Nature Notes

July 6th. Having replanted the plants that a badger had dug up while trying to dig out a bumble bees nest out of our rockery, it was maddening to find that they had been dug out again during the night. I have now put sprigs of gorse over the area to discourage them. July 11th. We usually have more newts than we want in our garden pond as they eat too many tadpoles. This year I have not seen any newts and the tadpoles disappeared soon after hatching, but I don't know why.

July 13th. Badgers have raided our strawberry bed on each of the last two nights. Luckily we had already picked the best of them. July 15th. While walking though Swalcliffe Common we found a

place where roman snail eggs were scattered around a patch of loose earth. They had been scratched or pecked out and much of their contents licked or pecked out leaving the outer skins.

July 19th. There are very few full pods on our broad beans this year although they had plenty of flowers and I am wondering whether there were enough bumble bees left to pollinate them after the badgers destroyed those two early nest in our garden.

July 20th. At Hook Norton a buzzard was gliding around above while a hare was feeding below. They must have seen each other but when we left the hare was still there and the buzzard had settled in the tree almost above it. I cannot think that a buzzard would tackle anything as big as a hare.

July 24th. Last evening I was shown a tawny owl that had just been cut free after flying into a chain link fence and trapping its head, which makes me wonder how well a tawny owl can see in the glare of daylight. It looked to be in a very bad way but today I hear that it is showing signs of recovery.

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Agricultural Vehicles at Harvest Time

This is plea to all those who park their vehicles in the villages to be considerate to drivers of agricultural vehicles at this busy harvest period. It is often very difficult to get through, especially where vehicles are parked on both sides of the road. Long trailers on large tractors need a lot of space to pass a parked car. If all vehicles park on the same side of the road, leaving a straight passage it will make life a lot easier for the tractor drivers as well as avoiding snarling up the village quite so often.

A little thought when you stop at the shop really will help traffic flow.

Please remember when parking vehicles overnight that we farmers do work late into the evenings and, if we need to move large equipment, tend to do it very early in the morning when there is less traffic. Nothing seems to upset the residents quite as much as being woken up to move a car before 6 am! If all residents who have off road parking spaces were to use them it would


There are plans to enlarge and refurbish the chair storage/changing room that was the old kitchen so that is it friendlier to bands and touring groups that need dressing facilities. In the longer term the stage will be refurbished including curtains and stage lighting. Both of these projects will be reliant on obtaining the necessary grants to help us with the costs.

Costs, particularly heating and lighting, have taken up much committee time recently. Heating oil, electricity, water and sewage account for a nearly fifty percent of village hall costs. And these seem to rise with every committee meeting. Consequently, hire rates will rise from September 1St

this year; generally £1 an hour across the board. At the same time the committee has taken the opportunity to iron out some anomalies that have arisen over the years. Anne Spackman, our bookings secretary, has all the details and regular users of the hall will receive full and detailed information.

The grounds have looked much tidier and well kept this year and this is due to regular grass cutting by David Baker and David Soden. We even spotted some people picnicking on the village hall field earlier this year!

TREK TO SIERRA NEVADA

I recently took part in a trek to the Sierra Nevada in Spain, to raise money for research into Parkinson's disease. The target was to walk approximately 50 km in three days and to raise a minimum of a thousand pounds. Well, I'm pleased to report that not only did I manage the trek without any ill effects, apart from a few aching muscles, but I will have raised over three thousand pounds by the time I've finished. Here is a brief account of the trek.

We had an early start at Gatwick airport where we all gathered for our flight to Malaga. We stopped at a small coastal town where we had lunch at a beach restaurant. It would have been a pleasant start to the trek had it not been for one of our party having her handbag stolen. We had a delay while this was reported to the police and then we continued up into the mountains to our first hotel at the highest village of Trevelez at 1830 metres. We had a short walk when we got there to help acclimatise us to the area.

The next day we had to be up and ready to walk the longest distance of the trip. We mainly followed the GR7 route which is a hiking trail that runs from the coast in Spain all the way to Athens, approximately 4000 km. We walked about 19 km that day, the morning being the longest part before we had a late lunch in the square at a small village called Busquistar. Lunches, provided by the tour company, were always a mixture of salads, Spanish quiches and pates with melon and cake to follow – we had to keep our strength up! From Busquistar we walked to Pitres where we spent our second night. As we were such a large group, over 40 of us, we were in two different hotels.

The following day was not so long in distance, from Pitres to Capileira. We had some wonderful views of the snow covered mountains in one direction and the sea in another. The walking was varied, up and down hills, into river valleys, following the old Moorish waterways through pine woods. We also passed through chestnut and oak forests and some small holdings called cortijos, some of which are now abandoned. The flowers along the way were magnificent; many of them could be found in our English gardens. That evening we were glad to have a dip in the hotel pool although the temperature was a bit fresh!

The final walking day we went from Capileira to Soportujar where we passed through orchards of cherries and kiwis. Also, mulberry trees left over from the silk growing in the area and chestnuts which were used to build houses. There were some old mills which fed off the old Moorish irrigation channels and remnants of mines. We were welcomed in the square in Soportujar with a glass of bubbly and were given our medals. Then we were taken to Granada for our last night. There, some of us went round the Alhambra palace which is a marvel of Moorish architecture and had a celebration dinner that night.

Apart from the walking and the scenery, what made the trek so enjoyable was the people I walked with. We all had a common interest in that most of us had a relative or close friend with Parkinson's disease. It was good to talk to people who shared the trials and tribulations of this disease and of course we felt we were doing our bit to maybe finding the cause and eventually a cure for Parkinson's. Three of the people who did the walk had Parkinson's disease and I salute David who is in his 70's and walked quite slowly but managed to complete the trek.

