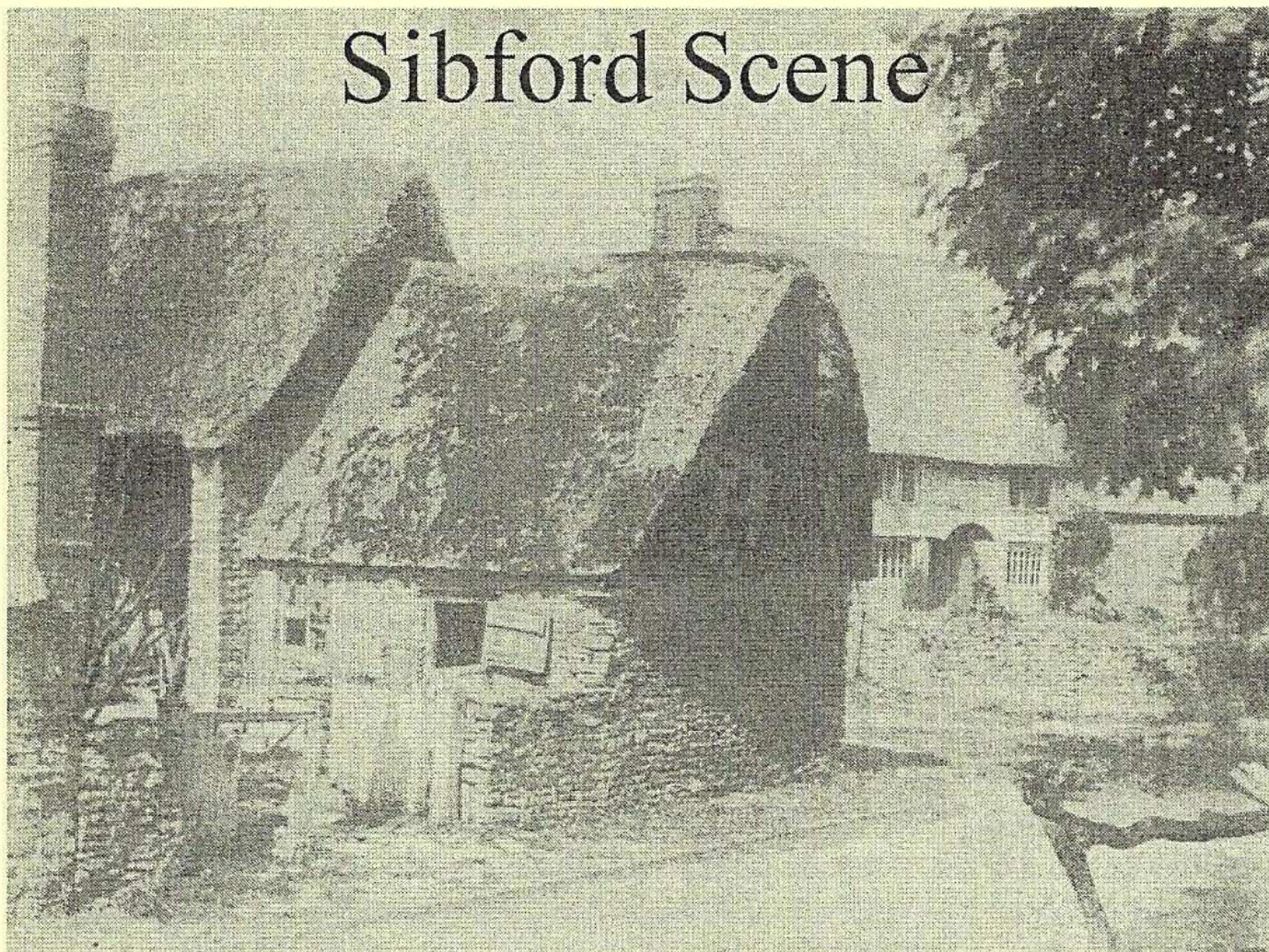

Nature Notes

Mar. 23rd. Last month I heard that two red kites had been seen in Sibford Gower. Since then two were seen at Sibford Ferris and today I saw one over the playing field by Orchard Close which is the first that I have seen over Sibford.

