Nature Notes

Apr. 18th. Saw our first swallows of the year catching flies round the cattle near Gautherns Barn.

May. 10th. On arriving at Walberswick on the Suffolk coast we were greeted by the noise from a rookery in some scots pines behind the cottage which made us feel at home.

May. 11th. Found the sea pea in bloom on the seawall and birdsfoot, climbing corydalis and spring beauty on Walberswick Common. Having read in last weeks newspaper that the banks of the river Blyth will not be maintained in the future it was interesting to see where last Novembers breach had let in the sea water killing off the vegetation over a big area. It had also crept along some drainage ditches killing all the bushes and silver birch trees growing on the banks. The breach was repaired and the sea water pumped out.

May. 12th To Dunwich Heath, a National Trust owned reserve adjoining the R.S.P.B. reserve at Minsmere. Saw a bittern flying over the reeds, whitethroat, willow warblers and chiffchaff in the bushes and linnets, stonechats and dartford warblers on the extensive areas of heather. The three sculptures in the shape of curling waves were made from silver birch poles thatched with reeds and were placed to show where the coastline is expected to be in 25, 50 and 100 years time. They were well used by a kestrel as a look out perch. In the evening we went to Toby's Walks, an old overgrown sand pit, where we heard four nightingales and on to Westleton Heath hoping to see a nightjar. Although we stayed until a tawny owl flew over we did not see any nightjars although my son could hear one in the distance. I expect it was too much to hope for two successes in one evening.

May. 13th On the way to Minsmere we walked into the top end of the Walberswick reserve and found a dead adder by the track. At Minsmere the array of waders and seabirds seen from the hides was bewil-

dering but included avocets, redshank, common sandpiper and a little stint. Some hobbies looked to be catching dragonflies while the marsh harriers spend most of their time searching the reed beds for an easy meal which could be one of the few bearded tits that we saw. The RSPB have also dug into a hillside to expose a vertical sand cliff in which a lot of sand martins are nesting.

May. 14th Walked across the Walberswick National Nature Reserve, which has the biggest area of reedbeds in Britain, on raised paths and boardwalks. Saw bitterns, bearded tits etc and saw quite a lot of deer tracks through the reeds. On the walk home we found burrowing clover, which plants its own seed.

May. 16th This afternoon we paid another visit to Dunwich Heath and saw some of the funnel shaped pits of ant lions which are insect larvae that feed on the ants etc which slip down the sides of their sandy pits into their jaws.

May. 17th The rookery at the back of our cottage is the only one we have

We learned in fascinating detail about the Wills and Probates of the inhabitants of Chipping Norton in the 16-17C, which are being researched by Dr. Adrienne Rosen and a group of people in Chipping Norton. In the 16C Chipping Norton was already a wealthy town. This wealth was generated by the


wool trade and the town had a population of between 800 and 900 people. Most Wills had to be dictated, often to the vicar and were very detailed, with bequests to the family and instructions for the funeral and burial and even what food and drink was to be served after the funeral.

The inventories listed all the contents of their houses, so a picture can be drawn up of how they furnished their homes and if they owned a shop or worked in a trade, everything there was also listed, so making a valuable social history for todays historians.



Sibford W.I. Meeting — Tuesday, 13th May 2008



After welcoming Members, President Glennis thanked everyone for their help with the Group Meeting which took place on 246 April. She expressed Women's appreciation of three W.I. husbands' support. The evening had been suc-Institute cessful and enjoyable and the speaker, Brian Little, held an attentive audience with his excellent talk "Is there Life after Hoods?" Yes, he does

feel that, although much changed, Banbury does have a good future. Lynda then gave a full report on the Group Committee Meeting (8th May). The next Group Event is a coach trip to the Savill Garden, Windsor on 10th July. Continuing with Lynda, the two Resolutions for the N.F.W.I., Liverpool (4th June) were thoroughly explained and voted on. "Ban on Bottom Trawling" with its catastrophic loss of marine life and " Inappropriate Imprisonment of the Severely Mentally III". Both were carried by Sibford W.I.

