Nature Notes

June. 25th. I went to a neighbours house to watch a kestrel attacking magpies that were threatening its nest where there are 3 or 4 well grown chicks. Repeated low level swoops over the magpies were enough to keep them away for now but magpies can be very persistent.

June. 28th. Three foxes were seen in different parts of a grass field at Sibford Gower all moving stealthily, listening and then pouncing. I presume that they were all hunting mice or voles.

July. 3rd. An unusual road casualty on top of Oatley Hill turned out to be a guinea fowl. It had probably escaped from the houses nearby.

July 6th. I found a wasp nest under our plum tree yesterday and today find that a badger has tried to dig one out of our rockery but had given up before it reached the comb, suggesting that they may not be completely immune to wasp stings.

July 7th. While crossing Ireland for a holiday in Donegal a dark coloured hare ran in front of our car which must have been a blue hare as I find that our brown hare is not native to Ireland. Further on, near the sea and a river there was a dead otter on the road. We arrived at our bungalow near Falcarragh, 2 miles from the north coast, in time to walk some of the little roads that cross this peaty area where bog asphodel and marsh orchid are making a great show at the moment.

July 8th. Walked on Horn Head which has a wealth of wild flowers that like acid conditions such as bog pimpernel, milkwort, lesser spearwort, sheepsbit, pink and blue butterwort, lousewort, woodsage and ragged robin.

July 9th. Having had two pretty dry days today it has rained all day. We went to see a very well restored water powered flax and grain mill. On route we crossed Glenveagh National Park where golden eagles and red deer have been reintroduced but we did not see any.

July 10th. A family of stonechats were flitting round our garden fences this morning. On the Ards Peninsula we came across otter tracks in a soft patch of sand.

July 11th. Went down to the harbour early as we were told that we might see ofters, mink and the hares that come to eat seaweed. We didn't see any of them but there were a few seals and sand eels were swimming by the peir. There were curlew, shelduck, herons, hooded crows, cormorants and oystercatchers. Later 5 of our party took a trip to Tory Island involving a 40 minute journey on a small boat so we opted out. They were escorted into harbour by a dolphin and escorted out again later in the day. It apparently does this with every trip. They listened to the rasping of corncrakes while having their sandwiches and saw wheatears, puffins, razorbills, guillimot, chough, manx shearwaters, ringed plover and gannets. My 50 year old bird book tells me that there are no buzzard in Ireland but we have seen several so they must have spread over the whole of the British Isles now.

July 12th. After waiting for the cloud to lift off the top, three of our party climbed Muckish, our nearest mountain. Then down to the 2 miles of sandy beach where we saw two ringed plovers that seemed to be playing with a red setter. It started with the dog rushing at them barking and away went the birds to be chased to the sea when the dog stopped and the bird turned and swooped over the dog again and away they all went across a shallow river, at times one bird in front of the dog and one behind. We walked along the sand and when we came back half an hour later they were still at it but the dog was slowing down. It may be a game they play regularly.

July 13th. On a recreation area we found wild thyme, white thyme and butterwort, and in a pond a bed of bogbean. We also saw goldfinches and heard a grasshopper warbler. There are very few crops grown in this area. There are a few cattle and sheep but it is mostly peat which is dug for fuel on a small scale in many places. There are a few fields that I think could have been stripped of peat in the past that grow good grass and clover but this is not always so. On Tory Island much of the peat has been used for fuel leaving only stones. The main crop now seems to be bungalows which are springing up everywhere. The one we are in was completed last year. There are so many sites being levelled and half built one's not being worked on, that I wonder whether there are enough builders. I asked one builder whether there would be people to occupy them all. He said that years ago he, like most young men, came across to England to earn more money but now they don't need to do that so more houses are needed. We have not seen or heard any aeroplanes here only one helicopter, nor have we seen any big ships on the stretch of water in our view. July 14th. On our way back to the ferry we visited the Giants Causeway and were amazed at the number of people. When my wife went there many years ago they were the only ones there.


Saturday 8th September 10 am - 6 pm Once again the Ride or Stride is coming up. The

This common "hooligan" weed, subject of the Ragwort Control Act 2003, MUST BE PREVENTED FROM SPREADING.

It is POISONOUS TO HORSES and other grazing livestock (resulting in liver damage leading to slow painful death).

Highly visible at this time of year - it is tall with dark green fern-like leaves topped with a mass of bright yellow daisy-like flowers - it is also TOXIC TO HUMANS and must be handled very carefully, definitely not with bare hands.

TO REMOVE IT NOW - BEFORE IT SPREADS ITS SEEDS (thousands of them):

- a) wear tough or rubber gloves, b) pull up (root must be removed) or use weed fork,
- c) bag up securely, and (d) burn, preferably incinerate.

