

SIBFORD ACTION GROUP

The Sibford Action Group (SAG) was set up to help residents of Sibford Ferris, Sibford Gower and Burdrop receive information about inappropriate and unsustainable developments that go against the Sibfords' Community Plan.

Please email sibfordactiongroup@gmail.com if you would like to be included on our email list. At present we have 160 residents receiving information.

Large areas of land have been put forward as potential development areas around Sibford Gower and Sibford Ferris. United with our local Parish Councils we are working to ensure that these sites will not be included on the CDC Revised Local Plan.

25 homes are going to be built on the Hook Norton Road by Gade Homes and now a second application by Blue Cedar Homes has been submitted and is likely to be followed by a third large development in the near future. How can our villages survive with a severe lack of infrastructure and traffic already exceeding capacity?

The latest planning application 21/04271/F will be voted on at the Cherwell District Council Planning meeting on March 10th at 4pm at Bodicote house. We encourage as many residents as possible to attend this meeting.

The Sibfords are wrongly categorised as a single Category A Village, which leaves them vulnerable to speculative development. We are working with our Parish Councils, our community and our local MP to seek a review on this as soon as possible.

Please join us and help to "Protect our villages."

If you have experience in planning matters we would welcome your expertise.

What a blustery end to the half-term it has been, but a wonderful half-term nonetheless. The children are really enjoying their topic themes and have built up a strong body of knowledge over the last few weeks with our youngest children learning all about London, as our capital city, including key buildings and landmarks such as the Houses of Parliament, Buckingham Palace, the Millennium Wheel and the River Thames. They have learned about important figures, including Queen Elizabeth and the Prime Minister. The children made a very impressive version of London Zoo, sorting the animals into different species and labelling their enclosures with interesting facts and information. They painted portraits of the Queen and have built an adult height version of

Big Ben's tower in the classroom, with a fully working clock face to help them learn how to tell the time!

Over in Key Stage Two, both classes ended the term with practical workshops that reflected some of the key learning they have been doing in different areas of the curriculum. The Willow Class focus on 'Natural Disasters' culminated in 'Volcano Day' with the children working collaboratively to design, build and decorate their own mini-volcanoes which then erupted in our very own 'ring of fire'. The very impressive lava flows were created by using either bicarbonate of soda and vinegar, or mento sweets with cola. All very exciting!



Oak Class have been exploring the theme of The Victorians. In D & T, they explored how different pulleys, gears and levers work and revised their knowledge of electrical circuits. They then used this knowledge within an extended workshop in which they designed and built their own, fully moving Victorian fairground rides. They learned a lot about construction including how to use glue guns.

They love working together and the regular opportunities we plan for this during the academic year mean that, by the time the children are in their final years here, they are able to cooperate effectively on joint tasks with a courtesy and maturity that is a delight to see.

ALL CHANGE at the Sibford Gower PC



Whilst you are probably aware that Local Council elections happen in May of most years, you may not know that **in 2022 they will include elections for our own Parish Councils in The Sibfords.**

For Sibford Gower & Burdorp, some of the councillors who will have served a 4-year term, are unlikely to stand for re-election in early May, and we are now **hoping to encourage a diverse new wave of community-spirited Gower & Burdorp residents** to take on the worthwhile challenge of supporting and representing the parishioners in our unique and very special village.

Alongside routine Council business which includes managing landscape maintenance, administration of our village burial ground and making consultation responses to local planning applications, there are some emerging strategic issues, such as the Cherwell Local Plan Review and Climate Change ... **all big issues which will need the attention of some new councillors** who may have relevant expertise and/or a personal passion for influencing our community's response to these important challenges that will affect us all.

Sibford Gower & Burdorp are able to have up to 5 parish councillors who are all non-party political, and a contested election is only required if nomination applications exceed the allowed number ... so why not give it some thought?

NATURE NOTES

Now Crocuses, Snowdrops and Winter Aconites are in full bloom it feels as if Spring is on its way. These are plants are mostly introduced or garden escapes although there may be native Snowdrops around the Welsh borders.

