

#### Nature Notes

Sept. 23rd. As it was such a lovely afternoon we walked along to Lambs Pool. There were very few birds there but we did see several dragonflies and walking back along the field we saw more small copper butterflies than I have seen in Sibford before. There was also a comma, some tortoiseshells and a silver y moth on the thistles inside the gate. Sept. 25th. In The Piece there were eight red admirals and a comma on one small patch of ivy flowers which shows how valuable ivy is to insects as a late source of nectar.

Sept. 29th. Today's two storms produced 2.05 inches (52mm) of rain which with the 0.17 inches that fell overnight makes 2.22 inches (56mm) in less than 24 hours or about an average months rainfall. Oct. 2nd. It must have been an exceptionally large autumn hatch of red admirals. I have been told that even at 8.45 this morning all the ivy clumps from Sibford Heath down to Tysoe had its compliment of red admirals often as many as 20 around one clump.

Oct. 3rd. This morning I came across what I at first thought was a headless pigeon which had been almost buried by a fox, but on closer inspection I found that the head had been doubled round in the burying. I don't know how they catch so many pigeons that they can put them in store like this one or, if foxes were responsible, leave the body behind as I mentioned last month.

Oct. 14th. Saw what we were pretty sure was a clouded yellow butter-fly at Hook Norton this afternoon but it would not settle for us to get a better look.


Oct. 15th. It is not only a good year for orchard fruit but there are also heavy crops of beech nuts and acorns. The ground is littered with

acorns under most oaks but under the ones at the top end of Hill Bottom the grass is nibbled down and they have all been eaten by sheep. Apparently it is only part of the flock that eats them but the ones that do are extremely keen. I don't recall that the sheep we kept years ago were so fond of them. Oct. 17th. Over the last two months tits have been taking as much sunflower seed from our bird table as they do in the winter months. At the moment they should be homing in on the plentiful supply of beech nuts but I expect that they find the sunflower easier.



# Sibford Horticultural Society

A small, select turn out for our October meeting which started with the A.G.M. The chairman and secretary gave reports on the

previous years activities and speakers, while the treasurer reported on a healthy bank balance particularly due to a good annual show this year. Both committees were re-elected and it was decided to raise the membership fee to £5. This is partly due to rising costs of speakers and that subs have not risen for many years!

We quickly got to the speaker for the evening, Mr. James Arbuthnott who talked about unusual climbers and wall shrubs. He gave a brilliant talk about how he and his wife purchased a walled garden near Kidderminster and have turned it into a garden and nursery. The most fascinating part (in my book at least) were all the towers he built, by himself, along the perimeter wall. They were all different in style but most had a

balcony from which musicians played in concerts there. We had slides of climbers such as roses and clematis, through the more unusual ones such as aconitum, dicentra and the fantastically named wattakaka, with cultural instructions given for each of them. It was a very entertaining and informative talk. A visit to Stone House Cottage Nurseries, nr. Kidderminster has got to be a must. (Open again in March, see www.shcn.co.uk for more details)

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 8th November at 8.00pm in the Village Hall. The speaker will be Mr. White talking about orchids. Everyone is welcome to attend.





#### I Remember

On November the eleventh my mind goes back seventy years to the Armistice Day service in the middle thirties in my school assembly hall in Banbury where a wreath was laid on the war memorial with it's plague in memory of about four dozen former pupils who lost their lives in the Great War. Little did we think that ten years later there would be a second plaque with over forty more names of pupils who died in an even longer World War which included a large number of that congregation and several of my classmates, including Peter Erikson who sat at the desk behind mine and Leslie Tyrrell from the one in front. His birthday was the day before mine, a fact of which I had an annual reminder by an in memorium notice in the Banbury Guardian each year at that time. I left school in 1938, but those who stayed on for their Higher School Certificates would have left in the summer of 1940 at 17 or 18 years of age and many chose to go straight into the RAF as pilots or aircrew rather than wait for their call-up and be drafted into the Army.

In Sibford I think Arch Kaye was the first loss in WW2. Arch was a pre-war regular army soldier. At that time their kitchen garden adjoined ours on the Hook Norton road before their move to Epwell and as a child I used to think how smart he looked in his uniform with white lanyard etc. That was before the days of the (dare I say it?) 'hairy-Mary' battledress which we wore in the army and prior to that in the Home Guard. I also wore the RAF blue version in the Royal Observer Corps in the Cold War. Arch lost his life at Dunkirk and we heard later that he had been seen boarding a troop ship which may well have been the ill-fated Lancastria. She was hit three times by dive bombers while lying fully loaded awaiting a destroyer escort. She capsized with thousands on board. estimates I have seen vary from 2,500 to 6,000. The loss of life must have been on a par with that in the Twin Towers of 9/11 but the news of the sinking was hushed up when Churchill said he thought the British people had had enough bad news for one day.

