Nature Notes

Apr 22nd. It is not long since our wintering blackcaps left but already others that have come from the south to nest here are singing.

Apr 23rd. Cockchafers (may bugs) are already coming into the house. It seems to be very early for them to emerge. I saw a cat pop into a garden and come back with a young robin from a nest. I think it heard them chirrup when a parent came with food.

Apr 25th. A cuckoo was heard near Traitors Ford today.

Apr 26th. A bumble bees nest was dug out by a badger from our wild flower patch last night. There were still a few bees among some dead leaves so they may have made use of an old nest made by mice or voles.

May 4th. A badger has dug out another bumble bees nest only a few yards from the first one. I expect that with this drought worms and slugs or, indeed, any food is in short supply for the huge population of badgers that we now have in this area, making it more likely that they will seek out the nests of ground nesting birds and bumble bees. I find it strange that in TV and radio programmes when the decline in the wild bee population is discussed I have not heard anyone suggest that badgers might be one of the causes. If they search out nests everywhere like they do in our garden they could well be the main cause. Looking on the bright side there are still quite a few bumble bees around so they have not found them all.

May 8th. Over an inch of rain has fallen over the last two days. Prior to that I had only measured two thirds of an inch in more than 9 weeks. It has given the crops in the fields and gardens a boost but the forecast is dry again for the south east of the country.

May 11th. A pair of partridges got up in front of us this afternoon. The first I have seen for a year or more. I did not see any young ones but as they did not

A little later our neighbour rang to say that they had seen one which could have been the same one or another of the same litter.

May 17th. My son has seen goldfinches pecking at the mortar in an old brick wall on several occasions recently. I suppose they must be finding insects or grubs for their young ones but that is only a guess as the goldfinch adult is a seed eater.

May 19th. A red kite was seen over Sibford Ferris today.

Local Co-ordinator required - Oil bulk buying scheme

Oxfordshire Rural Community Council (ORCC) have recently established a community buying scheme to help purchasers of domestic heating oil to make savings, by buying in bulk and allowing community oil buying groups to make the most of their collective purchasing power.

Members pay an annual £20 fee to join the scheme. The ORCC continuously shop around to get the best price. Once a month, the local co-ordinator will advise the ORCC of any local members wanting to order oil. The ORCC will then advise the co-ordinator of delivery times and price.

People join the scheme by paying their annual fee directly to the ORCC.

The local co-ordinator will:

- Ask members each month if they want to order oil and how much
- Contact the ORCC by the 1st of each month, to advise how many people want to order
- The ORCC will advise when deliveries will be made in the month. The local co-ordinator will then advise the members of this information. *The next month, it happens all over again!*

The local co-ordinator does NOT have to:

 Negotiate prices, handle money get involved in problems between oil supplier and customer

The local co-ordinator does have to:

 Be organised and reliable, with access to a computer/email.

WI Spring Group Meeting

On the evening of 28th April, Sibford WI hosted the Spring Group Meeting with representatives from Bloxham, Cropredy, Hook Norton and Shutford. Barbara Gray who is on the Board of Trustees, Oxfordshire Federation, attended with Peggy Mumby, the Group Convenor, making a total of over seventy. The Village Hall was beautifully decorated in a pink and cream theme with flower arrangements created by Val Powell and Glennis Hardman. An amazing selection of finger food was baked for the buffet supper by Sibford Members. The title of retired Lt Col. Malcolm Torrent' talk was "The Trumpets Shall Sound" and he began by playing not one but two fanfares. After al1, this was the Eve of the Royal Wedding! The first was by Sir Arthur Bliss, the second was the fanfare which was to be played by the Royal Airforce the next day. These certainly grabbed our attention and he continued to do so with anecdotes of his army career which began when he was fifteen. It was during training at the Royal School of Music, Kneller Hall that he had learned to play the trumpet (and fanfares) and interspersed with his stories he demonstrated many of the other techniques and skills he had mastered. He had often taken part in Royal ceremonies, the first of which was the investiture of Prince Charles as Prince of Wales, and we were treated to a vivid description of the challenges of blowing a trumpet on an exposed castle battlement in a howling wind. He went on to serve several years in Germany, with the Royal Artillery, the Kings Own Royal Border Regiment, the Adjutant General Corps and the Band of the Life Guards. For this he had to confess that his riding experience was limited to donkey riding on Weymouth beach! Therefore, not only did he have to learn how to get dressed correctly in the full ceremonial regalia but also how to ride a horse. He successfully conjured up in all of us a picture of him practising wearing his Life Guards helmet whilst watching TV at home. He brilliantly described the difficulty of riding "eyes right" with chinstrap under nose, holding reins in left hand whilst reading music and playing the cornet with his right hand. He had us wincing at the thought of having to sit on a horse from 8.15am until 3.45pm during the Lord Mayor's Show. He told us what happened to the piccolo player who dropped his piccolo during a parade. We listened to Handel's "Where E'er You Walk" "Misty" and finally the "Post-Horn