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Sibford Gower Annual Parish Council Meeting - Friday, 29th June 2007

The Annual Parish Council Meeting was attended by three Parish Councillors, seven local residents and the Clerk. Cllrs Robin Spicer and Martin Layer were re-elected as Chairman and Vice Chairman respectively. The minutes of the previous Parish Council Meeting, the Special Parish Meeting of 12th April 2007 were accepted and signed. Additionally, the amended minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting of 12th May 2006 were accepted and signed. The Chairman thanked Mrs Eileen Haynes and the members of the Bishop Blaize Support Group for all that they had done in the campaign to prevent the use of the building being changed from licenced to private dwelling. Reference is made to this later in the report. He also thanked his fellow Parish Councillors for their appreciated involvement during the previous year and his thanks went also to the Clerk for carrying out his duties. It was resolved that the new Code of Conduct be adopted as from 1st June 2007 and the Registers of Interest were received from all the Parish Councillors. The Clerk reported that he is still in touch with Charter Community Housing Ltd with regard to changing the light from yellow to white on the lamp at the steps to High Meadow and also the installation of a timer. Since the previous Meeting, just two planning applications had received attention and these included a resubmission regarding the change of use of the Bishop Blaize. Again it was rejected and this led to the application being referred to a meeting at Bodicote House of the North Area Planning Committee on 28th June. The Chairman, Clerk and several local residents attended to hear the Members of the Committee overwhelmingly support the refusal recommended by the Planning Officer. The way forward by the owners remains to be seen. The Parish Councillors took the opportunity at the Meeting to discuss the submission of amended plans for Oaklands, Acre Ditch and no objections were raised. The Annual Financial return to the External Auditor was approved as was the Receipts and Payments Account. Thanks go to Mr David Soden for the internal audit of the former and the independent examination of the latter. Copies of both will be

exhibited on the Parish Council's notice board and they may also be viewed by arrangement with the Clerk. Turning to Highway matters, the Clerk reported that the damage to the stone wall adjacent to the Bishop Blaize had been repaired by Oxfordshire Highways which had also installed three verge protecting posts at Burdrop Corner. A request had been received from a resident at the other side of Burdrop Corner that posts be installed to protect the verge there and this will be the subject of a site visit by Parish Councillors as will places where it has been reported



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that bushes are overhanging pathways. A report was received that a plot of land, also at Burdrop Corner and where a plough is sited, is vastly overgrown and untidy. As the land belongs to the owners of the Bishop Blaize it was suggested that matters are left until the way forward with the pub becomes apparent. The Council Members then discussed the new Burial Ground and a working party, with two members each from the Ferris and Gower Parish Councils, is to be set up to deal with administrative aspects. The Clerk will liase with the Clerk of the Ferris PC. A local resident, Mr Bruce Woodall, very kindly offered to mow the very long grass prior to the required leveling of the land after which fencing will be erected. The Parish Councillors then turned their attention to the maintenance of Holy Trinity churchyard which is an ongoing problem. However, some solution is on the horizon in that two parts of the churchyard receive the attention of two willing volunteers and arrangements are in train to have other areas maintained by a local resident on a paid basis. Details of this arrangement are in course of discussion. Sibford Ferris Parish Council is currently considering its involvement in the maintenance work. Following the issue of Health and Safety relating to the Village Pond being raised at the Annual Parish Meeting, Cllr Martin Layer has been undertaking considerable research to establish what reasonably needs to be done. He has been talking with a local expert in Health and Safety and also to ROSPA. A great deal of information has been received but as there is some more to come, he asked that he be allowed to report again when he is armed with all the facts. Mr Bruce Woodall kindly offered to assist with any risk assessment that may prove to be necessary. The next item on the agenda was the Village Pond and Mrs Glennis Hardman, as a member of the Pond Action Team, was asked to give a brief report. She thanked Cllr Martin Layer for his excellent and full report at the Annual Parish Meeting. She thanked the members of the team for their involvement and went on to say that the pond is looking extremely good and compliments have been received. Water plants have been installed and appear to be flourishing well. Wild flowers that had been ordered and delivered had been potted up and will soon be planted on the bank at the rear of the pond. Four Indian Runner ducklings have been supplied by local resident Mrs Joey Woodall and are to be seen on the pond during daytime. The Chairman thanked Mrs Hardman for the report. The Clerk advised the Meeting that there appeared to be some dissent recently expressed by a local resident as to the work being carried out by the Pond Action Team and the expenditure involved. The Parish Councillors rejected this and are very satisfied with what is currently being done to enhance the pond both in appearance for the enjoyment of visitors and the well being of pond life. No items were raised at Public Question Time, those wishing to speak had spoken, by invitation, during the course of the Meeting. The next Meeting will be on Thursday, 13th September 2007 in the Sibford Endowed Gower Primary School commencing at 8pm to which local residents are cordially invited. The Chairman closed the Meeting at 9.10pm having thanked all those present for attending.

