Nature Notes

Oct. 29th. Almost an inch of snow fell last evening and is still lying on this sunny morning. Our thermometer read 24F at 8.00am which is exceptionally cold for October. The ice was almost half an inch thick on an earthenware bowl in the garden but not much more than a quarter of an inch on any of the tanks that hold a greater bulk of water. Oct. 31st. Still cold with the temperature on 28F at 8.00am. I found a newt floating on a water tank and put it in a crevise between the rockery stones. This is the only newt I have seen in the garden this year. Normally there are quite a lot of them in our garden pond. Frogs have also been few and far between. We did have some frogspawn that hatched but the tadpoles did not develop and soon disappeared. I have heard that a fungal disease is affecting amphibians but I have not found any dead ones, so it could be that the quality of the water is suffering from all the debris that falls from the overhanging cedar. Nov. 15th. The tawny owls are making their presence known by their frequent hooting as they usually do in the autumn but it is nice to know that they are still around.

Nov. 17th. We have seen very few blackbirds for several weeks but they have reappeared in good numbers. They may have been hiding away because they were moulting or their numbers could have been boosted by migrants from further north. Either way they, along with a few redwings; are already feasting on our holly berries which although red are not very ripe.

Nov. 18th I am told that goldfinches are coming to birdtables in good numbers. My granddaughter had eight at once feeding on niger seed.

Women's Institute

SIBFORD W.I. MEETING — Tuesday 1 11th November

This meeting was the 80th Anniversary of the Sibford Womens Institute and the President, Glennis Hardman, said she was delighted that so many members were present, including some previous presidents: Greta Baadsgaard, Rosalind Pearlman and Barbara Crabtree (who, having joined in 1960, is also the longest serving member.) She welcomed new member, Sue Nottingham and went on to thank the committee and all members for their support

throughout the year. Before proceeding with the business of the meeting everyone joined together in singing Jerusalem with piano accompaniment by Peter Hardman. Apologies had been received from Audrey Taylor, Ann Benham, Carol Evans, Miriam Henbrey, Kathleen Reid and Lynda Conway (another previous president) and in the latter's absence Rosemary deputised as secretary. The minutes of the October meeting were read and agreed followed by a brief review of past events and a summary of future programmes. The 80th Anniversary celebration lunch took place at the Saye & Sele Arms on Tuesday 18th November. At the December meeting there will be a display of archived material recording the Sibford WI activities over the past 80 years. Members were asked to bring a plate of food for the Christmas tea, a small wrapped present for inclusion in the Christmas Dip and a Christmas plate or dish for the competition. Bearing in mind that it was also Armistice Day, Barbara Crabtree then read some extracts from the archives about a few of the Sibford WI contributions to the War effort. On one occasion this had been the gathering and sale of 600 lbs of rose-hips and on another occasion the digging-up, cleaning and sale of dandelion roots. Rose hips were and still are used medicinally whilst dandelion roots can be made into types of tea or coffee.

"Monet's Garden" was the subject of this month's speaker, May Parker, and what a treat was in store for us. There are two parts to Monet's Garden, a flower garden in front of the house (The Clos Normand) created in 1883 and the Japanese inspired water garden accessed by a tunnel under the dividing road (begun in 1893). May and her husband have visited the Monet Gardens and Museum at Giverny, France on seven different occasions and this has enabled them to take and build the magnificent collection of slides which so effectively illustrated the content of May's talk. We saw slides showing the central path, the Grand Alle, covered by iron arches or wire on which there were

masses of climbing roses. We saw lavender and purple wisteria overhanging the gardens and Japanese bridge. We saw pictures of the lantern tree, clematis with lovely names such as Angels Fishing Rods and varieties of sunflowers such as the Teddy Bear. All paths were straight and bordered by box and spruce, salmon and red geraniums, rambling roses, oriental poppies, irises, trailing nasturtiums, French pansies, all mixed according to their colours. It is just not possible to cover here the detail of this talk – a case of you have to see and hear it to believe it?! And as a bonus May finished by telling us about a visit to the Cam-



From that date until 1815, many miles of canals were dug by hand by men called 'navigators', hence the term 'navvies' The families working and living on their narrowboats had a very hard life, living in a confined space, often with many children, who all had a job to do as soon as they were old enough to help and presumably not to fall into the water!. The tradition of decorating the boats with pictures of castles, roses and bright patterns was probably to brighten up their existence on the 'cut'.

