### Nature Notes

May 4th. Three people have told me that they have heard the cuckoo in Sibford. I heard one today but that was away on the Foxholes nature reserve. The bluebells there were only at their best in a few sheltered spots.

May 10th. The energy stored in the buds on our beech tree always amazes me. They seemed reluctant to burst after a long period of swelling but since bursting about a fortnight ago some have made

over a foot of new growth even on our mature tree.

May 11th. A group of six swifts, the first I have seen this year, were feeding quite high up in the clear blue sky as they slowly worked their way into the strong easterly wind. When I was a child the old three storey thatched houses, that used to stand by the Hook Norton Road out of Sibford Ferris provided nesting sites for a huge number of swifts. I lived there but in a two storey thatched house and we never had more than one or two nests under our eaves, so I think it must have been the extra height that made them favour the other block of houses. Their screaming was deafening as they flew at top speed between the houses and the line of lime trees, in groups of 20 or more. It always seemed to be just a noisy game they were playing. May 12th. Looking into a pond today we could see some newts, a few tadpoles and a great diving beetle. I think the tadpoles are too big now to be eaten by the newts but are probably still on the menu for the great diving beetle.

May 19th. I heard a cuckoo in the valley this morning.

Some Nature Notes from a new contributor.

Apr. 20th. 12 species of birds regularly visiting the feeders in our small garden. 8 of these species are nesting in, or immediately around, the garden.

Apr. 21st. First holly blue butterfly recorded. The first brood lay eggs on holly and the second brood in summer on ivy. They overwinter as

chrysallises.

Apr, 22nd. A nestbox in the garden containing a camera has 7 blue tit

Apr. 26th. 11 blue tit eggs in the nestbox. The male is feeding the fe-

male at regular intervals.

May 1st. About half of the bluebells in woods are in full bloom. They are almost a week later than last year.

May 2nd. First swifts seen flying above Wyatts garden centre. Cherwell District Council website states that between 1994 and 2006 the number of swifts breading in southern England has halved. This is because many traditional nest sites have vanished due mainly to building repair work. (details of nest boxes to make for swifts can be downloaded from the internet) 6 species of butterflies in good numbers recorded on the D'arcy Dalton Way.

May 7th. First blue tit chick hatched.

May 8th. 7 blue tit chicks.

May 9th. 9 blue tit chicks and no sign of the remaining eggs.

May 12th. Two swift boxes erected under the house eves on west facing walls.

May 15th. 12 species of butterflies recorded locally this year with peacocks and orange tips in good numbers. Small tortoishell also doing well despite a decline nationally.





The May meeting of the Society welcomed Liz Woolley who came to talk to us about the Parish of St. Thomas the Martyr, Oxford, one of the most ancient and historic areas of the city. St. Thomas was one of Oxfords earliest suburbs, first inhabited in Saxon times. During the 12<sup>th</sup>


century it stood on the direct route between the Castle at the West gate of the City and the great Augustinian Abbey of Osney.


The early years saw the working of cloth and leather as the main activity whilst in the 15<sup>th</sup> century the building trade became important. The coming of the Canals led to the development of the wharf area whilst the arrival of the railways in the 1850s meant an influx of other workers. The area then became the home of Oxfords Brewing Industry. Throughout this time the area had a reputation for being one of the most lively, even disreputable parishes of the City with closely packed houses and often itinerant communities.

The Church of St. Thomas was the centre of life where many quite eccentric vicars were incumbants. The Parish was also home to some pioneering work to improve the condition of the population and in 1903 a school was established by local subscription and fund raising which became a model for others and pioneering in some fields.

In the 20<sup>th</sup> Century much of St Thomas' housing was cleared and its close knit community dispersed, however this often overlooked area is now set to become the centrepiece of Oxfords new West End Development.

The next event will be the guided walk in Oxford on 18<sup>th</sup> June. Those who have arranged to come should meet at Blackwells Book Shop at 10.20am. Details of the evening stroll on 16<sup>th</sup> July will be in the next Sibford Scene.

### Report of the Sibford Gower Annual Parish Meeting held in Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School on Thursday, 14th May 2009

Present were the five Parish Councillors, seventeen local residents, Mr Ralph Grant (Area Engineer, Oxfordshire Highways), Police Community Support Officer Nikki Dale. County & District Cllr George Reynolds joined during the latter part of the Meeting having earlier attended another Annual Parish Meeting. Highway & Footpath Matters: Mr Ralph Grant (Area Engineer, Oxfordshire Highways) gave a brief presentation which included the fact that the County Council is making a significant change, emphasising on quality, in new contract arrangements and subsequent new contracts should be in place by June 2010. Various matters were raised by residents at the Meeting. They were:- Request for dropped kerbs in High Meadow to facilitate easier wheelchair access, repairs to village pond kerbing, recent footpath work considered to be finished not up to standard, a blocked pipe in Colony Road causing flooding from time to time and mud on the road in High Meadow. Mr Grant promised to ascertain what action might be taken and he will keep the Parish Council informed. He referred to the disappearance of the village name plate in Pound Lane. He said that this was one of a number that had been stolen quite recently and replacements are being arranged for this year. Thames Valley Police: A presentation was made by Police Community Support Officer Nikki Dale. She said that she is one of five officers who have responsibility for thirty three villages. She commended the local Neighbourhood Watch Team and its leader, Mrs Mollie Mulley. New members are sought so that dissemination of urgent telephoned information may be more easily and quickly facilitated. Information on crime reduction was circulated and made available for distribution in the Village. Chairman's Report: The Chairman welcomed all present. He said that the Parish Council had met five times since last year's Annual Parish Meeting. During that period fourteen planning applications had been considered. Regular contact had been maintained with Cherwell District Council and

