

Nature Notes

July. 22nd. To Jevington on the South Downs near Eastbourne where we are staying in Jiggs Cottage. Jiggs, known as Jevington Jiggs, was the leader of one of many smuggling gangs in the area. Our bedroom has a square box shaped roof light with vertical windows that would have given all round vision to check on the movement of customs men.

July. 23rd. At Seven Sisters Country Park we saw a good range of wild flowers including houndstongue, yellow-wort, yellow horned poppy and red star-thistle which I had not seen before. On a muddy river bank there were cormorants, shelducks, herons and 25 little egrets. My old Collins bird book published in 1954 list the little egret as an "accidental" which means that less than 20 had ever been seen in Britain and here we are now, seeing more than that on one small section of river bank.

July. 24th. This morning before it got too hot we walked up the South Downs Way on to the chalk hills and along what was probably an old drovers track with wide un-grazed verges. There were more butterflies than I have ever seen, including appropriately, chalkhill blues. When a cooling evening breeze brought some relief from the afternoon heat we went to look at an ancient field system and also found a wonderful area of chalkland wildflowers.

July. 25th. Walked to see another field system passing through fields that were being successfully managed to benefit the wonderful variety of wildflowers including autumn gentian, round-headed rampion, common century, clustered bellflower, eyebright, marjorum, vipers bugloss and the one that always makes me think of Fawlty Towers on TV, wild basil. July. 26th. As we walked up the South Downs Way to Lullington Reserve which is probably as quiet a place as can be found in Southern England. It is too far from roads to hear traffic and there are very few

aeroplanes. This time we located the splendid dewpond which still has plenty of water in it and lots of birds especially linnets coming to drink. It is fringed with reedmace, bur-reeds and rushes which may well help to collect the dew and fog and certainly help dragonflies and damselflies. The reserve is noted for an area of acid soil that

overlays the chalk on part of it, providing a good show of heather, vervain, mellilot, dropwort, ploughman's spikenard and crosswort were all growing on or near the reserve. Also some patches of hemp agrimony which I thought was a strange plant to be growing on that dry chalk down. The butterflies included chalkhill and common blue, small copper, brimstone, painted lady, small skipper and a clouded yellow.

Aug. 5th. Yesterday and today I have watched a hornet catching flies on a patch of wildflowers in our garden. It always stopped to chew them up before carrying them away.

Aug. 15th. While cycling this evening we spotted 2 spikes of broomrape which is a parasitic plant that takes its nourishment from the roots of knapweed.

Aug. 16th. We saw three humming-bird hawk-moths feeding on one buddleia bush this afternoon.

Aug. 21st. My daughter saw 2 green and 2 great spotted woodpeckers all clinging to one telegraph pole.

Aug. 24th. My granddaughter took me to see how well the roman snails are doing at Swalcliffe Common. They are finding the un-cropped corner of the adjoining field ideal for egg laying with plenty of rotting vegetation to provide cover and food and the high calcium soil needed to make their big shells. In one of the little pits that they dig to lay their eggs in we found newly hatched snails.

Sept. 9th. A young blackbird died when it hit our window recently. Our neighbours had a blue tit and a sparrowhawk hit theirs. The sparrowhawk soon recovered and carried the blue tit away but the most unusual window casualty was a kingfisher that hit a window at Blenheim Farm Cottages and took quite a time to recover enough to fly away.

Sept. 16th. Headless bodies of pigeons have been found recently. Can anyone tell me what would take the head and leave the pigeon?

May I say how nice it is to see cattle once again in the Church field, it does help to remind us where we are. JS



Our first speaker of the Autumn session was Dr Malcolm Graham, who spoke on Victorian Schools in Oxfordshire. He brought with him a few of the 3,500 photos taken between 1901 to 1903 by Percy Elford,

who was Director of Schools at that time in Oxfordshire. Percy Elford was probably the first person to be issued with a car by the Education Board, for travelling around his large area and he has photographed it standing outside schools he was visiting.