Memories of Christmas in the Sibfords during the 1920's

The Sibfords' Society are currently transcribing the memoirs written by Anthony Oddie who was the grandson of Robert Brearley Oddie and his wife Elizabeth - Robert was the second Superintendent (headteacher) at Sibford Quaker School in the late 1800's. He and Elizabeth had seven children – their eldest son, Sydney and his wife Mary Ethel had two sons, Hugh and Anthony and the family used to return to their grandparents home – Sibford House (known now as West Town House on Woodway Road) to spend Christmas during the mid 1920's.

Anthony's father ran a pharmaceutical chemist's business in Uckfield in Sussex. Christmas Eve was the busiest day of the year and the shop did not close until 8pm. The family then caught the train to London Victoria, crossed London to Paddington Station where they took the midnight express to Birmingham. This had a 'slip coach' which was dropped off at Banbury – 'a miracle to a small child as the coach stopped at Banbury station while the main express hurtled on to Birmingham without even slowing down.'

Anthony remembers and writes 'Here we were met by Tom Kyte and his pony and trap. Hugh and I would be snuggled down on the floor under a rug for the seemingly endless drive out to Sibford. 7 miles and 8 hills.... We would arrive at Sibford House at about 3am to be met by two Aunts, Edith and Helen – in their dressing gowns and with their hair down. A warm drink and Hugh and I would be bedded down on camp beds on one of the landings but not before we had been

through the ritual of a) shouting up the chimney to Father Christmas to tell him what we wanted as presents and b) hanging up our stocking at the foot of the bed....'

The many presents were distributed to all the family members by the grand-children... 'An endless procedure – or so it seemed as we would have to wait until the end before we could undo our own presents. They were mainly simple little parcels wrapped in coloured crepe or even brown paper and tied with red string.' ...No Christmas wrapping paper or sellotape in the 1920's!

'One did not appreciate all t he backroom work that had been carefully organised and efficiently executed for by one o'clock the full Christmas dinner would appear. Grandfather R.B.O. at the head of the table would carve the enormous turkey and all the trimmings would be piled high on the plates. (All the Oddies were excellent trenchermen!) Subsequently Grannie at the foot of the table would dispense the Plum pudding. Being a Quaker household this would be served "straight" i.e. with custard! Certainly no flaming brandy or brandy butter. Even for the adults Christmas dinner would be washed down with lemonade or barley water!

'There followed another tradition – the mince pies. Each daughter and daughter in law would contribute their own home-made variety and a sample of each would be presented for Grandfather's inspection and selection. To have one's mince pie selected by RBO on this occasion was the equivalent of an "Oddie Oscar". There was one famous occasion when after a thorough inspection, he selected the one cooked by my mother. Murmurs went round the table "Ooh, he's chosen Ethel's. He picked it up and parting his beard and moustache, took a large bite. The assembled company waited for his verdict, - but instead he turned livid, disentangled the mince pie from his beard and held up the offending article - the little circular tin baking dish in which it had been cooked, but which by oversight had not been removed!"

Anthony goes on to describe the beautiful Christmas tree lit with a cascade of coloured candles which was such a hazard to the paper decorations and party frocks – the tree in the bay window was constantly 'policed' by two adults. He describes the Christmas tea using the best china removed from the glass fronted china cupboard in the drawing room and also his most dreaded event – the family concert...'

As we prepare for Christmas in our own homes this year we can reflect on the many traditions and customs which still hold good today whilst reflecting on the vivid memories of a young boy who used to spend Christmas with his family in Sibford. How fortunate we are that, later in his life he found the time to share his wider observations and memories of the happy times he spent in the village, at Public School, Medical School and during the Second World War. His brother Hugh, who as a Flying Officer was killed during World War II is remembered and honoured in a memorial window in Sibford Church.

