Nature Notes

Aug 10th A suffnier day brought out a few butterflies. I saw 3 male common blues and a small copper in the garden.

Aug 14th While I was in our garage with the door open two wood pigeons settled just outside. After eyeing each other up they walked round in a tight circle with their outer wing trailing on the ground. I thought it might be a mating ritual but after a few circles they really flew at each other and I realised that it was a fight between two males or could they have been two females!

Aug 16th A humming-bird hawk-moth visited our red salvia bush today and there were several common blue butterflies on our wildflower patch, only one of them a female.

Sept 1st Looking back through the last 23 years of weather records I cannot find a wetter August than this one. I measured 6.42 inches. In spite of this the grain harvest is well underway and September should be drier as August is historically the wettest month of the year on average. July 2007 with 6.78 inches was the last month that was wetter than this and then there was widespread flooding as it followed a very wet June. Sept 12th My son who lives the other side of Banbury tells me that the last brood of martins from the nest on his house only left the nest two days ago. He thinks they may have raised three broods but is not sure. Sept 18th A dog chased a muntjac into our garden but gave up the chase when it reached the bushes and nettles.

Sept 19th At the end of June I noticed a hornets nest in the corner of our bungalow roof where blue tits nested last year. Since then it has gradu-

Margaret Gardiner for making all the arrangements. News was given of Jane Martin, now happily settled in Derbyshire. Miriam Henbrey was welcomed back after her operation and good wishes have been sent to Norma Allen and Gwen Whitehead, both recovering from operations. Mr Brian Lowe, here to talk on the life of C S Lewis, was then introduced. The Chronicles of Nania, The Lion, Witch & Wardrobe, The Screwtape Letters - all familiar titles to most of us. But what do we know about the life of the author, Clive Staples Lewis who liked to be known as Jack? How many of us know how prolific he was - the number of pamphlets, religious books, poems, stories he published? The younger son of wealthy parents, Flora and lawyer Albert, he was born in Belfast on 27th November 1898, a brother for three year old Warren. However, when his mother died in 1908 he was sent to boarding school in England. Although not a happy time for him, nevertheless in 1917 he won a scholarship to the University College of Oxford and began life as a student, a committed atheist. Four months later he enlisted and began Officer Training at Keble College. There he became friends with Paddy Moore and they made a pact that should only one of them survive the war, the other would take care of the bereaved family. In fact, Moore did not survive and at the end of the war Jack rented a house in Oxford in which he installed Paddy's mother Janie and her daughter. Then he resumed his studies which resulted in a first in English, in Greek and in Philosophy as well as the Chancellor's Essay Prize. In 1929 Jack's father Albert died and in 1930 Jack purchased a house, The Kilns, in Shotover for £3000 to which he moved Janie and her daughter Maureen; he, too, lived there from time to time as did Tolkein Jack himself regularly did the shopping for the and Jack's brother Warren. household and frequently undertook various domestic chores to assist Janie who These arrangements continued until Janie died in did not enjoy good health. 1951 (Maureen married and left The Kilns in 1940). Jack had fulfilled his

promise. In 1925 Jack had won a Tutorship at Magdalen where he remained until 1952. It was during the early years of the 1930s that he and JRR Tolkein, a committed Catholic, established an informal writing club – Inklings - and regular meetings, usually in the Eagle and



Child, continued until 1949. Other members included Hugh Dyson, Charles Williams and Jack's brother Warren. It is thought that it was Tolkein's influence which led to Jack first becoming an atheist and eventually to his conversion to the Church of England faith. It was also in 1952 that Jack first met Joy Gresham, an American author who was visiting the UK with her two sons. He was increasingly attracted to her but she was still married, albeit unhappily and she returned to the States. In 1954 Jack left Oxford for Magdalene College, Cambridge to become the first Professor of Medieval and Renaissance Literature. The same year Joy was divorced and returned to the UK. In 1956 they went through a civil ceremony of marriage and Joy moved in to The Kilns with her two sons, Jack's brother Warnie and of course Jack when he was in Oxford. Shortly after this Joy was diagnosed with cancer and a priest was found who was willing to perform a Christian marriage service at her bedside. They spent a further happy three years together before she died in 1960. Jack was devastated and poured his feelings into his Book "Grief Observed". He died on 22nd 1963 – the same day that Jack Kennedy was assassinated.

