





Despite the variable weather, we love the summer term here at Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School. The slight easing of restrictions has allowed us to re-start our after school football and netball clubs and children in KS2 and the children are starting to use the Big Field at lunchtimes as well as for P.E lessons and Forest School. We are so fortunate to have such a wonderful space where the children can spread out as they play.

The children have been enjoying our thematic approach to learning. The younger children in Acorn and Beech classes are exploring the theme of The Enchanted Woodland and have spent some time exploring the trees in the Millennium Wood. They used rolls of paper to measure and compare the circumference of tree trunks and were encouraged to notice and describe the differences between trees, the shades and shapes of leaves, the texture of the bark, whether they are deciduous or "forevergreen" and so on. They made tree bark rubbings and have been learning the names of the different trees. There are so many changes and details in Nature for the children to notice, explore and learn about and our focus on outdoor learning develops our young learners in all sorts of positive ways. They show a real interest in, and care for, our natural environment.

Willow Class children, Years 3 & 4, are exploring the theme of Mighty Metals. As part of this, they have been exploring 'The Iron Man' by Ted Hughes as their 'class book' this half-term. This text is a rich resource for learning and the children have used it to develop their understanding of characterisation and enrich their vocabulary. It is also a very 'good read' and a story that we are sure the children will remember into adulthood.

The children explored pencil technique in creating their own drawings of the Iron Man.

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SUNDAY SMALLHOLDING

April was bitterly cold and dry, and seeds required watering daily. May however, has been quite the opposite, warmer but with hardly a day without rain. One expects winter to be an uncomfortable time to be a smallholder, but not May! I have found the return to muddy animal pens, milking in the wind and rain, the struggle to get the mower out and young plants in, hang washing out, bring washing in, jumper on, jumper off, and worrying about young fledglings in wet nests, decidedly depressing and there seems little sign of improvement.

As the flowers emerge on the blackcurrant bushes I note the bottle of 2020 syrup is almost empty. I use it sparingly but it cannot go on forever. My dwindling supplies of 2020 harvest include tomato and basil sauce, butternut squash and carrots. The seemingly never-ending supply of spinach in the veg plot has finally faded to a pale green and is sending up seed heads. I have started digging it up, putting some in the freezer and delighting the chickens when another plant full of leaves lands at their feet. The rain this month has helped to bring on my vegetables and in particular the four patches of spuds; I eagerly await the first digging of Charlotte new potatoes in June. To be perfectly honest the restricted diet I have currently is becoming tedious, but that is reflective of a life of self-sufficiency as opposed to a ridiculous amount of choice on a supermarket shelf. I'm making and eating more bread than I should; it's good that I like poached eggs on toast!

As a treat, I bought a rib of beef from Carol Beasley in Oxhill. She has a couple of Dexter cows and sells the meat locally. The cooking was a period of anxiety and stress but it was the first beef I have eaten since September and honestly, the BEST I have EVER tasted! The family joined me for Sunday lunch, their vegetables having been bought in as my supplies are so low. I was happy with my beef, carrots and spinach! Rhubarb has successfully completed the year with the last frozen supplies being overtaken by this year's delicious young stalks. It was rhubarb for dessert yesterday and when I finish writing this, I will be harvesting some more to make 2021 syrup.

SUNEDAY SMALLHOLDING

Goats

Belinda and Beryl were born on 30th April to Rosie Red Collar. Two good strong goat kids quickly set about finding their mother's milk but both decided to drink only from Rosie's left teat. This is very likely due to the humongous size of the right one! I am therefore having to milk Rosie's right side until the kids are large enough to tackle it themselves. Luckily I have an extra mouth to feed by way of Boris, a British Alpine kid donated to me by a local goat milk farm. Boris was born on the 2nd May which makes him, at time of writing, just over two weeks old. As he is being bottle fed (and because of the dreadful weather), he spent his first week partly with the other goats and partly in the house, getting lots of cuddles, sleeping in the dog crate and following anything that moved. He has now joined the other goats permanently and seems very happy. He will follow in Alan's footsteps and will hopefully become my second pack goat.

Pigs

There are two new pigs on the block! A black Berkshire female (Betty) and a white Gloucester Old Spot male (Gus). These young pigs have come from a farm in Cherington. In time, and with careful handling, Betty will hopefully become my second sow. These pigs are not pedigree animals but cross breeds. When I started with the pigs I thought it would be important to preserve the rare breed status of one of our native breeds; the Oxford Sandy and Black. However, keeping a rare breed has its problems, one of which is finding a pedigree boar. Over the last four years I have had limited success with artificial insemination and without my own trailer, collecting and returning boars has not been easy. It does not make financial sense to keep a boar all year round for just two sows. Cross bred boars can be found more locally and the registration process for them as opposed to pedigree is vastly easier and far less expensive. Meanwhile, Washington is booked in with the abattoir on 27th May. Esme is not pregnant and her future is undecided.