Apr. 2nd. A very early swallow was seen down the Colony today and it is thought that it may have been there two days ago when a bird flew out of the same building as the owner went in.

Apr. 5th I am pleased to have heard a mistle thrush singing over the last few days. They seem to be faring much worse than the song thrushes in this area and I was beginning to think we had none left in the parishes. It could be due to their habit of nesting in very exposed situations where their nests are easily found by the increasing number of predators. This morning's hard frost must make those swallows wish they were back in Africa.

Apr. 12th. There was a blackcap singing in the garden this morning which always makes me think that spring has really come. It may be the same birds that come back each year and although they stay around for the summer I have never seen any young ones; even so blackcap numbers seem to be increasing.

Apr. 13th. It is only since rooks started nesting close by that I have realised how varied the noises are that they make when nesting. Today there was a sound rather like a barking dog that I think came from up there.

Apr. 16th. I see today that the frog spawn in our garden pond has hatched in spite of its being frozen several times.

To obtain a bus pass for the Banbury service it is necessary to:

1. Go in person to either the Cash Office at Cherwell District Council Offices, Bodicote House or Town Centre Office (by the bus station).
2. Show two types of identification
3. Show proof of age (over 60)

(I believe you will need a passport sized photo for your bus pass as well - Ed)

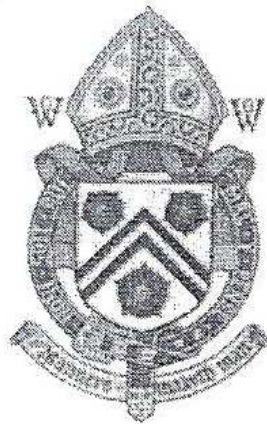

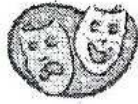

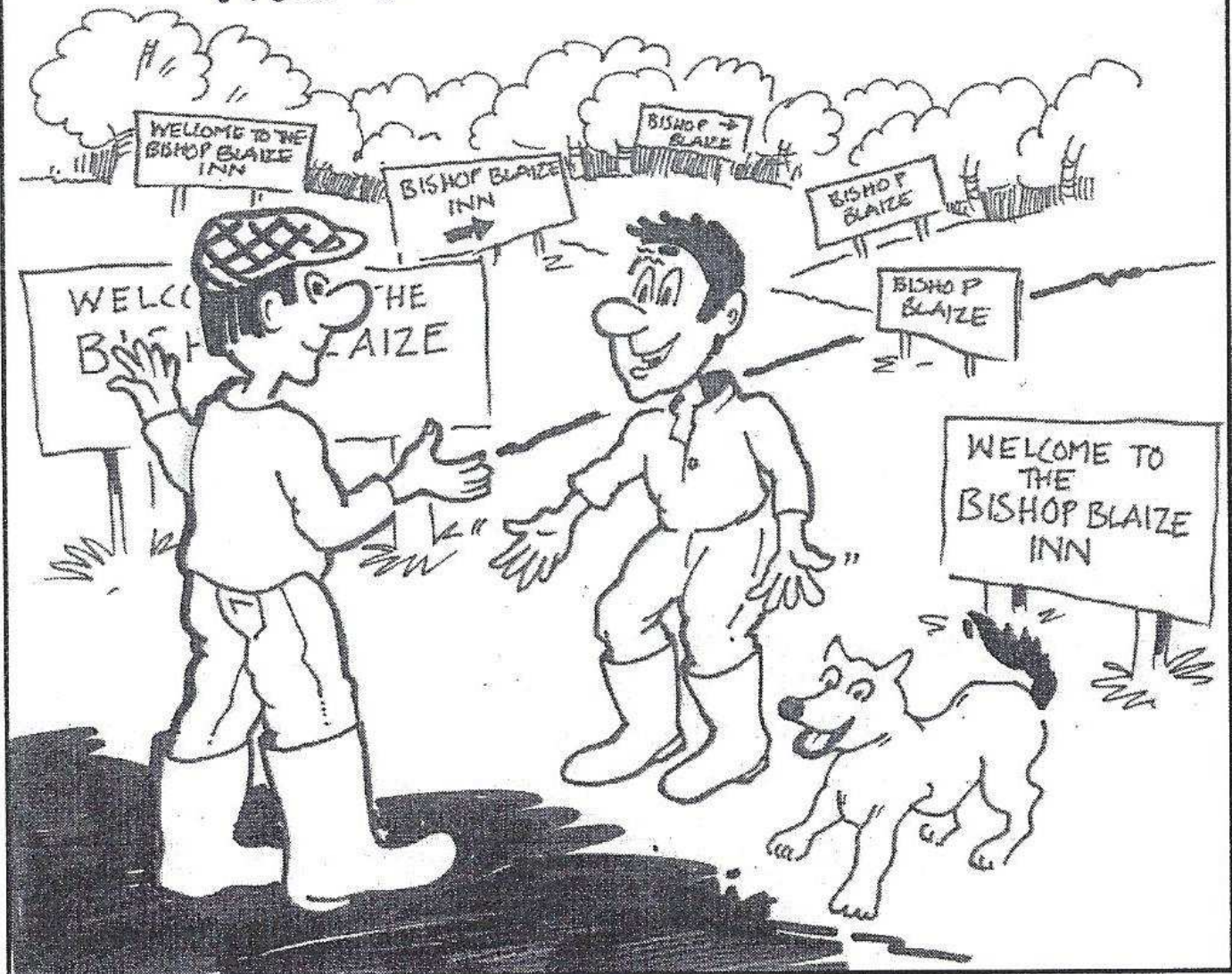

Annual Parish Meeting - Reminder

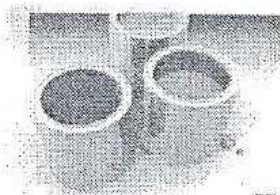

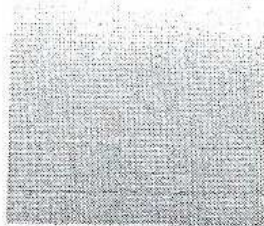

How does your garden grow?

