Nature Notes

Oct. 24th. On the way to Hickling Broad we called again at Grimes Graves where flint was mined on an industrial scale when flint weapons and tools were in demand (3000 - 2000 BC). I went down a shaft that has been opened and lighted so that visitors can see how it was done. On the surface lots of 3 inch long fox moth caterpillars were crawling over the short vegetation which is mostly wild flowers. There were still a few late blooms on the wild thyme and harebell. Oct. 25th. In How Hill nature reserve we found quite a lot of royal fern in its autumn yellow. This fern was apparently collected almost to the point of extinction in Victorian times.

Oct. 26th Sunny and the wind has dropped. We took a trip on an electrically powered boat through the narrow channels cut through the vast reed beds near the river Ant. Could see little except the tall reeds except where we stopped at a hide looking over a big area of shallow water where about 200 teal were feeding. There are still a lot of red common darter dragonflies around and two female brimstone butterflies. One of them settled on a bush to sun itself and a fly settled on its wing probably thinking that it was a leaf and had a surprise when a few minutes later the 'leaf' flew away. Two of our party went fishing only catching a roach that would not have been much too big for the kingfishers that they saw. A barn owl was out early this evening flapping gently across in front of the house. There are also plenty of tawney owls around.

Oct. 27th This morning we hired a boat and went across Hickling Broad and Horsey Mere. Saw quite a lot of duck of various kinds and increasing numbers of geese. These are truly wild, not like the semi-tame ones that hang around the boathouses. There were several hundred greylag or pinkfooted geese on the broad and with the big skeins flying round there may have been 1000 in view altogether. The sand dunes at Horsey looked to be good for wild flowers but I was surprised to see a green woodpecker there. This afternoon a rather disappointing visit to Hickling Nature Reserve except for marsh harriers which seem to be getting more common in the area. From a hide we were looking at a windfarm a few miles away and a lad told us that the huge wind generator standing alone generated as much electricity as the 10 smaller ones, who's faster spinning blades looked to be a far greater danger to birds. If we are to have more wind generators let them be big ones that have an altogether more leisurely less stressful appearance.

Oct. 28th We were told that there are cranes on the marshes beyond Hickling reserve but when we went to look we found that the area was closed to keep it quiet and we could not see any through our binoculars. It would be a good place for a tower from which birds could be seen without disturbing them. Some of our party went up to Cley on the North coast and saw turnstones, various duck and avocets. It had dried up a bit since we came and one or two farmers are making another attempt at harvesting sugar beet. I don't think they have done more than 30% of them yet so a good dry spell is needed.

Nov. 10th In the British Isles Natural History programme this evening we saw the rubber tracked reed cutter that was working at How Hill.

Nov. 18th A song thrush has been in good voice for the last few mornings. This morning it was singing in the rain.



Sibford Gower Parish Council Meeting Friday, 22nd October 2004

All the Parish Councillors were in attendance together with County and District Councillor George Reynolds, Peter Neighbour (Chairman, Sibford Ferris PC), three local electors and the Clerk. The Meeting scheduled for October had to be postponed because a quorum of Councillors was not available and, because of the extra time period, the agenda was somewhat longer than normal. Since the previous meeting, the Councillors had considered seven planning applications and six planning decisions had been received from Cherwell DC. The Sibford Ferris Manor Development was discussed and Cllr Martin Layer gave a detailed report on his enquiries into what may or not be allowed on the land at the rear - whilst not in our Parish, whatever is erected will have a visual impact. Sibford Ferris PC had carried out considerable dialogue and correspondence with Cherwell DC in this regard. In turn, Cherwell DC is in correspondence with the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister which has the ultimate decision to make. Cllr Layer reported on a Waste Debate which he recently attended. The Councillors were pleased to have seen the new Village Hall notice board which a little while ago replaced the old one. The Council's own notice board is starting to look a little bit the worse for wear and work to smarten it will be put in hand. A resident of one of the Pound Lane (High Meadow) properties fronting on to Pound lane raised the matter of a light being installed at the steps leading down to the road.