Report of the Sibford Gower Parish Council

Meeting on Monday, 6th September

At the Meeting, items on the agenda and discussed were Local listed buildings: Cherwell District Council places importance on the preservation of the historic environment, its rural built heritage, landscapes and market towns, all of which contribute to the distinctiveness of the area. To this end, the District Council intends to create a district-wide database of locally important buildings, structures and archaeology which are not included in the nationally compiled List of Buildings or Schedules of Ancient Monuments. Parish Councils and local history societies are asked to be involved in drawing up a local list as local people best know the hidden treasures within local communities. The Parish Council is asked to nominate buildings and structures within our area for inclusion in the local list. The Chairman asked the Members to suggest what should be included and the subject will be on the agenda of the next PC Meeting. Conservation Area: The Chairman had been speaking with Rose Todd, Cherwell District Council's Conservation Officer regarding a review of the Parish's conservation area. Parish Plan: Following an approach by Sibford Ferris Parish Council to formulate a Joint Parish Plan, it was agreed

that the matter should be taken forward and to this end the Chairman suggested that all bodies and organisations in the two Parishes should be involved including, amongst many others, the Churches, Schools, the Village Hall, The Sibford Society and The Town Estate Charity. Contact will be made with all the organisations to seek involvement and, in due course, a Steering Committee will be formed. It would be appropriate for a Member of each Parish Council also to be Committee Members. An established Parish Plan will give more weight in respect of matters that may require attention in the future. The Oxfordshire Rural Communities Council will be fully supportive and give any advice and information that may be required. Miriam Tebbs' Land: The Clerk referred to the plot of land that was bequeathed to the Parish Council by the late Miriam Tebbs some years ago. The intention was that it should be for the enjoyment of local residents. Despite endeavours in inviting usage, no advantage has been taken and it would appear that the land has relatively little appeal. Expenditure is ongoing in respect of periodic maintenance work. The Council will have to consider the best way forward and the subject will be on the agenda at the next Meeting. Vehicle Activated Signs: A suggestion had been received from a local resident that, in the interest of safety, Vehicle Activated Signs should be installed at two points in The Cross area - one approaching from Colony Road and the other approaching from Pound Lane. Any sign would have to be funded by the Parish Council and solar powered signs are extremely expensive which would make the concept impossible taking into account the Parish Council's financial situation. The Clerk was instructed to investigate the possibility of installing speed warning notices similar to those used recently by two neighbouring Parishes. Public Participation: A resident, present at the Meeting, raised two matters and both relate to the Village Pond. The first concerned the poor condition of a small road area where water constantly gathers, having leaked from the pond, and will not drain away. The Clerk was instructed to contact Oxfordshire Highways. The second related to cars parked on the road at the edge of the pond. These were seen as preventing a view of the pond by those visiting it. The Council acknowledged that this is a difficult position bearing in mind the lack of parking facilities in that area. It was decided to carefully monitor the position over the coming months so that a view as to any appropriate action may be taken.

The next Meeting will be on Thursday, 11th November 2010 starting at 8pm in the Staff Room of Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School. Local Residents are warmly invited to be present and the opportunity will be given for any matters that they may have to be raised.

Percival Crawford "Bish" Calveley

Residents in Burdrop were shocked to hear of the sudden death of Bish Calveley on Friday 18th June. Few locally knew that he had been suffering from cancer. He was looked after wonderfully well in University College Hospital in London but sadly there was nothing they could do to save his life. A service of thanksgiving took place in London on Friday 25th June.

Bish was born on 19th October 1925, the eldest of four boys, and, as with so many of his generation, he left school and went straight into the army. Here his qualities were soon noticed and the army sent him to study at Queen's University in Belfast. Soon afterwards he was sent to India where he gained a commission. On demobilisation, he studied law and became a solicitor, taking up practice in the West End of London. His practice prospered and his clients ranged from Eastern Royal Families to well known pop stars. The more complicated a legal problem the better, as far as he was concerned. He loved to get his teeth into something difficult and always came up with the solution. He became a mine of information which he retained until the end of his life. He claimed to have a limitless knowledge of trivia but he was enormously well read, frequently having several books on the go at a time.

