#### Nature Notes

Mar. 17th. Today's sunshine brought some butterflies out of hibernation. I had 3 brimstones and a tortoiseshell in view at the same time.

Mar. 20th. Quite a good dawn chorus this morning but as last year a fair way from the house. The song birds don't seem to like having the rooks nesting overhead. Whether they feel threatened by them or it is that they need protection from the same risk that we take by walking there I don't know but it brings to mind an image of a singing wren holding up a cocktail umbrella for protection.

Mar. 28th A red kite was seen over Whichford a few days ago and today my son rang to tell me there was one at Temple Mill being chased off by a buzzard. By the time I got down there I could see a buzzard going away towards Traitors Ford but no sign of the red kite. Today I had a phone call to say that one had been seen over Epwell. They are expected to come into this district but the buzzards will not welcome them.

Mar. 31st. We had 1.73 inches of rain over the last 2 days which is considerably more than in the first 2 months of the year.

Apr. 1st A blackcap is singing in the garden this morning which is a few days earlier than last year.

Apr. 8th. To Worth Matravers in Dorset for a few days. It is a stony area with drystone walls round many of the fields and most of the houses built of the same grey limestone with big roof tiles of similar stone cemented into position. Most of the steep land sloping to the sea locally is terraced with what the map calls strip lynchets. I presume that crops were grown on them originally but they are now grazed.

Apr. 9th. Walked to the big stone quarries at Winspit Point. As well as quarrying there were some horizontal mines the biggest of them leaving a 10 or 12 foot ceiling supported by a few pillars of rock which were left in situ. The siting of equipment made us think that most of the stone had left the quarry by sea. While we were there a peregrine falcon flew by probably looking for a meal in the form of a rock dove. The heads of last years carline thistles still looked bright. I can remember a lady in Sibford that used to collect them to put with dried helichrysums for winter decoration. There were also some patches of early scurvy-grass in the old quarry. Apr. 10th. Walked to Chapmans Pool where about a dozen people were busy on the annual litterblitz. They were quickly filling bags along the high tide mark which then had to be taken by rowing boat to a point access-

sible to vehicles. On the way we saw swallows and on the way back crossed a meadow where the introduced milk thistle or sillybum now grows as a weed. Our path also took us through a quarry which, like several in the area, is still being worked. The spring sown corn crops are suffering from the lack of rain.

Apr. 12th. In the ruins of Corfe Castle we found that ravens were nesting in the tallest of the remains. One of them was seeing off a buzzard as we arrived. In the Corfe Castle Museum I read that much of the stone from Winspit quarry was shipped to London as paving slabs which may be why they mined into the most suitable strata.

Apr. 13th. Before leaving for home we visited Kimmeridge Bay which has great geological variety in the surrounding cliffs and much of interest in the bay but the tide was in covering that. A rock pipit was performing its song flight which probably means a nest close by. There was a nodding oil pump working on the bank at the other side of the bay. Seeing all the tempting footpaths setting off up the gorse covered hillsides makes me think that this is a very good walking area especially at this time of year although July would be as good for wildflowers.

Apr. 19th. A while ago I was told that 4 buzzards were seen over Sibford, then came a report of 7 and now 8 at the same time. Any more bids?

As Mr. Steele was unable to come the meeting in April to demonstrate making a chair, Martin Way came at short notice and spoke on The Golden Age of Coaching' to a fascinated audience. He brought with him a collection of old maps and coaching memorabilia and showed slides to illustrate his talk. Up until the early

17C a road would be very like our farm tracks are now and were often deeply rutted, sometimes up to four foot deep by the heavy carts and coaches passing along them, so travel was slow with many accidents happening. The first 'good' road was made in 1718 and the Turnpike Trust was set up and tolls levied on all who passed through a turnpike - literally a pike set across a road and turned when payment had been made. The first Royal Mail coach went from London to Bath in 1784 but this service finished in 1823 with the advent of the railways.

