### Nature Notes

Oct 24th My son saw skein after skein of gulls flying south this afternoon. He thought they were flying as if they were on a long distance migration. Not knowing much about the habits of gulls we looked at a book which indicated that if they were on migration they were probably lesser black backed gulls.

Oct 28th What a year for apples. I have picked quite a lot mostly to store for feeding to birds in the winter. I found that almost every cluster of apples had ladybirds round the stalks which is not the safest place to hibernate as they are sure to end up on the ground.

Oct 30th A fallow deer crossed the road just in front of our car this morning. It was a good thing that I was going slowly because the dazzle from the low sun. It was about 100 yards west of Broomhill farm which seems to be a favourite crossing point.

Nov 6th Two buzzards have been feeding on the cultivated fields to the south and west of the Ferris for the last few days. They look bigger hopping about on the bare fields than they do in the air. A few people have remarked on their presence and tell me that they spend much of their time grooming which suggests that they could be late hatched ones that are still getting rid of their down.

Nov 12th My neighbour went outside at 11pm recently and a cock pheasant called from its roosting place and some more from both sides of the valley joined in the conversation. I expect they were passing on a warning that someone is about.




by Hook Norton WI. After an excellent lunch, Lt Col Gerald Lesinski, Master of the Lord Leycester Hospital, Warwick gave a brilliant talk and slide show. Later he judged the competition for 'A Photograph of a Mediaeval Building' and awarded the cup to Sibford WI for its entry of a view of the interior of the Great Barn, Swalcliffe. When the President welcomed the speaker, Adrian Williams, we had high hopes that his subject "Village Life in Malta" would be just as interesting as his previous talk on 'Monuments of London'. Unfortunately, this time last minute technical difficulties with the projector presented too many problems for him to give his talk. BUT all was not lost! This meeting's competition was "A Souvenir from Malta" and Adrian kindly agreed to judge the entries and where possible give us comments on some of them.

Contrary to expectations there were quite a number of entries including a silver filigree brooch, two pieces of Mdina glass, a framed picture of two Maltese buses, and a large old framed embroidered picture of flags, brought along by Kathy Yorke. The first prize was awarded to Valerie Curry for her pretty Maltese filigree brooch. The second prize went to Sue Nottingham for a delightful piece of Mdina which was a typical example of Maltese glass (Malta has an abundance of the right sort of sand!) Both Valerie and Sue gave brief descriptions of their Maltese holidays. Third prize was won by Gaynor Harper-Tarr for the 'bus picture'. Adrian said it was a true depiction and evoked memories of travelling with his wife in Malta ,although, at first, they had been somewhat disconcerted by the habit of the local Maltese inhabitants to cross themselves as soon as the driver switched on the engine. Adrian was intrigued by Kathy's embroidered picture, which she purchased from a London antique shop, and admitted he was "flummoxed" about its origin. He suggested that a little bit of research might be worthwhile! However, he did not include it in the judging as he felt that it was very much in a class of its own.

So, whilst we never did get to hear about "Village Life in Malta" everyone turned what could have been a disaster into an interesting, sociable afternoon culminating in very welcome tea and excellent cakes supplied by Norma Allen and Sue Nottingham.

Award-winning author, William Fiennes, passed on some secrets of the trade when he joined students at Sibford School for a writing workshop. William,

whose books include The Snow Geese and The Music Room, told pupils: "A lot of writing comes out of real life experiences, but it's the little unexpected details that bring things alive in the reader's eye."

The son of Lord and Lady Saye and Sele of nearby Broughton Castle, William was also at Sibford to undertake the official re-opening of the recently refurbished school library.

"A school library is like a treasure trove," he said. "It's a great resource ...

there are things in here that could really change your life."

He also revealed that the library, which was refurbished thanks to support from Sibford old scholars and the school's parent association, was the first thing he had ever opened.

"My father has been called upon to open numerous things," he said. "But this is the very first time I've been asked to open something so it really is something to celebrate."