This month's speaker was Sibford W.I. Member, Valerie Taylor, who was once a social worker for the Soldiers, Sailors and Air Force Association (SSAFA). SSAFA was founded in 1885 by Major James Gildea of the Royal Warwickshire Regiment primarily for the purpose of providing assistance and support to the wives and dependants of serving members in the Second Egyptian Expeditionary Force. He went on to establish the Royal Homes for Officers' Widows and Daughters (unmarried) in 1986 which provided them with rent-free accommodation. SSAFA's first president was Queen Alexandra and her personal monogram was adopted as its official seal. Within a few years the Association's remit was widened to the care of families and dependants of all the Army, Navy — and eventually the Royal Air Force — personnel. With few exceptions anyone with a Service connection, even of only a few days, is eligible for a grant or assistance. Referrals may originate from family, friends, and neighbours and applications must always be submitted in writing. A social worker will visit the applicant within a few days with a view to establishing the validity of the application as well as the type of assistance required e.g. housing, financial, clothing, social etc. This information will be the basis of a written report to be made available to the relevant SSAFA committee for consideration. The only test is on need, not rank. Once the application has been approved, it will be the social worker's responsibility to put in place all that is required to meet the applicant's needs. An important aspect of the social worker's work is known as 'almonising'. This is knowledge of and liaison with other possible sources of assistance to the applicant which might be available from one of the other many voluntary organisations, for example perhaps gardening or decorating. Financial assistance might also be forthcoming from Regimental funds, the RAF Benevolent Fund or the Royal Naval Benevolent Fund. Valerie ended her talk by giving us some very interesting examples of casework. SSAFA has been in existence for well over one hundred years. Sadly, its work is still essential and relevant and we all agreed that Valerie's talk was not only interesting but enlightening and thought-provoking.

Val and Gaynor refreshed us with tea and a choice of three lovely cakes. The Best Bloom competition was won by Jane (1st), Barbara (2nd) and Glennis (3rd). On 10th June we meet at the Village Hall at 2pm when Christine Reeves will give a talk "The Connection between Health and Dinosaurs". Competition — A Health Tip. An Evacuees Story

My name is Alan J Smith. I was 3yrs and 6 months old when the 2nd World War officially commenced on the 3rd Sept. 1939. I became one of the 3.5 million evacuees during that war. I was born in the East End of London on the 9th February, 1936. For me, evacuation provided a view of the outside world. I saw greener pastures, and was never again happy with my city environment. Some returned to their homes to stay, others remained in the countryside they had grown to love. Yet, others returned to their cities in 1945 when this terrible war came to an end but returned to the countryside again. I was one of those. My mother would not leave her children (I had a younger brother, Brian, at the time), so we were evacuated to several places, including Windsor and Somerset before eventually living in Sibford Gower, Sutton-Under-Brailes and then Whichford where I spent my first four years in the village school. In Sibford Gower we lived in the Mission Room where several of our family had a room upstairs, Mrs Rust and a Mrs Sullivan and others lived downstairs. It was idyllic in Sibford, away from the dog-fights in the sky over London where the Spitfires and Hurricanes of the Royal Air Force took on the Messerschmidts 109's and 110's of the Luftwaffe and away from the bombs(we had been bombed out once) and lost all our furniture and possessions. The peace of the countryside was wonderful with good nights' sleep, being able to bath and good food. We were also able to put away our Micky Mouse gas masks. I remember a Mrs Barnes bowling turnips(I think) down the hill in the Colony. My mother made friends of the indigenous people, in particular, a Mr and Mrs Dunkley. Mrs Dunkley and mum remained friends for the rest of their lives. We moved away from Sibford Gower and our friends and went to live in Sutton-Under- Brailes until I was 5 years and 6 months old. Then we were found a cottage in Whichford, one amongst four cottages named, Church End Cottages. These were situated opposite the church of St. Michael's. My second brother, Ron, was christened in the church in the year 1944 by the Rev.Gifford. Ron was born in the cottage on the 4th May. I remember a Mr Parkin and a Mr Herbert who taught in the Friends School in Sibford walk-



ing the children to Whichford woods and back. This is an overview of my experiences as an evacuee in these parts of the country. The villages that I have loved since about 1940. I will remember those times for the rest of my life!!