These photos showed schools of all sizes, from small, one room buildings in villages, to schools built at the end of the 19C in towns, with more rooms and larger windows. Many of the schools had a house attached to them, for occupation by the teacher.

The photos are a wonderful record, as they show the buildings, both inside and out, even the grim outside toilets and also of the teachers and their pupils. Children of different ages were often all taught in. one room and kept warm by a stove, which was usually sited near the teachers desk. One of the photos was taken at Sibford Primary School and shows a group of children with their teacher, outside, learning about growing vegetables.

Sibford Ferris Parish Council Meeting 6 September 2006

The meeting was attended by all Councillors, District and County Councillor George Reynolds and two members of the public. Highways matter on the agenda included the junction at Lanes End which has been narrowed by the addition of the bell-mouth build out. Plans to construct a safety platform on the east side of the junction have been dropped by Oxfor shire Highways due to lack of funds. However it was agreed to write again to the County Council pointing out that the junction alterations they had insisted upon have increased the danger to pedestrians and that the safety platform should have been completed long before the funding restrictions were imposed. Other sources of finance are being investigated in the event that negotiations with the County Council do not succeed. The OCC drainage engineer had advised that surface water drainage improvement works to the upper part of the village would commence on the 18th September (see note about road closure). A drainage scheme for the Woodway Road/Hook Norton Road junction was provisionally booked to start in 2007, County Council budgets permitting. Camera investigations into the state of existing surface water drains have been carried out. Regarding the play area, it was agreed to request a 25-year lease from Cherwell District Council for the Cotswold Close play area; this is required to secure usage of the Section 106 funds for its refurbishment. Progress has been made on the proposals to share the multi-use games area at Sibford School: it has been confirmed that the Parish Council can use funds to add refurbishments to the area in accordance with its statutory powers, subject to a satisfactory legal agreement and to appropriate insurance liability cover.

Mike Spring has provided a fine "Sibford Ferris Parish Council" sign, engraved on an oak board, to be installed on the new **notice board**. It was recorded in the minutes that the sign was in memory of his father, Ken



Spring, who had engraved the sign for the previous notice board, in accordance with Mike's wishes. The Councillors thanked Mike for this very kind gift to the parish.

The Clerk had spoken to OCC about outstanding matters con-

cerning Ferris Hill Farm and reported that instances of lorries using the village route will only be investigated if registration numbers, dates and times are noted. Similarly, if bonfires are reported, it must be clear that they are on the Ferris Hill site, with dates and times recorded. It was confirmed at the meeting that lights are still being left on, but it is possible that this is a district council matter and the Clerk will investigate further.

Three **footpaths** requiring attention had been reported at the last meeting: Cherwell District Council has agreed to clear the path behind the garages in Cotswold Close; Sibford School has kindly cleared the path alongside Orchard End in Back Lane and the poor condition of Coffin Path in Burdrop had been reported to Sibford Gower Parish Council.

Repairs to the **light cover on the barn on Mannings Hill** had been carried out by Cllr Lamb, and the Chairman thanked him for attending to this matter. The Clerk was asked to write requesting reinstatement of the **annual joint** Wheathills Committee Meeting.

On planning matters, there was one application and one notice of decision. It was agreed to meet with officers at Cherwell District Council to discuss the review of village categorisations. An objection to the inclusion of the Horton Hospital site in the North Cherwell Site Allocations document for residential development was posted on the Council website. Following requests for information on the new house next to the Church, and also in light of the recent application to change the Bishop Blaize to a private dwelling, it was agreed between the two Sibford Clerks to exchange information on planning applications that affect both parishes. The matter of the Bishop Blaize was brought up under Any Other Business with questions from the floor and following discussion it was agreed that the Parish Council would write with objections to the application on the grounds of loss of amenity, and that all households would be notified of the application by way of a leaf-let drop.