SUNEDAY SMALLHOLDING

Chickens

Bertie Morley has had two incubators working at her home over the past month. The first successfully hatched 5 out of 7 chicks and the second is hatching as I type! The egg round continues with Alan carrying 126 eggs into the village every Friday morning...except last Friday (due to the awful weather), when I whizzed them around in the car. So far...no broken eggs!

Dawn Chorus

On the third attempt (due to the awful weather), ten villagers met up with Iain Brown at 0430 for the Dawn Chorus walk. It was a lovely morning, starting with very little wind and mainly clear skies. Robins and Blackbirds sang as people arrived, but just prior to this, at about 0420 Wendy Wealsby heard the male cuckoo calling. I missed it as I had popped back inside to use the loo! Luckily we all had another opportunity to hear it as one called again at around 0600. Examples of other birds heard were the all year round residents; Great Tit, Blue Tit, Long Tailed Tit, Bullfinch, Chaffinch, and Dunnock. The Wren stood out not only because, for one of our smallest birds it has the loudest and arguably most striking song, but the fact that there was one singing at every point on our walk. Song Thrushes were also notable for their abundance and in fact were heard more during the morning than blackbirds, probably due to the latter which, being early nesters, were busy feeding their young. Iain picked out the song of a Mistle Thrush singing somewhere near Gibraltar Quarry and Goldcrests were heard at Temple Mill singing their very high pitched 'jangling keys' song above the din of the rookery. Warblers, which, along with the cuckoo, have migrated here to breed, included Blackcaps, Willow Warblers and Chiffchaffs. A Raven, Red Kite and a Herring Gull featured as the largest of the morning's birds. My thanks to Iain for leading the walk and, for anyone still not sure of the Wren's song, please pop back for another listen.



DID YOU KNOW?

SIBFORD PRIMARY SCHOOL HEAD STARTS BISCUIT BUSINESS

Joseph Huntley was born in 1775. His father, Thomas Huntley, was a Quaker school master in Burford and Joseph followed his father into teaching and was appointed Headteacher at Sibford Gower Endowed School. However, Joseph who had lived in Sibford Ferris with his wife Mary, left Sibford Primary School in 1811 and moved to Reading with his young family. He opened his own private school which was not very successful due to Joseph's inability to manage his financial affairs very well. In 1817 he sent his eldest son, Thomas to be apprenticed to a grocer and to learn the baking trade from an uncle. In 1822,




Joseph opened a baker's shop on London Road, Reading, and he and the newly qualified Thomas ran the shop. The bakery, at 72 London Road, was opposite The Crown Inn, a posting inn for those travelling from London via Bristol to the South West.

The food at the inn was poor and expensive so, in addition to local trade, Thomas successfully sold biscuits and baked goods to travellers making the stop in Reading. Thomas soon sent a boy carrying a basket of wares to meet each arriving horse drawn coach. Once passengers reached their destinations, they often asked their own local grocers to order and stock Huntley's goods so they soon enjoyed a thriving and growing market.

Thomas had a younger brother, Joseph who, following an apprenticeship with a Quaker ironmonger and tin plate worker in Reading, set up a separate business manufacturing tins near to the bakery. To keep the biscuits fresh and whole for delivery across the South East, Joseph was able to supply the tins keeping business in the family.

In 1829 Thomas, became a partner in the business and he and his father traded as Huntley and Son until Joseph Senior retired in 1838. In 1841 Thomas, who was very conscientious but lacked the drive to run a successful business joined with a fellow Quaker, and cousin by marriage, George Palmer, to form the successful biscuit company Huntley and Palmer.

SIBFORD FERRIS PARISH COUNCIL

Community Speedwatch

The Parish Council has been contacted by a number of parishioners in relation to concerns about speeding in the village and on the road between Sibford Ferris and Sibford Gower. The Parish Council sought guidance from Oxfordshire County Council about what options are available to us (full details of the response can be found in the minutes of the 5th May meeting) and it appeared that the options are limited, costly and with limited likely benefit. Due to this the Parish Council have decided that the best option initially is to run a Community Speedwatch Scheme in conjunction with Thames Valley Police. Taking part in the scheme would provide us with data that can help identify the level of speeding issues in the village informing future plans for speed reduction whilst also educating and encouraging drivers to drive sensibly. Hook Norton Road development

We have identified a number of potential anomalies with the Section 106 Funding Agreement that was produced to support the Hook Norton Road Development.

Through our District Councillor we have asked to review the agreement and understand the consultation process that was undertaken, the concept behind fund allocation and how if anomalies are identified these can be corrected. We will provide an update to parishioners when clarification has been obtained.

Please note the article about the S106 monies published in the May 2021 edition of the Sibford Scene was not written by the Parish Council or any of the current councillors.

Gade Homes have now erected fencing around the site in preparation for future works. Parishioners have previously used an informal path around the edge of the field but as this is now private land and will eventually become a building site with the associated health and safety risks we have been asked to remind parishioners that they should no longer access the site without the prior permission of Gade Homes.



