#### Nature Notes

June. 24th. I had a very interesting afternoon when I went to look at a bat that had been rescued from the driveway before predators found it. We decided that it was a long eared bat and were looking at it wondering whether it was healthy when it suddenly flew from the box and away up towards the roof of the house where there is a sizable colony. I was then taken to look at a garden pond built about 15 months ago. Already there was a nymph case of a big dragonfly on a plant and while we were looking at that a male broad bodied blue dragonfly came to patrol the pond and settle on a stone close to us where it would have made a nice photo. A few seconds later a female appeared; they mated and she started dipping to lay eggs. The next thing that happened was that the bat reappeared and twice flew down to skim a drink from the surface of the pond with amazing neatness and accuracy. It then landed on the garden and crawled around for a while and we decided that it might be safer if we put it back in the box to release at dusk, but before we could do that it took off and went into a clipped evergreen hedge where we hope it stayed till evening.

I was told that when the wind got up two days ago after a calm period, clouds of whitefly were blown from the beeches in the next garden and swallows came in great numbers to take them. There were also one, perhaps two, spotted flycatchers nesting in that lovely garden.

July 3rd. I was shown a beautiful elephant hawk-moth that had come into a neighbours house. A lovely moth that had hatched from one of the rather leathery grey caterpillars that we saw several of last autumn. July. 13th I was played a recording of the distinctive "quick ma click" call of a quail which a neighbour made recently on Ditch Hedge Lane picking it up on his camera. Several summers have passed since I last heard one so I will go and listen for it.

July. 14th A young great spotted woodpecker is coming regularly to feed at our tube of peanuts while robins and a blackbird compete for the bits of nut that fall to the table.

July. 22nd I used to love to hear the rasping call of the native grey partridge when I lived on the farm and while I was over there this morning I heard it once more and managed to spot 2 birds running away across a grass field. I could not see whether they had a covey of young ones with them.

# Sibford Ferris Parish Council Meeting

Many items were discussed at the meeting of 5th July, including notably the play area, footpaths and litter bins. The annual inspection of the Cotswold Close play area had been carried out by John Hicks, with no major defects found. The items identified in the report as requiring attention had been dealt with. The vandalised roundabout was discussed once more. A new roundabout would cost approximately £3000 (the old one will cost £500 to repair). £3000 was felt to be a very large sum to spend on one item and it was agreed to ask for suggestions for an alternative, via the Scene. Villagers would also be asked if anyone might be interested in reviving the Play Area Committee. (See separate item on page 9).

It was agreed to give the go-ahead for the construction of the footpath which will join together the existing path on Mannings Hill and the new path put in by Swan Hill Homes along the edge of the field next to the Manor development. Proposals by the Highways Department to enlarge the pavement at Lanes End to increase pedestrian safety were also discussed and there will be further contact with Highways in order to establish if any progress is being made.

The new green wheelie bin for litter, mentioned last month, would be installed near to the shop as soon as a slab had been laid to put it on, which Cllr Arnold Lamb kindly offered to do. (This is now in place.) It was noted that the containers were still at the Sibford School drop-off point on the Hook Norton road, but the meeting was assured that there are definite plans to remove them. There had been further correspondence between the Ferris and Gower Parish Councils concerning the extension of the burial ground. Discussions with the Gower concerning a new permissive footpath across Wheathills are also continuing. AS


#### Sibford Gower Parish Council

A meeting was held on 9th July 2004 in Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School and in addition to the Parish Councillors and the Clerk, it was attended by County & District Councillor George Reynolds and two local electors. The Audit Commission Annual Return and the Account of Receipts and Payments for the year ended 31.3.04 were approved. It was reported that Dr Pascale Nicolet, a Fresh Water Ecologist, from The Ponds Conservation Trust had been invited to visit the village pond which she did on the 8th July and met there with interested parties with a view to giving advice concerning the best way to both enhance the appearance of the pond and attract wildlife. She will return shortly to carry out a full survey and provide the Parish Council with her recommendations for consideration. The Clerk reported on a recent visit from Oxfordshire County Council's Deputy Engineer when a tour of the village was made to inspect those places where remedial work is required. Action was promised and the situation will be closely monitored by the Clerk. A pathway to make access easier to the Council's notice board has been completed. Other items on the Agenda were the need for acquiring additional church burial ground, the feasibility of a pathway through Upper Wheathills Field and the damaged seat at Burdrop corner. The next Meeting will be at 8pm on Friday, 17th September 2004 to which local residents are cordially invited.