quiries to establish whether there may be a solution. Cllr Muriel Chandler then referred to the steps which are falling into disrepair and she pointed out that many elderly local residents use them. The Clerk will take the matter forward with the County authorities. Several highway matters still need the County's attention and County Cllr George Reynolds said that this village is not unusual in this respect. The County Council has a budget which it apportions as fairly as is possible but he suggested that pressure be kept on. The Clerk has this well before him. With regard to footpaths, all outstanding remedial works have been completed. The annual financial return for the year ended 31st March 2004 had been signed off by the External Auditor and was approved and accepted by the Councillors. Cllr Peter Abbott had been nominated by the other Councillors for appointment to the Conservation Board in the Chilterns and Cotswolds (Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty). The outcome of the election is awaited. Turning to Affordable Housing, four sites in the village had been highlighted by the District Housing Enabling Officer and he will discuss these with the District Planning Officer. Should one be thought suitable, dialogue will be opened with the Parish Council and the land owner. It was decided not to pursue the matter of a permissive footpath on Upper Wheathills after a letter from The Town Estate Charity (the land owner) setting out its conditions. The Clerk reported that he and interested parties had met earlier that day with the Pond Officer from Ponds Conservation Trust who will be providing advice and suggestions for the future of the pond as to its appearance and attraction for pondlife etc. The land bequeathed by the late Miriam Tebbs was a subject for discussion. A suggestion as to making it attractive had been received but would mean a capital outlay which, at this stage, the Councillors could not justify. The Councillors felt that it would be a good thing to publicise their phone numbers so that contact may be made as and when necessary. They are given below. The Chairman closed the Meeting at 9.45pm thanking all who had attended. The next Meeting will be in the usual venue (Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School) on 26th November 2004 commencing at 8pm. Local residents are cordially invited to be present.

Pages from the Past

Recollections of a Farm Worker by Eric Payne
In February 1933, when I was 14, I finished school in April on a
Friday, came up to Elmridge Farmhouse, above the pond in Sibford Gower, on Saturday to collect my Dad's wages. He had been a carter in the employ of Mr. John Lamb since age 16 till he died when he was 60 in 1940. I
came to collect my father's 1.0.0 per week wage and Mr. Lamb said "Eric,
I understand you have left school. Would you like to come and work for
me", and I said "Thank you very much Mr. Lamb, I would". He said "You
can start on Monday" I said "No, because it is my cousin Lizzy Payne's
marriage (to Ambrose Sabin) on (Easter) Monday, but I can start Tues-

day". He said "Alright", and I arrived on Tuesday morning at 7:00a.m.

The first job I did was to go up to Elmridge Barn to collect a horse and cart and bring it back. Then I had to collect a pig, put it in the eart and take it back to Elmridge Barn. This took 2 hours and then I had my lunch, 9:00 - 10.00 a.m. Lunch would consist of a crust of dry bread, no butter, white cheese (from the co-op) and cold tea (in a glass bottle). After lunch I put the horse in a flat roll and went and rolled wheat in a field rear Elmridge Barn,

From 12:00 to 1:00 we had dinner consisting of a crust of bread, boiled bacon (home cured) and a bit of cheese and cold tea. After lunch we continued working in the field. At about 3:00p.m. we would stop for a drink

of tea, my father scolded me once for sitting down to drink my tea, saying there was no need to sit down during this short break. At 4:30 p.m. I put the horse in the stable at Elmridge Barn, took off the harness, fed it and then let it out in the field. Work finished at 5:00 - 5:30 p.m. Then we went back home to the Colony for tea a cooked meal consisting of boiled potatoes, cabbage, swede. Afters - boiled apple or jam pudding. In the evening sometimes I would play football or help my father in the garden. We didn't have a radio and didn't get one

until I was 17: a crystal set with cats whiskers.

This routine would be for 5 1/2 days per week (till 1 p.m. on Saturday) and the pay was 7s 6d per week. Of this money I would give 5s. Od to my mother for groceries and the other would be used for clothes. A good pair of hob nailed boots cost £ 1.0.0 and last about one year. Jacket and trousers cost about 30s between them.

On Sunday we had a best suit which would last for years, a pair of light boots costing about 15s. I was in the choir, so church at 11:00 a.m. and again at 6:30p.m. We would be paid to be in the choir - 3d per service. The vicar then was Thomas Coles, In the afternoon we would usually go for a walk around the Elm at Sibford Ferris or Traitors Ford. The only holidays we had were the 1st Monday in June - Sibford Club Day and Christmas Day.

In March 1933 we used to cross plough the ground with horses. With a good pair of horses on reasonably sandy ground you would achieve up to 3/4 acre per day. Then the ploughed ground would be scuffed (long tines to break up the ground). Then it was dragged and harrowed to get the squitch out, which was then burned. Then in April you could plant your oats and barley. Then more ground would be prepared for mangle - planted in May (mangle is like beets - food for cattle). Then swedes and turnips would be planted in June.