The **audited annual return** was received with no issues arising and would be displayed in accordance with regulations for 14 days on the notice board. Financial regulations and a Financial Risk Assessment and Management strategy were formally agreed and adopted.

It was agreed there was no objection from the Parish Council to the fencing around the electricity pylon on New Road being removed.

There being no further business the meeting closed at 9.30pm. The next meeting will be on Wednesday, 1 November at 7.45 pm in the top floor room of Sibford School Sports Hall.

With ripening blackberries on our hedgerows (if the trimmers haven't had them already) I have been sent this recipe by Diana Thompson to make the most of the fruit.

Blackberry Clafoutis

302/90g soft unsalted butter plus 2tbsp more

302/90g caster sugar, plus 3 tbsp more

11/2 lbs / 750g blackberries

5 large eggs

3fl oz/100ml double cream

302/90g ground almonds

grated zest of 1 orange

Heat the oven to 180C/350F/gas mark 4. Melt the 3oz/90g butter and remove from the heat. Line a gratin dish with the 2tbsp softened butter, followed by the 3tbsp sugar. Scatter in the berries and set aside.

Whisk the eggs together with the 3oz/90g of caster sugar; add the double cream, ground almonds, orange zest and melted butter. Whisk together until smooth and pour over the berries. Bake for 30 minutes until firm and golden on top.

"No Time to Waste"

According to local government statistics, if Oxfordshire does not reduce its waste by 25% by 2009/10, a fine of £3million will be levied by central government, meaning service cuts or an extra £13 charge for every household on band D council tax. The fines would go up every year. Targets for 2012/13 are for 50% waste reduction. Last year, people in Oxfordshire produced around 300,000 tonnes of household rubbish, which is half a tonne of rubbish for every person in the county. If it was put on a football pitch it would be 1600 feet high, equivalent to 110 double decker buses stacked on top of each other. Landfill waste emits greenhouse gases that contribute to global warming. Alternatives to landfill are under investigation and a new waste strategy is being prepared for the period 2010 to 2035. In the meantime, every bit helps and if you would like to contribute to waste reduction in Oxfordshire, you may like to call 08450 50 45 50 for a waste reduction pack and a free "bag for life" (aimed at reducing the number of carrier bags we use). 

Hello my name is Dave Hibbert and I am the Sergeant responsible for the Policing of the rural area around Banbury, and I hope to be able to submit further articles covering various topics in the future.

Over the summer we have seen a slight increase in rural crime, particularly cases of burglary, and with a number of so-called 'Distraction' type offences. In these, one or two persons will turn up at your home and claim they are from one of the utility companies, gas, water, electric, and will ask to come and check out fuse boxes, water supply etc. One person will then distract the owner, and the other will enter the house and go through drawers/cupboards looking for cash or jewellery.

Another favourite ruse is to claim they are looking for a friends address, needing a glass of water for a friend who is feeling faint, or a football has

landed in your back garden.

ALWAYS CHECK for any identification at the door, DO NOT let them in but close the door and check with whichever company they claim to be from. If in doubt ring the Police on 08458 505 505 and explain your concerns and we will try and get an officer to you asap.

I would also like to mention Neighbourhood Watch, which is a great way of uniting the community to deter crime where you live. There are two neighbourhood watch co-ordinators at Banbury DEBBIE TONKS and RON GLYNN, and they can be contacted via the 08458 505 505 number.

They will give you advice and help to set up a watch for your area, and you will get warnings of crime happening around your area, plus as members of neighbourhood watch many insurance companies will give you a discount, usually 5%, on your home insurance.

Finally there is a national drive to recruit PCSO'S- Police Community Support Officers, and we here in Thames Valley are looking to recruit at least

another 300 by April next year.

PCSO'S provide a vital link with the communities we serve, and provide a visible uniform presence in addition to regular Police officers. It is an important job and one which is central to the neighbourhood management plan.