Once fully transcribed, Anthony Oddie's memoirs will be archived and provide a most valuable document, which together with the Rev Stevens diaries recount, in detail, the social history of our village in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. What, I wonder will we leave for the early 21st century?

James Marcovitch

Many Sibfordians will remember James Marcovitch as a mischevious and cheeky young boy growing up in Sibford Gower in the 1980s. Most will not know that he went on to become an outstanding and inspirational musician, writer and performer, heading up a ground-breaking and award-winning band. Sadly, he has died at the age of 34 of non-Hodgkins lymphoma.

Our family moved to the Gower in 1982 and James (he became Jim to his family and friends) quickly made a reputation for himself in the village as a colourful character – in the words of his childhood friend Matthew Abbott he was 'devilishly naughty but irrepressible'. Jim often got into trouble at school for being outspoken, challenging, honest and 'often more than his teachers could handle. He had a fierce and sharp intelligence, refused to conform or compromise and would argue, debate with and challenge adults. He rarely did as he was told and was always looking for ways to make school more interesting for himself and his friends.

Jim was hugely creative and naturally talented, characteristics that gave great pleasure and enjoyment. He was successful in auditioning for the National Youth Theatre at the age of 14 although he later decided the acting world wasn't for him. He was -a brilliant artist who doodled caricatures and cartoons on any spare scraps of paper he could 'find, and he would play the piano for hours, improvising and composing tunes despite no formal training. At 17 Jim was 'asked to leave' his A level courses. Initially devastating, this, act inadvertently ended up doing him a favour, that would shape the rest of his life. At a loose end, he travelled to Romania with the charity set up by our mother (Orfan) to work with children who had been neglected and abandoned and with children and babies with Aids. Jim -worked hard, bringing love and affection – and music --into their lives for the first time in most cases.

It was in Romania that Jim became interested in Eastern European gypsy music and where he bought his first accordion. He taught himself to play and before long was using it as his ticket to travel wherever his fancy took him. He would literally play for his supper, sometimes busking all day to raise enough money for food or a bed for the night. Alone, and later with our brother Alex and his then girlfriend he travelled throughout Europe, to India and Pakistan, and to the Middle East – Israel and Jordan, then Syria and Iran. When Jim returned to England he enrolled at Goldsmith's College in London to study music and from there discovered Klezmer – traditional Jewish Eastern European music characterised particularly by the violin, clarinet and accordion. He co-founded his band

She'koyokh, and they quickly made a reputation for themselves as one of the fore-most and most exciting klezmer bands in London, and just this year She'koyokh won first prize at the International Jewish Music Festival award in Amsterdam.

Jim worked as a musical director, composer and performer for many theatre companies. One children's play, The Mouse Queen, in which he played an accordion playing fox, had sell-out runs in London and New York. He formed the band Soup with two friends, writing songs characterised by their quirky and darkly comic observations on life.

When Jim was diagnosed with non-Hodgkins lymphoma in 2004 he did not for one minute contemplate giving up performing, composing, travelling or living life as he always had. It was a cruel irony that he was enjoying life and having more fun than he ever had, and was just at the beginning of a wealth of achievements and opportunities. He didn't stop working unless he was in hospital. His bravery and lack of self-pity as his health deteriorated was humbling and inspirational: he continued to produce and create, writing a play, recording an album with Soup, composing original klezmer tunes for She'koyokh's new album, and, one beautiful and magical weekend in September, marrying Jenny Pidgeon in Whichford. The week before his death he launched Soup's album 'Night of the Long Spoons' and reminded the audience of how wonderful life is, and how important it is to cherish every moment.

Three days before he died we took him in his wheelchair on to Hampstead Heath where he marvelled at the beauty of the autumn. He died at home, his body ravaged by cancer, but his mind still full of passion and energy and joyfulness about his music and the wonder of life and of the world around him. Jim taught those of us who knew him how to live, how to love, and how to die —exactly as he chose to and with absolute integrity. He was a unique and irreplaceable person.