Our next meeting is on **Thursday**, 19 May at 8.00pm in the Village Hall. Mr Sirot Smith is talking about the 'History of Sulgrave Manor and the Washingtons', which will give us a background for our visit to Sulgrave Manor on 16 June at 7.00pm. 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





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#### AFRICAN RAIN

Why do we get so obsessed with the weather? Well, when it affects the crops we grow, our means of transport and most importantly, the water we drink, we take a keen interest in what the weather is going to do. It's been a much talked about topic in the Western Cape over the last twelve months as a lack of rainfall has meant dwindling water supplies. The dams are down to 28% of capacity on average and some are lower than that. Why so little water left? Well, we had poor winter rains last year, coupled with a very long hot, dry summer. Planning of new dams and alternative water supplies has slowed down as the politicians have argued over silly things like renaming the roads in Cape Town. We are also experiencing incredible growth of new houses and shopping centres as more people migrate to the Cape. Then there's the annual influx of tourists. To say that the water situation is critical is an understatement!

However, last week we had our first autumn storm and what a storm it was! The thunder and lightening was quite spectacular - a rare sight in the Cape. We had lots of glorious rain but the Overberg, the mountains to the west of Cape Town, had too much too quickly with the result that roads got washed away, including the main N2 highway up the Garden Route. We went to Knysna last week and had to divert via Worcester and the Robertson valley. The water coming off the mountains was amazing and all the rivers were raging torrents.

I'm glad to report that this week we have had some more good rain as two cold fronts have passed through. We're now waiting to see if it's made any difference to the dam levels. Otherwise, we're into our lovely autumn weather with our warm days and cool evenings, which I prefer to the heat of summer.

I mentioned that we went to Knysna, which is on the Garden route and is a good centre for different activities. My mother is over from the UK at the moment so we did some things with her that we've been meaning to do for a while. We took the Outeniqua Tcho Choo, a steam train that runs along the coast to George which offers some lovely views of the sea and the lagoons. We also visited an elephant park where you can feed and touch the elephants. There were lots of little ones, which were very cute. Then we had a river cruise up the Keurbooms River by Plettenberg Bay where you get an idea of the forest as it was before man came along and chopped most of it down. We

saw the Knysna Lourie, which is a parrot type of bird found particularly in this area.

Another excursion was to an old farm, just north of Wellington, called Bartholomeus Klip. Once a sheep farm, it has been converted to the native vegetation and buck and zebra re-introduced. We stayed in the old Victorian farmhouse, which was beautifully restored to its former glory. Sitting on the stoep (veranda), in the gardens or by the dam was so relaxing. A great place for a quiet getaway. Oh! And did I mention the wonderful food including a high tea at three o'clock in the afternoon.

Once my mother goes back to the UK next week we can finally hang up our B&B sign for the season. It's been quite busy this year. Then we start to do some travelling with our first trip to Chobe in Botswana. Steve is keen to go after the famous tiger fish, which are difficult to catch and put up a great fight. I will be happy to see all the wonderful game along the Chobe River and in the National Park.

So here's hoping for more rain and good fishing!

## A Page from the Past (continued from last month) A short account of Farming in and around Sibford in the 1930's by Charles J. Lamb

The next holding, Elmridge Farm, formerly known as Ryehill Farm, 90 acres, was the property of my grandfather John Lamb, who farmed here together with the 60 acre property of Gibralter Farm just across the River Stour in Hook Norton parish. Ryehill Farm was formerly owned by my grandfather's cousin, William Lamb, and before him by his father, A.J. Lamb, and his grandfather, Joshua Lamb, since 1819. On the sale of the farm following my grandfather's death in 1940, it had been farmed by a member of the Lamb family for 120 years.

William Lamb, in addition to farming, ran a jam preserving business in the custom built brick buildings behind Elmridge House, but little is known of its operations, and the buildings were largely disused during my youth, but after the sale of the farm to Hopkyns, were used as a cabinet maker's workshop by my wife's father and brother for some years, but are, again, largely derelict.

Adjacent to the jam factory lived my Uncle Jack in a cottage that obviously had at one time been a separate property from Elmridge, and was popularly supposed to have been a public house known as the Red Lion. This was partly borne out by the fact that adjoining the "Red Lion" was a small cottage lived in by my grandfather's sister, Rachel, which had been converted by my grandfather

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Telephone 788595 Levender Cottage, Bonds End Lone, Silford Gover, Benhury OX15 5RT from a building described in 1868 by A.J. Lamb as a malthouse. A.J. Lamb also at that time owned Stickleys Farm and Wells Ground, later to be the property of my mother.