Report of Sibford Ferris Parish Council meeting on 11thJuly.

All Councillors and one member of the public were present at the meeting. Play Areas - the Clerk reported that the contractor refurbishing the Cotswold Close site has been delayed by problems with the supply of wooden installation poles. The Parish Council has been contacted again by the School about sharing facilities for older children and hopes to renew discussions. Trees - Oxfordshire County Council inspected all highways trees in the parish and has carried out works to some and felled three. The tree officer confirmed to the Clerk that all felled trees will be replaced, including the horse chestnuts on the Hook Norton Road. Burial Ground Extension - the repairs to the stone wall dividing the old and new burial grounds have been done. It was agreed that John Simms. Adrian Lamb and Maureen Hicks will be available for joint discussions with Sibford Gower Parish Council on the management of the burial ground extension. Affordable Housing - James Alcock of ORCC contacted the Clerk to advise that all the alternative sites suggested for consideration had been rejected and she was asked to respond to him requesting, in the light of the acute shortage of affordable housing, that all previously considered sites are looked at again. Verge Erosion on Main Street - Oxfordshire Highways has rejected the Parish Council's contention that erosion from vehicles along the Main Street verge is destabilising the stone wall. However, a proposal to put wooden bollards along the verge by Newstone has been put by the Highways Inspector to the Parish Council. The Councillors agreed to the installation of bollards provided they are in line with the driveway to the two properties. The Clerk was asked to propose that wooden bollards could also be used to protect the verge alongside the Small House boundary wall in Main Street. Horses in Holly Tree Field - It was reported that the horses had been removed permanently and had been replaced by sheep. Dog Bins - The Clerk was waiting for information from the Dog Warden on parishes that had recently installed bins in order to gauge their effectiveness in reducing fouling. Speed Signs - the Clerk was asked to apply to the District Council for grant aid towards a fixing point for a portable speed sign. Locality Primary School Review - Maureen Hicks reported on a meeting at Bodicote to discuss the County's pilot review of Banbury and Bloxham primary schools, which aims to maximise good use of existing schools although there is still the possibility that some schools may close. There is also a proposal to overcome the difficulty in recruiting head teachers by creating federations of schools that share a head between them. Finance -The RFO reported that the Annual Return has been sent to the external auditors. It was confirmed that out of the Parish Council's donations to local good causes, only the donation to the Warriner School Farm will be discontinued for March 2008. It was agreed that the parameters of Parish Council's contributions to Church expenses not relating to the burial ground extension will be set at the joint meeting on the management of the extension. Planning - it was noted that

the second Bishop Blaize planning application for change of use was unanimously rejected by the Planning Committee. There were two planning applications, and one planning decision relating to the operation of security lighting on the existing workshop at Ferris Hill Farm, which is now restricted to between 9.00 pm and 5.00 am, with a reduced bulb wattage and angle of illumination. **Any Other Business** - the Clerk was requested to ask residents of Mannings Close to cut back vegetation along their Main Street boundaries (*this was attended to very quickly - many thanks to all concerned*), and she confirmed that the School had been approached to cut their hedges and Oxfordshire Highways to remove the weeds. A resident kindly offered to look into setting up a village website and the Clerk was to send details of the free space available on the Cherwell District Council website. The meeting closed at 9.30 pm. The next meeting will be on Wednesday, 19th September at 7.45 pm in the Sports Hall classroom, Sibford School. All welcome.

Blue Bin Scheme - Sibford Ferris

Sibford Ferris Parish Council has decided to register for a District Council scheme whereby £5.00 will be paid for each new blue bin purchased by residents through the Parish Council. The blue bins are £20 each. The District Council wants to encourage recycling in the area and is hoping this initiative will help. This is due to a national shortage of certain types of wood. However, he has now informed us that his supplier will be delivering by the end of the week commencing 16 July and he can move onto site in the week commencing 23 July. We, therefore, hope that this time progress will have been made by the time the Sibford Scene goes to print!

Agricultural Vehicles at Harvest Time

This is plea to all those who park their vehicles in the vicinity of Green's Shop in the Ferris to be considerate to drivers of agricultural vehicles at this busy harvest period. It is often very difficult to get through, especially where vehicles are parked on both sides of the road. Long trailers on large tractors need a lot of space to pass a parked car. If all vehicles park on the same side of the road, leaving a straight passage it will make life a lot easier for the tractor drivers as well as avoiding snarling up the village quite so often.

A little thought when you stop at the shop really will help traffic flow.

