Nature Notes

Oct. 27th. Today's exceptionally warm weather brought out some yellow brimstone and red admiral butterflies. One red admiral was in perfect condition as though newly hatched.

Oct. 30th. Wood pigeons are already taking our holly berries. This is nearly a month earlier than usual and I cannot understand why they should be short of food when the weather has been so mild.

Nov 1st. Our holly tree that was red with berries last week now only has a few round the bottom where the pigeons have a job to settle and those will not feed the redwings and blackbirds for very long. I am wondering whether the declining number of mistle thrushes, that usually try to keep other birds off, may have something to do with it. A few of the pigeons have even started to take berries from the yellow pyracantha that grows against the wall of our bungalow.

Nov 4th. My brother tells me that already there is a huge flock of pigeons feeding on oil seed rape near Stow-on-the-Wold. There are so many that he thinks they may have come over from the continent.

Nov 5th. There was only a tap as a goldcrest, which weighs about the same as a 5p coin, hit the window, but it took nearly half an hour to recover enough to fly away.

Nov 11th. Sparrows are picking the flowers off a very early mahonia by our drive entrance. Tits often do the same to ours when it blooms in early Spring. I wonder whether they get nectar from the flowers. I suppose the prime example of a bird that feeds on nectar is the humming bird but here sparrows also pick flowers from primroses and tits, bullfinches and wood pigeons can make a nuisance of themselves taking flowers from plum and ornamental prunus trees, which could all be for the nectar. Nov 14th. Despite this morning's frost there was still a tortoiseshell butterfly and a few queen bumble bees around that have not yet gone into hibernation.

Nov 16th. There are quite a lot of redwings around but as yet I have seen very few field fares.

Nov 17th. We are getting some exceptionally cold nights for November. Our thermometer has been down to -4°C but with little wind the frost hollows round us will have been colder. As yet we have not had fog but glorious sunshine by day. An old rhyme goes ice in November to bear a duck and all the rest is slush and muck.



With Christmas preparations on the way and only just a few weeks left till we break up for the holidays, let the festivities begin here.....



Sibford Gower Parish Council Meeting Friday, 11th November 2002


At the Meeting held in Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School four Parish Councillors were present. Cllr Eric Payne was indisposed and unable to be there. The Meeting was chaired by the Vice Chairman, Cllr Robin Spicer who welcomed all present. Also at the Meeting were County and District Councillor George Reynolds, whose presence and helpful input is always appreciated, and four Local Electors. Since the previous Meeting, four planning applications had been considered and the matter of a planning application for Wheathills Barn is ongoing. Local opinion is being sought by the Parish Councils of Sibford Ferris and Sibford Gower regarding Parish Action Plans (details are contained elsewhere within this copy of the Sibford Scene). The Clerk had prepared a financial budget for the year commencing 1st April 2006 for consideration by the Councillors and this will be discussed fully at the next Meeting prior to submitting the Precept request to Cherwell District Council. Included in the figure is a contingency for a Parish Council election and the maintenance of the churchyard of Holy Trinity Church - this latter cost will be shared with Sibford Ferris Parish Council. Cllr Spicer gave an account of his attendance, with the Clerk, at

the Annual Parish Liaison Meeting held at Bodicote House on the 3rd November. Turning to Highway Matters, Oxfordshire County Council has confirmed that the outstanding items calling for attention are in the "pipeline" but no timings could be given. As to Footpaths, there is one path where pruning back of the adjacent hedge is needed and the Clerk has this in hand. The Councillors sanctioned the payment of grants within the Parish, namely to Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School, the Village Hall and the



Sibford Scene. The Survey Report in respect of the village pond is still awaited but promised quite soon. Enquiries are being continued into the possibility of having three street lights in High Meadow but this depends very much on Charter Community Housing. The Clerk's salary was reviewed and the Councillors brought it into line with the salary scale recommended by the National Association of Local Councils. The Clerk took the opportunity to remind Councillors of the Register of Interests and that should any one of them have a pecuniary interest in any matter under discussion at a Meeting of the Council it must be declared and no part should be taken in the discussion or vote on that matter. Cllr Muriel Chandler raised the subject of support for the Horton Hospital and it was agreed that she should formulate a letter to our MP for consideration by the Council. A car (untaxed) parked on a grass verge for some considerable time has given cause for concern and the Clerk is making appropriate enquiries. The Payphone in Main Street was reported as being out of action and the box in an extremely dirty condition. This has been reported to BT and action promised within forty eight hours, There being no further business, the Vice Chairman thanked all who were in attendance and closed the Meeting at 9.50pm. The next Meeting will be on

Friday, 13th January 2006 in the same venue commencing at 8pm.

