Nature Notes

Mar 28th. My granddaughter disturbed a buzzard that flew up from the ground carrying what looked to her like a rat which it dropped as it went away. Later as she went back past the spot she found that it was still where it had dropped and it was actually a rabbit. I was surprised that the buzzard had not been back for it. Apr 2nd. The female blackcap that has been a regular visitor to our bird table has now stopped coming as has a male one that has been visiting another bird table in the Ferris so I expect they have moved north. We should soon be having the song of the ones that come from the south to nest here.

Apr 4th. I hear that there were four swallows at Wigginton today which is very early.

Apr 7th. Two swallows were seen in Sibford Ferris parish today.

Apr 8th. A red kite was flying over the Friends School today.

Apr 10th. Some young blackbirds are hopping around our garden looking like very easy meals for cats. The recent warm sunny days have brought out quite a good selection of butterflies. Those seen, but not all by me, include brimstone, small tortoiseshell comma, and peacock that have over wintered; holly blue, orange tip, and speckled wood that have emerged this spring and a painted lady which will have migrated north and was photographed in the Ferris. This was the first recorded in the Berks Bucks and Oxon area this year.

Apr 11th. I was told that there was a dead heron on Folly Farm and went to look at it. It had a break near the tip of one wing which would have made flight impossible and it probably starved to death. I wondered whether it could have flown into the electric cables that pass over that field to Folly Farmhouse. A group of house martins was seen over the village this evening.

Apr 16th. Four wheatears were seen near the Old Grange today. As there are more spring sown crops this year it should be easier to spot them as they move through to nest on the hills further north, although about forty years ago a pair did stay and nest at Field Barn.

Apr 20th. It may be easier to spot birds but the spring sown crops are certainly suffering in this dry weather. I have only measured half an inch of rain since the beginning of March, which is about an eighth of normal and none is forecast for the next few days.



SIBFORD SCHOOL INSTALLS SOLAR PANELS

Sibford School has installed 50 solar panels onto the roofs of some its sunniest classrooms. The 9KwH photovoltaic panels will help the school to cut down on electricity bills and will also feed power into the National Grid. The move is part of the school's on-going commitment to-

wards sustainability ... Sibford is already a member of the Eco Schools campaign and is entitled to fly the prestigious Green Flag. Sibford head, Michael Goodwin, said: "Since being award the Eco School's top award of Green Flag status in 2010, we have continued to look at ways of cutting our carbon footprint. "Installation of solar panels was an obvious step forward. Not only do they help us generate our own electricity but they also come with a special display so that our pupils can see real time data on how the system is performing." The panels were installed in February half term and already the school has generated more than 1,100 kwh of power. Cost of the installation was £30,000 but, through the Government 'Feed-in-Tariff', the school can expect pay back in less than 10 years.

PAPER CRANES RAISE FUNDS FOR JAPANESE EARTHQUAKE APPEAL

Pupils at Sibford School are hoping to make 1,000 origami paper cranes in a bid to raise money for the Japanese earthquake appeal. The school is currently home to three Japanese students ~ sisters Mariko, Aiko and Yuriko Fukuda. And fellow pupils decided to show their solidarity by organising the fund raising initiative, which grew from the regular lunchtime origami club. Teacher Derek Bottomley, who runs the club, said: "The Thousand Origami Cranes became a symbol of world peace through the story of Sadako Saski, a Japanese girl who was struck down with leukemia as a result of radiation from the atomic bombing of Hiroshima during World War II.

"The story goes that she tried to stave off her death by making 1,000 origami cranes. Unfortunately, she only managed to fold 644, but her friends completed the number and buried them with her. Since then, the paper crane has become a symbol of peace, so it seemed an appropriate thing to create to help the disaster appeal."

Pupils hope to raise £1,000 by selling the cranes for £1 each ... and have already received an order

We attended the meeting at Sibford Church on March 30th to which all villagers were invited, one of the purposes of which was to share the financial plight of the church funds as they currently stand. As with many such situations there is a need to adddress two elements, the expenditure and the income streams. The latter is being considered by a working group who will present its thoughts to the next PCC meeting as I understand it and it will be interesting to see what they come up with.

It would be good to see a minimum level of ring-fenced reserves (£20k?) reached if at all possible so that there are always some funds available for unexpected costs which are inevitable for such buildings.

One point which was made though which was very dismaying is that Sibford Ferris PCC will not contribute to the upkeep of the bulk of the churchyard. We were told that the new area of the graveyard is shared between the two PCCs but that the rest is not. Could someone please explain the thinking behind this because on the face of it this is an unfair situation? The church is after all for all the community and to hold this position seems bizarre.