Our last meeting was very well attended, lots of visitors came. It is always a pleasure to have Tim-

In a year when we have had a General Election and the formation of a Coalition Government it was fascinating to learn about the origins of our English Parliament from the 13th century during the reign of Henry III. Tim Porter, a medieval historian told us that in an English Government document

written in 1236 the first reference to parliament was recorded. At a time when the English, French and Scottish Kings were related to each other and their manner was to regard talking as better than fighting - a forum to talk (parle) was formed when the Bishops and Barons were invited to discuss the important issues of the day with the Kings Councillors to give the benefit of both their spiritual and regional knowledge. Henry III's rule was regulated by the Magna Carta and during his reign Simon de Monfort led the reforming Bishops and Barons forming the first Opposition Party. In 1258 the first record of Parliamentary expenses were paid to the Knights and Burghers who were summoned to the irregularly convened meetings of Parliament. Many mediators and fixers were required to prevent the breakdown of Parliament during its infancy. Later medieval parliaments developed and created new precedents. By 1376 the Commoners had become more powerful and appointed the first Speaker of the Commons. By 1388 Parliament had become the highest Court of Law in the land. Henry III became known as the father of the British Parliament.

Work continues on the Domesday project with data input and analysis and the website www.thesibfords.co.uk has generated several enquiries about the Sibfords and its history.

We look forward to our **Annual Social gathering on 27 January** - as this is our next meeting we would like to wish you all a happy time during the festive season.

Report of the Sibford Gower Parish Council Meeting. Thursday, 11th November 2010 Joint Parish Plan: Mrs Sue Mattinson brought the Meeting up to date with the progress that she and Richard Hartree have made with the Joint Parish Plan. Letters have gone out to all the organisations in this Parish and Sibford Ferris and a Launch Event, organised with Oxfordshire Rural Communities Council, is to take place in the Village Hall on 7th December 2010 starting at 7.30pm. Chairman's Report: It was agreed to participate in the Rural Run-a-bout Bus scheme (a travelling bus that provides free information and advice on grants, services etc in your village on set days), and in the 2-week loan to the village of a thermal camera to monitor heat loss on properties that wish it. The controversial new planning regime imposed by Cherwell Planning was discussed; neighbours will no longer be informed of planning applications, and publicity will be confined to one notice publicly placed by the applicant on the property. The parish council will continue to be informed of planning applications, but this will increasingly be on line and without paper plans; the clerk will be expected to respond with on line comments. It was agreed that this was a serious diminution of public participation in the planning process; the parish council will do its best to give appropriate publicity in the village to applications, by public notices and by informing individual neighbours, and will seek to monitor the unrolling of the new scheme. The PC was warned that a Revised Core Strategy Plan for the Cherwell area would appear in the New Year, and that it would probably take no notice of the previous response of the two Sibford PCs as a result of the joint Sibfords public planning meeting. It might be necessary to renew our comments then. Clerk's Report: There is still a problem with cars parked at the junction in Burdrop and complaints have been received from residents. The Clerk was instructed to advise Thames Valley Police of the registration numbers so that they may speak with the car owners informing them that their cars are illegally parked. Rural Exception Sites: The Quarterly Parish Council Progress Report had been received from Oxfordshire Rural Community Council with

regard to the search for suitable sites for Affordable Housing. Cherwell District Council had indicated a preference for three sites: Hook Norton Road (in the Parish of Sibford Ferris) and Hawkes Lane and High Meadow (in the Parish of Sibford Gower). Planning Matters: Since the previous Meeting only three planning applications had been received for consideration and three planning decisions received. Highway Matters: Cllr Gilian Soden referred to the poor condition of sections of the road surface leading from Hawkes Lane to the Doctors' Surgery. Cllr Oswyn Murray said that a similar situation exists in Temple Mill Road. The Clerk was instructed to take matters forward with Oxfordshire Highways. Burial Ground: The matter of the stone wall which divides the very old churchyard and the new burial ground was discussed. The church had requested that the wall be taken down and the stone used to repair a wall at the other side of the very old churchyard. Churchyard: No matters were raised but the opportunity was taken to thank Mr Cedric Brown (present at the Meeting) for maintaining it to a very satisfactory standard.. Concessionary Bus Passes: Notification had been received that a new single scheme will replace the existing five different schemes operated by each of the City and District Councils. In preparation for this, the County Council is now consulting on the details of the scheme. These details will be displayed on the Parish Council's and Village Hall's notice boards and be published in the next issue of the Sibford Scene. The consultation closes on 14th December 2010. Public Participation: A member of the Public, present at the Meeting, referred to the dropping

water level in the Village Pond and the matter will be investigated. The Next Meeting will be on Thursday, 13th January 2011.