After these chores - end of June - we had to get ready for haymaking. Two horses on a mowing "machine"; a four foot blade pulled along between two horses. On average every hour you would have to get off and sharpen the blade with a file. The hay would lay for a week then would be turned with a swath turner. After another 3 or 4 days it would be stacked in heaps then pitched on the wagon. The wagon would take the hay to the ricks near Elmridge Barn. This job would last until harvest time -August. The first harvesting job would be cutting the winter oats (planted in October of the previous year). They would be stacked in stooks and "Let the Church Bells ring on them for 3 Sundays" by which time they were ready to rick up. The Spring barley would be ready to cut and then the wheat was left to the end (September) The wheat was cut down in a field in ever decreasing circles. The rabbits would stay in the middle and work would stop at some time and the guns would come out. The rabbits would be shot, gutted on site and taken home to be eaten.

After harvesting, we would thatch the ricks, 5 or 6 hay or com ricks and it would take 2 days for each rick.

October time would be time for hedge trimming with a splashing hook, this for a week; then ploughing the clover back in and planting

wheat. At the end of October the oats were planted. November, get the mangles up and store them in a trench (buried them in a "clamp") Then get up the swedes. The sheep had the turnips.

The winter months would be for hedge laying or, if the weather was bad, clearing manure out of pens.

In December and January the "corn" (wheat, barley oats) would be threshed. Mr. Gibbs used to come from Ascott with his Fordson Tractor and Threshing Box. This would involve 7 men: the tractor would drive the pulley which would turn the drum and thresh the corn. One man on the cornrick to put the sheaves up on to the threshing box. Another man would cut the string (and save it). One man fed the drum. Another man carried chaff and cavein. Two men would pitch the straw on to the rick. One man building the rick. One man would take the corn away. The machine would start at 7:00a.m. and stop at 5:00p.m. Cider would usually be taken - sometimes quite strong because Frank (Wealsby) and I used to add some wheat to the mixture.

Sibford Ferris Parish Council Meeting. 15th November 2004 Amongst other subjects discussed, were items relating to Sibford School. Michael Goodwin, the new Headmaster of Sibford School, and the new Business Manager, Peter Robinson, attended the meeting in order to respond on these items and also to answer any queries from members of the public. Peter Robinson explained that the tree maintenance programme being undertaken by the School, including the removal of the second beech from the sports ground and three other trees, was for safety purposes. Mr Robinson advised that tree planting was also scheduled and this was welcomed by those at the meeting. He also reported that access points to the School were under revision, and that a "No access" sign would be put up at the Hook Norton road end of Back Lane to discourage vehicles from using this route. Mr Goodwin took the opportunity to thank the village for the warm welcome received by him and his family and said that he was keen to strengthen links between the School and the community. There were plans to create an arts workshop and other areas were being looked where there was potential to develop new and existing links. Peter Neighbour, Chairman, welcomed this initiative on behalf of the Parish Council and looked forward to working with the School. On other matters, it is hoped that a Parish Council notice board will be available once again within the next month on the new wall of the Manor development close the junction with Main Street. This is dependant on Listed building consent being obtained from the District Council. The new board will have a section for public notices. The new footpath at the top of Mannings Hill has been completed and the path provided by Swan Hill Homes has been opened. The Parish Council will try once more to address Swan Hill on the problem of contractors parking on the pavement by the Lanes End junction. The problem of speeding vehicles was also discussed and an offer by the Highways department to provide speed measuring strips will be accepted. The proposed new layout at Lanes End is still under discussion with Highways, but it is hoped that some progress was made by Councillors who attended the Parish Liaison Meeting at the District Council on 4th November. The Councillors are concerned that proposals to create a built-out section on the west of the junction will put at risk those waiting at the bus stop on the east side unless a safe area is created on the bus stop side. The local Chairman of the Campaign for the Protection of Rural England (CPRE) has made an initial response to the Parish Council's concerns that the fields adjacent to the Manor development be maintained as open countryside as intended by the planning permission. The CPRE Chairman requested documents and information which have been supplied, and her further response is awaited. Investigations into potential sites for affordable housing are continuing.

The Cherwell Villager service is still under review by its provider, Banburyshire Community Transport Association Ltd, who advised that the timetable and prices published in the Scene were out of date. The correct





The Church Bazaar raised over £1,000 for Church funds. Thank you to all who helped and attended.