Another non-native species to look out for is Winter Heliotrope that produces vanilla scented flowers throughout the Winter months. It is an attractive plant and provides nectar and pollen when there is little else around but is probably a bit too invasive for many gardens.

For the first time ever, I actually took part the Big Garden Bird Watch. This has been going since 1979 and now attracts over one million participants. It is an excellent way of getting children and adults to take an interest in what is in their gardens. Although it is not very scientific the enormous size of the data set generated is useful to pick up trends in bird populations. When I was entering my results, I realised how few Starlings we have seen in the garden over the last few years.

We have had a pair of Bullfinches visiting the bird feeders frequently over the last few weeks.

Although they are great to see I do feel that they are rather vulnerable to predation by cats in that they often feed on the spilt seed under the feeders and seem less alert than many other ground feeding birds.

There have been plenty of small mammals around this Winter which is good news for the local owl population but I was not happy when I discovered they had eaten out the hearts of all my overwintering Cauliflowers and Purple-sprouting broccoli. I have not encountered this problem previously.



SUNDAY SMALLHOLDING

The winter is ending and the early signs of spring are here. As I milk Sophie Goat each day I tend to gaze up into a row of six hazel trees. Milking takes just a couple of minutes but that is time enough to mentally take a photo of the daily growth stage of these trees. In the summer there is a thick canopy of leaves and many species of birds pass through. Last year a Chaffinch built a beautifully thick, cosy nest of fine twigs and moss. They are so well camouflaged that they usually go unseen, but in this case, the regular trips of both parents to bring caterpillars to feed their young led me to it. In my opinion, only Long Tailed Tits build a better nest. So, the hazel I gazed up into this morning is now decorated with hundreds of yellow catkins. I think they must be opening to release the pollen as the colour seems to have changed. I must keep an eye out for the female buds coming into flower. I have also noticed the bees bringing pollen back to the hives on their occasional winter sorties.

Goats

The goats are doing very well...by the size of Alan I think a little too well! It will be good to get him back out walking into the village, but with the weather and the fact that I have been busy back at school, the egg deliveries have been done by car. Shame. The Toggenburg goats appear to have long shaggy coats which I think will keep them warm, but Boris, a British Alpine who is now 9 months old has surprised me by growing a deep thick black winter blanket that is so soft to the touch. The shock of white hair that gave him his name has faded somewhat but his easy going affectionate personality just keeps getting bigger. Sophie continues to give plenty of milk. Now that there are no pigs to drink it there's more for me, more for the dogs and more for yogurt.

Chickens

The hens and one cockerel have settled well into the polytunnel and are totally isolated from any Avian Flu infection. There shouldn't have been any cockerels transferred from the field (and indeed four of them have ended up in the freezer), but moving the hens happened late at night when they were in their calm, easy to handle, roosting state and this one lucky cockerel was mistaken for a female. As so many of my hens have been 'home grown' it is important to bring a fresh cockerel in from another flock when I move the them all back to the field, hopefully in late March.

The polytunnel is 7 bays long; five bays are for the hens and the other two have been kept free for seed growing. It has been a struggle to keep the hens in their side - how they get through the netting is beyond me. I continue to fortify the defences for the young seedlings and enter each morning with some dread. The good news is that we have managed three days without any escapees so problem probably solved.

A heads up for anyone interested in coming along with Iain and I on May 1st (ish) to listen to the dawn chorus. Hopefully there will still be some Gus and Betty sausages left for breakfast. 2021 was not a great year for number of species for this event so hopes are for better this year.

In Your Garden - March

March should be the start of spring, but it can be wet, cold and frosty, especially up here in our glorious Cotswolds, so be wary about planting annuals and veggies outside. Wait until the soil has warmed up a bit, and it stays light for longer. You can make a start sowing seeds in a greenhouse, a sunny porch or a cold frame, and of course a sunny windowsill.