Gallop" which he performed (on foot!) whilst playing the handsome silver post-horn presented to him upon his retirement as Director of Music with the Band of the Royal Artillery. The volume of the two Fanfares at the beginning of the evening was challenged by the laughter during and the applause at the end of a very funny unforgettable evening.

By the 19th century many customs had been handed down by word of mouth to communities in many Oxfordshire villages from 'Time out of Mind'. Our speaker, Shaun Morley, described, in amusing detail, some of the elaborate and unusual rituals which were observed by the customary calendar during the 1800's. Many of these were related to the agricultural year beginning after Epiphany with the celebration of

Christmas and ending, some ten months later, with the gathering of the harvest in the autumn. Many of the customs involved the coming together of the community for a celebration and a well-earned holiday from their agricultural labours. The procession led by the village band, feasting, church service and fair on Sibford Club Day on the first Monday in June every year was a good example of how the Sibfords celebrated in a customary way.

Custom was often used to control behaviour in a community and 'Rough Music' was often inflicted on persons who were seen to be contradicting the acceptable code of behaviour at that time. Villagers would collect household items capable of making a noise and gather together outside the house of the offender and make as much noise as possible to draw attention to the behaviour they saw as unacceptable. This treatment was feared and became the custom by which villagers administered their own form of justice. However, by the end of the century laws and legislation were introduced which removed these customary rights. We might question today the effectiveness of these two very different systems!

Report of Sibford Gower Annual Parish Meeting held in Sibford Village Hall on Thursday, 12th May 2011

Present: Parish Councillors Peter Abbott, Roger Alder, Oswyn Murray (Chairman), Alan Parkin and Gilian Soden. Peter Hardman (Clerk and Responsible Finance Officer). County & District Cllr George Reynolds (who joined the Meeting at a later stage having attended another meeting elsewhere), Louise Wilson (Oxfordshire County Council Highways & Transport). PC Rebecca McLeod (Thames Valley Police Neighbourhood Specialist Officer). Twenty local residents including Jean White (The Town Estates Charity), Mollie Mulley (Neighbourhood Watch), Muriel Chandler (Sibford Village Hall Committee) and Sue Mattinson (The Sibfords Community Plan).