They help to reduce anti-social behaviour, reduce crime and provide intelligence allowing Police officers to arrest offenders for a variety of offences

'Anyone? for a Drink' campaign to tackle under-age drinking

Did you know that 11-15 year olds are now drinking twice as much as children of a similar age who were surveyed in 1996 and those who drink at least once a week has risen from 17% in 1994 to 21% in 1999.

Did you know that it is estimated that in the UK that at least half of all 15-16yr olds get drunk at least once a month.

Did you know that in an interview in 2004, 93% of 13-19 year olds in Banbury had drunk alcohol with 81% consuming this between the ages of 10-14 years.

Underage drinking has been identified as a cause of antisocial behaviour on our streets. So, Oxfordshire Trading Standards in conjunction with Cherwell District Council and Thames Valley Police have launched a 'Hotline' in a new initiative to help tackle underage drinking.

Called 'Anyone? for a Drink', the hotline encourages members of the public to report where young people get alcohol. By doing this, Trading Standards and Thames Valley Police will be able to target their actions on the shops that are causing the most harm, making it harder for young people to buy alcohol illegally.

The telephone number will be displayed in a number of public places and buses and all reports can be anonymous.



Road Closure - Mannings Hill - 4 weeks from 18 September

The road closure on Mannings Hill has been applied to permit Oxfordshire Highways to install new surface water gullies and drainage pipes. These will divert rainwater from the top part of Sibford Ferris, along New Road, into the field opposite Woodway House and down to the brook. A cleaning system will be installed to protect the brook from pollution. It is hoped that this work will reduce the flooding to the lower part of the village, which has been quite severe even after relatively short spells of heavy rain. Work was started in the field initially, anticipated to last one week, after which the channelling in the road is to commence. This will take approximately two weeks. The road closure barriers will be set up when the work in the road starts (25 September approximately) and access will then be restricted to frontages only until work is completed. Towards the end of the closure, there will be traffic lights at the Lanes End T-junction to permit the installation of gullies which will cause added congestion at peak times. It may be advisable to avoid using Main Street at busy periods if at all possible. The Warriner School bus and the 480 Geoff Amos service have been diverted during the closure.

Sibford Gower Parish Council Meeting held on Friday, 8th September 2006 In Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School

In attendance were four Parish Councillors (apologies having been received from Cllr Peter Abbott), County and District Cllr George Reynolds, the Clerk and for the first part of the Meeting fifty two residents from Burdrop, Sibford Ferris and Sibford Gower. The minutes of the Meeting held on 14th July were approved as a correct record after two inadvertent omissions had been corrected. In Matters Arising, no response had been received from The Town Estate Charity with regard to a local resident's request that the Charity might consider financing a replacement bench at Burdrop Hill. The Clerk pointed out that the Trustees' next meeting is in October when the matter may be on the agenda.

The Chairman, Cllr Robin Spicer, then introduced the next item on the agenda which was to consider a planning application to Cherwell DC from the owners of the Bishop Blaize in respect of a change of use from licenced premises to dwelling house. It was this matter that drew the exceptionally large number of local residents. The Chairman threw the Meeting open to ascertain the local views. In support of the application to Cherwell District Council, the owners have stated that the pub had traded at a loss since its purchase in February 2006 blamed on:

- 1. a lack of village support
- 2. a reliance upon passing trade which by virtue of its location is limited.
- 3. a general lack of support for pub/restaurant facilities in the area.
- 4. some doubt over the validity of the financial information provided by the previous owners
- 5. That the village cannot support two pubs. Although the Wykham has recently attracted new trade by discounting, this is not sustainable unless the Blaize closes.
- 6. The pub has been up for sale for four months with little interest shown and as a consequence the owners are seeking a change of use.