#### Seat at Burdrop Comer

It may have been noticed that the seat at Burdrop corner is in a dreadful state of disrepair and it has been declared beyond salvation. The matter was discussed at the recent Sibford Gower Parish Council Meeting and a suggestion was made that someone may care to finance the cost of a replacement in, perhaps, memory of a loved one. #### AFRICAN ADVENTURE

Long before the first white man appeared on the scene, they were known as "Musi-Oa-Tunya" or the Smoke that Thunders. It was David Livingstone, the legendary missionary, who 'discovered' the Falls and named them after his Queen, Victoria. It must have been an awesome experience to come across such a natural wonder. He must have been puzzled by the appearance of what does look like smoke on the horizon and as you get closer to hear the roar of the water plunging into the gorge below.

It is still an unbelievable sight today as the mighty Zambezi river suddenly disappears into the abyss to surge along a narrow canyon. Our first glimpse was from the plane as it approached the town of Livingstone on the Zambian side on the Falls. The Falls and the river mark the border between Zambia and Zimbabwe. Zambia has become the more popular side to visit since Mugabe has made it a bit unpredictable for foreign visitors. The hotels on the Zimbabwean side are sadly empty.

We spent five days in Zambia, staying at a hotel on the Zambezi river, just above the Falls. We could walk to the Falls, right to the edge and down across a narrow bridge to get a view from further below. The summer rains had been good this year so the water over the Falls was enormous, approximately 540 million litres (143 million gallons) every minute! It is seventeen hundred metres wide, which from the side was difficult to gauge because the spray obscures your view. A raincoat and hood are essential as it was like being in a very strong shower as the spray swirls around you. There's a constant rainbow or two over the Falls which also makes it very pretty.

The best view is probably from above and we decided to take a trip in a helicopter to get the full effect. Not only did we see the Falls from all angles but we plunged into the gorge below the Falls and skimmed the river between the cliffs - quite amazing.

So what else is there to do apart from gaze in wonder at one of the world's great sights! Well, for the really adventurous, there's wild river rafting, bungee jumping, flights in a microlight and jet boat riding. But being of more advanced years we decided on calmer pursuits. We had a trip up the river at sunset, otherwise known as the booze cruise, only you get to see crocodiles and hippos as well. Steve went fishing one morning for the legendary tiger fish - lots of bites but a case of the ones that got away! He did catch a nice river bream however, and has got a photo to

prove it. While he was doing that I went for a ride on an elephant - as you do! Now that was a wonderful experience and something I've always wanted to do. Not only did I get to ride one, I was able to feed 'my' elephant, sit on his leg, and listen to him 'talk'. They are the most remarkable creatures.

Our final excursion was a day trip to Chobe Game Reserve. Chobe is in Botswana but we were only an hours drive from the border, where we crossed the river, African style in a small boat, and then drove to Chobe which is only another half hour away. We had the morning on the Chobe river, followed by lunch at a riverside lodge, and a game drive in the afternoon. Well, we'd heard that Chobe was teaming with wildlife and we weren't disappointed. I have never seen so much game, so close, in such a short space of time. We saw so many elephants, lion, hippo, crocodiles, sable, and a python to name but a few. A truly memorable day.

So that was our African adventure which was a wonderful experience. Back in the Cape we've had some lovely warm winter days. We still need lots of rain though, otherwise we are definitely heading for water restrictions in the spring. We will be in the UK late August/September so we look forward to seeing some of you then.

#### Village Pond

Sibford Gower Parish Council recently made contact with The Ponds Conservation Trust with a view to seeking advice regarding the village pond and on 8th July 2004 a visit was received from Dr Pascale Nicolet, a Freshwater Ecologist. She met by the pond with representatives from the Pond Committee and the Parish Council together with other interested parties. She asked what was sought and she was given to understand that we were looking not only to making the pond visually attractive but also to enhance the aspects of pondlife. Dr Nicolet said that she would return shortly and make a detailed study of the pond and then provide her written recommendations for consideration. She made the point that only recommended water plants should be installed and highlighted the fact that there are plants already in the pond which should not be there and ought to be removed as their impact is not at all beneficial. So, whatever the very kind thoughts and intent of residents may be, it is important that plants and pondlife should not be put into the pond. The Parish Council and the Pond Committee will carefully weigh up, in due course, Dr Nicolet's views and consider a planting programme under her guidance