Please remember when parking vehicles overnight that we farmers do work late into the evenings and, if we need to move large equipment, tend to do it very early in the morning when there is less traffic. Nothing seems to upset the residents quite as much as being woken up to move a car before 6 am! If all residents who have off road parking spaces were to use them it would help the running of, what the weather has ensured, will be a difficult harvest.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

BEWARE

Distraction Burglaries are on the increase in this area. One group have been travelling across several counties and are very aggressive. Guttering workers have been another group. Burglaries do happen in the villages around us.

The summer period is a great opportunity for Con-men —who are up to every trick including the use of children — and Opportunists. The weather is warm, Doors and windows are open, garden sheds are in regular use, people are away and are visiting this area.

POLICE ADVICE IS

Never let strangers into your house, always check their identity with the authority concerned, never ask them for the phone number, always close the door while you look it up and check independently. Keep doors and windows closed when out of sight. Keep garden and other sheds locked.

Look after your neighbours, keep an eye on their property, make sure letters and papers are put through the letter box and do not leave parcels on their doorstep. If you see anything suspicious, please report it with details of people, vehicles etc. to the Crime Prevention Team on tel. 08458 505505. You may save someone great distress.

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Windpower: Oswyn Murray

The Sibfords are windy villages: high on a ridge facing the prevailing wind they have more days of strong wind than anywhere else I have lived. With the government promoting environmental energy we decided to investigate how easy it would be to install a windyane.

The cost for a small wind turbine has recently come down: B&Q offer one complete with installation for £1500. It is visually only slightly larger than a television mast, and looks quite attractive as it whirs away. The turbine needs to be installed at rooftop level clear of tree turbulence, on a secure wall (not a chimney); the electricity supply generated is fed through the wall directly into the domestic supply via the nearest 13 amp ring main. A surveyor from the installation company comes and surveys the site free of charge.

In order to avoid the usual hype of manufacturers, we talked to someone in Great Tew, who has recently installed one: he happens to be a wind-pump engineer with long experience. He confirms that the product is both viable and nuisance-free. There is no external wind-sound greater than the actual wind itself produces, but the internal controls produce a humming sound which cuts in and out: it might therefore be irritating in a bedroom. He found that his actual saving was roughly 35 kwh per month (420 kwh per annum, which at current prices works out at around £50 a year); economically it would seem to need 30 years before you break even. The government however offers a 30% grant, which would make it a bit more attractive: the problem so far is that the grant money (which has to be applied for before installation) is allocated monthly, and the amount available is so small that unless you apply within the first few hours of the month it will have run out. Our friend also warned us that the turbine cuts out if the wind is too strong: it might be that the Sibfords are too windy, rather than not windy enough! Nevertheless it is clearly true that if enough people installed turbines, it would have a small but significant effect on electricity consumption at the visual cost of another aerial on the roof.

The good news is that on an ordinary house you do not need planning permission; the bad news is that if like us you live in a listed house in a conservation area you do need it (but there is no charge for an application). We were visited by someone from Cherwell, who seemed less than optimistic that we would get permission, despite the fact that our proposed site was virtually invisible from any public place. Indeed the installation company warned us that (although it is not legal to prejudge the issue) they had not yet heard of any case in which a local authority had allowed a turbine on a listed building: it seems that, despite government directives, local councils have decided to oppose this type of installation

wherever possible – although they have littered public roads with them to power speeding signs.

Despite these doubts we have decided that global warming is a serious issue and we should go ahead with an application for Glebe Farm; if we are successful, we invite all residents to enter our yard to see for themselves what it looks like, and we will report on our experiences to you. Watch this space!

John Tattersall of Swalcliffe was duly ordained in Christ's Church Cathedral in Oxford on July 1st and there were many from the Benefice at the celebratory Benefice Eucharist in Swalcliffe Church that evening. Although John has a full time job in London, he will be assisting the Rector in the Benefice at weekends and increasingly at other times as his retirement approaches.

The Coffee Morning held in the Church on Saturday 7th July was, as usual, a very sociable occasion and a good opportunity for meeting friends from the villages and elsewhere. A useful £208 was collected, of which £100 was donated towards the rebuilding of a school in Kashmir. The next Coffee Morning will be on Saturday September 22nd from 10.00 am to 12 noon.

The Family Service held on 8th July celebrated Pets and there were many of them present; mostly dogs with a few very handsome Guinea Pigs and some white mice (perhaps thankfully, no cats.) All the animals were very well behaved and there were no interruptions. The Rector blessed them all by name but perhaps Roan Court who was baptised during the service stole the show.

Our Dyson vacuum cleaner has mysteriously disappeared. If someone has borrowed it, could they please return it as soon as possible as it is a much-needed item.