He had an enormous sense of humour and knowledge of several languages, delighting in conversing with people in their own language wherever he went, whether it be a local restaurant or somewhere in Eastern Europe. He hated authority and being told what to do and there was a story that he refused to complete the Census form, even when he was threatened with prison for not doing so.

Six months after he retired to Burdrop in 1985, he was working again part time with solicitors in Banbury where he continued until a few weeks before his death. Whenever he took Continuing Professional Development exams, he never got a mark of less than 97%. During this time and over a period of twelve years and totally unknown to Erica, he wrote and published a novel based on his army wartime experiences in India and elsewhere



Another of Bish's passions was cinema and he could tell you about any film, who starred in it and who directed it. Particularly he liked Westerns and the Marx Brothers. He was also a devout Christian and whenever he could went to church every Sunday.

The love of his life was Erica whom he met at a party and after a whirlwind courtship, they were married in 1949. They were a devoted couple and were never out of each others company. Nothing was too much trouble for Erica, and Bish never forgot the support she gave him when he was studying law and throughout their married lives. He would follow her every whim, whether it took him to a freezing cold caravan in the middle of nowhere in Wales or their annual romantic trip to Paris on their wedding anniversary. They travelled extensively together, both overseas and for short holiday breaks in the UK and they loved dining out together.

Bish was a devoted and caring father and grandfather, delighting in the company of his son Charles and daughter Susan and their families, and he was especially pleased when his grandson Kiran decided to become a lawyer.

Although Bish was, as with everything else, knowledgeable about various sporting activities particularly Manchester United and Twenty Twenty cricket, he was not very interested in participating except when he played rugby in the army in the Himalayas.

The community in Sibford greatly misses both Bish and Erica who have been so much part of village life for over 25 years. Erica has gone to live in London to be near her son and daughter and the love, sympathy and good wishes of all who knew them here go with her and to her family.

Our September meeting was well attended and we were pleased to welcome back Liz Woolley as our speaker. Her topic for the evening was 'Child Labour in Oxfordshire in the 19th century.' Basing some of the research for her MSc on 'The place of the child in Victorian Britain', work done and pub-

lished by Dr Pamela Horn, she had studied, in detail, the effects of work and the working conditions for children in rural Oxfordshire during the 1800's. Many of the poorer families in the villages relied on the very small additional income from their working children to keep the family together and top up other meagre income in order to survive. Agricultural labour, domestic service, local workshops and cottage based industries such as glove making and pillow lace making all employed very young children who received little or no schooling at that time. Children were also employed in quarry work in the brick and stone fields, as errand boys and newspaper sellers, as climbing boys cleaning chimneys and in the Clarendon presses for Oxford University.

Legislation during the century very gradually reduced the working hours, improved the working conditions and increased the minimum age for employing children. It was not until 1870 that education for children less than 10 years of age became compulsory although children working half time in factories were still exempt.

A number of successive Factory Acts gradually reduced to working hours for children. The Mines Act in 1872 prohibited children under 12 from working underground and by 1873 the Agricultural Children's Act prevented children under 10 from working in mobile agricultural gangs while children under 8 were no longer permitted to work in agriculture at all. This, of course, was as paid employment – all children were expected to help their families at haymaking and harvest time. Life for many children

in 19th century was extremely tough, health was poor and education for most was very limited or non-existent.

At our next meeting on 21 October, Deborah Hayter will be talking on The Lost Villages of Oxfordshire – 8pm in the Village Hall – visitors are always welcome.

The data from the Groups and Organisations and Householder's surveys has now been entered onto the database and all the information collected on our designated Domesday, June 16, is now being entered. Currently the steering group are conducting a series of interviews of people who hold any kind of office within our community or who work in the villages eg headteachers, postmen etc. In addition, our final survey is to contact those who live in the villages and advertise their businesses in the Sibford Scene. The services offered in 2010 will contrast directly with those reported in the Stevens survey in 1877 which recorded farmers, agricultural labourers, a butcher, a baker, blacksmith, shoemaker, barber, cooper, carrier, wheelwright, carpenter, tailor, shopkeepers, etc.