Oxfordshire County Council especially with regard to Highway and Footpath matters. As to footpaths, residents will have observed that certain areas have been resurfaced very recently and considerable work had been carried out at Burdrop Corner. As a bonus, the footpath leading down the slope to the road (near to the Bishops Blaize) had a proper surface and edging stones installed. The resurfacing of footpaths in High Meadow had been postponed because of financial constraints but the lowering of kerbs to facilitate wheelchair access is still being considered. The Annual Litterblitz took place on Saturday, 4th April and thanks were extended to all those who took part. The Parish Council, under the powers available to it, financed the maintenance of part of the Churchyard with the Ferris Parish Council taking on the maintenance of the remainder on a volunteer basis. The Parish Council, purchased, jointly with the Ferris Parish Council, the land adjacent to the Churchyard to create a burial ground. Turning to the Parish Council Meetings, he thanked County and District Councillor George Reynolds for the advice he gives when attending as many of the Meetings that he can bearing in mind his very busy schedule. As usual, a warm invitation was given to all residents to attend the Parish Council Meetings, which are always advertised, to take advantage of the Public Participation part of the Meeting to express views and opinions. Matters discussed at Parish Council Meetings are always set out in the reports published in the Sibford Scene. Finally, he thanked his fellow Parish Councillors for their involvement and input. He also thanked the Clerk for the work he carries out at the Parish Council's instruction. Clerk's Report: A new bus contract was awarded to Stagecoach and new Bus Service 50A starts on 31st May 2009. The Clerk gave details of the Parish Council's financial transaction during the twelve months period to 31st March 2009. The Town Estates Charity: In the unavoidable absence of Mrs Jean White (Secretary to the Charity), the report was presented by Cllr Oswyn Murray (a Charity Trustee). Neighbourhood Watch: Mrs Mollie Mulley, as leader of the Neighbourhood Watch Team, set out the current situation endorsing what PCSO Nikki Date had said earlier in the Meeting. She had gained another member for the Team and shortly will hold another Team Meeting to discuss how warning messages received may be more quickly passed on to the community. Village Hall: Cllr Muriel Chandler in her capacity as Hon Secretary to Sibford Village Hall Committee presented the Report. New Burial Ground: The Clerk reported regarding the present situation Thanks go to Mr Cedric Brown for the maintenance work and his involvement in the erection of the proposed new fencing. Mrs Evelyn

Phillips is very kindly providing two seats, in memory of her late husband. Holy Trinity Churchyard: The Clerk set out the present situation regarding maintenance work. The Village Pond: The Report was presented by Cllr Martin Layer and he extended thanks for the work carried out by the Pond Action Team led by Mrs Glennis Hardman. Any Other Business: Mr Fred Inns raised the matter of cleaning out the Village Pond, a practice that happened until the Pond Action Team was formed. He was assured by Cllr Martin Layer that it is not at present considered necessary. Mrs Kathleen Winter referred to recent very low flying aircraft and asked whether something might be done to prevent this. Mr Alf Mullis expressed his thanks to the Town Estate Charity for financing the free bus to Chipping Norton. This service has now been cancelled because of lack of use. Mr Bill Wealsby complained about the ducks from the Village Pond which are 'visiting' his land and causing a nuisance. This matter is before the Parish Council at the present time and will be discussed at the next Parish Council Meeting. Mrs Mollie Mulley was concerned about the possibility of villages being forced to take Affordable Housing in line with Cherwell District Council's Options for Growth. Cllr Martin Layer advised the Meeting that Cherwell District Council had been fully advised of the Parish Council's views.

There being no further business to discuss, the Chairman thanked all present for attending and declared the meeting closed at 9.50pm. Full details of the Reports made are available, on request, from the Clerk (780391)

### Note from Sibford Gower Parish Council re Bus Service

The new bus contract was awarded to Stagecoach and New Bus Service 50A starts on 31st May 2009. An abridged time table is published this issue of the Sibford Scene and a full one may be obtained from drivers and the shop in Sibford Ferris. One interesting feature is that the route now extends from Banbury to Stratford-upon-Avon. As far as Burdrop and Sibford Gower are concerned, there are two official stopping points – one in Main Street and the other at Burdrop Corner. With regard to the latter, the sign 'collapsed' some years ago and was not replaced. Oxfordshire County Council has been contacted in this regard. Certain residents are concerned that their boarding point has traditionally been in Pound Lane but this is not an official stop and, as such, technical difficulties exist in that drivers are not really allowed to stop unless the stop is official. The Sibford Gower Clerk has spoken with Stagecoach and is now is dialogue with Oxfordshire County Council in an attempt to make the stop official.