The Parkinson's Disease Society Events team who organised the fund raising and got the people to do the trek did a great job, Rachel and Maria who did most of the work joined us on the walk. Tall Stories was the company who did the actual organising of the trip and liased with the Spanish guides etc. They were very



supportive and even employed a couple of doctors (young and attractive!) to come with us and attend to any blisters etc.

So, to all the people who have sponsored me for this trek, THANK YOU VERY MUCH for your contributions. It was a truly wonderful experience and I'm grateful for your support and interest.

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Sibford WI. Outing to London with O.F.W.I — 2ⁿdJuly 2008

We set off on our Day Trip to the City of London, the Square Mile, wondering if we would be held up by the lorry drivers' demo. Our driver assured us that he had a strategy to cope with delays but, in the event, we weren't held up at all, arriving by St. Paul's Cathedral early, at 10 am, where our guide met us. He led us down narrow streets to the front of St. Paul's which is being cleaned at a cost of 50 million and is looking magnificent and showed us an inscription in the pavement commemorating the spot where Queen Victoria's carriage rested during her Diamond Jubilee Celebrations. Apparently she was too frail to leave her carriage so the whole service was held outside on the steps of the Cathedral. A painting in the Guild Hall Art Gallery depicts the scene. We then moved on to Temple Bar with it's ornate arches. It originally stood on Ludgate Hill but was re-sited when the arches proved too narrow for traffic. After coffee and cakes in the Crypt of St. Paul's. we walked on, our guide pointing out some of the many churches in the area, most of which were badly bombed in the war, and beautifully restored. One of them, St. Mary Alderman wasn't rebuilt but left as a ruin which was then bought by the USA and is now sited in Missouri in honour of Winston Churchill. We moved on towards the Guildhall and opposite the Hall stands the Church of St. Lawrence Jewry . Lawrence was a Roman Saint and when the Emperor of the day asked him to produce the treasures of his Church, he responded by saying that the 'poor and needy' were the treasures of HIS Church. For being 'flippant and facetious' he died a dreadful death being roasted on a Grid Iron and high on the Church, one side of the Cross is in the form of a Grid Iron, in his memory. The area around the Church was called Jewry because all the Jews lived there. Edward 1st. decided that so much was

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owed to them that they should be got rid of. He carried this out and decreed that all Jews should wear yellow armbands to identify them — a chilling reminder of more recent times. The Guild Hall itself was built around 1411. Its roof was burned in the Great Fire of London, restored, and then restored again after being destroyed in the blitz of 1940. When someone is made a Freeman of the City of London the ceremony takes place here and the Banners of the 12 Great Livery Companies hang around the Hall. Churchill was honoured in this way during the war, and his statue dominates the room, and a very large impressive memorial commemorates Nelson and his victories. The Guild Hall also served as a Court. Lady Jane Grey was tried here and sentenced to death, as was Thomas Cramner who was burnt at the stake and Anne Askew, tortured and executed for reading Protestant books. It is also the venue for State Banquets for visiting Statesmen. The City of London has been governed from this area for 800 years and it is now home to the City of London Corporation. At right angles to the Hall is the Guild Hall Art Gallery. When renovations to this building took place in the 1988, archaeologists were called in as is the norm in London. Roman walls were found, as expected, but it was soon realised that these were no ordinary walls. They were actually the walls of a Roman Amphitheatre. A huge construction able to accommodate 6000 people (the Albert Hall holds 5000) built in 120 AD replacing the original wooden structure of 70 AD. Remains of the Gladiators training ground have been found close by and it was quite a thought that under our feet many people would have been thrown to the lions and executed just for entertainment. When the Romans left in the 4th century the area was left derelict. The City itself was built between 2 hills - Ludgate and Cripplegate. It was sacked by the Danes and left derelict until Alfred the Great rebuilt it. We were able to go down under the Art Gallery to see the Roman walls and walk around them. The gallery houses many beautiful paintings. One immense

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painting depicting the Spanish trying and failing to take Gibraltar in 1782 originally hung in the Guild Hall. It was taken down and rolled up in the war, for it's protection and secreted in the West Country. It was later brought back, restored and hung in its present position. We saw the Goldsmiths Hall where the treasures of the churches of the City of London were on display. Treasures dating from medieval times to the present day. After lunch we met up again, boarded our coach for a tour of the East End, Dockside and Greenwich right down to the Isle of Dogs, so named because Henry the Eight kept his dogs there when he was at his palace of Greenwich. We crossed London Bridge and Tower Bridge, noting Traitors Gate at the Tower, thinking of Anne Boleyn, probably the most famous of all the prisoners who have entered the Tower at this gate to await execution. We saw the Monument erected to commemorate the Great Fire of London, constructed so that if it falls it will just reach the house in Pudding Lane where the fire started. Our guide explained how the wharfs etc., which had made up the Pool of London have been filled in and luxury apartments built in their place. It is now a very trendy up-market place to live, many famous personalities having property there. He pointed out the last 'Old Pub' on the Isle of Dogs which has recently been bought for 30 million pounds so that it can be demolished and luxury apartments built in it's place. We saw the site of the London Olympics and noted that much work still needs to be done. We admired Canary Wharf, the Gherkin and the London Eye, then back to the City for tea and cakes and then home. A marvelous Day Out.

The simulator is an accurate recreation of the flight deck of the real aircraft in both look and most functions. We fly as realistically as possible and follow actual real world airline procedures and checklists. We fly in accurate weather and have live air traffic control provided by the Virtual Air Traffic SlMulation network (VATSIM) (www.vatsim.net) a virtual ATC service on the internet. The event is staged over the course of a week, and is 24 hours/day. The Worldflight event is also International with other simulator teams from around the world taking part, all supporting their own local charity.
