HORTI SOCIETY

On October 12th Harriet Rycroft, ex-head gardener of Whichford Pottery, came to talk to us on the subject of Planting Pots for Winter Interest and Spring Joy. Veronique has been in negotiation with Harriet since 2019 but with COVID etc it has only just become possible to get her to Sibford. And we were not disappointed! We enjoyed a lively and informative evening with one of the hall tables being put through it's paces as Harriet whacked a large terracotta pot firmly down on it time and again, expelling air from within the pot and making me fear for the safety of pot and table! She gave us some useful tips among which were: to plant now for a spring display, keep a record of what you plant, limit the colour palette, plant a group of pots repeating the same colours for maximum impact and have in mind shapes, colours, height, how the plants work with the pot and timing. Harriet uses Melcourt Sylva Grow general purpose peat free compost which she enhances with slow release fertiliser. These come in either 15litre or 50litre bags. 15l = £2.50 + VAT, 50l = £5.90 + VAT. If I have enough expressions of interest I will order a pallet of compost. (A pallet will probably be at least 40 bags)

On November 9th we close our 2022 programme on a high point with Timothy Walker who will be coming to talk to us on Paradise Lost and Restored: 400 years of garden design in Oxfordshire. As usual, doors open at 7.00 for a 7.30 start, but we will be serving mulled wine and seasonal food beforehand so do come along and join us. Non-members always welcome, ± 3.00

Our Year 5 & 6 Oak Class children ventured off to Shropshire for a four night residential at Condover Hall. From kayaking to laser quest, buggy building to high ropes, every day had something new and the children made the most of it. NATURE NOTES

As we have been away my own observations are a bit limited this month.

On sunny days in late September any Ivy that had been left to flower was often covered in various insects including very fresh looking Comma and Red Admiral butterflies.

Despite the very dry summer there seems to be an abundance of hedgerow fruits as well as acorns and beech nuts which will provide a good food source for many small mammals and birds.

Sue Sabin has seen a hedgehog several times in her orchard and commented that returning Redwings and Fieldfares are now appearing in the general area. She also heard a Firecrest in the Blue Cedar outside her house.

I have noticed that there are quite a few of the tiny but pretty Owl-midges around this year. They are also known as Moth-flies or by the less complimentary name Drain-flies or Sewage-flies. There are 99 species in the UK but they are very difficult to identify to species level. The adults live for up to 5 days and lay their eggs on decaying matter including the slime around drains and sinks. The larvae then feed on this matter for a couple of weeks before pupating.



NOT SO GREAT TASTE

Thought I'd give you my take on cauliflower cheese.......

CAULIFOWER CHEESES-ISH

Fresh spinach - a handful

1 Cauliflower, ripped into florets

Cheese (grated) - any old cheese you like. I usually have a mixture of cheadar, parmigiano, manchego and anything else in the bottom of the cheese drawer.

Milk - 200ml; Butter - 100g; Flour - 100g

Tomatoes - about 3 sliced (depends on the size, I guess)

Breadcrumbs - a handful

White wine - small glass (or large if you feel like it)

Steam the caulifower for about 5 minutes. Grab a baking dish and chuck the spinach in it and then put the florets on top. Now, make the cheese sauce.

Bung the butter in a pan and melt, take it off the heat and chuck in the flour - stirring constantly (you don't want lumpy sauce) Shove it back on the heat and cook for about 5 minutes. Take it off and slowly add the milk. Add s&p. Once it's smooth, get it on the heat again and cook until it gets thicker, constantly stirring. Now add the wine and keep stirring. You should now have a lovely smooth sauce. Finally chuck in your grated cheese and let it melt into the sauce.

Pour it over the cauliflower and place tomato slices on top. Finally, and top it with breadcrumbs and some more grated cheese. Shove it in the oven at 200 degrees) for about 30 minutes.

Voila!

In Your Garden - November

- 1. This is the best time to plant bare-root roses, so order some now, and on arrival unpack immediately and soak in a bucket of water.
- 2 It is also a good time to plant new rhubarb crowns, if you divide up the old established crowns.
- 3. It is a bumper year for apples and pears. Keep checking the stored fruit regularly for signs of rot, and hand some out to your lovely neighbours.
- 4.. When all the apples and pears have been picked, now is a good time to start pruning them.
- 5. If your garden is beginning to be rather colourless, a bit bleak perhaps? In need of a bit of winter cheer? It is time to go and visit an Arboretum lovely one over at Bourton on the Hill, and see the rainbow of colours you could be having. Try adding cyclamen hederifolium they like to sit happily under trees. Some roses have magnificent berries. Try R.Glauca, R.geranium. or R. Shropshire Lass. If you have room for a small tree, many of the Acers are brilliant.
- 6.Rake up the fallen leaves on the lawn, and avoid walking over it on frosty mornings. Use the leaves to make leaf mould, or to use as mulch over tender plants.
- 7.If you have been removing stakes and canes which have been supporting plants earlier in the year, or propping up beans and tomatoes, it is a good idea to clean them, and stow away in the shed. (Ah Ha, this makes me laugh. I noticed this morning that I had left mine in a muddy heap behind the shed. I really must try and do what I tell everyone else to do.)
- 8. November is the right time to start planting your tulips, and always plant them really deeply. This will protect them from whatever the weather throws at us this winter..
- 9. And if you do it early on in the month, you can still plant winter bedding, and do some lovely pots, with wallflowers, primroses and primulas, violas and Bellis Perennis.
- 10. Might be a good idea to buy in some birdseed, and fatballs, in case they vanish off the shelves too, and it is Bonfire Night! Yippee. But please have a good poke around underneath it, in case there are toads and hedgehogs standing there. And enjoy the mulled Wine.


DID YOU KNOW?

Hill Top Security and Shelter

During the Iron Age and Roman era there was a large hilltop fort on the conical hill above Swalcliffe, known as Madmarston Hill. It has been extensively excavated and remains of human activity, including iron bars used as currency, iron implements and weapons (swords and spears) have been found there. Pots made from local clay and identified from the Iron Age have also been found there.

Was Burdrop once a Hill Fort?

Leslie Baily – an ex-scholar of Sibford School and local Sibford Historian, suggested that the primitive hill-village of Burdrop, standing high above the surrounding countryside may have been an outpost for Madmarston's full defences affording good visibility providing early warning against any tribal invaders or missionaries visiting pagan Burdrop. A 'burh' was described as a hill-top defended place and, with the asset of a stream at its foot, the hill village commanded views of the eastwest trackways reaching as far as Broadway Tower on the main Cotswold Ridge. A hilltop settlement comprised huge earthwork circuits of banks and ditches.



stockade would have provided safety for its people from wild animals roaming the forests. The cultivated land lay outside the perimeter of the settlement in the valleys below. Trade and ceremonies may have been shared with Madmarston and might even have reflected the same focus as the ceremonial functions celebrated at the nearby Rollright Stones found on the Jurassic Way West. The ditches ran around the extensive high banks in a circular fashion and these acted as a maze to confuse attacking enemies. Its circle of dwelling huts, known as roundhouses, provided sleeping accommodation and shelter from the elements. Other outbuildings were used for cooking, food storage and animal shelter. The settlement was totally enclosed by a ring of stakes. The whole