HORTI SOCIETY

The Horti Spring Show couldn't go ahead this year, but the Horti will hold a virtual flower show on the Sibford website, rather like last year's Chelsea in Sibford. This year we welcome both flowering and non-flowering plants the deadline for entries is **midnight on Friday 18th June**. It is the most perfectly preserved William Kent designed garden in England and a haven of unspoiled tranquility and loveliness. The house is still inhabited by the Dormer family for whom it was built in 1635. We will be leaving the village hall at 4.00pm, the cost of entry is £8.00 a head. As we are arriving after closing time, we will have the run of the gardens to ourselves. If you would like to take a picnic tea or something stronger to imbibe, then by all means do so, but **NB, THERE ARE NO LOOS OR TEA ROOMS AT ROUSHAM**. In Your Garden - June

This Spring has been the coldest for many years, and all our gardens suffered - we were pretty fed up too. Many plants have been frosted, and growth is about three weeks later than usual. I give many of my perennials the Chelsea Chop in May, but the miserable looking things were still whimpering in the cold, so I have put it off until they have made enough growth. Now, after all this rain they have started to shoot up, so the first job to be done is to stake everything, to stop it flopping.

1. Annuals can be sown now in neatly raked soil, to fill any spaces in the borders, and to fill up the picking border. I particularly love cosmos, in rich colours, poppies, and malopes, and cornflowers..

2. The tulips are going over. You can carefully lift them, shake off the soil and put them to dry in a cool, dark place. Then replant them in November. I like to fill up their space with small sparkling dahlias, who fill the place with colour in August and September. Remember to label the tulips, or like me, you might not remember which colour they were.

3. It is warm enough now to get on with planting urns, pots and hanging baskets. (I don't actually do hanging baskets any more, as John was prone to knocking himself out on them, and I found them a bit of a faff to keep watering.) But don't let me put you off!

4...Do not put the hoe away. Still keep going at the weeds. Never stop.

5. Watch out now for blackspot, and spray your roses. Also greenfly and whitefly, and keep a constant eye out for lily beetle. If plant pots suddenly flag, and you have been watering them properly, turn them upside down and check for vine weevil. Quite fun to squidge.

6. Tomatoes can now go into the final pots, and side shoots must be pinched off. Early potatoes will need earthing up.

7. Lawns are growing like mad, and need cutting regularly. Lower the cutting blade down. And always trim the edges.

8. Beans, lettuces, carrots can all be sown, and frequent small sowings of lettuces and radishes will keep you supplied all summer. Put pots of basil in the sunniest place near the back door, or even on the kitchen windowsill.

9. Hellebore seeds will be ready to collect, and they do not like being stored, so sow them now, in seed trays, and pop them into the back of the cold frame. Forget them, and then have a nice surprise when they emerge in the spring. Aha! Did you forget to label them?

10. June can be such a glorious month; roses romp away, so keep tying in new growth, help the clematis and sweet peas to climb up their supports by tying in shoots, and take time off to dream, on a rug, in the sun, with a hamper perhaps

SIBFORD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Our last Zoom talk for 2021 will be delivered by Stephen Barker on 17th June at 8p.m.

He worked with Banbury Museum and Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum. Stephen has delivered projects for the University of Oxford, Oxford Brookes University and the Battlefields Trust. He gives presentations and organises tours related to the First World War and the British Civil Wars.

'Soldiers, Saints and Sinners - Oxfordshire characters from the British Civil War, 1642 -51.' Oxfordshire played a significant part in the First Civil War - Oxford became the Royalist Capital in late 1642, and the country was on the frontline with parliamentary Buckinghamshire. This participation has left a legacy of wonderful stories and fascinating characters, many associated with local Oxfordshire communities. The talk is fully illustrated, is replete with anecdotes, character studies and tales of daring do!

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PILATES IN SIBFORD

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NATURE NOTES

On 16th April we spotted a group of 7 Roe Deer in the valley between the villages.

On 17th April, in the sunny weather, I was surprised at how many different species of bee were visiting the gooseberry and red currant flowers in our garden. I did manage to identify one species – a Tawny Mining Bee where the females are a distinctive shiny ginger colour.

On the same day a number of Blackbird fledglings appeared in the garden begging for food from the adults.

Both Colin Lamb and Fiona Pidgeon reported seeing Orange-tip and Holly Blue butterflies towards the end of April. Fiona also spotted a Swallow around the 19th and managed to get a photo of a couple of them a few days later. Both Swallows and Swifts are now being reported fairly regularly in the area.

I have heard that Hares have been seen boxing in the local fields.

In the Sibford school tree planting area Megan Gilkes found an attractive plant which neither us could name. It turned out to be Meadow Saxifrage.

There are Kestrels nesting in the area which is good to hear and hopefully they will join the Tawny Owls in keeping the mouse population under control. Colin Lamb managed to get a good photo of the pair mating.