The Parish Councillors were grateful to County and District Cllr George Reynolds for his advice during the ensuing discussion. Many local electors expressed their views over a period of one hour and the overall feeling was that Burdrop, Sibford Ferris and Sibford Gower would not wish to lose this facility which previously was seen to be a thriving and vibrant business. To reflect the mood expressed, the Parish Council is to object to the application. Cllr Martin Layer advised all present that representations from individuals would also be taken into consideration by the District Council when making its decision on whether or not to approve the application. He gave advice as to the correct channel for views to be expressed. A note giving background information was dropped through the letterboxes of residents by a group of willing volunteers to whom the Parish Councillors express their gratitude and appreciation. The Chairman then thanked all who had contributed and invited those who had attended for the specific purpose to leave, if they so wished. With their departure there remained ten local electors for the remainder of the Meeting.

In addition to the above planning application, the Parish Council had considered, since the previous Meeting, a further five applications.

As to Highway Matters, Oxfordshire Highways has been asked to proceed with the matter of installing six wooden posts to safeguard the grass verge adjacent to the pond. The cost to the Parish Council will be £20 per post but thereafter the maintenance will rest with Oxfordshire Highways. It has been established that the land to the rear of High Meadow is owned by Cherwell DC which is now considering whether it may be used as a temporary parking area during the visits of waste collection vehicles which have difficulty in negotiating the road corners hampered by parked cars. Turning to Footpath Matters, a member of the public had reported that some branches overhanging the footpath at Burdrop Hill are causing a problem for pedestrians. The Clerk was instructed to check the situation. With regard to a previous complaint regarding the poor condition of the "Coffin" walk, the Chairman undertook to investigate. Relating to the New Burial Ground, the Clerk advised the Meeting that £3,440.70 had been paid to the solicitors acting in respect of the purchase to enable completion to take place in due course. There may be further, and it is hoped small, costs still to pay. A grant of £800.00 had been received from the Town Estate Charity (which was gratefully acknowledged) and £1,615.05 had come from Sibford Ferris PC being its pro-rata financial input. Moving on to Finance, retrospective sanction was given to the aforementioned payment of £3,440.70 to Messrs Herbert & Cholmeley (solicitors) being the cost of the purchase of the new Burial Ground. The payment had been discussed with all the Parish Councillors prior to dispatch and £94.00 to Oxfordshire County Council being the cost of four wooden posts. installed to protect the grass verge to the footpath opposite the Surgery car park. The Chairman sought, and gained, the Councillors' sanction to the issuing of a cheque for £50 in favour of the British Legion in respect of a wreath for Remembrance Day. The annual cost is shared with Sibford Ferris PC on an alternate year basis. Next on the agenda was Street Lighting in High Meadow, The Clerk advised that matters have not moved forward. Charter Community Housing Ltd had not sent out the questionnaires, as promised, to the residents of High Meadow and Pound Lane to establish whether or not there is a majority desire to see street lighting installed. Charter has now promised that the questionnaires will go out during the week commencing 11th September 2006. Until the result is known, the way forward cannot be established. Under the heading Any Other Business, the following were raised. Village Pond: A Local Elector, Mrs Glennis Hardman, referred to the formation of a Pond Action Team so that the planting advice of Ponds for People may be implemented. Time is now of the essence and she was pleased to report that a number of people had offered to become involved. A date for the initial meeting is to be arranged. Next, a letter had been received from the Head Teacher, Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School, seeking opinions about a suggestion to open the school's PICT suite for use by community groups. The school is about to submit a planning application to build a new classroom which will be used as an PICT suite, enabling a classroom for the youngest pupils to be enlarged. As a new facility is to be built, it seems sensible to make it suitable for evening and weekend community use, with toilet facilities and the ability to shut off other classrooms. The room will have an interactive whiteboard, so will be suitable to use for power point presentations etc and 18 networked computers. The Parish Councillors undertook to provide their views in due course after having sought local opinions. The next Parish Council Meeting is to be held in Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School on Friday, 3rd November 2006 commencing at 8pm. There being no further business to discuss, the Chairman thanked all present for attending and closed the Meeting at 9.55pm.