Thames Valley Police Matters: Police Constable Rebecca McLeod attended the Meeting and provided information regarding the team, of which she is a member, responsible for the welfare of the area of which the Parish forms part. The matter of speeding through roads in the Gower and Burdrop was raised and PC McLeod outlined the way forward in holding speed checks might be considered. It was thought that this subject would perhaps be suitable for the Traffic, Roads and Footpath/Bridleway Network Group - part of the Sibfords Community Plan. The Clerk will liaise with Mrs Sue Mattinson in this regard. Highway & Footpath Matters: Mrs Louise Wilson, Senior Technician, Oxford County Council Highways and Transport set out the current make-up of the Highways Team of which she is part. She provided a chart showing how the team is made up and setting out their particular responsibilities. Not unexpectedly, she referred to the continuing financial constraints on the team but every endeavour is made to deal with complaints and matters raised by the public. She said that residents are always invited to direct complaints and matters to the Highways Team and contact details are given below this report. The Chairman invited questions and comments from the Meeting and Mr Fred Inns raised the matter of potholes in the roads which appear not to have attention. Mrs Wilson assured the Meeting that every complaint received in this regard has attention but very much, because of the financial constraints, on a priority basis. She went on to say that every road is inspected each year checking where remedial work is required. The Chairman expressed the Meeting's thanks to Mrs Wilson for her contribution and also said the Parish Council was grateful for the 'Keep Clear' signs on the road adjacent to the Village Pond and also for the kerbing of the pond. Chairman's Report: The Chairman thanked everyone present for attending the Meeting. He referred to the change of Parish Councillors since the last Meeting with Gilian Soden, Roger Alder and Alan Parkin taking the places of Muriel Chandler, Martin Layer and Robin Spicer and he very much appreciated the contributions that had been and are made in the work of the Parish Council. He was very much of the opinion that change from time to time is of benefit. He also thanked the Clerk for carrying out his duties. He spoke of the work of the Parish Council during the year and of matters affecting both the Gower and Burdrop. Mr Fred Inns questioned the value of including in this year's precept the sum of £1,000 to assist with expenditure in respect of The Sibfords Community Plan. (Sibford Ferris Parish Council will provide a similar amount). The Chairman set out the purposes of the Plan, one which is that the District Council will react more favourably to those Parishes which can demonstrate that a Plan is in place involving all sections of the Community. Mrs Sue Mattinson pointed out that the £1,000 will cover at least a two year period and expenditure will be kept to an absolute minimum. Clerk's and Financial Report: The Council's Financial Accounts for the year ended 31st March 2011 have been completed and are presently with the Internal Examiner (to whom thanks are extended for once again carrying out the role) and then will be submitted to the External Auditor. The Clerk gave details of the current financial situation. All financial details are freely available to residents from the Clerk upon request (Tel: 780391). Report by The Town Estate Charity: Mrs Jean White (Secretary to The Town Estate Charity) set out current information regarding the Charity. Report by The Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator: Mrs Mollie Mulley presented the report on behalf of the Neighbourhood Watch. Sibford Village Hall Report: This year's Report was presented by Muriel Chandler. The Sibfords Community

Plan: Mrs Sue Mattinson (Secretary to The Steering Group) reported the current situation and residents are kept fully informed by periodic newsletters that are distributed and information on the Website. Any Other Business: Mrs Jean White asked whether details of planning applications received for consideration by the Parish Council might be included in the Parish Council Meeting reports published in the Sibford Scene. The Chairman agreed to this and they will also be set out on the Parish Council's website. Mrs Kathy Yorke enquired concerning the current situation of The Bishop Blaize. Mrs Eileen Haynes (Bishop Blaize Support Group) said that the Pub is still advertised for sale at a totally unrealistic price leading to the view that another approach will be made to convert from Licenced to Private use. The Support Group continues to keep a watchful eye on the situation. Mr Fred Inns again raised the matter of potholes in the roads and he was assured that every situation reported to the Parish Council is passed to Oxfordshire Highways and continues to be monitored until remedial work is carried out. However, there is not a lot that the Parish Council can do to expedite such work as every case is considered by Oxfordshire Highways on a priority basis. The Chairman urged those raising matters with the Parish Council to also personally contact Oxfordshire Highways to add a certain amount of pressure.

There being no further business to discuss, the Chairman again thanked all present for attending and declared the Meeting closed at 9.35pm.

In defence of Ivy

Before anyone starts hacking ivy off trees I would suggest reading the article called "IVY-FRIEND OR FOE?" which can be found at the website www.arborecology.co.uk in the articles section. This provides a balanced view on the issue of ivy on trees. Some of the key points are as follows.

- □ Ivy is not parasitic and does not directly affect the health of the trees it climbs.
 □ A heavy infestation of ivy is likely to be a sign that the tree is in a natural state of decline.
 □ Ivy provides shelter for birds and their nests and roosting sites for bats.
 □ In Autumn the flowers are an important source of nectar and pollen for bees and
- many other insects.

 The berries which ripen in March/April have a high fat content and are an invaluable energy source for many species of birds.
- Many species of invertebrate live in ivy and some feed on it directly. These invertebrates themselves are an important food sources for many other species.

The removal of ivy from trees may be considered desirable in parks and gardens but this does not mean that it is always appropriate in the countryside.

It should also be noted that it is an offence to damage or destroy a breeding site or resting place of any bat and it does not require the offence to be intentional or deliberate.