CAPE CONNECTION

It's been a while since I wrote and I can only apologise for my laziness. My only excuse is that we've been doing some travelling over the winter and I've been getting more involved in charity work. I'll report on both and bring you up to date on what's hap-

pening in this part of the world.

After our usual influx of visitors last summer we had some really interesting breaks over the winter period. Our first was to Botswana where we revisited the Chobe Game Reserve. We stayed in a hotel on the banks of the Chobe River, just outside the game park, in a place called Kasane. Steve fished every day on the river amongst all the crocodiles and hippos and successfully caught lots of tiger fish. The one day I went with him we didn't have so much as a nibble, consequently I was labelled a Jonah and banned from subsequent trips! We had the most amazing game sightings, from the river or by land. The one that stood out for me was watching a small herd of elephants crossing the river, all in a line hanging on to each other's tails.

Our next trip was to Mauritius. This was our fifth visit to this wonderful island. It was mainly a golfing holiday for Steve but I managed a few rounds this time on a course, which was set on a spit of land going out to sea. Any wayward shots meant you landed up on the beach or in the palm trees! I also enjoyed the water skiing, which I can still manage

to do at my advanced age!

Then we went to the Drakensberg Mountains in KwaZulu-Natal. More golf and fishing for Steve but we also did a bit of exploring in the area. We often used to visit the Drakensberg when we lived in Johannesberg so it was interesting to see how it had developed. We went to a wonderful concert one afternoon performed by the Drakensberg Boys Choir whose school was in the area. It was a lovely mixture of classic, folk and African music.

We drove back, a total of 1500 kilometres, taking three days to complete. It was a great trip, taking us through the Golden Gate National Park with its dramatic weathered rock formations which glow orange and red in the sun. We stopped at a small town called Clarence in the Free State, which has now become a Mecca for artists. We drove for miles along straight roads, only seeing the occasional car. We stayed one night in a place called Graaf Reinet, a small town in the middle of nowhere but with the most amazing rock and desert scenery. From a view-site above the town you can look down onto the Valley of Desolation, which speaks for itself. It was a treat to drive through part of South Africa for a change and once again marvel at its diversity and beauty.

Then we had our annual trip to the UK. We only stayed just over two weeks so we were limited in what we could do. As it was we went to a wedding - our neighbour's (in SA) daughter got married, and had a weekend in the Peak District. We did manage a

quick trip to Sibford where the Bovils treated us to a lovely barbecue.

ECHO, the charity I work for, continues to thrive. I have got more involved this year organising workshops for our students, and heading a life skills project at one of the schools in a poor area. I also look after the students doing tertiary education with whatever they need help with which can be anything from form filling to getting them set up with accommodation. Going to University and living away from home is difficult for most youngsters but these students have little or no support from home. Sometimes they just want someone to talk to. We are now heading for our end of year celebrations; the first one is this week when we're doing a braai (barbecue) for our nine tertiary students. They want to bring their own music so I'd better warn the neighbours!

Some of our other news from the Cape is that we have had our water restrictions lifted after good rains this winter. We still can't be complacent however, as water shortages are still an issue here. Spring is with us in full force along with the usual fantastic display of flowers. We managed a trip up the west coast to see the wild flowers. Summer will be upon us soon although we are still getting some rain and big variations in temperature.

On the political front we seem to be getting more and more reports of corruption and incompetence. Jacob Zuma the ex Deputy President is awaiting trial for accepting bribes. The travel vouchers scandal has implicated about twenty MPs. Various people running Municipalities have been exposed for lining their pockets and not delivering the services they should do. They are also talking about recruiting people from India to work for various government departments as they say there's a skills shortage. What happened to all the people they got rid of a few years ago?

However, the economy continues to grow with building and development in evidence everywhere. The worry is that many people are still not benefiting from this expansion with families caught in the cycle of poverty. There is so much pressure for the youngsters to go out and earn money rather than stay on for further education. But when they do stay on, it's incredible how they blossom and grow as we have seen with the ECHO students.

Finally, Christmas is just around the corner and the festive lights are up in Somerset West (although not switched on). We still have Santa's sleigh being pulled by springbok and giraffe and hippos amongst the holly! We will be spending Christmas at home with a short break in Franshhoek. Some friends will be here from the UK and my second cousin, his wife and new baby, who now live in Cape Town, will probably be joining us at some stage. So we wish everyone in Sibford a Happy Christmas and New Year.
