

Nature Notes

June 3rd. A pair of bullfinches have been visiting our bird table most days but today there were two pairs at the same time which probably means that neither pair has reared a brood.

June. 10th While cycling this evening we found the flattened body of a buzzard on the road near Great Tew. Much of it was so flat that it could have passed for a hen pheasant but the great talons put its identity beyond doubt. This is the first buzzard that I have seen as a road casualty.

June. 13th The nesting times for wild birds have advanced by about ten days over the last 25 years and scientists believe that even this has not kept up with the pace of climate change which is still speeding up.

June. 14th About a week ago it was reported on the radio that there was a big migration of painted lady butterflies coming into the South East of England. Judging from the speed that the last big migration crossed the country in 1996 they should have been here by now. On that occasion the main front of millions if not billions of butterflies stretching from Cornwall to here and beyond passed over in one day leaving behind enough stragglers to out number any of our own native species. Since it is now 10 days later than that influx was, I doubt whether this will be a very big invasion.

June. 16th A song thrush that nested in the pyracantha that grows against the wall of our house seemed to be feeding its young one for ages. I looked at the empty nest today as we have not seen any young ones around but there is nothing to indicate that they did not fledge successfully. A young jackdaw was hopping round the lawn today. At one time it settled down in a patch of wild thyme that was in full bloom as though it was going to have a snooze. I think it is too trusting to survive for long although it can fly quite well when it wants to. June. 17th A neighbour tells me that blackbirds nested in wall shrubs on either side of his window. The two nests being only a few paces apart. When feeding young, the parents came to the nest from their respective sides so that their flight paths did not cross which probably avoided territorial squabbles.







The choice of Thomas Merton (1915 - 1968) as the focus for the quiet day on July 8th, was inspired by hearing a selection from his writing one evening on Radio 4's *Something Understood*. As a Trappist monk Merton seemed a somewhat appropriate subject for attention on a quiet day. He spent most of his adult life at a Trappist abbey in Kentucky, and is considered the most important monastic writer of the twentieth century. His writing has inspired millions, and a selection of his works will be available for perusal on July 8th.

Although quiet days are not meant to be study days, the work of St Augustine and Julian of Norwich engendered enthusiastic interest and lively discussion at our last two meetings. Even so, attendance at the short talks is not necessary: anyone of any faith or none is welcome to come and enjoy the garden in stillness and peace.

After the August break, there will be two further quiet days as follows: **Tuesday 9th September:** exploring the Eastern Orthodox tradition.

Tuesday 7th October: The Rev John Stroyan from Bloxham will lead on the theme of 'desert' in our spiritual lives, following his experiences of leading a retreat in the Sinai Desert.

Ok there was some slightly dodgy running between the wickets, according to those involved they are all blameless, but aren't they always in run outs. And