Report on Sibford Ferris Annual Parish Meeting, 30 April 2008 The meeting, attended by six members of the public, was chaired by Chris Franklin, Chairman of the Parish Council. Banbury Police PC Phil Morris gave advice on crime reduction, such as keeping windows, doors, garages, sheds, etc. locked. Leaving keys in locks is not a good idea as it makes it easier for thieves to remove larger items. Items at particular risk of theft, such as garden items, can be postcode marked using a "smart water" technique, (contact Jane Taylor, Crime Reduction Officer at Banbury for details). PC Morris appealed for new members of the local Neighbourhood Action Group, set up to identify crime concerns in the villages, and particularly for someone to take on the role of Chairman. When asked about speeding in the village, he agreed to do a spot check. Banbury Police are planning to purchase a new speed camera for this purpose. There are three PCSO's (Police Community Service Officers) now working in the district. PC Morris can be contacted on 0845 8 505 505. Wheathills Farm Jean White, Secretary of the Town Estates Charity, then reported on the past year, when new hedging plants were put in alongside Acre Ditch and a minor boundary issue dealt with. Highways Ralph Grant, Area Engineer, was asked to respond to a number of issues. (1) A kerbing scheme, with some drainage, for the verge from the Small House down to the telephone box, has been drawn up and hopefully will be completed before the 31st March 2009. (2) Mr Grant took note of a request for the verge from Lanes End down to the Old House also to be kerbed, but could not give any assurances on a bid being successful. (3) Speed limit between the Ferris and Burdrop - Highways does not want to alter the speed limit because there is no data to support a change. Mr Grant cited the results of a speed check carried out on Mannings Hill in January 2005, which did not show speeding. However, he agreed to find out from the Speedwatch officer whether the check was made at the top of Mannings Hill or nearer to where pedestrians cross lower down, as this would have a bearing on the discussions. (4) Speed reduction in the village - on this topic, he recommended spot checks such as offered by PC Morris. 20mph limits are apparently not practical for villages because of the physical components required, such as speed bumps. (5) Road repairs - the condition of the roads was discussed. Mr Grant said that village roads are inspected 6-monthly, and other roads 12-monthly. They are only scheduled for re-surfacing when sufficiently "bad" and in the interim are "kept safe". Therefore, if anyone finds potholes, they should report them to Highways, who will repair within 24 hours if they are dangerous, or 28 days if not. Parish Plans Aimee Evans of ORCC then gave a very informative presentation on Parish Plans and their benefits to village communities. She would be happy to do another presentation, perhaps jointly with Sibford Gower, if required. Sibford School Michael Goodwin, Head of Sibford School, presented their plans for future development, which include the redevelopment of some of the older parts of the building stock. In the immediate future, new changing rooms will be built and a new school hall put in place of the existing. The School hopes by 2020 to have 450 pupils, which they want to be their maximum (they currently have 422), and a large part of this growth they expect to be in the Orchard Close primary school. The development plans are available for inspection in the School Office. Bishop Blaize Les Summerell read Eileen

Haynes' report on the Bishop Blaize, giving a summary of events since March last year. There are no practical steps the village can take to restore the pub to its former use, other than to keep a watchful eye on it and keep in touch with the Planners. It was confirmed there are still persons interested in purchasing and running the Blaize as a pub. Sibford Ferris Parish Council Parish Council business followed, with the Chairman's Report and the Financial Report for the year to 31 March 2008. Open Forum The meeting was then opened to the public and two issues were put to those present. Firstly, opinion was sought on the switching off for a period each night of the village street lights. There were no objections, but it was decided to canvas views via the Sibford Scene. Secondly, the idea of doing a "Swap Shop" where people can give away, rather than throw away, unwanted items (of reasonable quality and non-electrical) was discussed. This suggestion was generally approved and further information will be obtained. The meeting closed at 10.00 pm with thanks to all those attending. Copies of the full draft minutes can be obtained from Anita Spencer (788557).

Sibford Ferris will be offered, later in the year, the opportunity to switch street lights off for five hours after midnight, using light sensitive devices. The financial saving of doing this would be indirect as the cost of street lighting is borne by the County Council, although there would be environmental benefits also. If anyone has any views or comments on this idea, please let us know so that we can give feedback to Oxfordshire County Council.
