been referred to them by local residents. These included a footpath where access is being impeded by protruding conifer branches, rainwater escaping from Colony Road into a resident's garden, damage to a resident's car tyre by a kerb stone at the Cross and a weed problem on a grass bank near to the village pond. The Clerk was instructed to contact the relevant Authorities to take the required action. The Clerk's salary was discussed and it was brought into line with the scale recommended by the National Association of Local Councils, The resiting of the Council's notice board was a topic and whilst it is in the most central position, access is not the easiest over grass, particularly when it is long and wet. The Clerk will investigate to ascertain whether some paving may be possible. The Village Pond had the Council's attention and the cleaning out will take place in August and research is to be undertaken as to the installation of plants, water snails and suitable fish in an attempt to keep the water clearer. The Chairman closed the Meeting at 9.30pm thanking those who had been present. The next Meeting will be on Friday, 11th July 2003 at 8pm in the Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School. PH

The Funeral Address for John the Tramp.

My dear friend John Peter Gregory passed away on Tuesday 29th of April and died of natural causes. I was fortunate enough to have seen him the evening before and he was in great form both physically and mentally, so his passing came as quite a shock to me and my boys less then 24 hours later.

Over the past few weeks I have gained much comfort finding out the number of friends who cared and supported John in so many ways. Some I have spoken to, others through evidence I have seen of gifts left at his home after his passing. I think John has made an imprint on all our hearts. I know how special he was to me and I hope I can accurately portray a true picture of John and his life through what I was told by him and from his friends.

John was born in Blackpool on May 19th 1933 and he lived in a boarding house for many years. He was to celebrate his 70th birthday on Monday and thankfully the boys and I had discussed with him the evening before his passing our birthday plans. We had decided it was going to be a big chocolate cake and a belting rendition of happy birthday! And of course loads of candles, the works for such a special occasion.

You understand John loved music and song! His little radios he so meticulously looked after gave him so much joy. He loved classic FM. One day I came knocking he opened his door and he said did you hear it? And I said no John what? The planet suite! It was fantastic! 10 minutes it went on for. He was delighted. John never ceased to fascinate me.

The next part of his life (circa 1963) and for years after that he drove a frozen food delivery truck. What happened after this period is a blur, and he ended up living in a bus shelter in Tamworth in a syndicate? For 5 years. He told me he decided to leave because someone had been pilfering his money and food.

How did he end up here? I will try to get this right but if not 100% it is very close to how it happened. Well John was seen in September time trundling up Sun rising hill on the Stratford to Banbury road pushing his large trolley when he was first spotted by a future friend. John had then stopped in front of Sun rising house and was rummaging through a large dustbin. Later his friend spotted John sat on the verge reading a large broadsheet (like the Sunday times) with all the one hundred and one supplements neatly laid out in piles all around him. This was John and he also loved reading and crossword puzzles.

His friend asked him where he was going and he was heading for a hostel he had heard of in Enstone. Thank fully his friend the carpenter as John always called him when he spoke to me enquired about this hostel and it didn't exist so John ended up traveling to Sibford and there he stayed. He had a beautiful spot where he lived and thanks to the carpenter fresh water, wood and provisions. This friend the carpenter meant so much to John and he always spoke of him with such fondness. He would say the carpenter came to see me yesterday and they would discuss their mutual love of football John being a Blackpool supporter. John would also share his fruit with the carpenter if he had any spare. I can only thank the carpenter from the bottom of my heart for all he did for John.

Another important family in John's life let him have his tin hut where he set up his home. I am sure without his tin hut he would not have survived the winter as it

kept him warm and dry. This also showed another side of John he was meticulous about how he kept his possessions and in his own funny little way he was very house-proud. Once again I can only say thank you to all of you who made such a difference to Johns life in so many ways. I would also like to thank Vicar Timothy Wimbush and Rebecca from Cherwell District Council for making today so special.

John used to open up his door and say Hello love! I adored him and he knew it. I think it happened when I said do you need any new shirts and he replied, oh yes a

17-1/2 collar please!

I don't know if you know but he was 6 foot 2 and had a size 12 shoes, he was a very tall graceful man. Another day he asked me if I liked to dance! Well this was my passion in life and what was Johns? It was ballroom dancing he loved to waltz and to foxtrot! He was truly a gentleman.

There was one thing I did give John. He would say bye-bye love with a wink and a nod and then I would blow him a kiss bye-bye... love you. I adored him.

So lets dance...

I'm Alright.

In memory of John.

"I'm alright," you told us when we asked
And stopped to talk, on our way past.

We didn't like to pry or interfere
For freedom is a thing we all hold dear.

It seemed your right to choose which way to live, But it challenged us, in what we had to give. We were safe inside, comfortable and warm, While you sat in your tin hut, braving the storm.

Your large tin candle and your radio, Were all the worldly goods you had on show, To give you company in the long dark night. Yet still you smiled and told us, 'I'm alright.'

You chose our village as your stopping place, And thanked us for our offerings with grace. How right the term, 'A Gentleman of the Road,' For in your quietness, that quality showed.

We're sad you've gone, but I think it's fair to state
That in our village history, we'll call your place John's Gate.
May you walk Heaven's roads now, in the warmth of Angel light.


June 14th is our plant sale and coffee morning and garden visit at Gowers Close we hope to see many of you there with plants to sell and buy.