The Sibfords Community Plan: Progress to date will be contained in the next Newsletter to be distributed in April. Chairman's Report: The Chairman reported that there had been no developments in respect of possible usages for the Miriam Tebbs' Land, including garden facilities for any future Affordable Housing development on the District Council owned land to the right of the 'Piggy' path. Cty & District Cllr George Reynolds has the matter before him and he will also investigate whether permission might be given for use as allotments of the same piece of District Council owned land. At the Chairman's invitation, Cllr George Reynolds updated the Meeting on the progress so far with the Localism Plan which will abolish the SE Plan and which is expected to receive Royal Assent in the Autumn. Village Website: The Parish Council will consider the inclusion of a page on the Village Website. Planning Matters: Since the previous Meeting, the Parish Council had considered four planning applications. Highway Matters: On 8th February 2011, the Chairman and the Clerk had site meetings with Mr Simon Marsden of Oxfordshire Highways in respect of (1) The narrowness and slope of the kerb at the junction of Pound Lane/Main Street create a hazard for those using mobility vehicles and this was demonstrated by local resident, Mr Alf Mullis, who was present. (2) Cars parked at the edge of the pond cause a problem for passing vehicles especially the large ones (including milk tankers) that serve the nearby farm. Subsequently, 'Keep Clear' signs have been marked on the road immediately adjacent to the pond and these, so far, appear to be effective. (3) With regard to the very poor condition of the road from Hawkes Lane to the Surgery, Mr Marsden said that he had already applied for capital funding to enable repair work to be carried out. In the meantime, he will arrange for patching work. Footpath Matters: With regard to the footpath between Backside Lane and Main Street, the stone wall of a property adjacent to part of it is in a state of collapse. The Clerk was instructed to speak with the property owners requesting that repair work be carried out. Village Pond: A Land Registry search revealed that there is no owner of the Village Pond. The Clerk was instructed to make enquiries as to the cost of registering ownership by the Parish Council. Once this is known, a decision will be taken as whether or not to proceed. Holy Trinity Churchyard: An explanatory notice will appear in the next issue of the Sibford Scene in respect of the increase in the Precept for 2011/2012 to cover the estimated sum of £3,000 to pay for Churchyard maintenance. Annual Parish Meeting: This will be held in Sibford Village Hall on Thursday, 12th May 2011 starting at 7.30pm. Public Participation: A local resident, present at the Meeting, raised two matters. (1) Speeding traffic along Colony Road and Pound Lane - he asked that the Police be requested to carry our camera speed checks especially at school arrival and departure times. Another resident asked that this should also be carried out in Burdrop. The Clerk was instructed to liaise with Thames Valley Police and also write to Sibford School, Sibford Ferris asking whether it would consider seeking parents' co-operation in slower driving through the villages. (2) The possibility of the installation of a mirror at the junction of Backside Lane/Pound Lane for the benefit of motorists exiting Backside Lane. The Clerk was instructed to make enquiries of Oxfordshire Highways.

At our April meeting the Master of The Lord Leycester Hospital in Warwick gave us a most entertaining and informative talk about the medieval buildings which have comprised the united Guilds of Warwick for over 400 years. Parts of these buildings now provide homes for ex-servicemen who live there cost free but who work to help run

the 'Hospital' on a day to day basis by acting as guides to the visiting public who provide the income to maintain the charity which runs the Hospital.

Robert Dudley, Earl of Leycester, set up the Hospital for injured soldiers, during the reign of Queen Elizabeth I. Originally, there were 12 Brethren managed by The Master who then was a priest. They were each given a silver badge to wear on their black uniform and these are still proudly worn today by the 8 Brethren. We were able to handle one of these invaluable tokens made in the shape of the bear and ragged staff which is still the well known emblem for Warwick today. Each badge was surmounted by a solid silver coronet – such a thrill to hold something also held and presented by the first Queen Elizabeth. The Brethren continue to be managed by The Master, who is no longer a priest, but he continues the custom and leads them in prayer in St James' Chapel every morning at 9.30 am (except Monday).

Beauty of the Environment

The Sibfords are beautiful and this enhances the quality of life which we experience here. This no doubt is clear to the Sibford Community Planners.

Ivy on trees is blighting this. It is very resilient to pollution which may account for its current dominance.

Apart from its ugliness and invasiveness, it endangers the life of trees. When it covers 80% of a tree, the tree struggles for life and its growth is held back. When it reaches the crown the tree will slowly die.

There are few enough beautiful mature trees in the area and we need to take care of them - they can't be replaced easily - little trees planted now wont be fully grown until most of us are dead.

Some people say that ivy is good for birds, but trees are better - they house the great variety of insects etc which birds need.

In winter we get most wind and the ivy acts as a sail when the leaves are off and trees are not built to withstand that sort of stress in winter. Hence large branches are broken off because of the ivy.

Ivy can be gradually killed by cutting out a section about a foot long from the main stems as near to the ground as possible. Knowing how busy farmers are, I am offering to cut the ivy from their trees for them. Please ring 788398. If anyone wants to help me that would be great.
