# Nature Notes

Apr. 5th. Having had a very warm day to bring out the insects there were

several bats flying this evening.

Apr. 6th. At 7 o'clock this morning a cock pheasants alarm call alerted us to see that there was a fox close by. The hen pheasant who was feeding under the bird table at the time just kept absolutly still and apparently was not seen by the fox although it was less than ten yards away.

Apr. 8th. This afternoon we walked in Edge Hill woods which were beautifully carpeted with wood anemonies and celendines. Sadly two trees have fallen on to the ancient yew, stripping it of its remaining branches. I doubt

whether such an old stump can regrow but you never know.

Apr. 9th. Went on a family trip to the cotswolds stopping on the way to look at a restored sheep wash where the sheep used to be washed in the stream before shearing. We went first to Sherborne water meadows where there were probably quite a lot of birds, but only a heron and a few ducks were visible among the rushes. Megan's keen young eyes saw the flash of a kingfisher as it sped downstream. We then went on to Gawcombe where our walk took us to a point where we were looking down on a pond in a valley. I don't know whether the canada geese, mallard and tufted ducks realised that a fox was creeping along the other side of the fringe of rushes that lined the waters edge. Farther on we came to a rough field that was dotted with clumps of green hellebore. Plenty of buzzards overhead, some of them just specks in the sky. The owners of Gawcombe looked to be doing their bit for the environment with a big boiler fuelled by wood from the estate which we thought must be providing heat for the big house, although it was some way away.

Apr. 10th. Having seen that miner bees were digging their burrows at the edge of a path yesterday we walked up to Folly Farm and found several groups of mines at the top end of the footpath that crosses the old allotment field by Little London. Some of them must be quite deep as the colour of the grains of soil extracted showed that they were down to subsoil.

Apr. 16th. On these sunny days we have been seeing a lot of overwintered peacock, tortoiseshell and brimstone butterflies, also a comma, but now this years are emerging. A few days ago I saw my first orangetip and today a

couple of speckled woods and a holly blue.

Apr.17th. Yesterday I heard a blackcap singing which to me indicates the arrival of birds from the south that intend to nest here. I am told that the blackcaps that winter here move north to nest and sing up there. This morning we saw a pair at the sunny end of our hornbeam hedge. I had not seen a swallow until today but I am told that they have been around for a few days.



# Report of the Sibford Gower Special Parish Meeting for the purpose of discussing Street Lighting in High Meadow held in Sibford Village Hall on Thursday, 12th April 2007

### Present

Parish Cllrs Peter Abbott (Chairing the Meeting), Muriel Chandler, Eric Payne and Robin Spicer. County & District Councillor George Reynolds, Ms Jaz Kundi (Resident Involvement Manager, Charter Community Housing Ltd)

One hundred and seven local residents, One Resident from Shenington (present as an observer) Peter Hardman (Clerk to the Parish Council) and Mr David Lumb (Banbury Guardian Reporter)

### **Apologies**

Apologies were received from Cllr Martin Layer who should have taken the Chair but at the time of the Meeting was at the John Radcliffe Hospital awaiting the results of tests following injuries suffered by his son in a road accident.

### Purpose of the Meeting

To debate a request by Mr Alf Mulliss (a local resident) that Street Lighting be installed in High Meadow.

The Chairman introduced the two main speakers, Mr Alf Mullis to speak in favour of the Street Lighting and Mr Bruce Woodall who was to oppose the proposal. He said that there would follow an opportunity for those present to be able to express views and opinions.

Mr Mulliss gave an extensive and well researched presentation providing background statistics and his reasons why three street lights should be installed in High Meadow. The cost of the lights and installation would be financed by Charter Community Housing Ltd and ongoing maintenance would be met by Oxfordshire County Council. The main purpose was to ensure the

health and safety of the elderly residents who feared venturing outside on dark nights. He deplored the fact that the Parish Council had taken what he considered to be an undue time in the consideration of the lighting and he felt that the majority of the Council was opposed to the lights. (This view had been previously rejected by the Parish Council on the basis that Parish Councillors had expressed personal opinions but were very willing to seek the views of all Parish Residents and abide by the majority view - hence this Special Parish Meeting). He said that he failed to un-

derstand how the Parish Council could have approved the installation of the light at the steps from Pound Lane to High Meadow without having consulted the public and then hesitate over the introduction of the additional three lights. Mr Mullis indicated that in the event that the lights were not approved, the Parish Council would be reported to the Standards Board.