I also remember Bob Freeman of Epwell who was in Mr. Hoopers classroom at Sibford Gower School when I moved into it. He lost his life on a bombing raid over Germany.

I remember the Wellington bomber which crashed in the fields across the road from Little London while doing 'circuits and bumps' on a quiet night when the weather suddenly changed. Sadly it was only one of many which met the same fate that night.

After my Army call up in June 1943 and Royal Signals trade training, I was posted just before Christmas to the 79th Armoured Division in Suffolk and was attached to the 22nd Dragoons, a flail tank regiment. They were being trained to flail paths through the minefields on the D. Day beaches. They had a motley collection of tanks and vehicles but when mobilisation started these were replaced with brand new Sherman flails, Austin lorries etc. We all had booster jabs for the three T's, typhoid, tetanus and typhus and we all made our wills which were handed in. Then we moved to Sussex where we were based at Petworth House with the troops of tanks in the surrounding countryside. Shortly before D. Day they gathered for an inspection by a V.I.P. who turned out to be H.M. King George VI.

Everybody was given a 24hr leave pass and travel warrant for home leave and on our return Petworth House was sealed and D. Day briefing of the tank crews began. I thought of the lines of the hymn we used to sing on Armistice Day. "Proudly they gathered, rank on rank to war". There was some talk of the 50% casualty rate that they had been warned to expect on D. Day but mostly they kept off that subject. A and B squadrons were selected to go on D. Day with C squadron to stay in reserve to supply trained replacements. They all had an invasion haircut which left them almost bald and left in good spirits to be re-united with their tanks on the invasion ships.

They were destined to land on Juno Beach to flail paths for the Canadian Army. Thankfully the regiments casualties were not as heavy as had been feared and it was some months before the 50% total was passed, a figure which included 60 dead and almost 300 wounded by the end of hostilities.

While I was serving in Normandy I received a letter from my father with the shattering news that my mothers sisters Ella and Nora met up in London with their brother Len, when a doodlebug fell, killing all three! Nora, the youngest had already lost her husband, a navel reservist, when his ship was sunk while escorting an Atlantic convoy.


For our tomorrow they gave their today.





# Sibford W.I. Tuesday. 10th October 2006

Following the welcome by the President and the reading of the record of last month's meeting by the Secretary, Lynda described the brilliant evening spent in the company of Pam Ayres on 26th September when twenty one members and their friends joined an audience of nine hundred at the Kings Centre, Oxford. Glennis reported on the course she had attended at Denman College on 9th October. Oxfordshire W.I. have undertaken to help assemble the Oxon Parish Pond Survey as part of the National Pond Inventory. Led by Rod d'Ayala and Anita Weatherby from Oxford Brookes University, full instruction was given on the filling in of the survey form followed by the donning of wellies and macs for a visit to the huge pond in the grounds. Pond Conservation needs to know of the situation of as many ponds as possible. If you have a garden pond and would be willing to take part, the necessary form can be obtained from Glennis on 780391. Arrangements were discussed for the Group Meeting on 26th October which will be hosted by Wigginton and held in Swerford Village Hall.

Our speakers for the afternoon were Joan and Geoff Todd with their talk "Getting Organised - Travels with a Street Organ". Joan and Geoff became interested in street organs when on holiday in France. After attending a succession of mechanical music festivals in the village of Contravoz, they bought their own street organ in Britain, a twenty one note Trueman model with one book of music. Subsequently, they acquired further music and have since become well-known locally for their money raising work for Cheshire Homes and McMillan Nurses, and for the church roof at Deddington, their home village. The couple have also made a name for themselves in Europe through the self-contained world of mechanical music. Joan and Geoff adopted their magnificent pearly king and queen costumes when they discovered that they were expected to perform in a cabaret at the end of the larger festivals in Europe. Soon they began to invite members of their audience to join in the entertainment and, thus, introduced bewildered Europeans to the Hokey Kokey. At the end of his talk, Geoff played various old songs on his street organ while Joan and the members sang; then several ladies were selected to take part in a rendition of Old Mc Donald's Farm and, indeed, the Hokey Kokey - a rousing finish to

an entertaining afternoon. They were thanked by Jean for sharing their exciting experiences in such a lively and colourful way.

Tea and lovely cakes were served by Gaynor and Kathleen (Reid). The competition for a monkey was judged by Geoff and he awarded first to Kathleen (Winter) for her charming monkey teapot, second Jane and third Greta.