All children have an innate curiosity about the natural world, but all too often this is given no opportunity to express itself or else stifled.

Cars have put paid to the freedom to roam about independently on foot and cycle, as enjoyed by children in the 1950s. Gardens, therefore, are now more important than ever as places where children can safely come into daily contact with – and learn about – wildlife.

Whether at school or at home, there are many simple things you can do to build on your children's instinctive interest in nature. Here are just a few:

Start a compost heap or a wormery. Turning kitchen and garden waste, cardboard – and even the contents of your vacuum cleaner bag – into crumbly compost within 12 months or less seems like magic, whatever age you are!

Make a small pond. Even an old washing-up bowl sunk into the ground and filled with water will attract flying aquatic insects in no time. Measure how fast the water level goes down to show the effects of evaporation.

Put a bulb into an old glass, fill it with earth and watch the root system develop.

Hang up some bird feeders with different contents, near the house or classroom and get the children to record all the different species which visit. Make a note of which species prefer which foods.

Give your children their own garden patch to look after. Sow some seeds which have a high germination rate like sunflowers or tagetes.

Go on a caterpillar hunt. Blue tits may give you a clue where to find them as they will be feeding them to their young. Collect a few and keep them in a plastic box, with air holes. Feed them with fresh leaves every day but take care to supply the leaves of the plant or tree you found them on. Some will only eat that species. Clean out the box regularly and watch them grow and – ultimately – pupate. If you're patient, you can eventually watch the adult moth or butterfly emerge from the chrysalis.

