Nature Notes

May. 21st. A jay settled on our bird table today but it left before I could get a photograph.

May. 30th. I am puzzled by a birds nest that was lying on the bridle way in The Piece. It was probably a blue tits nest; the outside which had square corners showed that it had been built in a bird nesting box but what could have extracted it from a box and left it there in one piece I don't know.

June. 7th Last night was the coldest June night recorded at Benson in the South of the county with the temperature falling to - 1°C. I did not see any sign of frost here although it was very cold. June. 12th. We are getting a bit worried about a young great spotted woodpecker that spends much of the day feeding from our peanuts, sometimes stopping while it rests hanging on to the feeder. We wonder whether it will ever learn to feed naturally and whether it will suffer from a mainly peanut diet. It looks pretty fat already. Another youngster seems to go round with its father who reaches down from the feeder to give it peanuts as it begs from the table below.

June. 14th. We walked on to the Southern end of the Malvern Hills today. The foxgloves were at their best with big drifts of dark ones and a few pure white ones without the throat spotting that most of our garden ones have.

June 19th. Very hot. Two young grass snakes were cooling off in our garden pond with only their heads above water. There seem to be quite a lot of grass snakes about this summer. My grand daughter saw one sunning itself on the road which is very risky judging by the very flat one I saw last week.

June 22nd. On the way back from Oxford we stopped by the single track road from Deddington to Milton where we saw a very good selection of damsel flies by the rather sluggish section of the river Swere that borders the wood. They included 10 or 12 black winged damsels that always seem to stay very near the water.



With summer finally here the children at playgroup are enjoying the seasonal themes of under the sea, pirates, holidays and travel! Fish and chips are on the menu in the playhouse, shark hand puppets make for some hair raising imaginative play and the children are all looking forward to an outing to the Sea Life centre at the end of term.

SIBFORD FERRIS PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

The Parish Council Meeting, held on 8 June 2005, was attended by three Councillors, the Clerk and Cherwell District Councillor, George Reynolds. Peter Neighbour was reelected as Chairman, and Barbara Crabtree as Vice-Chairman, with Peter Neighbour agreeing to take on the role of Responsible Financial Officer once again.

David Bennett having kindly undertaken the internal audit of the accounts to 31 March 2005, the Annual Return and Statement of Assurance were approved and signed. Information concerning their availability for inspection is displayed at the Shop.

The Clerk, for the Play Area Liaison Group, reported that one quotation/proposal had been received for the Cotswold Close site, and three more were awaited.

Concerning the fields adjacent to the Manor Development, a letter from the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister had been circulated which states that equine use would not be permitted under the agricultural restriction placed on the fields.

The Clerk was asked to chase Oxfordshire County Council on the long overdue removal of the diseased horse chestnut tree on the Hook Norton Road.

Discussions were still ongoing with Sibford Gower Parish Council on the best way forward to procure and administer the extension to the burial ground.

The results of the traffic speed survey on the Hook Norton Road had been received and showed that around 40% of traffic was travelling at over 30 mph, including around 5% travelling at over 40 mph. According to the accepted standards of the County Council, these figures do not show a serious speeding problem. However, in view of villagers' concerns about vehicle speeds, its was agreed that the Parish Council would apply to borrow advisory signs and also to request from the Community Police Officer a mobile speed camera operation in the village. NB Further to the meeting, it has now been arranged with the local police that mobile speed checks will be carried out at some point in the next few weeks.

A response has been sent to the County Council on a planning application at Ferris Hill Farm to put up a new building to house a recycling operation for waste from building sites. As is now required practice in other areas of local government, the County Council is preparing a Statement of Community Involvement on planning mat-

ters, including the Minerals and Waste development framework, and this has given the Parish Council the opportunity formally to request involvement in all County planning applications within the vicinity of the Parish.

The next Parish Council Meeting will be on Wednesday. 20th July at 7.45 pm in the top floor room of Sibford School Sports Hall.




I read with some dismay Suzy Straw's article entitled "Save our Trees." Her article appears to be a thinly veiled criticism of the fact that the Friends School at Sibford Ferris had to fell some trees recently. As an old scholar and former member of staff, I feel her article requires a factual response.

I fully support every attempt to save mature trees, but I have to say that in general terms, tree husbandry in the general Sibford area has been very positive, and from my schoolboy days, I can still pinpoint trees that have survived, that I used to climb back in the early 1950's. The School itself has an excellent record of looking after its mature trees, which didn't just happen.

When the Hill complex was opened in 1930, it was a bare windswept place. The then headmaster's wife, Jessie Johnstone, carried out most of the planning and planting of the now mature trees which adorn the place. The meticulous care of the School Campus has continued ever since, and its beauty and wellbeing is a credit to the current groundstaff as the inheritors.

It is also a fact that there have probably been less than twenty trees that have had to be felled in the last twenty years. I myself can share some satisfaction to note that in the time I worked there as Estate Manager, I was involved with planting over 500 hundred trees which have matured and are there for all to see. In the mid eighties the School also planted a large conservation area at the back of the Manor House, which covered a derelict landfill site. It is now an area of great beauty. In recent years, further extensive tree planting has taken place to enhance the new buildings. I also know that all the developments that have taken place have been carried out with great care to avoid destroying the environment. It is also School policy to plant a tree for every child who enters the School.

The felled trees in question were done out of necessity. One of the



Beeches had fallen over in a storm, and the mature tree next to it had to be felled, along with some smaller species because they were diseased. The School uses the expertise of one of the foremost authorities on trees in the Country, who I introduced to Sibford. Trees do have their 'sell-by date' like any other living organism on our planet.

Incidentally, I think I am correct in mentioning that the only surviving Elm in the area is the one at the Elm crossroads, which was planted in 1982 when the original 400 year Elm tree succumbed to Dutch Elm disease. It is of course, in the Elm garden, created by Old Scholars of Sibford School.

Save Our Trees

While I support Suzy Straw's plea for us to save as many of our mature and beautiful trees as possible, I am responding to her letter in the June edition of Sibford Scene, as I was responsible - and still feel miserable about it - for the felling of our wonderful beech last Autumn.


For nearly a year I lived with the words of the Cherwell District Council tree specialist ringing in my ears ("Beech trees can just fall with no warning"; "If I lived over there, I would move to a tent to the far end of the garden" etc.,) whilst I tried to find someone to reassure me that the tree would not be a hazard to the families living opposite Malvern House.

The beech, which was growing on the edge of a wall and had only 50% of the normal space for its roots, had apparently been planted as part of a hedge and then allowed to mature into its extraordinary shape. We miss the beautiful canopied arch of the beech over Main Street, Sibford Ferris as much as anyone and we certainly miss the privacy it provided.

Our majestic lime tree, however, similarly situated in a wall, will remain, as we are told it is more secure, and if it did fall, it would probably land on our house or in Arnold and Ina's wild flower meadow - not <u>quite</u> such a worry as the consequences of the beech falling on the houses opposite.

One of the specialists whose advice we sought, explained that the beech and the lime were fine trees for a meadow, but with the meadow long gone and the building in the village increasing at such an extraordinary rate, it is best to plant trees more suited to smaller garden spaces.

SIBFORD CRICKET CLUB MATCH REPORTS