Mr Woodall, opposing the proposition, said that he had lived in the Parish for thirty one years and valued the dark skies at night and the charm of a rural community. Amongst other grounds for his opposition were the facts that statistics showed that the number of burglaries was greater in areas with street lighting, emissions should be a consideration and although initial costs would be met by -Charter, the maintenance costs and electricity supply would be sourced from residents' Council Tax.

The Chairman thanked the two speakers and opened the Meeting for general discussion requesting that speakers should be as concise and limit what needed to be said to five minutes.

The Meeting then heard views and opinions expressed by twelve local residents, mainly in opposition, giving reasons, and some with alternative suggestions such as security lights affixed to the properties and lower level lights to illuminate the pathways.

The Chairman then called for a proposer and seconder that Street Lighting be installed in High Meadow. This was proposed by Mr Alf Mullis and seconded by Mr Gordon Fowler. A show of hands was called for with the following result:-

For: 9 Against 53

The Chairman declared the motion defeated by an overwhelming majority.

Mr Mullis then demanded a Poll to be administered by Cherwell Dis-

trict Council. The Chairman called for a show of hands of those in support. Those is favour numbered nine but, in accordance with rule, as ten local electors or one third of those present at a meeting (whichever is the lesser) are required to carry the request forward, the demand was declined.

The Chairman declared the Special Parish Meeting -closed at 8.40pm after thanking all who had attended and those who had spoken.



# SIBFORD CLUB DAY - A Historical Celebration

Club Day was the highlight of the village calendar during the late 1800's and early 1900's. The 'Club' was a Friendly Benefit Society formed, so we are told by the Rev Stevens in his diary, in the same year as the Church was built, 1840. Members paid a small but regular quarterly amount of money to the Club Secretary and the resulting funds were used to help villagers and their family in times of illness and need. Once the doctor had provided a sickness certificate monies could be paid out to the member and this often made all the difference enabling the family to stay together and provide meals for their children when the breadwinner was unable to work.

The

Once a year on the first Monday in June the Club held a day of celebration for the male members of the Society, who were later joined in the afternoon by their families, all dressed in their Sunday best clothes. The day started with a meeting of the Society in the village school and this was followed by the first refreshment of the day - local ale! The Sibford Brass Band joined the members and they all gathered with the Vicar, Church Choir and village dignitaries, by the village pond outside the Rectory. They processed, led by the band following the Friendly Society banner, which had been painted by Frank Lascelles. A service was held in Church and they returned to the school for a hot lunch, roast beef, Yorkshire pudding and vegetables with plenty of beer to wash it down. During the afternoon the ladies and children were invited to join in all the fun of the fair - skittles, squibs, bowling for the pig, swing boats and roundabouts on the field opposite the church where the village hall is now. A cricket match between the Gower and Ferris was also played during the afternoon.





By 8 o'clock the men returned to the school for a supper of cold meats, ham, cheese and more beer! The children were put to bed and by 10.30pm everyone adjourned to the Old Village Hall (behind the Wykham Arms Pub) until 2am! They certainly had stamina in those days but if Club Day was your only day's holiday other than Christmas Day I guess they made the most of the whole day.

1000 year's of Oxfordshire is being celebrated during 2007 and to mark the significance of the villages in the life of rural Oxfordshire Cherwell District Council have awarded grants to fund celebrations in the villages. The Sibfords Society has been successful in an application to carry out a modern day re-enactment of Sibford Club Day. A marching band has been booked and we plan to process from the pond – after a short service of thanksgiving for village life led by our Rector, Canon Timothy Wimbush on Saturday 23 June.

We hope that everyone will join in, not just the men folk, although we might get them to go first! We hope that everyone will also try to dress in old-fashioned clothes – from Victorian times. The last Club Day was held in 1938 so there is quite a lot of scope for costume. Prizes will be awarded to the best-dressed family, best ladies hat etc and there will be separate classes for children.

The band and procession will form the start of the 50th Anniversary





Cotswold Close Play Area Announcement

Sibford Ferris Parish Council is pleased to advise that a grant of £5575 has been awarded by SITA Trust (www.sitatrust.co.uk), through the Landfill Communities Fund, towards the cost of refurbishing the play area. The grant will provide a junior swing, a cradle swing, a playhouse, two springies, a sturdy litter bin and three seats and gives the project a huge boost. The remainder of the equipment, principally the very exciting multi-play unit, is being funded by the Section 106 monies from the Manor development agreement.

The go-ahead has now been given to the contractor to commence work on building the play equipment and the anticipated completion is in June, assuming he has no delays from his suppliers. As the safety surfacing will be grass mats and the grass will be seeded we will need to wait for it to be sufficiently established before the area can be used, but hopefully that won't take too long.