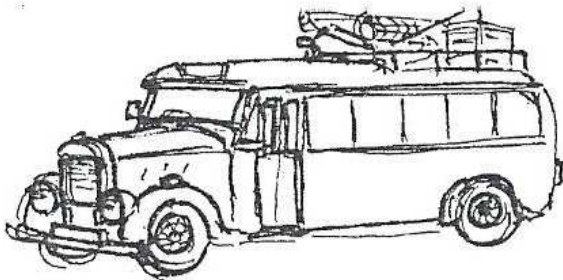

SIBFORD 1939 - THE WAR YEARS

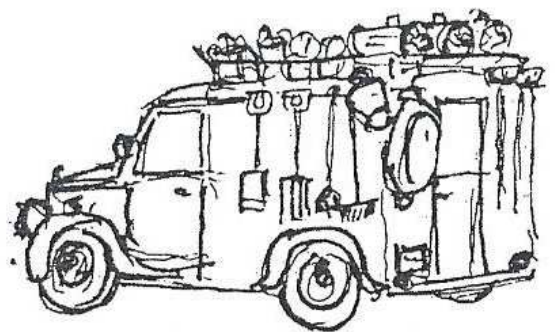
Some more memories from Terry Cemm.

The Ferris had a post office which sold stationery, sweets, etc. and there was another farmhouse kitchen where you could buy sweets and chocolates. The Gower had a co-op shop near the school and another little shop down by the pond. Most people grew their own fruit and vegetables, kept chickens and bartered various items. There were occasional visits from an old van which was festooned with hardware items – this was a form of mobile shop. Other shopping was done in Banbury. There was a Midland Red bus which could be caught at the Elm. The best transport was Tanner's bus, a 1930's coach which called at the Ferris and returned with its large roof rack loaded with crates of chickens, rolls of lino, wire netting, large tin baths, etc. I enjoyed watching Jess driving. When he let go of the steering wheel to light his cigarette, the wheel jumped around. Then you could watch his hand groping back behind him for the gear stick which jiggled and jumped around in an alarming

fashion. When he stopped, he reached over to give a tug on a handle which opened a folding door. One of my favourite jobs was taking shoes or boots to the cobbler at Burdrop. He was always happy to chat and I remember you stepped down into a small front room workshop where he sat in the middle surrounded by tools, bags of nails, hundreds of off-cuts of leather and racks of shoes.





A little way along the road was the doctor's house from which he also dispensed your medicines. The main children's complaints were nits, chaps, chilblains and a nasty skin complaint called impetigo. There were many characters living in the village. Out on the Shipston road in some ramshackle old wooden huts surrounded by iron bedsteads, etc. lived Theodore Lamb, a recluse who dressed in old sacks and who pushed either a pram or an old bicycle around the villages. It was said that he was thwarted in love which caused him to adopt his way of life.

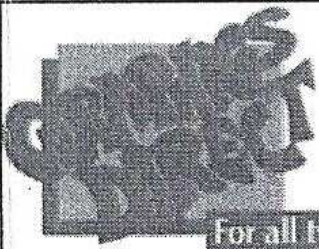

Review of the Mobile Library Service - Sibford Gower

Oxfordshire County Council has advised Sibford Gower Parish Council that, following a comprehensive review of the Mobile Library Service and the reduction of the fleet by one vehicle, the opportunity has been taken to plan and implement more efficient routes for the mobile libraries. Services will continue to meet demand by the re-routing of the vehicles and the introduction of revised timetables as efficiently as possible. 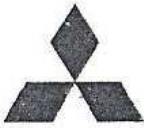
Sibford Gower Annual Parish Meeting

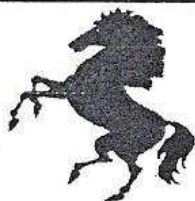