1. Time to get pruning. You have probably finished the roses by now, but if not, crack on with it and give them a treat of rose fertilizer to encourage new growth. Also prune clematis, buddleia, hardy fuschias, hebes and Hydrangea Petiolaris, (thats the climbing one) but DO NOT prune hydrangea Annabelle until April.
2. Dahlias can be started into growth towards the end of the month. Use a large pot and spread out the roots. Just cover with compost tucking the roots in, leaving the stump at soil level. Water, and leave for 6 - 8 weeks in a frost proof but light place.
3. Order some new bulbs for summer and autumn flowers. Small gladioli bysantinus are much more elegant than the loud, shouty brazen ones, and they come back each year. I love big pots of white Acidantheras, which bloom in August and September, and best of all, Nerines, which like to be snuggled in by a south-facing wall, and flower when nearly everything else has given up.
4. When the snowdrops have finished, dig up large clumps, divide and replant, and daffs will be flowering, so remember to deadhead them.
5. Hostas will be popping through, and they can be split up and replanted. You cannot have too many hostas, they are brilliant in shady places.
6. Flower beds will need weeding after you have cut back last years growth, and everything will enjoy a feed of mulch or compost. Large clumps of Michaelmas daisies,, hellebores and astrantias can all be divided and replanted, or given to friends.
7. I shall be planting some annuals soon in the greenhouse, and the absolute winners I used last year were Cosmos Rubenza, poppies, cornflowers, and malope Vulcan. My sweet peas are already emerging, but I do them a few at a time, as I am a bit short of room.

8. While one waits for the soil to warm up, it is a good time to dig over the veggie patch, and add some manure, before planting carrots, spinach, parsnips etc. Main crop potatoes can be chitted now.

9. Lawns look a bit straggly after the winter, so wait until the grass is dry, on a nice mild day, before you cut it, and do the edges. Did you remember to have the mower serviced? I didn,t.....

10. Pests! The slugs are on the warpath. I picked up the pots in the greenhouse, and found quite of lot of little baby slugs were living underneath them, and also as new shoots come through on delphiniums, they need protecting from the little blighters. As it warms up, check for white fly and green fly in the greenhouse.. Enjoy Spring - when it finally comes. Jupe Hitching

DID YOU KNOW?

While researching an inquiry received via the Sibford website I had the privilege of talking to a gentleman, called Peter Coombes, who was evacuated as a young boy to Sibford Ferris at the beginning of the Second World War. In 1939 he was living near Croydon with his parents and two sisters. His father was an ambulance driver at Biggin Hill aerodrome - one of the main fighter stations for the RAF and which played such an important role in the Battle of Britain in 1940. With his mother and two sisters, Peter was evacuated to Sibford Ferris where they lived in rooms rented from Mr and Mrs Hiles who owned and were living in Home Close. For three years they lived in part of what we now know as



Mulberry Cottage on Main Street, Sibford Ferris, in a group of cottages just before Rymells Corner. He remembers the Reading Room and the passage-way along the edge of the main meeting room which led to stairs leading to the room above where the Home Guard used to meet.

He remembers a boyhood visit back to Kent to see the area where he had lived. He recalls the total devastation caused by bombs aimed to destroy the aerodrome. His father became very ill and could no longer work, so he too came to Sibford to recover. Once well enough, he became a delivery driver for the Co-op and delivered to the Co-op store in Sibford Gower. While visiting other local villages he found a larger cottage to rent in North Newington. The family moved to North Newington after three years in Sibford, and lived there for a further three years until, with three further additions to their family, they were granted a council house in Adderbury. Peter gained a place to Banbury Grammar School and met up with boys he had known while living in Sibford. He remembers a lorry arriving at his house at the beginning of the school year delivering him a bicycle so he could cycle to school each day in Banbury.

Now in his 90's Peter still lives in the same house in Adderbury, which he subsequently bought, and lives independently with support from his son who also lives locally. It is good to know that his evacuation to Sibford and time spent in this area as a young boy, has led to a long and full life living in this part of North Oxfordshire.