Home Farm, 120 acres, had long been the property of the Hopkyns family, who were also to purchase the adjoining Elmridge Farm.

Home Farm was farmed by Elizabeth Wealsby, a widow for many years, and whose son, Frank, after his marriage to my father's sister, Edna, was to farm here and Elmridge until his death when the property again reverted to its original components to be farmed by my cousins Frank and William Wealsby. (Elmridge has therefore by 1984 achieved a further 44 years in the hands of Lamb relations, giving a total of 164 consecutive years.)

Adjoining Home Farm, and extending in a narrow strip up Pound Lane, was a small 20 acre farm belonging to the Gaydon family. A Miss Gaydon was the sole survivor at the time of which I write and she, in the loneliness of middle age, married her ploughman, Harry West, who then inherited the farm on her death. After his retirement the farm was worked by the Will Poulton family and on his death broken up and sold partly for building and partly to neighbouring farmers. The farmhouse appeared to be one of the old village farmhouses from pre-enclosure days and was considerably larger than to be expected on a 20 acre farm, and I believe that the Gaydon family did, at one time, own a farm later to be part of Handy Water Farm. Handy Water Farm, with its Barn Farm, approximately 90 acres across the tumpike, was farmed by my uncle Will Bishop until ill health necessitated his retirement to the small 10 acre Glebe Farm adjoining Stickleys. #### Sibford Gower Parish Council Meeting Friday 18th March 2005

At the Parish Council Meeting held in Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School, all the Parish Councillors were in attendance together with six members of the public and the Clerk. The following matters were on the agenda:-

Highway Matters: There are a number of areas where remedial work is required by Oxfordshire CC. The Deputy Area Engineer is due to attend the Annual Parish Meeting on the 4th May and the Clerk has written to him reminding of the outstanding attention needed so that he may be properly prepared to answer questions which may be put to him. An acknowledgement had been received in which he said that he is most conscious of what needs to be done and has budgeted for monies to be expended on some of the items. Footpaths and Bridleways: The matter of motor cyclists and scramblers using Bridleways was raised and the Clerk was instructed to write to the Field Officer, Oxfordshire CC to check the position.

Church Burial Ground: Negotiations continue regarding the acquisition of additional land from the Diocese of Oxford to allow the present churchyard, which is reaching full capacity, to be extended. As a matter of current policy, the Diocese will not transfer land to a church or Parochial Church Council but only to a Parish or District Council. The Parish Council is having to consider the purchase of the land. Discussions are ongoing in partnership with Sibford Ferris Parish Council -both communities being served by the Church. The South East Plan: Cllr Martin Layer gave an outline of the plan which will influence what happens throughout the South East for the next twenty years. The plan is the re-





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sponsibility of the South East Regional Assembly (SEERA) which has replaced the County Councils and Unitary Authorities as the strategic planning authority. He provided an informative paper on the subject and a copy was provided to the other Parish Councillors.

Village Pond: It is anticipated that a detailed ecological survey of the pond by Pond Conservation, Oxford will take place sometime in May, June or July This will be funded by its Ponds for People Project. The results of the survey (plants, invertebrates and amphibians) should shape the way the pond ought to be managed. The Parish Council has been asked to keep a detailed collection of data regarding the activities of amphibians during a three month period (February to April) and Glennis Hardman has kindly undertaken to do this during her nightly "Frog and Toad Watch".

Miriam Tebbs' land: The Council has received an approach from a local resident, who represented other residents also, advising that they will consider managing the land. The intention is to include the reinstatement of a hedge which was taken down a couple of years ago - without the knowledge of the Parish Council. The initial clearance and subsequent maintenance will require funding and this will be looked for from the Parish Council. Discussions are to be taken forward.

1-6 Pound Lane: Investigations continue as to the ownership of the cracked steps, the hedge and the pathway in front of the properties. Oxfordshire CC, Cherwell DC and Charter Community Housing are in some disagreement as to where responsibilities lie. The Clerk will continue pressure to resolve matters.

British Legion: In the absence of a local branch of the British Legion, Cllr Robin Spicer acts as a Correspondent. He has been asked whether a fund raising event
